THE SABBATH OBSERVANCE ASSO.

The first public meeting of this association took place on the evening of Wednesday, the 18th, and proved in every way a success. Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather the hall was filled with interested ladies and gentlemen, all of whom, to judge by the breathless silence with which they followed the speakers and the active applause with which they rewarded them, sympathized heartily with the movement, and very many gave proof of their sincerity by handing in their names for membership. A spirit of earnestness characterized the entire proceedings, and all seemed to realize that a work of holy import had been begun, to the success of which all Israelites true to their religion and to themselves must contribute. It was not a question of approval or disapproval; it was simply to decide how can I best help on, support and assist an association that has for its sole object and aim the rehabilitation of the Sabbath, the restoration of the virtuous home-life and the invigoration of true manhood; consistency between profession and action and that true sense of honor which are all the fruit and outgrowth of the Sabbath spirit when properly understood and faithfully practiced. Hence is the Sabbath the "sine qua non" of the Jewish Home. It gives weekly the opportunity, AND DEMANDS IT, AS A DUTY to enforce by precept and example those fundamental principles of rectitude and morality, of honesty, fidelity and self-control, contained in the sacred Ten Commandments, but we fail, only too often, to appreciate at its true and high value this heaven-born weekly call to duty and self-examination.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Dr. M. Blumenthal, who cordially welcomed all present to the opening meeting of the new association, and after giving a very concise report of the organization, with the names of its founders, read "the Declaration" as defining its aim and object, accompanied by an appeal for earnest co-operation, and finally by a paper defining the reasons WHY—in addition to the ALL-POWERFUL AND BEST, AS BEING THE WILL OF GOD—every Israelite, if he truly is such, is bound in duty to God, to himself, to his people and to mankind, to honor and "remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy!"




