## IMPRESSIONS OF THE WEST INDIES.

By DR. LEOPOLD WINTNER.

**Grandeur of Nature—Work of Man—Panama Canal—Genesis of Islands—104 Psalms—Jamaica—Kingston—Jews—Barbados—Bathsheba—Bermuda.**

SOME people who seldom leave our island-city, Greater New York, may think that the West Indies down in the Caribbean Sea are a terra incognita, not of much interest to the tourist, nor to the general traveling public.

But this is not so; I speak from experience, for I returned shortly from there, and, barring my former travels in foreign lands, I found the trip to the West Indian islands one of the most interesting I ever made. It was my pleasure to be one of the passengers on the palatial Steamer "Avon" of the Royal Mail Line on her "Cruise de Luxe" to the West Indies, last winter. We visited the principal islands, Cuba, Jamaica, Trinidad, Barbados, Grenada, etc., stopped in the Colombian port, Colon, where we took the special train of the Isthmian Railroad to the City of Panama and, of course, inspected the principal points of the Panama Canal, now under construction—the most stupendous work that man ever dared to undertake.

Now to the man of an impressionable mind the beauties and the grandeur of nature are always inspiring; and on beholding, for instance, the great, thundering American cataract, the awe-inspiring canons of the Rocky Mountains, the stupendous "Cathedral Cliffs" of Utah, the wonderful formations of the coral reefs, or the wild sublimity of the Swiss and the Tyrolean Alps—the temperamental Jew involuntarily exclaims the psalmist's words: *Moh rabbu maasaichu Adonay!* "How great Are Thy Works, Oh Lord!"

### The Panama Canal.

And next to the adoration of God's power and wisdom, revealed in his works, comes the admiration of him who was created in the image of God—man; man, who with his genius, daring, persistent, inventive—was, indeed, "made a little lower than divine" and crowned with honor and glory"—through the works of His hands. And when we passed through the Canal Zone, stopped at several places, saw the thousands of laborers busy at the stupendous work of the "great ditch," gazed in astonishment at the giant shovels lifting out tons of earth and rocks at one

turn; at the engineering marvels of the "Gatun Dam" and locks and the "Culebra Cut"—all these things impressed me so intensely that I felt like exclaiming, in paraphrase of the biblical words—"How great are thy works, oh Uncle Sam!" Indeed it

curred to the remarkable fact, how, thousands of years ago the monotheistic author of the 104th Psalm so beautifully and strikingly described the wonders of creation, the secret relation, the inter-activities and the mundane oneness of the great "trinity of nature"—sea, earth and mountain! For example:

"O Lord, my God, Thou art very great . . . Thou art he who layeth the beams of his chambers in the waters . . . Who maketh the winds his messengers, the flaming fires his ministers . . . Who covereth it (the earth) with the deep as a garment; above the mountains stood the waters. At Thy rebuke they fled, at the voice of Thy thunder they hastened away.—They ascended mountains; they went down valleys, unto the place which Thou hadst founded for them. Thou hast set bounds for them; that they turn not again to cover the earth."

And whenever our good ship—sweeping like a giant Nymph through the blue waves—approached this or that island, and I beheld it emerging suddenly from the sea and looming up to the horizon—the above God-intoxicated verses came back to me. They describe, in poetical garb, with divine inspiration and scientific intuition—the genesis of insular formation. No wonder that the great naturalist, Alexander von Humboldt, so admirably speaks of the 104th Psalm—of that descriptive gem of biblical nature literature.

The islands which we have visited belong, nearly all, to the British possessions. Each place, however, is an "Olom Koton" in itself; and in this microcosmic character it presents, in its urban and rural life, in its topography, quaint architecture, more or less picturesque, in its street scenes, in the customs and the costumes of the people, in the shops and markets—altogether a peculiarity of its own, so very novel to the American tourist, and such an interesting study, ethnographically, socially and economically. That English professor, who lately advanced the theory (on paper) that the white man was doomed to vanish, that the original color of the human skin was dark, etc., may have theorized from the premises of the racial conditions in the West Indies; for there the black people are in the overwhelming majority; in some of the islands only about twenty per cent are white.

However, having enjoyed freedom for generations, the negroes of the British West Indies are of a better class than those in our country; the majority, of course, are poor but many are hard working tradesmen, shopkeepers, hoteliers, and a number

was left to the American genius, energy, skill and—to American dollars—to accomplish that which others tried and left undone, and to complete the greatest engineering work of the age. Truly, I thought, "there is the navigation and world's commerce of all the nations of the earth. The Islands. The West Indian islands, irregularly grouped in and around the Caribbean Sea, are some of volcanic ori-

ocean. During this interesting voyage in the "Mediterranean of America"—affording to the observing traveler frequent changes from sea to land and vice versa—my mind often re-

occupy professions and municipal and government positions.

The object of my trip, however, was not merely to satisfy the "Wanderlust" but, primarily, for my health. I wanted to flee, not (like Jonah) "from the presence of the Lord", but from the rigorous winter of New York, and to seek the latitudes of perpetual summer, where the sky ever-blue, the tree ever-green one can, like father Abraham of old, "sit at the door of the tent at the warmth of the day"—which, to the man who has long passed the biblical three score and ten, is "healing to the body and strengthening to the bones."

And so, after having seen the larger and smaller islands, I stopped during the winter months in Jamaica and Barbados, dividing my stay between these two most popular and beautiful resorts in the tropics.

#### Kingston.

The city of Kingston, Jamaica, is a large bustling place and is slowly but steadily recovering from the late disaster of the earthquake; and when I was there, in January, the Kingstonsians celebrated the fourth anniversary of their escape from death, by memorial services in the churches and synagogues. The traces of the ruins in the city are still much in evidence, but new two-story buildings of enforced concrete, are constantly going up in the busy streets; and let us hope that the good people, black and white, Jews and Gentiles, may be spared from such calamity in the future!

#### The Jews of Kingston.

It is well known that the Jamaica capital has a large old Jewish community, mostly of Portuguese origin, but the German element is also represented. They seem to be commercially prominent, as King street, the "Broadway" of that city, abounds in firms bearing Jewish names.

The two large synagogues have been rebuilt since the earthquake and are fine edifices. There were no services held in the temple of the German Jews on account of not having a minister, but I attended the services in the Portuguese synagogue, of which Rabbi Dobrin, a graduate of the Theological Seminary of New York, is the minister and Rev. Mr. Solomon, the Hazan, who has been in Kingston 18 years. It is remarkable that the functions of Mr. Solomon, who is also the "shochet ha kolel" of Kingston, are subsidized by the city government; quite English, you know; but at the same time, it is quite altruistic, as the Christians too can, or may, have Kosher meat. But on the other hand, I was told that the Jews of Kingston are generally derelict in their "religious" observance, concerning "Kashruth" and dietary laws. Quite an anomaly; the Jews are more "traifa" than their Episcopalian brethren.

In the Synagogue the orthodox London ritual is used with organ and vocal (female) music. The services were quite impressive, although somewhat lengthy for a tropical climate. Another thing, "tell it not in Gath," there is reform in the air of Kingston Judaism; Rabbi Dobrin, who is well spoken of, started the reform movement by introducing Friday night services with regular lectures. Just think of it! "They go to school there," our orthodox

friends of the New York K'hilla would say—"like the 'goyim'—at 8 o'clock."

And so the ancient Portuguese orthodox citadel of the Kingston Jewry is being slowly battered—truly, *Tempora mutantur*.

#### Barbados.

Barbados is the most typical of the British islands; the sobriquet "Little England" is justified, for life, language, customs and religion are distinctly English. Even the negroes, mostly extremely poor, but generally industrious and intelligent, pride themselves in being "English Barbadians."

The small island—every foot of land under cultivation—is said to have more people to the square mile than in any country on earth; this may be true; but en passant, I would say, no such discomfort and ills are experienced there as in our tenement districts.

The civilization of Barbados is the development of three centuries. and Bridgetown, its capital city and port, has an ancient appearance. It may be called "Little London," for its congested traffic, fearfully crowded streets, bewildering locomotion, swarming "Trafalgar Square" with Nelson's statue (older than that in London); the fine public buildings, law courts and parliament (almost replicas of those in the English capital), the busy harbor with the forest of sails, the ancient bridge, crossing it, etc.—all reminds one of the English Metropolis, in small proportion, and, of course, minus the fog and bad weather.

No Jewish news of Barbados to tell, this being exclusively a little country of Gentiles—except perhaps for the mentioning of a place with a Jewish, or rather, Hebrew name, namely, "Bathsheba," which is situated in the northern part of the island, where I spent most enjoyably five weeks. It is directly on the seashore and a delightful health resort, a perfect winter Garden of Eden, where the Adams and Eves from northern countries come to enjoy the tropical climate, tempered by the refreshing breezes of the South Atlantic, to enjoy sea bathing, rest and recreation.

I met there a very genial old gentleman, Dr. Massiah by name. He did not claim to be "the" Messiah, but said that his name was a Hebrew one, his ancestors were Jews and he traces it far back to biblical times. He also told me that there were some Jews in Bridgetown, prominent as members of the insular legislative body, but somehow or other I could not find out the existence of any Jewish society in Barbados.

A very cultured Christian lady, also a guest of the "Atlantis" Hotel of Bathsheba, was very reticent in speaking of that biblical name, because, she said, a very unsavory story was connected with it. I told her we must not judge events in ancient times from the prudish, modern standpoint. The fact is, polygamy of those days engendered various sins, and particularly committed by kings.

Bathsheba, the wife of Uriah, was taken by King David to his palace, and after the death of her husband she became the wife of David and the mother of King Solomon. Compare with this the actions of the Christian King, Henry VIII., many centuries later! That uxorious brute of all brutes "took" six wives in succession, discharged some of them and cruelly executed others, and to the end of his life remained the persistent execrable sinner.

David, however, being rebuked by Prophet Nathan, confessed with a contrite heart his sin and became truly "repentant before God."

On a high rocky cliff in Barbados, overlooking the blue sea, stands a house of the past century; it is still well preserved, being substantially built of solid rock. It is a very fine villa, which the original owner fanci-

fully named "Bathsheba," by which name later on the whole settlement was called.

The place is twenty-five miles from Bridgetown by mail; the train runs through the sugar cane plantations and cotton fields of the island, and then turns seaward to Bathsheba. It is an attractive seaside resort; the beauty of the marine scenes is enhanced by immense coral rocks, standing like giant sentinels off the cliffy shore, and the hills gradually rise and recede back from the shore in terraces on which are scattered country houses and fishermen's huts picturesquely nestled among the tropical trees and vegetation.

Thus I spent very pleasant days in that lovely place, which bears the euphonic semiting name of the beautiful mother of our "Wiseest of Kings."

#### Bermuda.

On my way home I stopped a few weeks in Bermuda. There is no need of describing it fully as it is well known to thousands of New Yorkers to whom it has become of late quite a suburban winter resort. People of all classes go to Hamilton, Bermuda, to bask in the sunshine, when there is any, and to enjoy the sea breeze which is often quite cool, and sometimes too cool, or even cold.

Nevertheless the Bermudas are a most picturesque island group, set in the bluest of waters and continually covered with beautiful tropical verdure, cacti, oleander, various flowers, and, above all, cedar trees.

Bermuda is the land of old romance and legend, of wonderful caves and of the traditional scene of action of Shakespeare's "Tempest." It is the land of the complacent idler and recreationist, the land of the onion, of the rose and the lily, the charm of the naturalist and the delight of the Anti-Semite—there are no Jews in Bermuda.

And now I am back again in the greatest of American Jewish centers; and in order to catch up with the events which have occurred during my four months' absence, I will have to look over the accumulated back numbers of THE HEBREW STANDARD, and other Jewish weeklies.

## AN ESTIMATE OF THE JEWS.

An estimate of the Jews by the famous orator and publicist, George R Wendling, was recently published in the *Staunton Dispatch-News*. Mr. Wendling in the course of his article said:

"There is not a drop of Jewish blood in my veins. I am not connected with the Jews by the marriage of any near or distant kinsman. I owe no Jew a dollar and no Jew owes me. Among all my personal or intimate friends, I cannot name one single Jew. I speak, therefore, from the vantage ground of absolute independence and impartiality."

Such is the viewpoint from which Mr. Wendling ponders upon "a splendid race," splendid in patience, in brotherly love, in endurance, in sagacity and temperance, in intellectual resources; "splendid in their inflexible adherence to their Mosaic ideals."

"Do you want an aristocracy of blood and birth?" inquires Mr. Wendling. "The Jews, then, are the purest blooded people and have the best established descent in the world." Neither Mirabeau in the French Assembly, nor Patrick Henry, in the House of Burgesses, nor Sam Adams in the Colonial days, ever said a more thrilling thing than Disraeli's reply in the English Commons to O'Connell's charge that he was a Jew:

"Yes, I am a Jew! And when the ancestors of the right honorable gentleman were brutal savages in an unknown island, mine were priests in the temple!" Who could answer such a magnificent statement as that? Who, in the light of human history, are the aristocrats if not the Jews?

"Do you seek an aristocracy of talent?" asks Mr. Wendling. The great church historian, Neander; Napoleon's marshals, Soult and Massena; Gambetta, the brilliant cynic Heine—these were Jews. The world's list of great soldiers, authors, musicians, painters, poets, philosophers and financiers "contains more Hebrew names than I could recite in many hours."

If an aristocracy of wealth is sought, let it be remembered that the combined financial power of the Jews in Europe and America can "prevent the floating of any national loan which may be put upon the markets of the world."

Then Mr. Wendling continues: "It is a spurious, false Christianity that hates Jews. The mystery of the Incarnation found expression in the flesh and blood of a Jew, and therefore, in a sense, we worship a Jew. We get our Ten Commandments—the very foundation of our civilization—through the Jews. We sing Jewish psalms, we are uplifted by the passion and poetry of Jewish biographers for the only history we have of Christ. We get our Pauline theology from a Jew, and we catch our earliest glimpse of the next world through the sublime apocalyptic vision of a Jew. Then, forsooth,

we Christians turn about and sneer at Jews! I have conversed with teachers of philosophy who spoke slightly of the Jews, and yet were teaching with enthusiasm ideas which they had absorbed from Maimonides and Spinoza; the two greatest philosophers, omitting Kant, since Plato's day—both of them Jews. I have heard musicians denounce Jews and then spend days and nights trying to interpret the beauties of Rossini, Meyerbeer, Mendelssohn and Strauss—all Jews. I talked the other day with a gifted actress, and heard both her and her husband sweepingly condemn, confidentially, of course, the whole race of Jews, and yet that woman would give half her remaining life if she could only reach the heights which the great queen of tragedy, Rachel, trod with such majestic power—and Rachel was a Jewess, as is Bernhardt, the great genius on the stage to-day. Here in Washington I have heard aspiring politicians, when beyond the reach of the reporter's pencil, sneer at Jews, and yet it was a Jew that made England's Queen Empress of India, and it was a Jew who was for years the adroit and sagacious chairman of the national committee of one of our great political parties. The most powerful intellect in the Southern Confederacy was that of Judah P. Benjamin, a Jew; and Chase, when managing our national finances in a perilous time owed much of his success to the constant advice of a New York Jew."

A Jewish tramp or a Jewish drunkard is never seen—that is proverbial. You never see a Jewish beggar—that is a commonplace. The Jewish race contributes fewer inmates of hospitals, jails and workhouses than any other race. "The two greatest philanthropists of modern times" were both Jews—Hirsch and Montefiore.

Mr. Wendling goes on to say: "There is no sweeter domestic life on earth than is found in Jewish homes. How rarely we hear in our courts of a Jewish divorce case. In reverence and honor for parents, in self-sacrificing love among the children and in unity, peace, and concord, the average Jewish family is simply ideal. The beauty and fidelity of Jewish women command my homage, and among wealthy and educated Jews the exquisite refinement of Jewesses, their culture and high breeding blended with a sort of Oriental grace and dignity, put them among the most charming women in the world.

"Convert the Jews? Yes, but meanwhile let us convert many of our church members to genuine Christianity. Suppress the Jews? A score of Russian Czars cannot do

it. Every people in the Old World has tried it and failed. They have outlived the Tudors and the Plantagenets, the Romanoffs, the tyranny of Spain, the dynasties of France, Charlemagne, Constantine, the Caesars, the Babylonian kings and the Egyptian Pharaohs. It was God's own race for 4,000 years, and the awful persecution it has survived for 2,000 more stamps it as a race still bearing some mysterious relation to the plans of the Eternal."

The belief that the Jew is more dishonest than the Gentile is half non-sense, half falsehood and prejudice, asserts Mr. Wendling. The anti-Semite movement in Europe is hideous and repulsive, and all anti-Jewish feeling is "un-Christian, un-American and unhuman. No man can share it who believes in the universal fatherhood of God and the universal brotherhood of man. It is born of the devil." The truth is mighty and it will prevail.



King of Italy Visits Florence Synagogue.

In fulfillment of a promise made some time ago, the King of Italy paid a visit last week to the magnificent synagogue in Florence. Although the visit had been timed for 2 o'clock in the afternoon, the Via Farini was crowded at an early hour with Jews who were anxious to demonstrate their affectionate loyalty to the Sovereign and to appreciate his thoughtful act. When His Majesty, riding in a motor-car, entered the vast garden of the synagogue, he was greeted with frantic cheering, which lasted several minutes. The President of the Community, Signor Vittia, who was the first to greet the King, was one of the most distinguished officers in the suite of His Majesty's father, the late King Humbert, in the campaign of 1866. After cordially shaking hands with Chief Rabbi Dr. Margulies, the King entered the synagogue, which was brilliantly illuminated and handsomely decorated. A brief discourse was delivered by the Chief Rabbi, whom His Majesty subsequently thanked for the loyal and patriotic terms in which it was couched. The Ark was opened, and when the splendid ornaments to the Scrolls of the Law were disclosed to view, the King was loud in his expression of admiration.

# NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

(Exclusive Correspondence to the HEBREW STANDARD.)

## British Government's New Shops' Bill Will After All Have One Law for Jews and Christians—The Truth About Jewish Members of British Government Having Been Refused Permission to Enter Russia—Grave Fears in London of Another Pogrom—The Ghastly Story of Bluma Lapidus.

London, May 20, 1911.

After a day's debate on the Home Office Shop Hours' Bill, the Commons Committee on May 18 resolved to have one law of Sunday opening for both Christians and Jews.

At the previous sitting a week ago the first portion of Clause 4, which provides that every shop shall, save as otherwise provided in the bill, be closed for the serving of customers on Sunday had been agreed to. A long discussion took place on the proposal that, where the occupier of a shop is a Jew and the shop and all other shops belonging to him are closed from nightfall on Friday to nightfall on Saturday, the shop may be kept open for serving customers only until 2 o'clock on Sunday afternoon, if all the shop assistants employed for the purpose are also Jewish.

Sir George Kemp moved as an amendment that it should be left to the discretion of local authorities, in areas in which the question arose, to decide until what hour, not later than 2 p. m., shops may be kept open on Sunday.

Sir Edward Cornwall said the question was not one of religion. In the East End of London the Jewish traders opened their shops on Sunday as rivals of the Gentile shopkeepers. He did not favor racial hatred, but he protested against legislation which would handicap British shopkeepers against alien rivals. He thought Jewish shopkeepers would be content to limit the exemption from the general provision in favor of Sunday closing to the months of June, July, and August. There was a good voluntary arrangement in Manchester, but such an arrangement might break down.

Mr. Joseph Samuel opposed the amendment, because he thought it would transfer to local authorities that which should be the duty of the State. He warned the Home Secretary that he was opening the floodgates of such a persecution as he did not contemplate. If the amendment were adopted the cry "Down with the Jews!" would be raised at municipal and other local elections.

Mr. Lionel de Rothschild said the amendment would make the privilege granted hardly worth having. The privilege was intended to be granted by way of compensation to Jewish shopkeepers for the closing of their shops from nightfall on Friday to the same time on Saturday; and if the committee had determined to give a privilege the gift should not be a sham.

Mr. Harry Lawson said the clause would be a blot upon the bill and should be omitted.

Winston Churchill, who is the member of the Cabinet in charge of the Shops' Bill, said he did not believe the Sunday trading question to be capable of a completely satisfactory solution. Whether they looked at the question from the point of view of religious observance or from the point of view of the State the opening of shops on Sunday was not wanted. Were he to take the easy course of eliminating the Sunday closing clause from the bill there would be great disappointment, dissatisfaction, and even disgust in many parts of the country. He said frankly that might be the end, if neither the committee nor the House of Commons could reach a solution of the problem, but that was a counsel of despair, and would be a failure to attempt to grapple with a great and growing evil. If special exemptions were given to Jews without the people in the districts concerned being allowed to bring influence to bear upon their local authorities, the anger which would be excited and would have no constitutional outlet might rise in certain circumstances to such a pitch that there would be riot and disorder. He would not resist the amendment, and he would afterwards move to add the following provision at the end of the subsection:

"Provided, that if the local authority are satisfied that, as respects the whole

or any part of their area, the foregoing exemption of Jewish shops is desirable, but that it would, if confined to such shops, unduly prejudice the interests of the occupiers of other shops, they may by order, which shall be subject to confirmation by the Secretary of State, confer the same exemption on all shops, or on shops of any particular class within their area or such part thereof, and where such an order is in force the special conditions attached by the foregoing provision to the keeping open of Jewish shops on Sunday shall not apply either to Jewish shops or to any other shops."

Sir George Kemp's amendment was carried.

An amendment moved to substitute 10 a. m. or 2 p. m. as the hour up to which the shops exempted from the general provision might be kept open on Sunday was negatived.

The additional provision which had been mentioned by Mr. Churchill was then added to the subsection.

I have just heard the truth about the curious story that either Mr. Herbert Samuel or Sir Matthew Nathan, the two Jewish members of the British Government, had been refused permission by the Russian Government to visit Russia. A statement to this effect was printed in the Russian papers, caused discussion in the Duma and spread throughout the world as an established fact. In reality it all arose out of a misunderstanding. Two years ago a Jewish civil servant occupying a quite modest post in the secretary's office of the postoffice wanted to visit Russia. The Russian Consul refused to vise his passport unless he got a commission to represent a firm as a commercial traveler. This was in strict accordance with the regulations applying to Jews, but the civil servant declined to adopt the humiliating device, although a firm was quite willing to assist him. Shortly after the deputation from the Russian Duma came on a visit to this country. One of the deputies knew the head of the firm in question, and was told what had happened, but either himself misunderstood what he was told or gave a wrong impression to those to whom he repeated the story. The civil servant in the secretary's office became the secretary to the postoffice, and as the permanent and the political leader of the postoffice happened at the time both to be Jews, report could choose freely between Mr. Herbert Samuel and Sir Matthew Nathan. I have this explanation from the civil servant, so that its authenticity is quite unexceptionable. Whether in point of fact his more illustrious chiefs would have received more generous treatment at the hands of the Russian Government is, of course, another question.

It is stated in London that there is grave fear of the Jews of Kieff being massacred. No one can realize the horror of such a report who has not seen a pogrom. I was at Bielestok, writes a correspondent, a couple of days after the pogrom of 1906, and I am never likely to forget what I saw and heard. Turning over an old note book the other day, I found the brief but terrible story of her experience written down for me in Russian by a girl called Bluma Lapidus. It is as follows: "We were all in the house, when a mob rushed into the courtyard with some soldiers and shouted out, 'Come into the court, all of you.' We did not know what to do, and obeyed. When we got into the yard the hooligans set on us, and my two brothers, Max, a lad of twenty-one, and Aaron, who was twenty, were killed by them. The rest of us implored an officer who was there to save us, but he only shouted, 'Get away.' Then a soldier began to beat us with the butt-end of his rifle, and we rushed away to escape. As we were going, my little sister, who was only thirteen, fell, and they killed her. When at last we were able to return we found our home pillaged."

The room in which I sat while Bluma Lapidus wrote down her tragic tale,

adds the correspondent, was strewn with fragments of furniture and crockery, wantonly destroyed by the mob. The young girl spoke of the tragedy without a trace of emotion in a colorless voice, as though she were narrating something that had happened long ago in another land. But her beautiful face was lined with grief, and her eyes red with weeping. At a little factory the soldiers had slaughtered the hands, half-dozen in number, as they came from the building. In an upstairs room was an old and bedridden woman. The brutes were too lazy to go upstairs and kill her, so they set the house on fire and left her to perish in the flames. I listened to scores of such tales until the recital became almost unbearable. Jews and Christians alike assured me that they lived as brothers; the pogrom was carried out by the Russian police and soldiers, assisted by the riffraff of the town.

There was much significance in Dr. Magnes' address to the B'nai Jeshurun confirmants. He plainly showed that he was not in accord with the "administration of the solemn rite" when he told the young maidens that he would exact no promises or pledges from them, as they would most likely be broken.

*The Jewish Spectator*, of Memphis, has published a fine special number to commemorate the silver jubilee of the founding of that journal. In all these years Rabbi Max Samfield has presided over its destinies. We wish our contemporary many more years of life and prosperity and trust that it will long continue to enjoy the benefit of Rabbi Samfield's wise editorial guidance.

Rabbi Martin A. Meyer, in *Emanu-El*, has revised his rather acerbic estimate of the Jewish press of this country. He now finds that our contemporaries are weak because they are not supported properly by the members of their various communities, and that hence they are not the mouthpieces of Jewish public opinion they should be. From the attitude of open condemnation of the American Jewish press, his own journal included, Rabbi Meyer has jumped to the character of "glorifier" of all that appears in every Jewish weekly every week. For a rabbi such a right-about is significant.

An excellent feature of the work of some of the large, non-sectarian fraternal orders is their holding annual memorial services for deceased brethren of their lodges. The Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of this state follows this custom, and we note that the services this year are to be held at Temple Rodeph Shalom. Grand Master Joel Krone, in his announcement to his subordinate lodges, states boldly and properly that he is a member of this congregation and that he and Rabbi Rudolph Grossman will deliver addresses on this occasion. We are glad to see that the Odd Fellows are holding this year's services in one of our synagogues, eloquent testimony to the catholicity of religious interest and lack of sectarian bias of its leading members.

That Justice Leonard A. Giegerich, of the local Supreme Court, should know the Jew of this city is no matter for surprise. The learned jurist resided for many years among our people on the great East Side and is thus able to speak of them from intimate acquaintance. When he states, therefore, as he did in the trial of a separation suit in which the wife accused her husband of intemperance, that he "cannot remember ever having seen a drunken Jew," his words bear the most eloquent testimony to the truth of the well-known Jewish virtue of abstemiousness. Justice Giegerich not only knows the Jews of this city; he is ever ready to refute aspersions on their good name and excellent qualities. And lest our readers think that Justice Giegerich (because of his German name) is one of our people, we hasten to say that he is a loyal and devout Roman Catholic.

Who says the Jews are not successful in every field of endeavor into which they venture? The South African mine magnate, J. B. Joel, a co-religionist, carries off England's coveted trophy of the turf—the Epsom Derby. And this Jewish Derby victor succeeded through the efforts of a Jewish jockey, and stands thus before the world in this coronation year as England's premier sportsman. But this is not all. Our old friend, "Leach" Cross, the clever pugilist, "mixed it up" last week with Wells. "Leach" Cross (Louis Wallach) as everyone knows, is a Jew, for has he not been called the pride of the Ghetto? Wells, Mat or Mort Wells, is a Jew, too, and an erstwhile student of the Jews' Free School, London, at that. Thus we see that Mendoza and "Dutch Sam" and the celebrities of their day and generation have their latter-day successors.

## UNWRITTEN CONDEMNATION.

PRESIDENT TAFT has, with quiet forcefulness and no attempt to "play to the gallery," held up Colonel Joseph Garrard, of the cavalry post at Fort Myer, Va., before the country as conspicuously deficient in the essentials required of an American army officer and gentleman, so we feel that no further action is needed in the case of Private Frank Bloom. This young man, of excellent antecedents and habits, will now be permitted to take the army examinations for a commission without that surrounding prejudice, because of his Jewish affiliations, which has grown up in the regular military circles of this country during the past few decades.

For, Colonel Garrard is, in our opinion, but the creature of a vicious system of caste and privilege, and the President of the United States by exhibiting him to the country in his true light, has done much to make the exponents of this outrageous method of condemning pause in their tracks. He has conferred lasting "fame" on Colonel Garrard, and we doubt very much whether any man wearing Uncle Sam's shoulder straps will be disposed to repeat his offense.

Colonel Garrard's conduct ought to be made the subject of a trial by court-martial, although it is perhaps too much to hope that a tribunal of his fellow officers would convict him of a misdemeanor of which many of them, perhaps with less outspokenness, have been guilty. As it stands, therefore, President Taft has in the Bloom case vindicated the essential democratic and unprejudiced character of our institutions, and justice will surely be meted out to this young soldier when he takes his final examinations.

These comments cannot be closed without a word of appreciation for the new service our tried and true defender, Simon Wolf, has rendered our cause. Through more than four decades now Mr. Wolf has been literally "on guard" for the Jews of this country at Washington, ever ready and willing to adopt prompt measures for the protection of our civil and religious rights. In the Bloom case his efficiency has again been conclusively demonstrated, and we give it as our inexperienced opinion that one Simon Wolf is worth more to the Jews of the United States than ten American Jewish committees. He has the confidence of the public authorities, and, what is more, no axe of his own to grind.

## ANYTHING FOR NOTORIETY.

HAVING had his name "mentioned" in connection with the recent army manoeuvres in Texas, and taking up one day with a proposed Jewish militia regiment, the next with the so-called "Big Sisters" movement, that irrepressible genius, Nissim Behar, and his "paper organization," the Federation of Jewish Organizations of the State of New York, have conceived of another means by which the former will receive some more free advertising. We may add that this latest scheme has about it all the ear-marks of mendacity and gratuitous meddlesomeness which characterized previous ventures.

The perennially-unsettled question of national recognition for the services of Haym Salomon in our Revolutionary War has now been given its *coup de grace* by Nissim Behar, and this in a form which those most concerned therewith would surely be the last to approve. The money which Haym Salomon advanced to this government will probably never be repaid; his direct descendants profess their satisfaction with the project to erect a monument to their ancestor which shall imperishably record his services, and have even agreed to help the desired object to come to pass by means of subscriptions of money.

These conditions do not content Nissim Behar. Seizing upon this golden opportunity for cheap notoriety for himself, he would have the Congress of the United States repay the sums lent our government by Haym Salomon to his Federation of Jewish Organizations of the State of New York! That "body" promises to make good use of the gift proposed and will establish the Haym Salomon National University to the glory of Nissim Behar and the advancement of his ends! With his customary energy Nissim Behar has outlined what his university will do; he declares through a co-worker that his foundation will stand for absolute *Lehr- and Lern-Freiheit* and draws invidious comparisons between his faculty *in spe* and the members of existing faculties in this country. He has even gone so far as to arrange the details of a mass meeting in aid of his object, and has invited a large number of prominent citizens to speak at it. We trust his invitations will be but flashes in the pan!

Can our community do nothing to end the career of this compound of Phineas Taylor Barnum and Cagliostro?

Boris Bogen, of the United Jewish Charities of Cincinnati, evidently thinks that if school children of the Jewish faith are supplied with *kosher* meat by the public authorities, the latter are guilty of pandering to them. If the authorities supply penny lunches to their young charges, Mr. Bogen believes they need not have the meat for Jewish children properly *koshered*. For, thus the schools cease to be non-sectarian. The character of this suggestion may at once be determined by the consideration of the fact that these lunches are not part of the regular work of the schools, and that, assuming the laws of *kashruth* are properly observed by and for Jews, the non-sectarian nature of the instruction is not violated thereby. Of course, it would have been too much to assume that such thoughtfulness for our little children on the part of liberal Christians would have been allowed to pass without an apologetic Jew raising the spectre of sectarianism. Mr. Bogen happens to be a communal worker in Cincinnati Jewry and this fact only makes his *lapsus* all the greater and more distasteful.

## THE HOME INTELLECTUAL.

יהי ביתך בית ועד להכמים והיה מחאק בעפר רגליהם  
והיה שותה בצמא את-דבריהם:

"Let thy house be a meeting house for the wise; sit amidst the dust of their feet, and drink their words with thirst. Pirke Aboth 1:4.

This remarkable saying reminds us very strongly of the French *Salons*. Originated by women of wit and wisdom, these salons soon became a national institution. They were, as if in literal fulfilment of this rabbinic admonition, the meeting place of the wise and the learned of the age. They flourished at a particularly productive time of French history. Many an epoch-making thought or plan saw its birth in the discussions carried on in these intellectual home circles. They decayed when the spirit of decadence sapped the life of the nation. They were the mirror showing forth the body of the age that fathered them.

Long before the rise of the French salons, the Jewish home had realized the ideal underlying them. Our so-called "enlightened" brethren are in the habit of turning up their noses at the very notion of mediaeval Israel; yet, it is undoubtedly true that the Jewish home of the Middle-Ages embodied in itself the old tradition with regard to the character of the Jewish home, so beautifully expressed in our mishnaic text; namely, that the home should be an intellectual center, that it should be subtly pervaded by an atmosphere of culture and refinement. The Jewish home of old was in the best sense of the term a salon. The trouble with our enlightened brethren in their estimate of the Jewish past is that they confound Christian mediaevalism with Jewish mediaevalism. Whatever Christian mediaevalism may or may not have been, Jewish mediaevalism was the synonym of light. It does not matter that Darwin and Spencer, or other anachronisms, were not to be found in the old-time Jewish home; the Torah was there, the Talmud was there, the writings of the Jewish philosophers and the commentaries of the Jewish scholars were there and formed the topic of conversation. In brief, *Lamdanuth*—the word for Jewish culture—was there, lending the home its peculiar Jewish dignity and aristocracy.

The Jewish home is usually described as an abode of the affections of the human heart, of love and tenderness, of filial devotion and parental love. This picture, ideal as it is, would still be incomplete without a description of the intellectual side of Jewish home life. The emotionalism of the Jewish home is usually emphasized to the neglect of its intellectualism. And yet, it is the harmonious combination of the two that gives the Jewish home its peculiar character. Who of us, born in an old-fashioned Jewish home, with their sacred memories still clinging to his soul, could forget the vision of Father examining the children every Sabbath in the Sidrah or the Perek or the Shiur?

It needs hardly to be pointed out in this connection that the home is the mirror of man's progression or retrogression. As we advance in civilization our homes cease to be mere armories, or mere sleeping and eating places, but become the scene and the means of our spiritual development. And certainly the farthest point in this advance is reached when the home is spiritualized and intellectualized, when it is the home not only of bodies, but of hearts and souls, when it is the abode not only of feelings, but also of thoughts and ideas. Common material interests may hold together the members of a family, but in a rather loose fashion; the bonds of instinctive love knits them together more firmly; but there is nothing as efficient to cement the bonds formed by love as the ties of common intellectual interests whereby love becomes conscious and affection-enduring. This stage of development was decidedly reached in the old-fashioned Jewish home where the love of the Torah, the common zeal in its maintenance, united the members of a Jewish household.

The contemplation of the beauties of old-time Jewish life, especially within the home, naturally calls to mind the vivid contrast of life in the up-to-date home. The picture is a sad one. Card tables, expense for expense's sake, loose and frivolous gossip, ragtime music sheets, rich bindings of books that are never read, a general tone of shallowness and stupidity, if not of vulgarity, the love of brutal burlesque and void vaudeville—such are the elements of the average home life of the present generation. Where formerly the debates of the sages of the Talmud engrossed the minds, there to-day the victories of some husky negro pugilist or some baseball hero claim the attention; where learned men and pious women lived in a sort of spiritual communion hallowed by the presence of the invisible company of the great men of Israel, there we find inane men and ignorant women. Jewish culture has gone abegging and even general culture is seldom found. From a highly intellectual people we are getting to be a coarse, commonplace mob.

But, of course, our "enlightened brethren" assure us that we are—"progressing!"

They use all the arguments that can properly be raised in a discussion of this question, and it is to be hoped that the matter will rest there. No good purpose is subserved by a continuance of this discussion and we commend to the publisher of the periodical in question the desirability, the absolute need, of promptly discontinuing it. Let him take up with other, and less controversial, subjects in the hope of increasing his circulation thereby.

Some time ago the police made a raid upon what are commonly known as fortune-tellers, though plying their alleged calling under various euphonious appellations, such as clairvoyants, palmists, etc. Why this class of barnacles which infect certain parts of the city and flourish with impunity in large numbers on Coney Island and other seaside resorts is not banished seems to be beyond understanding.

They are plying their so-called business under misrepresentation, and their pretended telling of the fortune of individuals has been the source of untold misery. Only recently the daily press told of a young girl in Brooklyn who had her fortune told by one of these miscreants, and the information imparted to her weighed so heavily upon her mind that within a week she committed suicide.

There are untold numbers of cases where the supposed information as to future happenings has been a nightmare to them, and a constant source of brooding over the "fortune told" has unsettled weak nerves and resulted in wrecking of lives.

Women as a rule are the victims of this species of cormorants, and the havoc sustained by them is inestimable. Their thoughts, not understanding themselves, will recur to the story told by the fortune-teller and the unsettling of their nervous system follows in the wake of this constant recurring to the supposed revelation of these frauds. They ought to be taken in hand by the police and suppressed.

### More Than a Mistake.

The chairman of the entertainment committee of the Chancellor Social Club, an offshoot of Chancellor Kent Lodge, No. 870, F. & A. M., who recently arranged and held a lodge "affair" on Friday night, cannot be heard to say that he knew no better. We are credibly informed that this gentleman is connected with a business house where our Sabbaths and festivals are strictly observed, and we are not aware that he himself is other than a Jew.

We do not condemn the course pursued by the gentleman in question and the members of the lodge who ratified it by lending their support to the "affair," because a majority of the members of Chancellor Kent Lodge are of Jewish faith. In Freemasonry and the other non-sectarian fraternal orders there is no such thing as a Jewish or a Christian lodge. We condemn their action because as Jews they lacked sufficient *Derech Eretz* to prevent the holding of an "affair" on the holy Sabbath, especially in view of the earnest protest of a Past Master of the lodge. Being Jews they should have been the last to consent to a desecration of our Sabbath by non-Jews where they and their co-religionists would be *particeps criminis* to the violation. But these Jews did more: they, not the non-Jews, with malice aforethought (as the lawyers say) openly and flagrantly traduced their Sabbath, for which our fathers endured countless sufferings and persecutions before the world.

If the chairman of the entertainment committee in question had not been a Jew a plea in mitigation might be advanced. As it stands, he and his associates, who thus lay themselves justly open to the charge of treason to the cause of Judaism, are convicted of a cruel and careless defiance of the susceptibilities of true-blue Jewish members of the lodge.

Strange that our traitors are al-

ways members of our own religious household! A Christian would never have thought of holding a lodge entertainment on a Friday night, feeling that his Jewish friends would feel outraged in their feelings thereby. But Jews like these who themselves are Masons are callous to tradition, to sentiment; they have in short no *Derech Eretz*.

We ask our readers to contrast this action of Jewish members of Chancellor Kent Lodge, F. & A. M., with the action of the Grand Master of Odd Fellows in this State, to which we refer in another place. The latter is a Jew who is proud of his ancient faith and who honors himself by paying proper respect to it.

### The Latest From Pittsburg.

It is new, startling and worthy of its author, Rabbi Leonard J. Levy. The injunction of the Pentateuch that the priest should not approach a dead body does not at all mean what it unmistakably says. Listen to the omniscient commentator! It tells us to abandon dead issues and dedicate ourselves to the living present. But he, nevertheless, tolerates kindling the *Chamekep* lamps and observing other old-time ceremonies, as they are harmless, and people seem to like them. Therefore he does not dissuade his flock from adhering to them. But he had previously told Temple Israel of Harlem that he was a radical. Did he wish to mollify his hearers, knowing that they had not yet plunged into the abyss of senseless reform?

We heard nothing of the Nazarene, a favorite theme with Rabbi Levy, and one which has earned for him ridicule and contempt.

## What Pastor Russell Preaches.

lives as far as the Jews are concerned.

Seated in his study he permitted himself to be questioned by the hour, and the questioner was hostile and critical, but the answers came freely and without reserve. And equal freedom of speech was indulged by the followers, who, however, speak the language of their leader, and constitute a group such as one sometimes reads of, but which one never expects to discover within a few stone's throw of the lower end of Brooklyn Bridge. He lives in a sort of communistic brotherhood with his co-workers, they eat and dwell together, and at table they are as the disciples of old, and the meal is the occasion for a continuous exposition of Biblical verses, and the theology thus discovered is curiously akin to the doctrines of the Chassidim, of whose existence the pastor and his friends know nothing. Of course the pastor believes in the Nazarene, but it is not the common Christian conception, and what concerns us most his Christ is for the Christians not for the Jews. He does not believe in the Trinity and regards the doctrine as contrary to all Scriptures.

Reading his Bible literally, and particularly the Psalms, he believes that the dead are all dead till the resurrection, and Sheol is the grave and nothing more. Calculating from the Book of Daniel he has some idea of the actual date of "the things to come," and his teaching and his life and that of his disciples are entirely a preparation for "the latter days." He and they and all those who are good and accept his teaching are to be, or seek to be, among the 144,000 who are to have a special resurrection, and whose kingdom is to be invisible, in the sky. For the rest of us there is to be a physical material resurrection, embracing all generations since man began.

The fervid enthusiasm with which all this is related would surprise most Jews who take the hereafter and the future life as a matter of course. With Pastor Russell and his followers it is a matter of a burning quest. They seek to be among the saints; they want for themselves something more than that physical resurrection which they hold out with assurance to all mankind. And because of this desire they approach the Jews, and more particularly the Zionists, in a peculiar spirit of fellowship.

It is unquestionably hard for the Jew to understand how far his own every day practical efforts at amelioration can be and are mystically interpreted, but nevertheless it is true that a score of the Christian sects see in Zionism a proof of the truth of prophecy, evidence which they welcome as sustaining them in their various contentions as to the things that are to happen at the millenium. The writer met the same anxious inquiring spirit on Sunday among Congregationalists in Franklin, Mass., to which the Russell propaganda has not yet penetrated. But so it is.

Pastor Russell is not looking for the resettlement of all the Jews in Palestine. He is quite satisfied if in numbers and effort they repeat what is related in Ezra and Nehemiah, but the more they move in that direction the more they accomplish toward rebuilding Zion, and inter alia the more religious they are, as Jews, the more certain he becomes of the truth of his own conceptions of God and God's purpose.

He has no use for Reform Judaism because it moves the centre from the physical Zion, and apparently his doctrine would not serve if all or any proportion of the Jews were converted to Christianity, for then the higher and the lower schemes of resurrection would be purposeless. He sees humanity through a Biblical concept, he believes in the federation of the hitherto distinct nations, not their assimilation—altogether a huge reaction toward the primitive motives in religion. Pastor Russell believes that all nations will, under the millennial reign, become Jews.

So Pastor Russell neither practically nor theoretically favors the conversion of the Jews. But our interest in him does not quite end there. The removal of the fundamental cause for suspicion brings him, as a matter of fact, on an entirely new plane of relation with Jews. He is the possible philo-Semite. His particular creed teaches him that the Jews are entitled to their own creed, and therefore he has not the usual Christian reason for assuming an attitude of spiritual superiority towards the Jews. He thinks his creed the best of all possible creeds, and by that measure all others are inferior to his own, but it does not set the Jews apart. His message to the Jew is: You ought to be the best you can

possibly be within your own teachings. Perhaps Jews, here and there, will resent this as interference, but after all the majority will view with satisfaction a Christian who is teaching his own people to hold the Jews in great esteem.

A subdued and religious atmosphere prevails throughout the house in which Pastor Russell does his personal work, and his work is the interpretation of texts. His followers gather as the International Biblical Students Association, and they study texts just as the rabbis studied them, but with an eye to their interpretation from the point of view of their doctrine of preparedness for the millenium, and of the character of the millenium itself. It is interesting to listen, for instance, to a discussion which divides the Promise to Abraham of abundance of descendants into two parts, the stars of the heaven to be the invisible redeemed, the multitude like the sand of the sea referring to the Jewish nation in general. It takes one out of the work-a-day world to listen to all this solicitude for the future, and the battle of this quiet little host for the salvation of the world according to their way of thinking. And what is most pleasant in it all from a Jewish point of view, and that is what after all concerned the writer most, if not entirely, in this exhaustive interview was that this newest form of Christianity permits the Jew to be himself and offers him a measure of praise if he will be it. In the words of Pastor Russell:

"My writings and teachings in general are addressed to Christians. I am striving my utmost to help fellow-Christians out of the blindness of error and superstition and away from the misconceptions of the Divine Word which led our forefathers to persecute your race—in dense ignorance of the teachings of the holy Scriptures and the spirit thereof. From an unsectarian standpoint I am speaking to the little remnant of true Christians in the great heterogeneous mass. Those true Christians I am endeavoring to instruct from the Word of God respecting the spiritual privileges and hopes which the Bible holds out to them."

"All the good promises of His Word are sure to be fulfilled. I see it in your prophecies. I urge upon the Jew that he turn to the Voice of God speaking through Moses and the Prophets. The time for this is ripe. Set before your minds the glorious heights and depths and lengths and breadths of your Law—love to God with all your hearts, and love to your fellows as of yourself."

"Assuredly, I do not urge Jews to join any Christian sect or party, nor to accept the crudities of Christian creeds. My message to them is "To the Law and to the Prophets (testimony). If they speak not according to this word it is because there is no light in them." (Isaiah, 8:20.) True Christians and true Jews should not be very far apart in their well-wishes toward each other, even though they differ in their views relative to certain modes of belief."



editor of the Jewish Advocate paid a flying visit to New York to spend a day with Mr. Russell, determined to report his conclusions whatever they might be. And let us at once set forward the conclusion, in justice to the man: Pastor Russell is not a missionary to the Jews, he has no desire to convert them to Christianity in any form, in fact, he could not be an ordinary Christian and be Pastor Russell at the same time.

On Brooklyn Heights, where the ceaseless traffic of New York is distinctly visible, but where not a sound of the hustle penetrates, Pastor Russell has created a cloistral retreat for himself and his

army of workers who are his disciples. Its salvation upon the ultimate conversion of the Jews, and therefore, however liberal a churchman may be, in obedience to his own creed, he must stand ready to defend the movements that seek to snatch the souls of Jews and save them to Christianity. It has been our good fortune to have been intimate with two other teachers of Christianity who dispensed with the mission and the conversion, the late Father Ignatius and Mr. Heuschler, of Vienna, but neither created a school of followers. But Mr. Russell has the following, and that itself made for suspicion of sinister mo-

**Union of Orthodox Hebrew Congregations.**

(Communicated).

An important meeting of the executive was held in the synagogue, East 35th street, last Saturday evening, to act upon the resignation of the Rev. Dr. H. Pereira Mendes, the president of the organization.

In his letter to the meeting, Dr. Mendes made the following vigorous suggestions, which will be of interest to show the work which makes the organization a necessity:

To the Executive of the Union Orthodox Congregations.

Gentlemen:

I regret very much that my ill health prevents my attendance at this meeting.

I have frequently stated that the work of the union must be for some fifteen years, merely preparatory. The time for full organization is only just beginning, and in order to further prepare for this, I venture to make the following suggestions:

1. That such amendments to the constitution be prepared for the next convention as past experience has indicated. The present constitution is to be found in the year book of 5661. The amendments should provide for membership of Jewish orthodox organizations, such as hospitals, homes, Talmud Torahs, etc., and for the membership of individuals who wish to see Orthodox Judaism organized, strengthened and made efficient, in addition to present membership which is confined to congregations only. Furthermore, the number of small congregations that have sprung up all over the country, far beyond our expectations, needs special provision for their membership, for our object should be to get in touch with these. And the question may be at least debated as to whether we can establish an associate membership with these congregations that wish to affiliate with us, but which cannot do so fully because they have made some innovations in worship, though not in Jewish doctrine. The suggestion has been raised by two esteemed ministers of this city.

A committee should be appointed to prepare this amended constitution and to submit by-laws in accordance.

2. There should be more vice-presidents and at least one from New York city, so that in case of emergency like the present, the New York vice-president can act.

3. There should be an additional secretary, able to correspond in English and his constant duty should be to make propaganda for the union, by correspondence with the congregations and through the English and Yiddish press.

4. The relations of the union to the American Jewish Committee and to the various Kehillahs must be carefully studied in the light of what they accomplish practically within a set time, say three or five years. The American Jewish Committee occupies itself with national Jewish, but not with religious matters. Therefore, national religious matters affecting orthodoxy fall especially in the province of the union. By national Jewish matters, I mean such as for example the Russian persecutions, the passport question, the immigrant question, etc. In all of these, the American Jewish Committee properly acts. By national religious matters I mean for example, such as provision for Jewish education of children and the training of rabbis pledged to orthodox Judaism. In neither of these can the American Jewish Committee with propriety interfere.

The experiment of Kehillahs is not yet conclusive. If any Kehillah applies itself to any of the requirements of orthodox Judaism, it is our duty to have something to say in their councils, to oppose where necessary and assist where possible. Whether any Jewish organization of any kind is self-appointed, or whether it is nominally elective and representative is not a subject for the union to discuss as a union. But if any Jewish organization, created in any matter whatsoever acts for Jewish interests, we must give it the hand of friendship whether it is acting for general Jewish weal or for orthodox requirements. In my opinion, the original convention which created the union acted wisely in providing for the creation of local committees or Kehillahs.

5. The central idea of the Union being the strengthening and preservation of our religion, its chief object becomes the education of rabbis whose qualifications shall suit the requirements of Orthodox Judaism. Deep learning in Jewish law, Talmud and the Codes, practical knowledge of the special requirements of Orthodox Judaism must be combined with the power to hold the young generation. A Jewish and an American education must therefore be conjoined. The seminary was created to train the students after the heart of the revered late Sabato Morais. Its present head is devoted heart and soul to Orthodox Judaism, and is opposed heart and soul to reform vagaries. The curriculum, and rules of the seminary provide for a rabbinic education, plus graduation from some university of high standing. But the immense number of small congregations throughout the country do not want university graduates, and university graduates would be unhappy and out of place in all of these small congregations. On the other hand, we must insist upon the necessity of a proper English education. At the least, high school graduation should be insisted upon. I suggest that a committee be appointed to devise means for the creation of scholarships for approved students of the seminary with additional special course to meet the peculiar conditions existing.

6. The union should from time to time issue leaflets of advice for the formation of schools, selection of text-books, etc.

7. Beginnings should be made to form

small committees for Orthodox Jewish interests in the various cities.

8. The executive should be enlarged, especially by the addition of representatives from leading Orthodox Jewish organizations.

9. Provision should be made to fill vacancies in the Board of Directors, and drop from the board those New York members who do not attend the executive meetings.

I bid you all take heart, even in the face of the great difficulties before us. I repeat that we must complete a long term of years of preparation, study and experiment before we can become well organized.

Conventions may be, and are, necessary, especially from the American point of view. But conventions mean sacrifice and expense which many cannot afford. Provisions should therefore be made for meetings of the FULL executive, which includes leading Orthodox Jews of the largest cities to be occasionally substituted for the regular convention.

I fervently hope that a working committee will be appointed to act upon whichever of these suggestions you meeting-to-night shall deem worthy.

The Judaism that has lived through the centuries is our Judaism, the historical Judaism that we stand for. The Judaism that has preserved the Jews throughout the centuries in our Judaism. We do not believe that we have come to this country to be merged, after so many centuries of existence into the un-Jewish world around us. Our problem is to hand down the religion we love so well, to our children who come after us. The work is great, the time allotted to us for the work is small. The Master is urgent. It is not for us to expect to do the whole, but we are expected to do our part. Moses, our master, worked for forty years, but he only reached the top of Pisgah. He did not even begin to see the realization of his work. We will be more than content if we only begin the work set for us to do.

It was decided at the meeting to accept Dr. Mendes's resignation temporarily, until the next convention. One of the vice-presidents, Rev. Meldola de Soia, of Montreal, and Mr. Simon Koeder will act in the interim.

After earnest discussion it was resolved to prepare plans on the above lines for presentation at the next convention which will be held next year.

A new Jewish school building at Demotica (Turkey), was recently inaugurated. The ceremony was attended by over 2,000 persons, including the deputy-governor, the metropolitan of the Greek community, the military commandant and other public functionaries, all of whom gave donations.

At a meeting of the Palestine Committee at Odessa it was announced that the organization had in hand 100,000 francs for the purpose of purchasing land in Palestine, and it was agreed to spend this sum with a view to planting a colony for Palestine workmen or to reselling the land to individual settlers.

Major Wolf Bardach Edler von Schlumberg died recently at Czernowitz in his seventy-third year. The greater part of his life was spent in the army, and he saw much active service. On several occasions he distinguished himself by his bravery, and was rewarded by the bestowal on him of the Gold Medal for Valor. The Emperor of Austria raised him to the nobility in the year 1888.

On the 4th of May the Khedive arrived at Alexandria and held a reception in his palace. Among the large number of Jews admitted into His Highness's presence was Dr. Valensin Bey, chief physician of the Jewish Hospital. Norsa Bey, comptroller of the municipality, was received in private audience, and learned from the Khedive that he had been appointed, together with the Governor of Alexandria, to represent the city at the international exhibition in Rome.

Lipov, the Medical adviser of the Olonetz Zemstvo; the Order of Stanislav (Grade III) for Dr. Yephes, the Medical Adviser of the Eupatoria Zemstvo; a gold medal and the Andrei ribbon for M. Hodzash, the chairman of the Eupatoria Credit Society; a gold medal and the Alexander ribbon for the Hebrew lecturer of the Wilna Institute, M. Lazarev; and silver medals and the Alexander ribbons for M. Byrel (teacher at the Vilkomir Jewish School), M. Susman (Curator of the Odessa Jewish Commercial School), and M. Yenkelevitch (the promoter of the Kitchen for the Poor at Harbin).

LITERARY.

HAYM SALOMON, the financier of the revolution. An unwritten chapter in American history. By Madison C. Peters, New York. The Trow Press, 1911. Price 50 cents. Pp. 48. From the author.

This is an altogether admirable sketch of the man who has been rightly called "The Financier of the American Revolution." The broad facts of Haym Salomon's career are well known to students of American Jewish history, but nowhere else have these facts been so well and so completely marshalled.

The object of the publication of the little volume is the furtherance of a movement now on foot, to erect a monument to Haym Salomon—to give in compact form the story of Salomon, in order to create the preliminary intelligent interest essential to a successful campaign for funds. It would do much good, as the preface informs us, if this book were placed in all public and school libraries and in the hands of Jews and gentiles who are ignorant of the part the Jews played in the battles for American independence.

The story of Salomon's patriotism is a most interesting one. From his own funds he advanced the government over \$650,000 in the hour of its direst need, not one cent of which he has ever been repayed, though various Congresses have reported favorably on the claim, which has never been disputed. The descendants of the patriot have been very magnanimous in the matter of the debt. They offered to accept a gold medal as payment in full. This offer was accepted, but the medal has never been struck. Others have since suggested that his patriotism be perpetuated by printing his portrait on a National Bank note, and the I. O. B. B. recently agitated the scheme of a similar recognition on a postage stamp! We are not sorry that these schemes came to naught.

Haym Salomon is worthy of a national monument. Few rendered such eminent service as did he during the revolution. The proposed recognition, though tardy, would do something at least to dispel the prevailing opinion that republics are ungrateful.

There is one little fault that we have to find with the book before us. Chapter 2, on "Other Jewish Patriots of the Revolution," which contains numerous inaccuracies, does not belong here. It is merely inserted for the purpose of padding. We strongly recommend the author to omit this chapter in future editions, which will doubtless be called for.

We cordially endorse the movement for the erection of a national monument for Hyam Salomon, and trust that subscriptions will be forthcoming from all parts of the United States. If it is to serve its purpose, the monument must be a national one. Our gratitude is due to Dr. Peters for the new service he has rendered to the Jewish people, and we would like to see his charming volume very widely distributed and read. B. A. E.



**Temple Beth Shalom, Bensonhurst.**

The two sermons of Rabbi Jacob Goldstein on Thursday and Friday evenings formed a continuous, harmonious unit. "Setting the Bounds" furnished the introduction, gave the historical and local background of the greatest of dramas whose burden was "The Decalogue." At the outset he called attention to the fact that the three great festivals in addition to their agricultural associations each had a historical significance. The Passover was not only the spring-tide, it was also the anniversary of the birth of national and religious freedom; Pentecost, the past of the first fruits, commemorates the birth of spirituality, and Rosh Hashana is not only the celebration of the harvest, but is also a memorial of the creation of the world.

After Israel had been made political free, it was brought to the foot of the mountain that had been the central home of that older worship, the worship of the moon. After bounds had been set around the people and around the mount, three days were spent in self purification and sanctification in preparation for the revelation of the Divine Presence. None can receive that revelation who does not set the bounds against every gross and every base influence, who does not properly purify himself in body and mind and sanctify himself in spirit.

After such preparation, on the morning of the third day, a thick cloud descended upon the mountains. Amid the lightning's flash and the thunder's peal, from the cloud proceeded trumpet tones waxing ever stronger, whose echoes, as tradition has it, caused the most distant hills to quake, the outermost seas to tremble and awakened the nethermost depths of hell. A fitting setting for a sublime event.

These trumpet tones proclaimed a message, the most momentous, the most significant, the most far reaching in its influences that ever reached or ever can reach the mortal mind. Within those "ten utterances," between that "I am the Eternal, thy God!" and that "anything belongs to thy neighbor," is included all of duty that man owes to his God and to his fellowmen. It contains the basis on which is built all spirituality, on which is reared all our civilization. Yet it is so simple that every child can remember, the most feeble intellect can comprehend. It need not be brought down from heaven to be performed, it need not be fetched from across the distant seas to be fulfilled. It lies in every heart to do and to understand.





**Congregation Baitz Israel Anshei Emea.**

The synagogue was unusually crowded on the first day of Shabuoth, the occasion being not only the confirmation of eleven children, but the celebration of the fifth anniversary of Rev. Israel Goldfarb's connection with the congregation. President Louis Summer spoke briefly but very feelingly of the progress the congregation has made during the past five years, and then introduced the vice-president, Mr. I. Applebaum, who, in the name of the congregation, presented the minister with a set of the Jewish Encyclopaedia.

Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Lehman have donated a new pulpit for the synagogue, which will be constructed during the summer months and will be ready for the fall holy days.

## The Rich Man's Luck.

Dear children:

A POOR man who had a fruit stand in one of the poor and deserted streets of a large city could barely make a living, customers were few and far between; for hours and hours he would stand waiting for a customer, but no customer would come; one day a brilliant thought struck him: "If I could only get away from this God-forsaken place I would, perhaps, do better." With nothing to lose and everything to gain, he looked around where he could move. Walking through the streets of the city he came across a place that seemed to him to be one of the busiest spots in the city. It was the very attractive store of a rich wine dealer, and there seemed to be a ceaseless stream of people going in and out. The contrast between that place, full of life and light and his former dark and dreary place, was very striking. He lost no time in getting his fruit stand near the wine dealer's house, and soon the poor man had a share in the rich man's luck. He was kept busy all day selling his fruits to the customers of the wine dealer, and he soon made a very fine living.

Thus you see, dear children, that by allowing the poor man to keep his stand near his wine room, the rich man did not give the poor man anything of his possessions, yet he enabled him to make a fine living for his wife and children, doing a greater favor with his kind permission than with any amount of charity he could give—as charity often makes the receiver thereof feel ashamed and here there was no such feeling—

he just gave the poor man a chance to benefit by the "rich man's luck."

On the other hand, if the rich man would not have allowed the poor man to keep his stand near his wine room, although he would not have taken anything belonging to the poor man, yet he would have robbed him of his livelihood, and would thereby have killed him and his wife and children.

For a poor man's luck is very bad but a rich man has good luck—a poor man has a great deal of trouble before he can make a living, but heaven seems to smile at the rich man, and prosperity crowns his every effort.

When the rich man makes up his mind to let the poor man earn his bread for himself, his wife and children—and he comes in the synagogue on Rosh-Hashana and Yom Kippur—he begs of the Holy One blessed be he, "Our Father and King!" Oh write us in the book of maintenance and sustenance, and whilst the rich man is praying, the blessed God, who can read the thoughts of men, knows that the rich man is just then thinking as follows: "Who knows for what kind of a new year God will write me down, now my personal expense is one hundred and fifty dollars a week." The blessed God then proclaims to the Heavenly Beth Din the thoughts of that rich man. The Heavenly Beth Din look up the record of the rich man's expense for the past year and they find that one hundred and fifty dollars was his expense for his family and servants, besides the charity he used to distribute which amounted to no less than ten dollars each week and some weeks from fifteen to twenty dollars. The Heavenly Beth

Din then render their judgment: "This rich man should have an income of not less than four hundred dollars per week for every week of the new year because he considers the poor people as the members of his own household; therefore it is all his 'personal' expense.

The Holy One, blessed be he, thus decrees and thus it is recorded. Therefore, when the rich man supplies the poor man with his needs, he does not give him of his own, because God has given him the poor man's portion which, it is destined, must come to him through the hands of that rich man—and yet that rich man will be greatly rewarded in the hereafter for being the "medium" of the poor man's livelihood. This is the way the Dubner Maggid, of blessed memory, explained the words of Jose, the son of Jochanan, who together with Jose, the son of Joezer, received the oral law from Simon the Just and Antigonus: "Let thy house be wide open" in order that the poor man's profit may come through you, "and let the poor be thy domestic servants," as you will thereby gain a great deal, and at the same time allow the poor to have a part in "the rich man's luck."

Now, dear children, I will quote to you the maxims of the two great Rabbins just as it is written in the "Pirke Aboth" or Ethics of the Fathers. Jose Ben Joezer, of Tseredah, and Jose Ben Jochanan, of Jerusalem, received the oral law from them. Jose Ben Joezer, of Tseredah, said: "Let thy house be a house of assembly for the wise men; and dust thyself with the dust of their feet; and drink their words in thirstiness." Jose Ben Jochanan, of Jerusalem, said: "Let thy house be wide open, and let the poor be thy domestic servants; and be not prone to much discourse with woman-kind; not even with thy wife, much less with thy neighbor's wife; hence the wise men say, whoever converses much with women bringeth evil on himself, and thus neglects the study of the Torah, and at last will inherit hell."

The above, dear children, are maxims of the deepest wisdom which for thousands of years have been verified by practice and experience. Some of the above is explained to you, while you are still too young to understand all of these maxims.

Yet it is well for you to memorize these maxims, for the time will come when you will fully understand and thoroughly appreciate them.
