# SHADOWS AND ECHOES.

THINGS I SAW AND PEOPLE I KNEW.

By Halitvack—When Sholom Shavlan Was Chazan—A Shevuos Story.

I thought I would tell you a little story from somewhere outside Pavonda for a change. But it is to be a Shevuos story, the editor says, so I must take you back once more to Pavonda. But I can promise you this, before I am quite quite through I will set you down again in New York.

What I know about Shevuos or any other great day is all from Pavonda. I have not seen Shevuos here; and all I can hear in connection with it is confirmations, and I don't understand that. I thought always confirmations had something to do with Bishops. Maybe they have Rabbi Bishops here; but I never tried to understand them. In a sense, of course, you cannot expect to have the same Shevuos here as they had in Pavonda. In Pavonda Shevuos was the anniversary of the giving of the Torah; but what would be the use putting it that way here. Where is the Torah?

Mostly every Shevuos was much the same as the other. They were all beautiful and welcome, and each succeeding Shevuos was as fresh as the one before it: there was little change in them till that memorable Shevuos when the great Chazan Sholom Shavlan was in town with his eight helpers, four of them, at least, grown up men with beards, themselves each fit to be a Chazan: and you do not often see that feature in the personnel of an itinerant Chazan. But Sholom Shavlan was an exception.

And it was Rabbi Azriel they had to thank for it that Shevuos; and that was strange, for Rabbi Azriel never loved Chazonim. "If they would only sing and let the Almighty alone!" Rabbi Azriel used to say. "But they keep on dunning and dunning into His ears the same word twenty times." Sholom Shavlan was a great Chazan, of course, and that means that he was given to repeating his words, more often and more persistently than the smaller Chazonim. During that Shevuos, in the Mussaph, Hirsch the cobbler counted the

great Chazan's repetitions of the word "No, Chag Hashovuos" nine times himself, and two times to each of his helpers—that is twenty-five times altogether. But that is telling it too soon. I wanted to tell you

tour. Usually a Chazan does not leave his own town until after Shevuos; but unusual men will do the unusual things, and Shavlan cared nothing for precedent or example, for he was a famous Chazan,

It was more than Pavonda ever would have dared aspire to, even just for the Sabbath. For Shavlan, it was known, would not stay a Sabbath anywhere under fifty roubles, and that had to be guaranteed to

where he had been making for, and which was the nearest town, unless he traveled the night through and a Chazan with such precious Keilim would not dare brave night travel.

Friday morning a deputation from the Baalei Bathim waited upon Shavlan to arrange for the Sabbath. Twenty roubles was all they would guarantee him, and so Shavlan agreed to give them their choice of either the Kabbolath Shabbas Friday evening or the Mussaph Sabbath morning. He would give them twenty roubles' worth and no more. They chose the Kabbolath Shabbas, for it was less to wait for that.

Shavlan's performance that Friday night was a revelation. Never was such a Chazan heard. "S-s-s—a throat!" the Baalei Bathim said to one another in frenzied admiration. "A lion—a very lion's throat he has."

Shavlan was better than his word as a bargain-driver. He was entitled, according to the agreement, to quit the Almema after the Lecho Dodis, and leave the Maariv proper to some one else. But he was generous and he continued on. His Borchu was a marvel in Chazanship, as well as conductorship, the way he had his choir arranged. "S-s-s—that is what you call singing," the people said, "you'd think you were in a garden full of birds of all sorts." And the Hashkivenu—why Sholom Shavlan's Hashkivenu is still preserved intact with the people of Pavonda; and away in Chicago, where you will find many of them, you can hear them to this hour sing Shavlan's Hashkivenu wherever a bit of Simcha occurs, a birth or a wedding, or just a house-warming.

It used to be Rabbi Azriel's Chazoko to count the Sphirah each night. That Friday night the usual thing happened, Rabbi Azriel made the brochah and counted the Omer. Before, however, he was half through there was a tremendous banging on the desk of the almemar, and then, as if on second thought, the banging ceased. It was Chazan Shavlan did that himself, and I can never tell

why he stopped it suddenly, whether it was that he remembered it was too late and of no use or whether he felt he had given them too much as it was. But I can tell you what had at first moved him to resent Rabbi Azriel's intrusion, as he thought it. Shavlan had fixed up a most elaborate Sphira, with all his choir, to which he was about to treat the congregation, and there Rabbi Azriel should come and take it all out of his hands, or his throat rather. It was fortunate that the occurrence did not become generally known there and then, or there might have arisen a bitter revolution from the nether world—the erev-rav; that is, the riff raff (you see, I am providing you the opportunity gratis to sharpen your etymological faculty).

When all was over and the Baale Bathim learned the nature of their loss, they grew very restless. They could not get over it. And Rabbi Azriel, too, was sorry, for their sake, and he told them so. He would never have claimed his chazoko if he had known it, but who ever had heard of a Chazan's counting the Omer with full choir? Rabbi Azriel could never dream of it.

On the morrow, after the Havdolo, Zelig Moshes and Chatzkel Zundell and Herzel Mochmans, the three most important Baalei Bathim, waited on Rabbi Azriel with a very audacious proposition. Chazan Shavlan, they said, would be willing to remain over Shevuos with them for sixty roubles; which they would try to make up, but could not quite guarantee. But there was the money they had been collecting for the new Merchatz they were to build, and if Rabbi Azriel, who was one of the trustees, along with the three of themselves, would agree to let them fall back upon that for what they might be short in their collection for the Chazan, then it would be all right.

And Rabbi Azriel felt himself guilty on account of the Sphira. He looked upon himself so much as having cheated the public out of a very good thing, that he did not hold out any very strenuous objection. He merely said to his co-trustees, "do as you think fit," and they thought it very fit. They knew well if they consulted the public, whose money it was, the answer would have been most emphatic that they would rather the Chazan than the Merchatz.

But I need not go on telling you that after all there really was no occasion for referring to the Merchatz money. They made up the sixty roubles straight from the collections for the Chazan, and they had it ready the day before Erev Shevuos. Everybody gave with a generosity to match their enthusiasm.

It was a memorable Shevuos, not

forgotten yet, and never will be.

But where is Sholom Shavlan now? Long ago the America craze had seized him, too. But New York never was Pavonda in the oldest times. They had other music here; and, to make it even, by the way, what is music here would not be the music in Pavonda. It would never warm their hearts enough; that is not at all saying that the music of New York Chazonim touches the hearts here. But, of course, it need not, and it makes no difference, as long as the choristers wear beautiful caps and the conductor knows how to wave his arms to make him look like doing work.

But where is Sholom Shavlan, all the same? He is a Shammas in a little Shool in Allen Street, or maybe it is Monroe Street, it makes no difference. He is not a Chazan.

In *The B'nai B'rith News* for May, Dr. Julian Morgenstern, one of the "pillars" of the Hebrew Union College, who claims to be equally at one with scholars and "baseball fans," discourses on Rabbi J. Leon Magnes' induction into the pulpit of B'nai Jeshurun as a recent significant event. His views are of no particular interest to our readers; it suffices to say that he finds the movement headed by the local rabbi to be fundamentally weak and jejune. One point he makes which may be repeated often in the future: he says that Rabbi Magnes no longer stands for the counter-reformation but for American orthodoxy. As if orthodoxy could be earmarked by geographical attributes! What is known as "American" Judaism could not be otherwise than of the reform variety. But orthodox Judaism is consistent, logical, historical, the direct descendant of the Judaism of our ancestors in ages past. Rabbi Magnes stands for Judaism of the latter sort, and his conception and exposition of our faith can no more be denominated American than the graduates of the Hebrew Union College could be called *eo ipso* doctors in "Christian" Science. Dr. Morgenstern's attempt to localize Rabbi Magnes' stand and platform is Cincinnati in temper and validity.

## A SAD HISTORIC PENTECOST.

A Sample of Roman Good Will During the Time of Augustus!

**P**ENTECOST! How well timed! How opportunely chosen! In the loveliest month, in the most beautiful season of the year, when the earth is luxuriantly clad in its daintiest garb of vegetation, and everything around seems so harmoniously attuned for the celebration of a festival, falls the "Feast of Weeks." And yet exquisitely fine as this season is in all other parts of the world, it still presents no comparison to what this very season is like in Palestine, the ancient abode and original home of this festival—there the scene is superb. There the land from the shores of the Mediterranean to the heights of Judea and northward to the fertile plains of Samaria and Galilee smiles benignly in summer's beauty. There a deep blue, cloudless sky arches over purple vineyards and dark olive groves, over cornfields, whose stalks, laden with ripe, healthy grain, bend their heavy ears at this season and invite the reaper's sickle. There the "Harvest Festival," as שְׁבִעוֹת is called, sets in amid all the splendor and brilliancy and charm of a peculiarly favored climate; amid all the smiles and benignity, wealth and profusion of beauty; amid all the variety of leaf and tint of an Eastern climate of that particular region, and accompanied by a chorus of melody of sweet songsters—nature's own trained musicians, whose exquisite thrills minister to the occasion and invest the celebration with the holiness of beauty.

But Rome, whose mission (as far as we were effected) evidently was to turn our most joyous occasions into sorrowful plights, first began to show us a sample of the kind of goods she was to deliver into our country in the near future by turning this joyous festival into mourning.

This was in the year 3 B. C. Archelous, son and successor of Herod, whose rights were disputed by the other members of that august (?) family, had left for Rome to plead his case before Augustus, whom Herod in his will had named for the sole executor. At the desire of Archelous, Quintilius Varus, the Roman Governor, remained in Jerusalem after his (Archelous') departure for Rome to crush any attempt at revolt that might occur during his absence—knowing how little his people cared for him. Varus, however, finding that there was no cause to fear a revolt, soon left the Judean Capital and returned to Antioch.

No sooner, however, had Varus left than Sabinus, the treasurer of Augustus, came to Jerusalem to claim the treasures of Herod and that of the Temple, as if the property of the latter had been Herod's own private wealth and the Emperor the acknowledged heir; and this Sabinus did, notwithstanding the distinct promise he had made to Varus that he would remain at Caesarea until the Herodian disputes were settled by the Emperor. Sabinus came and demanded the surrender of the treasurer; and as his request was not quite so quickly complied with by the custodians, he created a disturbance among the people and thus obtained a pretext for entering the city.

The Feast of Pentecost was drawing near, and, as usual, multitudes of people congregated into Jerusalem from all parts of the country. Hearing that Sabinus was going to force his way into the Temple, the people resented the affront, soon chose their

leaders, formed themselves into an army of defense, and occupied the Temple mount and the Hippodrome; from which place of vantage they defied the Romans, who had taken up their quarters in the palace of Herod. Sabinus, the greedy, rapacious Roman, thinking that he would not otherwise get possession of the sacred treasury, encouraged the Romans to besiege the Temple; while at the same time he sent a message to Varus to hasten on with reinforcements. The Judeans, hearing that the Roman soldiery were laying siege to the Holy Temple, hurled all kinds of missiles, even huge stones, upon the Romans from the roofs of the cloisters or porticoes surrounding the outer court of the Temple, which they had mounted. The people fought bravely and would have gained the victory; but Sabinus, to whom nothing was sacred, gave orders to set fire to the cloisters, whose roofs were made of wood, cemented with pitch and wax; and the whole magnificent range, the Herodian pride, became one immense conflagration; the gilding melted, the columns fell, and all our people, upon the roofs were either crushed to death among the blazing ruins or lay victims to the unrelenting fury of the enemy; many of them also fell on their own swords, but none escaped.

As soon as the Temple was left unprotected the daring Roman robbers broke into the sanctuary, plundered on all sides. Sabinus himself secured 400 talents, and the rest was secreted by the pillagers.

The plunder of these treasures, the desecration of the Holy of Holies and the destruction of the halls of the Temple, barely ten years after their re-erection by Herod, roused all the indignation and, aye, all the valor of our people. The bravest of our people assembled from all quarters, even many of Herod's soldiers went over to the Judean side, and assisted them to fight against the Romans. Thus assisted, they besieged the palace, pressed the siege with vigor, began to move the palace, but offered Sabinus to spare his life if he were to depart from the city. Sabinus vacillated, expecting the reinforcements, which after repeated entreaties from him did arrive. Varus came along with two legions and four troops of horse; but Sabinus, ashamed of meeting Varus, stole away to the coast and took ship for Rome. Yet had Varus crucified 2,000 patriotic Judeans for trying to prevent the desecration of their Temple and checking the rapacity of the Roman Sabinus!


Such was the kind of "Yom-tov" our people spent that Pentecost as a result of their first conflict with that "beast with iron teeth, brazen claws and heart of stone," i. e., rapacious Rome; and this was but a foretaste of what Rome had in store for them.

Rome is in her grave; Judea, however, is manifesting signs of revivification; and the day of her complete resurrection may not be quite so far off as some of our assimilators imagine. As all roads led formerly to Rome, they all now lead to Zion; and the roads become clearer with every year. The realization of Israel's long cherished hope is certainly near-

er than further; and Pentecost, like all our festivals, will come back some day to her own.

NOTE—Tradition says that Sabinus met with shipwreck; and that all the gold and silver he robbed from the Temple treasury went to the bottom of the sea.

The corner stone of the new synagogue of Temple Beth-El, Niagara, N. Y., was laid on Sunday last.

The Louisiana State Bankers' Association has elected Mr. Joseph Gottlieb, of Baton Rouge as vice-president.

The United Hebrew Democratic Clubs of Brooklyn have changed their name to the Loyal League of Brooklyn.

The annual convention of District Grand Lodge No. 2, I. O. E. B., will be held in Denver, Col., on June 25-27.

A contract has been awarded for the erection of a synagogue for the Congregation B'nai Israel of Scranton, Pa.

Dr. Sandor Herwitz, for the past two years city physician of Peoria, Ill., has just been reappointed for a full term.

A handsome building, to be ready on September 1, is being erected by the Bayonne (N. J.) Hebrew Free School.

A number of young Jewish men, prominent in Philadelphia's social circles, are planning to form a new country club.

Die Yiddische Stimme, the first Yiddish newspaper to be issued from Cincinnati, O., has made its appearance.

Benjamin Frankenberg, merchant and philanthropist, died at his home in Dayton, Ohio, on the 20th ult., aged seventy-six.

Handsome new quarters of the Dayton (Ohio) Young Men's Hebrew Association were formally opened last Sunday night.

The King of Italy has conferred the knighthood of the Order of the Crown on Rabbi Abraham Eblagon, Chief Rabbi of Crete.

Steps have been taken for the organization of a conservative reformed congregation in the Flatbush section of Brooklyn.

King George honored Mr. and Mrs. Leopold de Rothschild with his company to dinner at Palace House, Newmarket recently.

At the festival dinner of the Jewish Religious Education Board in London, Eng., last month, over £12,600 was collected.

Last month saw the consecration of a new synagogue at Bulawayo, South Africa, which has accommodation for 550 seatholders.

Rabbi W. H. Finschreiber, of Davenport, Ia., has accepted a call to become assistant rabbi of Temple Israel of Memphis, Tenn.

The United Hebrew Charities have filed objections to several of the provisions in the proposed new charter for New York city.

Senator Ferdinand Dreyfus will preside over the International Congress of Children's Courts, which will be held in Paris next month.

M. J. Assael, Dragoman to the German Consulate-General in Salonica, has been appointed Knight of the Order of the Crown of Prussia.

Mrs. Anna Gilblom, founder of the Detroit, Mich., Chevra Kadisha Society and active in many other Detroit charities, died last month.

Members of Temple Sinai, of New Orleans, La., are considering an offer to sell their edifice to the local temple of Shriners for \$70,000.

A special committee has been formed at Durban, consisting of members of both the old and new Hebrew Congregations, with the view to bringing about the amalgamation of the two congregations.

There are two rooms devoted to Jewish exhibits at the International Hygienic Exhibition in Dresden, Saxony.

A Jewish naturalization bureau has been organized in Milwaukee, Wis., to encourage American citizenship.

Max Hankofsky has invoked the aid of the courts to have the Congregation Beth Jacob of Baltimore, Mr., restore him to membership.

Dr. H. Aschkensal, a student of the Rabbinical Seminary in Berlin, has been appointed Rabbi of the colonies of the Ica in the Argentine.

Mrs. Zelda Rosenberg, mother of ex-United States Consul to Rio Janeiro Louis A. Rosenberg, died at Detroit, Mich., last week, aged sixty.

Vandals broke into the Eighth Street Temple, Washington, D. C., last week, and besides doing other damage, practically ruined the \$40,000 organ.

The Jewish Publication Society has 7,608 members. New York State leads with 1,975, followed by Pennsylvania with 1,748 and Illinois with 1,052.

The honorary degree of LL.D. is to be conferred by Cambridge University on Lord Rothschild, formerly of Trinity College, on Wednesday, June 14.

The libel suit brought against the London Schechita Board, the Jewish Chronicle and others, in which the jury disagreed, is to be tried over again.

The recently organized Ohav Zedek Congregation of Denver, Col., is prospering and contemplates building its own synagogue in the very near future.

Mr. Julius Rosenwald, of Chicago, has subscribed \$50,000 toward a fund of \$500,000 for the erection of a hotel modeled after the Mills Hotels in New York city.

A new site has been purchased for a synagogue to be erected by the Beth Israel Congregation of Bangor, Me., to replace the edifice recently destroyed by fire.

The second annual convention of Philadelphia Roumanian Hebrews was concluded last week. Mayor Reyburn and other prominent speakers addressed the assembly.

A monument to Heinrich Heine is to be erected at Frankfurt on a site granted by the municipality. About 18,000 marks have been subscribed up to the present.

Rabbi C. L. Cohen, at present in charge of the Congregation Ohav Israel, of South Sharon, Pa., has accepted a call from the Congregation B'nai Israel of Toledo, Ohio.

Commandant Giuseppe Castelli, Inspector-General of Agricultural and Commercial Education, has been promoted Grand Officer of the Order of the Crown of Italy.

The Khedive of Egypt has conferred the title of Pasha on Moise Bey Cattaul and M. Joseph Cattaul-Aslan, both of whom have played a notable part in Egyptian finance.

The Hebrew Sheltering and Emigrant Aid Society has added a statistical department which will in future take a record of every immigrant arriving at the port of New York.

Rabbi Isaac Caplan has been elected by the Vaad Hakolel Congregation of Rochester, N. Y. Rabbi Caplan at present is visiting Jewish chaplain to the Monroe County institutions.

Mrs. Henrietta Nathan, who died at St. Louis, Mo., recently, willed \$2,500 to the Denver Jewish Hospital, besides making small bequests to a number of other Jewish charities.

Twenty-five years ago the Alliance Israelites Universelle had fifty schools, with 8,200 pupils; in 1910 it had 150 schools with 42,000 pupils, maintained at a cost of 2,000,000 francs.

A movement is on foot in Galicia to convene a Conference of Orthodox rabbis with the view to the adoption of measures to stem the growing irreligion of the Jews in that country.

Senator Ludovico Mortara has been appointed Advocate-General at the Court of Cassation in Rome. He is the author of a complete commentary on Italian Law of Civil Procedure.

The death has occurred, at Carlsruhe, in his seventy-first year, of Kommerzienrat Benjamin Hirsch, the head of the firm of Aaron Hirsch and Sons, the famous metal merchants.

The B'nai Jeshurun Congregation, of Newark, N. J., have just taken title to the property at High street and Waverly avenue as a site for a new synagogue. The consideration was \$50,000.

A large portion of Tachau, a Bohemian town, has been destroyed by fire. Among the buildings which fell a prey to the flames was the synagogue, which was more than one hundred years old.

Rabbi Leon Harrison, of St. Louis, Mo., has been made defendant in a suit to recover \$10,000, the plaintiff alleging that he was damaged that amount by being struck by the rabbi's automobile.

The German subscribers of the Alliance Israelite are opposing the re-election of M. Salomon Reinach as vice-president on account of his published criticisms of fundamental elements of Judaism.

At Novozibkoff, the police recently made several assaults on Jews in the streets, beating them in cruel manner. Their two latest victims were young men, whom they observed smoking on Saturday.

The late Frau Therese Plek, of Dresden, has bequeathed legacies to the Jewish community and various Jewish philanthropic institutions in that city, amounting in the aggregate to nearly 1,900,000 marks.

An interpellation in the Duma has resulted in the appointment of a Commission of Enquiry into the circumstances of the alleged ritual murder in Kieff, which is still being exploited by the Black Hundreds.

Joe Weber has completed arrangements for an early production of Rabbi Isaac Landmann's drama "A Man of Honor." Edmund Breese will be starred in the play and will be assisted by Hans Robert, Ralph Delmore, Ben Johnson and Mary Nash.

Sir Philip Magnus, M.P., has been elected chairman of the Parliamentary Peace and Arbitration Committee, and Sir Edward Sassoon, M.P., Hon. secretary of the British Group of the Inter-Parliamentary Union.

Great fires have destroyed the Jewish Hospital at Kieff and large portions of Foleshti (Kishineff), and of Skidel and Gontzdzi, in the province of Grodno, leaving two hundred and fifty Jewish families homeless.

The will of the late Michael S. Levy, of Baltimore, Md., shows many bequests to Jewish charities, among them being \$10,000, the income to be used for the benefit of the Beth Hamedrash of the Chazak Amuno Congregation.

The Rabbinical Board, which was recently organized under the auspices of the Jewish Community (Kehillah) of New York city, has now taken definite shape, and it has determined as its first work to constitute itself as a Va'ad Hakashruth (Ritual Food Board). This signifies that after long preparatory work the regulation of Kashruth is to be taken earnestly in hand.

The rabbis at present constituting the board are Rabbis Finklestein, Fried, Halperson, Jaffe, Kanarick, Klein, Kaplan, Margolies, Rabinowitz and Rosenberg.

At the meeting of the board held on May 24, at the Hebrew Charities Building, it was determined to invite all the authorized rabbis of New York city to join the board, and all such rabbis are accordingly requested to send their names to any member of the board or to the office of the Kehillah, 356 Second avenue.

IN MEMORIAM.

BELAIS, SOLOMON.—Staunch to his faith, loyal to his convictions, an example of simple orthodox Jewish life which meant obedience to the Torah, culture by wide reading, Sabbath beauty in the home—such was Solomon Belais, who in his ripe old age passed away last Sunday.

He was the son of the Dayan Abraham Belais, of the Kahal Kados Shaar Hashomayim, better known as the Spanish and Portuguese Congregation of London, Eng. Solomon Belais came to this country some sixty years ago, and by his industry soon established himself and ultimately became a recognized authority to advise the largest firms of this city.

He shrank from public life and knew no happiness outside of his own home. His wife was Jael, daughter of the late Rev. David A. de Sola, the learned minister of the London synagogue above-mentioned—a true Esheth Hayil.

The religious loyalty of such elders must be cherished, and their staunch obedience forever remembered as our example.

Mount Neboh Congregation.

At this writing five meetings on as many consecutive Thursday nights will have been held in the interests of the new congregation on Washington Heights. At each one fresh enthusiasm caused an increase of enrollment on the membership list until now Rabbi Samuel Greenfield has the support of over forty heads of families.

In explanation of his move Rabbi Greenfield said: "Insurgency is the battle-cry in politics and against the unlawful powers of bodies that are dominant by virtue of having control of the situation. Somewhat similar has been the reason for insurgency in our ranks. This has developed in movements assuming two extremely contrary phases, the 'Free Synagogue' and the reactionary one of more recent date. In both instances the democracy of the synagogue has been recognized and reassured."

"The old-line congregation has been a perfect failure of recent years. It has not grown with the population and nine-tenths of the Jewish people of Greater New York are unaffiliated. As a vast problem to be satisfactorily solved, this one of how to draw into the ranks this mass of unattached Jews is worthy of the most serious attention."

"For the past few years I have several times been approached by different families to take up the work of organizing a congregation on the upper west side of Manhattan whither the people have flocked in large numbers and where there are inadequate facilities for worship and Sabbath school instruction. This request coupled with my desire to establish one more link in the chain of popular, democratic synagogues has been urgent enough to make me take up a work which will prove more satisfactory from a spiritual standpoint than being connected with a congregation that abides by its old and antiquated laws of pew membership, initiation fees or other barriers to the admission of the general public."

"Doctrinally, I do not stand on new ground. Anyone who believes in conservative reform ritual may enroll as an aid to the cause of a popular synagogue intended to serve the interest of the many as against the religious corporation that invites the prejudice of the general populace. Rich and poor alike will be welcomed at the meetings."

The temporary officers are Messrs. M. Levin, president; E. R. Cohn, vice-president, and W. H. Stiner, secretary and treasurer.

Meetings are held regularly every Thursday night at the assembly room of Haldon Court on the southwest corner of 153d street and Broadway.

Famine Among Jews in Palestine.

A meeting was held last week at the United Hebrew Charities Building under the auspices of the Kehillah to discuss the critical and alarming condition of the starving Jews in Palestine. Dr. Magnus presided, and among the audience were many prominent rabbis and laymen and also Prof. Richard Gottheil, who is well acquainted with conditions in Palestine.

It was unanimously decided to make an earnest appeal to the Jews of the United States for funds for the immediate relief of our suffering brethren in Palestine. A committee in Palestine was selected, consisting of two rabbis and three laymen, as follows: Rabbi Chaim Berlin, of Jerusalem; Rabbi Cook, of Jaffe; Mr. J. Levi, director of Anglo-Palestine Bank; Dr. Segal, chief physician, of Baron Rothschild Hospital, and Mr. Marx, president of the Hospital Shaare Zedek, all who are in no way connected with the existing Chaluka system there.

Funds collected here will be forwarded to the above committee.

The local committee urgently requests that the American Jews liberally give their financial support to this worthy cause. Contributions may be sent to Mr. Nathan Roggen, treasurer, 43 East Broadway, New York.

New Site for Beth David Hospital.

The Federation of Russian Polish Hebrews of America has bought the entire block at Eighty-sixth street, Henderon place and East End avenue facing Carl Schurz Park and the East River as a site for a new building and grounds for the Beth David Hospital.

The hospital is now at 246-48 East Eighty-second street, and the demand for admission by poor patients has become so great that a larger and more modern institution is needed. The hospital is supported by the federation and by voluntary contributions.

The new hospital will be built on a lot 72 by 90 feet. It will be six stories high and of Gothic architecture, and will have 150 beds.

president of the Jewish community there, who has for several years past taken up cases of this kind. As the result of his prompt and energetic action, the nuns delivered up the girl, who was restored to her parents. She states that recently six Jewesses were abducted from their homes and were baptised in the Convent. At the present time another Jewess is being prepared there for conversion to Christianity.

Senator Alexander Georgievsky, who died recently at Tsarskoe Selo, was one of the few bureaucrats who always warmly supported the Jewish cause. In 1860, he contributed to the Raszyet and other Jewish journals on the Jews in Western Europe with a view to impressing upon Russia the virtues of emancipation. He participated in various official committees on the Jewish problem, and he was largely responsible for the favorable conclusions of Count Phalen's Commission in 1883, advocating the gradual emancipation of the Jews.

**Dinner to Joseph Barondess.**  
The banquet tendered by the Zionists of this city to Mr. Joseph Barondess last Sunday in Palm Garden, was most successful, and among the three hundred guests present a considerable number gave additional evidence of their interest in Mr. Barondess's Zionist work by contributing over twelve hundred dollars to the fund of three thousand dollars, which is now being raised for the purpose of establishing a printing press for "Dos Yiddishg Folk."

The dinner was given to mark the close of one year's term in office as president of the Zion Association, during which time Mr. Barondess rendered excellent service to this Zionist weekly newspaper. The dinner was arranged by the directors of the association in conjunction with the committee representing his friends, fellow Zionists and associates in communal work.

For some time past nothing has been heard of the soul-catching activity of the nuns of the Felzlaner Convent in Cracow. A fortnight ago, a young Jewess suddenly disappeared from a Galician village. A few days later her parents learned that she was in the Convent at Cracow, and they at once approached Dr. Rafael Landau, vice-



# NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

(Exclusive Correspondence to the HEBREW STANDARD.)

**The Excavations in Jerusalem—Some Account of an Extraordinary Judaeo-Turkish Sect—Present Position of Shabbatianism—Lloyd George's New State Insurance Bill and Jews. Hebrew Friendly Societies Deeply Concerned.**

(Exclusive Correspondence Hebrew Standard.) London, May 12, 1911.

Jewish Turkish topics seem to be especially prominent just now. A great deal of discussion has been aroused, for example, in connection with the British Archaeological Expedition which has been working in Jerusalem under the control of Captain the Honorable Montagu Parker. Two seasons' work have been put in and extensive excavations made. Reuter's messages have made the facts in connection with this public, and mysterious stories of ciphers revealing information regarding the hiding places of Moses' Tables of the Law have been told. Incidentally the excavators discovered tombs of the ancient J-busites dating back to 3000 B. C. In another part of the Turkish Dominions an important part appears to have been played by the extraordinary Judaeo-Turkish sect, known as the Salonika Donmeh.

The sect owes its origin to the Hebrew Shabbethai Zebi, who for years was implicitly believed, not only by multitudes of his own people, but also by many others throughout Europe and the East, to be the Messiah.

Born in Smyrna in the year 1626, Shabbethai was of Spanish-Jewish extraction. His father Mordecai was a wealthy and pious Jew, the trusted agent of a London firm of merchants. The youth studied in the school of the rabbi of Smyrna, but while he showed little affinity for Rabbinic learning, he was early attracted by the mystic lore of the "Kabbala." Kabbalistic learning, which attained a great vogue in the seventeenth century, pointed to the year 1666 as the date for the regeneration of the world and the gathering of the children of Israel in Palestine under the risen Messiah.

It is easy to imagine the influence of such ideas on Shabbethai. In his youthful days intensely ascetic, he led a life of the severest simplicity, and his time and thoughts were entirely absorbed by the study of mystic literature. He soon became renowned in Smyrna and gained a considerable hold over the youth of that city. In 1648, predicted, on Kabbalistic grounds, as a fateful year, he proclaimed his Messiahship to some of his companions; but his pretensions, however, were by no means approved by the rabbis of his native town, and he and his followers were excommunicated and banished from Smyrna.

Far from being discouraged, Shabbethai saw in his misfortune the opportunity of martyrdom. Throughout his career he never lacked adherents. With them he wandered through many towns of the Near East, and his mission was made easier by his tall and handsome presence and the beautiful voice with which he is accredited.

About the year 1653 he reached Constantinople, where he rapidly gathered around him many who were convinced of his claims; in Salonika, too, where the Kabbala was held in great reverence, he was hailed by a multitude of believers. When later on he came to Aleppo crowds acclaimed him, and at Smyrna, where he returned in 1665, his reception was even more enthusiastic. Here in his native city, at the approach of the year predicted for the Messianic appearance, he gave wide publicity to his pretensions.

The news of the proclamation of Shabbethai was received with the utmost interest throughout Europe. The Jews of Amsterdam vied with one another in honoring the new Messiah. Prayers are said to have been offered for him in the synagogue of Hamburg, in spite of the protests of Sasportas, a learned and traveled man, who had acted as the first chief rabbi of London.

The Turkish Government began to take alarm at proclamations, issued by certain of Shabbethai's disciples, and he was arrested, though his followers saw yet another miracle in the fact that the Sultan did not instantly put him to death.

He was sent to Adrianople, where he was interviewed by a representative of the Sultan; and to the consternation of his followers it was announced that the Messiah had adopted the Moslem faith and had become an official of the Sultan's court.

Such was the influence he had wielded that for a long time the truth of the news was disputed. Many of his followers believed in him to the end of their lives, and from these faithful ones are descended the modern sect of the Donmeh. Some maintained that he was merely acting a part in order to accomplish his great object—the conversion of all Mahomedans.

To the Turks he represented himself as working always for the conversion of the Jews to Islam, and on this account he was allowed intercourse with his former co-religionists, on many of whom, strange as it may seem, his personality still cast a spell. Finally, after being discovered singing Psalms with some Jews, he was dismissed from court favor and banished to Dulcigno in Albania, where he died about the year 1676.

Shabbatianism lingered long in Judaism, and there still survives a small sect which holds its tenets. Like Shabbethai himself these followers of his are hand-

some and of pure Semitic type. They have followed his example of adopting Mahomedan customs, but they hold themselves equally aloof from Jew and Mussulman.

Donmeh is their Turkish title and means "Traitors," but they call themselves "Ma'aminim," believers, or Harbarim, associates. Those professing the Jewish religion are called by them infidels.

A few of the sect are found in Adrianople; most, however, are settled in Salonika. They are sharply divided into three sub-sects, and not only do they forbid marriage with Jews or with Mahomedans, but each sub-sect marries only within itself. The largest of these sub-sects is that of the Yakubis, who claim that their founder, a relative of Shabbethai, was the reincarnation of his soul. The Ismiris (Smyrniotes), on the other hand, hold that they are the true followers of the Messiah, while the third sect is the result of an unsuccessful attempt in the eighteenth century to amalgamate the two others. Numbering in all about 10,000 souls, of whom about 4,000 are Yakubis, the Donmeh follow largely the trades of writers and barbers.

The introduction into the House of Commons of Lloyd George's new bill granting special insurance against sickness and invalidity and also against unemployment has created a big sensation, and, further, is not without interest to the Jewish community here. The position of the alien Jewish worker will be distinctly improved by the new measure, although in default of naturalization he will not secure full benefits. The measure, it will be remembered, levies a compulsory weekly contribution of eight cents upon each male worker and six cents upon each female worker. The employer is compelled to contribute a further six cents per week for each employee and the state contributes a final four cents per week. In return each male worker will receive when laid up through sickness \$2.50 per week for three months, and each female worker just under \$2 per week. For a further three months each will receive \$1.25 per week. The distinction made against the alien worker is that the contribution will consist wholly of the amounts paid by the worker and the employer, the state not contributing in this case the four cents per week per worker. The benefits paid, therefore, to the laid-up alien worker will be correspondingly reduced.

With regard to the unemployment scheme, which is separate, the alien question will scarcely enter into this, as so far the scheme is to be applied only to the engineering and building trades, which the alien worker does not enter. It is expected that the drain upon the funds of the Jewish Board of Guardians and similar organizations throughout the country will be substantially relieved by this state enterprise. It is urged in connection with this scheme that the non-naturalized alien should, in common fairness, have the path of naturalization made easy for him where the desire exists for British citizenship.

A special feature of the new act is that the scheme will be worked through specified and selected friendly societies whose membership must not be below 10,000. No Jewish society of this kind has a membership of 10,000, and, furthermore, whatever scheme is evolved for bringing up their membership to the legal minimum alien members would not be allowed to count. Still, much might be done in the way of amalgamating Jewish friendly benefit societies with a view to securing, if possible, a Jewish center for the administration of the act for Jewish workers.

A federation of Jewish friendly societies was established in 1907 comprising about fifty societies with a membership of 8,000. The biggest Hebrew friendly and benefit societies are the following: Grand Order of Israel, which has twenty-nine lodges in London; the Grand Order of the Sons of Jacob, five lodges; the Hebrew Order of Druids, eighteen lodges; the Order Achel Ameth, fourteen lodges; the Order Achel Brith, thirty-four lodges; the Shield of Abraham, eleven lodges; the Sons of the Covenant of Abraham, four lodges, and the Ancient Order of Mount Sinai, four lodges. Furthermore, there are five Hebrew courts in the Ancient Order of Foresters. Besides these there are about two hundred small local independent societies. Many of these, however, are what are called dividing societies of which the insurance bill takes no notice. The greatest membership of all these large and small societies is estimated at about 27,000, their income being just under a quarter of a million dollars per annum and their expenditures about forty thousand dollars less. An early conference is to be held between representatives of all the various orders, but, as the act will not come into force until May 1, next year, there is no need for hasty action.

The actual reference to aliens in the state insurance bill is contained in clause 33, which reads as follows: "This part of this act shall apply to persons over the age of sixteen at the date of entry into insurance, who are not British subjects, subject to the following

modifications: (a) No such person shall be qualified to become a member of an approved society for the purposes of this part of this act. (b) No part of the benefits to which such persons may become entitled shall be paid out of moneys provided by Parliament. (c) The rate of sickness, disablement and maternity benefit shall be reduced in the case of men to seven-ninths, or in the case of women to three quarters, of the rate to which they would otherwise be entitled under this part of this act. (d) No part of the sums payable in respect of such persons for medical benefit and sanatorium benefit, or towards the expenses of administration of benefits shall in the case of such persons be paid out of moneys provided by Parliament."

In Memoriam.

JACOB PHILIP SOLOMON.

Born Sivan 6th 5598.

Died Sivan 6th 5600.

To-day, the first day of our *Shebuoth* festival, two years have gone by since Jacob P. Solomon, the founder and, for the first twenty-seven years of its existence, the editor of this journal, passed to his eternal home. Dead though he is in the flesh, his spirit lives and casts the strong rays of its benignant influence upon his successors and followers. Those who now stand where he stood in his lifetime, those who preside at the desk once occupied by him, are his unworthy pupils. The ideals for which Jacob P. Solomon stood and fought are our ideals. This journal will ever be what his fostering care made of it: a family newspaper for the Jewish home. To-day and in the future years it will represent that for which it has battled in the past, for the best and the highest of traditional Judaism. Its policy editorially will be, now as ever, to represent and support noble orthodox Jewish thought and opinion. For them its columns are ever open. While this journal always will present all news of Jewish interest to its readers without fear or favor, it will yet emphasize the necessity for them to be punctilious in the observance of the hallowed ordinances of the fathers, to illustrate by their practical lives that the Jewish soul of our day responds to the same high ideals and sentiments as moved our ancestors; for the olden Jewish habits, customs and feelings have not departed from among us. This journal will continue to stand for these things because they are a tree of life to such as lay hold of them. It will stand for them, too, because they were the keynote of the activity and the inspiration of the life of Jacob P. Solomon, *Zecher Zaddik Livrocho* indeed, the founder and the never-to-be-forgotten editor of THE HEBREW STANDARD.

Because *Shebuoth* fell last year on the 13th of June, *The American Israelite* thinks it will come around on the same date this year.

The People of this city calls Rabbi Stephen S. Wise a "yellow" rabbi for his attack on the millionaire clubs of Fifth Avenue. We hardly think the qualifying adjective was happily chosen. Rabbi Wise paints his pictures a vermilion rather than a yellow hue.

The Loyal League of Brooklyn is to be congratulated for removing *Hebrew* from its former name. Its officers saw that *Hebrew* as a name had nothing to do with the United Democratic Clubs. We are pleased to note that our advice in this matter has been heeded.

The "great and glorious" Kehillah has issued in neat pamphlet form the reports of the executive committee presented to its recent second annual convention. The booklet makes a brave showing, and yet one feels that the German proverb hits it well: *Papier ist geduldig!*

We note that suit has been entered against Rabbi Leon Harrison, of St. Louis, to recover damages for injuries caused by his automobile. If our ministers wish to enjoy the pleasures of the idle rich, they must also be prepared to pay the penalties of their pleasures.

In the Press Notice prepared by the Central Conference of American Rabbis concerning The Feast of Weeks, we are informed that this Feast is "regarded as the corner-stone of the Jewish Faith." This is something brand new. We wonder who the genius is who made the discovery. The Central Conference ought to be more careful in its official publications.

We hope Alderman A. S. Drescher will fail to succeed with his project of a Jewish regiment for Brooklyn. The National Guard of New York, or of any state in the Union for that matter, is and should be open to all who would enlist in it, regardless of race or religion. The negro regiments in the civil war answered a certain purpose; no other Federal soldiers were so literally regarded as "the enemy" by the South, however. Let Jews remember this fact!

## A JEWISH UNIVERSITY CLUB.

ATTENTLY we have heard much concerning a proposed Jewish university club. We are told the need for it exists because our educated young men are denied admission to the present organization on account of their faith, and will drift away from Judaism if something be not done to hold them to it. The idea of enlisting the support and interest of young Jews of education and culture in matters Jewish has our sympathy. But we trust that admission to the proposed club, if it be established, will never be conditioned upon the possession of a collegiate degree: this will inevitably produce "snobbishness" and "toadyism," two great evils that must be avoided.

For Jews of refinement and intelligence a new club, but no university club, for such does not depend upon sect or race, is desirable. The *raison d'être* of the existing Jewish clubs in this city is mainly by reason of the fact that they offer their members comfortable and pleasant surroundings in which to play cards! A club of intelligent Jews may be expected to think of something more, to do much more, than play auction pinochle or "poker" or to indulge in similar innocuous pursuits.

An existing organization has been referred to as containing within itself the nucleus for such a club as is here spoken of. The Judaeans of this city has been called a "model" society, and model it certainly is: a sixth carbon-copy imitation of the real thing! For this new club to come into life under the *aegis* of the Judaeans would foredoom it to failure. The Judaeans is moribund.

In the light of the foregoing remarks we should cordially welcome, then, the creation of a new Jewish club; one, moreover, which would subserve a serious purpose. Only let it not be a Jewish "sheepskin" club! The latter may perhaps do very well for a rabbi of our acquaintance whose turgid pulpit utterances are anything but the result of a genuine culture and to whom an academic degree of any kind is the *summum bonum*.

According to Rabbi Gefson B. Levi, who has again become the "summer editor" of *The Reform Advocate*, the Yiddish language is "passing." And yet he sees a distinct future for it! Well, "we are game!" Will Rabbi Levi tell us what he means?

The recent twenty-first convention of the Independent Order Brith Abraham in this city seems to have been successful in every way. This is now, indeed, by strength of membership, the largest Jewish fraternal society in the world. Its officers are wise in their efforts to accumulate a large reserve fund for their order; at present writing this amounts to \$367,265.07.

A fortnight ago the daily press devoted considerable space to the "ritual murder" fable, this time because of then impending troubles in Kieff. A press despatch, giving the opinion of M. Sliosberg, a noted Russian Jewish lawyer, was properly published broadcast, and a lengthy communication on the same subject from the American Jewish Committee also. We cannot quite see why the latter body should feel called upon to supplement what M. Sliosberg said. *Des guten ist damit zu viel getan!*

The Feast of Weeks is here again, marking the entrance of the beautiful summer season into its full power, and commemorating the great and auspicious event on Sinai long ago. To those of us who keep to the old paths it ushers in an inspiring portion of the worship of the synagogue, for this is just as much the House of God in summer as in winter. For our reformed brethren the Feast of Weeks synchronizes with the rendition of the "solemn rite of confirmation" and marks the commencement of that suspension of the greater part of divine services which has made the reform temples peculiarly the creatures of the cold weather. Several so-called Jewish places of worship will from now on be entirely closed to service; until the fall holidays draw nigh there is for them no God!

While we should have been very glad to welcome the Rev. Dr. Rudolph I. Coffey, of Pittsburgh, to the circle of our local ministers, we are pleased to learn that he has decided to decline the call extended to him by the Ansche Chesed Congregation and will remain in his present pulpit. New York Jewry would have been the gainer if Rabbi Coffey had decided to come here: as it is, there is abundant need for him in the Smoky City, where he will act as a needed balance to our old friend, Rabbi J. Leonard Levy. When the latter flutters the dove-cotes of traditional Jewish opinion, we shall rely on Rabbi Coffey to prove that Pittsburgh is not wholly "deformed."

We rejoice that the Jews of Bukowina, in the far-Eastern part of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy, have not feared to assert themselves in the present Parliamentary elections, and have chosen no less than six outspokenly Jewish legislators to represent their interests, and the cause of all the Jews in that country, in the local *Laudtag*. We regret to find that obstacles to thwart their object were raised—as usual, by assimilatory Jews, and that one of the latter bore the great name Kuranda, while a second was Theodor Gomperz, the philologist. But this time the cause of true-blue Jewry triumphed. We should not care, however, to argue in favor of Jews *qua* Jews acting politically in any other country than Austro-Hungary. There conditions are such as to make it necessary for the Jews to undertake their own political salvation.

## GIVING AND TAKING THE LAW.

תורה קנין אחד . . . דכתיב ד קנינא ראשית דרבו:

"The Torah is a possession . . . for it is written, the Eternal possessed me as the beginning of his way . . ."—Pirke Aboth, vi:10.

IN the above quotation, the Torah is called *Kinyan*—a possession; while usually the Torah is referred to as *Marasha*—an inheritance. These two terms, I believe, are suggestive of our relation to the Torah. The difference between them points out a high conception of our allegiance to the Torah.

In one sense—and in one sense only—is the Torah to be regarded as our inheritance. Although its teachings were meant for all mankind and though the whole world claim the Bible as their own, the real ownership belongs to us. We Jews, as no other nation on earth, may lay claim on it. It is our patrimony by the grace of God. It contains thought-gems peculiar to our race. At its best it may be considered the embodiment of the Jewish racial genius. God has so fashioned the Jewish soul as to make it peculiarly susceptible of ethico-religious truths. The spirit permeating the Bible is the spirit pulsating within the Jew. God's gift to the Jew was, in the first place, the religious genius; in the second place, the expression of this genius, namely the Torah. When we say therefore that the Torah belongs to us by right of inheritance, we mean by it not only that the scrolls of the Torah have been handed down to us from generation to generation—often at the cost of great suffering; but also—and perhaps chiefly—that the spirit of the Torah has been transmitted to us from father to son by means of the very blood that flows in our veins, by means of the sparks of the original racial soul which have come down to us, like a quenchless torch, from the first Jew that ever saw the light of God in the world without and in the world within.

Our inheritance is of the subtlest kind. The Torah belongs organically to the constitution of the Jew. Its principles are interwoven in our very fibre. This is the meaning of the phrase that we Jews are "*Mushboim vcomdim mehar sinai*"—viz., that the oath of allegiance made by our forefathers at Sinai is binding upon us. There is no renewal of this first pledge necessary either through Bar-Mitzvah or Confirmation, for all Jews are pledged by virtue of this first pledge at their very birth. Other fathers impart to their offsprings life and light; Jewish fathers impart to them in addition, the spirit of the Torah. They energise them with the peculiarly dynamic power which for want of a better term we call Jewishness. This power is the same to-day as in the time of the Revelation at Sinai. This power it was that burst forth in the famous "*Naasseh Venishma*"—call; hence, this power being present within us to-day, we to-day are bound by this same oath. Every Jewish mother, giving suck to her child, feeds her babe not merely physically but spiritually as well. With every eager draught, the clinging lips of the infant take in not only life's sweet stream, but also the refreshing waters of the Torah, the honey of God's Word. Perhaps this is the underlying meaning of the famous Midrash which tells us that the child Moses when found by Pharaoh's daughter, refused to be nursed by Egyptian mothers.

In the sense, then, of eternal allegiance through birth, in the sense of racial aptitude for religious perception, and in the historic sense of tradition, the Torah is our *Morasha*, our inheritance. However, all these aspects of the *Morasha*-idea represent one side only of our relation to the Torah: the *passive* side. It represents us Jews in the passive attitude of receiving from natural, or if you will, supernatural sources, the priceless spiritual treasure of our people. In this passivity, there lies the danger which lurks in every inheritance, in every gift that comes to man without his laboring for it. The idle son of the industrious parent, having come without effort of his own into a goodly estate, is an example in point. Shall we too be such inactive "sons of the Torah?" Shall we fail to cultivate our patrimony, relying on the fact that it is ours by right of inheritance to do with it as we list? It is true that we have a natural gift for the understanding of religious truths; but this gift, needs it not careful fostering and developing, or else like all other human talents it will become blunted? It is true that the Scrolls are to be found in every Synagogue worthy of the name; but should they not rather be found in our hearts and minds? Shall we be spiritual parasites, failing to cultivate our inheritance, neglecting to increase it? Shall we be mere hangers-on content with the efforts of our forefathers, never caring to add unto these endeavors of our own?

It cannot be. Such passivity cannot suffice. For this reason, the Torah is called *Kinyan*—a possession. While in point of allegiance the Torah is an inheritance, in point of maintenance it is a possession, something that each generation must try to possess itself of, something that each generation must actively acquire for itself! By study and practice each generation must endeavor to fathom the depths of the Torah, thus making it its own. We cannot be said to really own the Torah until we make it our own. We inherit the Torah and the aptitude for understanding it; yet each generation must re-acquire it as if the thunders of Sinai were to come in its own day to shake up the old order of things; as if the lightning of the Revelation were to appear before its eyes to irradiate the world with new light.

We celebrate *Shevuoth* with the passive idea uppermost in our mind. We call the festival *Mattan Torah*—the Giving of the Law. I do not propose any radical changes in our religious nomenclature. But inasmuch as this name suggests the *Morasha*-idea rather than the *Kinyan*-idea; inasmuch as it visualises our people in the attitude of passive reception rather than in that of active acquisition—I should wish that every Jew rename this festival in his heart.—*The Taking of the Law!*

### A Temporary Victory.

WE hardly think that President Taft and Secretary of State Knox can be congratulated on their efforts to have Russia recognize our passports in the hands of Jewish citizens, resulting in the consent of the Czar's ministers to vize such passports as are to be used by their holders when traveling on business in the Russian Empire.

It is much to be feared that this concession on the part of Russia is unsubstantial and really no concession at all. "Traveling in Russia on business" may mean much to a Russian bureaucrat and it may mean little to him. A man who goes home on a brief vacation to see his aged parents is certainly on pleasure bent, and yet this would be a business trip. The action of Russia leaves such cases entirely at the mercy of anti-Semitic Russian consuls and we know from dearly-bought experience what value to place upon their mercy, their discretion or their judgment.

We regard the reported concession as simply and solely a sop to the agitation now making for the abrogation of our treaty of 1832 with Russia. If our government and statesmen in Congress accept the proffered concession, and *toute de suite* cease all their efforts to abrogate this treaty, we shall awake one fine day to find that Russia has gone calmly back to the old order of things. As their brethren in Russia suffer from special local laws, American Jews who wish to go to Russia must be judged by these same laws. It would be quite in conformity with Russian diplomacy and bad faith for this condition again to take place.

President Taft and Secretary Knox are, according to the press dispatches from Washington, well pleased with what they have thus far accomplished. So should we be, were our government dealing with any other country than Russia. The

latter makes no promises that she proposes to keep one minute longer than she must; her concessions are forced from her under duress, as it were, and regarded by her only as binding so long as she is in that grip of death during which she was forced to make them.

Let American Jews not be content with this turn in affairs with Russia! Let them continue, diplomacy or no diplomacy, to agitate the abrogation of the existing treaty! Then the United States and Russia, the high contracting parties, stand upon an equal footing and can produce lasting results.

### Coney Island Shore Front.

About twenty years ago THE HEBREW STANDARD in this column advocated three improvements in, behalf of the residents of the city of New York. One was the acquirement of the shore front of Coney Island and the erection of a boardwalk from Manhattan Beach to Norton's Point (now Seagate); the second was the acquirement of Governors Island, from the United States and its transformation into a pleasure ground for the people of the city; the third was the removal of the penal institutions from Blackwell's Island and its dedication to the use of the people as a pleasure resort.

It was then urged that it was a pity that so fine an island as Blackwell's should be used as a penal institution, whereas it would afford a splendid outlet for the residents of the city for recreation purposes.

Shortly thereafter a bill was offered in Congress to cede Governor's Island to the city of New York for a recreation ground; this came to naught. The Board of Aldermen

took up the Coney Island boardwalk extension project, and several of the daily journals advocated it, but nothing materialized. The improvements since added in the way of costly buildings on Blackwell's Island make the suggestion then urged impossible.

With the destruction of a large part of the buildings by fire on the shore front of Coney Island an opportunity is given to the city of New York of now carrying out the idea of the extension of its park grounds and the erection of the boardwalk. The complete destruction of the buildings on the land to be acquired gives the city an opportunity which it has never had before. Delay in this direction will make the scheme impossible. Phoenix-like the burnt district will re-create itself, and the improvements erected will defeat the acquirement of the land, save at a great cost.

An evidence of the virility of the island was given strong demonstration on Decoration Day. The fire which destroyed Dreamland and its surroundings was on last Saturday. On Tuesday morning hundreds of temporary shacks were set up, all of which were doing a thriving business from the frankfurter vendor to the saloon keeper.

The new iron pier is to be promptly repaired, and it is expected will be ready in July. This would remain as a permanent structure, even if the city acquires the shore front.

### CORRESPONDENCE.

Dr. Madison C. Peters Defines His Stand on Immigration.

Editor HEBREW STANDARD: For many years in a lecture entitled "Will the Republic Live?" and more recently in a lecture on "The Decadence of the American Spirit," a lecture which is sometimes given under the auspices of patriotic societies, I have discussed the immigration question and have called attention to the Immigration Commission reports that thousands of undeniably undesirable immigrants are being brought to this country every year by the foreign steamship companies for the profit in the traffic. I would debar undesirable adult aliens by an illiteracy test; the test to be that all above sixteen years of age be able to read and write in their own language or dialect. I would require a certificate of character, except where government tyranny of any people, because of race or religion, such a certificate could not be obtained; I would require women under eighteen to be accompanied by or to come to a near relative, and I would heavily fine steamships for bringing an undesirable alien when undesirable could have been ascertained before embarkation.

For the expression of these sentiments I have been called to task by men who are in the employ of the foreign steamship companies. I have been accused of being "in the employ of the restrictionists," and to discredit me among my friends, the Jews, the ridiculously absurd charge has been made that I "am now talking against the Jews."

As all the Jews can read or write their own language, and make good when they come and they come to stay and form only 8 per cent. of the present day immigration, what may be said speaking generally of south and southwestern European immigration would not apply with much force to the Jew. I would not refuse one Russian Jew shelter, unless he was a criminal or an anarchist. The Russian, even if uneducated, I would not send back into the hands of the Czar's assassins.

I would not proscribe any man for the place and condition of his birth. I believe with Theodore Roosevelt: "Of good immigrants we can't have too many, of bad ones we don't want any." I would not shut the door of hope in the face of any man, but I do protest against the greedy foreign steamship companies scouring all Europe and dumping all her undesirables on American shores. Recently forty-one murderers were awaiting trial in New York city, every one foreign born, not a Jew among them. In 1905 there were 50,000 foreign paupers in the New York State institutions, costing the State \$1,500,000 a year. Jews in the poor house are almost as scarce as white black birds. The State Lunacy Commission of New York declared that the alarming increase in insanity was due to our lax immigration laws.

The white foreign born population ten years ago and over in 1900, was 19 per cent. of the white population and furnished 44 per cent. of the white pauper population and 34 per cent. of the white insane.

I favor a reasonable restriction because I am a friend of labor. Why does Samuel Gompers, a Jew, favor further restriction? Because he knows that the 2,000,000 laboring men in his Federation need protection against free trade in European producers. If it were pos-



sible to give work to all the inhabitants of Europe and Asia (and if to all in of Europe, why not Asia), it would be a humane thing to perform so grand a service. The men who assist the coming of the "oppressed" from all lands are not grieving that the poor work men in the old world are starving, but they bring them that they may secure their services at European wages. The Erie Railroad to-day is paying its Italian laborers \$1.08 a day. Can the American laborer compete with them? Every one knows the starvation wages paid many workers in New York, and if we could force Russia to do justice to the Jew many Jews would be better off in Russia than they now are in the congested centres of our American cities, where they are too often exploited by their own people and who want them to come that their exploitation may bring them money—too many who come now are in such a condition that they must take work at any price or starve.

I believe that the steamship companies are stimulating immigration beyond our power of assimilation. We should now pick our immigrants—we are, under our industrial system creating enough paupers to burden us, we have enough diseased to care for, illiterate to educate, vicious to create discontent among us to allow foreign steamship companies,

for the sake of ballast to blast our fair Republic. These steamship companies are guilty of a crime against America for which prosperity and a righteous God will some day hold us to account for our indifference.







Strife, hatred and bitterness have been obliterated, and in a few days the heroes of both sides will be duly honored as they deserve in memorial exercises by a grateful posterity, who remember their loyalty when the Union was divided, and now consecrate the grounds where one flag only floats, honored, respected and revered by all of those who live under its protecting care. They and their progeny have forgotten that any other has ever existed. The American Israelites, and those of other climes who have settled on our shores from time immemorial, have been and are our best citizens and notwithstanding the unjust discrimination and criticism which we hear crop out occasionally, our records from the colonial days unto the present have been the equal of any of the creeds in the nation, and, from the days of Washington, when we were but a handful, until President Taft's time, all of the Presidents spoke of us as a people of the highest type of citizens and as Americans. It must not be forgotten that out of the two millions of Jews in America one million, two hundred and fifty thousand live in the Greater New York, where they wield potential influence in all walks and paths in life, with one end in view, to better the conditions of humanity, to ameliorate and alleviate suffering mankind wherever found, to strengthen the arms of the Government and expect to be treated alike at home, as well as abroad. We are hoping with expectancy that the President of the United States will take a hold of the resolutions adopted in Congress and unanimously in the State of New York that American citizens, irrespective of creed or color, shall not be denied admission in any land, and if denied that the treaty of 1832 be abrogated."



# CHILDREN'S PAGE.

## The Apprentice.

FROM Egypt to Mount Sinai, from Passover to Pentecost, is the journey we made in those seven weeks during which we counted the days when God, the Master, would admit us in his services; now that we are entering his services there is nothing more appropriate than the advice of Antigonus, the Lord of Socho, who received the oral law from Simon the Just; he used to say, "Be not like servants who serve their master for the sake of receiving a reward; but be like servants who serve their master without a view of receiving a reward; and let the fear of heaven be upon you."

One of our great men whose name was Rabbi Menassah Ilie, of blessed memory, explained the above as follows:

A master workman had two youths in his employ, one was a piece worker and the other was an apprentice who was hired to him for six years in order to learn the trade thoroughly, after which he would himself become a master workman. After the apprentice was in his employ for three or four years he became just as skillful in his work as the piece worker, but still there was a great difference in their work, for whilst the piece worker turned out his work in a hurried and slovenly manner, his ambition having been to turn out as much work as he could, as working by the piece the more he turned out the more he would get paid for. The apprentice who did not take any pay from his master, but served him because he wished to learn the trade thoroughly, did his work with great earnestness, because he desired to become proficient in his work—this is just what Antigonus meant, "In the service of God do not be as those servants who serve their master for the sake of receiving a reward, but be like these servants or apprentices who do their work not with a view of getting a reward." Thus shall ye serve God in order to perfect yourself more and more, for the worship of God leads to human perfection, physically, mentally, and morally.

The Dubner Maggid of blessed memory explains the words of Rabbi Antigonus by the following story:

A great Prince was once on his travels. As the shades of night were falling he applied to the nearest house for a night's lodging. The owner of the house gave him an entire suite of apartments for his own use, besides accommodating his servants and coachman and finding a suitable place for his carriage and horses. He also served him an excellent supper, consisting of many courses of the most delicious food finely prepared, besides supplying him with all kinds of wines and other beverages, according to his taste. The Prince ate and drank and was very well pleased. In the morning the Prince asked his host to give him an account of the cost. The latter handed him a bill, which the Prince paid, and then resumed his journey. The Prince never again thought of his host, for although he was satisfied with the food and accommodations, still the host acted in his own interest, as he got well paid for it, and there was no further obligation on either side.

Some time after the same Prince came, in the course of his travels, to another house to put up there for the night. The owner of that house

also received him with the greatest honor and provided him with the best he had, but he did not do this with a view of getting paid for it, as he esteemed it such a great honor to have the Prince lodge in his house and partake of his food that he considered it more precious than gold or the most brilliant gems. In the morning the Prince sent for his host and asked him for an account of the cost. Said the host: "My beloved Prince, how can I express to you the feeling of pride with which I am filled in having had the honor of entertaining under my humble roof such a glorious personage as your Royal Majesty? How can I expect you to pay me who asks for no other reward than the pleasure of serving you?"

The Prince was deeply touched at this token of the great esteem in which his host held him, and he also reciprocated the same warmth of feeling and love begot love. He thereupon strongly urged upon his host the acceptance of certain valuable presents which were considerably of greater value than the cost of lodging, etc., could ever amount to. But this was not all. From that day on a warm friendship sprang up in the Prince's heart toward his host and he made it his business to call on him very often and each time he called he would bring him and his family the most valuable presents.

It is the same way with the two pious men who worship God, one worships him for the sake of receiving a reward, and although his worship is acceptable, still he is rewarded only as much as he deserves for his work, but the true servant of God is not like that. He rejoices in the opportunity he possesses to serve our Holy King, and he is filled with pride that God has chosen him for his services—he has not in view any reward. Such a servant of God deserves and receives from the Lord, blessed be He, the eternal bliss, higher than which no one can enjoy. That is what Antigonus, the Lord of Socho, taught:

"Be not like servants who serve their master for the sake of receiving a reward, but be like the servants who serve their master without a view of receiving a reward, then you will be more highly esteemed in the eyes of the Lord, who will love you and reward you not according to your feeble actions, but with his ample generosity and loving kindness."




