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The Longevity of the "Black Memorial."

THE sad, gloomy Black Memorial, known as the "Black Fast" or "חשעה כאב" —that mournful legacy which the first and second national catastrophe had bequeathed to us, is already gray and old, hoary with age; had lived already about twice as long as Methuselah—has outlived Babylon and Rome, yet it is still hale and robust, firm as if in prime of life, and has no thought of dying!—as if death were not in his line at all. This hoary figure had even passed through many a period of sickness during his long career, and was on the point of death more than once, and the Jewish nation had indulged in the hope that soon it will give up its ghost, and posterity shall know it no more. But—as if to spite the Jewish nation—it revived, recovered each and every time, got up from its dying bed, phoenix-like, younger and more vigorous than ever: as if an evil genius had pronounced upon it the blessing of "Long life," and Jewish misfortune had answered Amen thereto!

I.

This Memorial, established in sad commemoration after the first national downfall, and re-established after the second national catastrophe, had lived on for about sixty years in undisturbed gloom; when our people, harrowed and harassed by Roman tyranny, summoned courage and made a fresh bid for independence. The dazzling Bar-Cochba shot across the Judean horizon like a luminous star, and challenged Roman supremacy over Judea. The prospect of success did indeed loom large for a time, and the "Black Memorial" was—so we thought—on the point of death once more. But on the battlefield of Bether our national aspiration received a death blow and the "Black Fast" a new lease of life!

II.

With the fresh vigor it thus acquired at Bether it lived on for another century, down to the time of Judah II., Patriarch at Tiberias, when the Black Fast—owing to the

exceptional peace and prosperity our people then enjoyed under the benign rule of Alexander Severus (222 to 235)—had lost its hold upon the sentiment of the people; and the patriarch was about to sign its death war-

were the Sages who opposed it; for Judah II. had not yet been gathered to his fathers before the Jews, under Rome, have begun to change masters in rapid succession, and changed all the time for the worse. The

than half a century—every one of whom was imbued with the spirit of Ponscennius (or Franciscus) Niger (of that time) who "much regretted his inability to tax the very air the Jew breathes." Under the iron heel


to abolish חשעה; and so the "Black Memorial" not only continued to live, but flourished, struck its roots even so much deeper into the Jewish heart!

III.

If the reign of Diocletian (284 to 306)—who hated Christianity and its professors most cordially—had ever inspired any hope in the breast of the Jew, under Rome, of seeing a speedy termination to the longevity of the "Black Fast," that hope was certainly crushed into powder under the succeeding reigns of Constantine (the Great) and Constantius (306 to 361). During these reigns the enemy got into the saddle. Christianity had donned the purple, attained to Imperial power, and the hitherto persecuted became persecutor! The power the Church acquired she used remorselessly against the Synagogue—the daughter (Christianity) sought to annihilate the mother (Judaism), and our hapless people found themselves strangers in their own land, now more than ever! Their position became so intolerable, insufferable, so exasperating to them as the natives that they revolted. But the net result of that revolt was as that of the forever, namely, the granting to the "Black Fast" another lease of life!

IV.

Julian (the Apostate) succeeded Constantius (361), and there was joy in Jewry! Now "חשעה כאב" is sick unto death! Now the "Black Memorial" is doomed to die for certain! For Julian had not only relieved Roman Jewry of all the vexatious restrictions, the exceptional laws, the exactions and burdens, even burnt all the anti-Jewish edicts of his predecessors—not only had he checked the arrogance of the Church and sent some of our arch-enemies bleeding into the grave, but he wrote that famous letter, in which he volunteered to play the role of a second Cyrus! He was going to rebuild the Temple itself after he returns from Persia—with which country he was going to war. Julian was going to destroy the very *raison d'être*, the

rant. i. e., to have it abolished (1). His contemporaries, however, opposed it; and חשעה remained alive. Time, alas, has, indeed, subsequently proved how premature the abolition would have been, or how far seeing

reign of Alexander Severus was succeeded by the many-headed "Hydra," the monster called "Anarchy," which brought as many as twenty Emperors and as many usurpers to the throne of Rome in the short space of less

of such masters the abolition of the "Black Fast" was out of the question. These tyrants saw to it—that our people should not feel too comfortable under them, and should have no cause whatever for thinking even

very cause which called forth the "Black Fast!" And Julian meant all he said; for at his command the preparations for the same had already begun! The ruins on the Temple site were being cleared away, and building material was pouring in into Jerusalem in large quantities. Wealthy Jews from various parts sent in large contributions, and Jewish women sold their valuables in order to give the proceeds to the building fund. They had even helped to carry the mortar and cement to the sacred spot attired in their festive garb! Now, the days of the "Black Fast" are numbered; now, he is going to die for certain! for his grave is being dug! his mausoleum is being built! i. e., the Temple! where **יְהוָה** is to be entombed forever; now, the "Black Fast" is a corpse! But, alas, the digging of the grave which was to have entombed the "Black Fast" was stopped in the middle! Julian, the would-be Cyrus, was killed (363), while in Persia, by the hand of an assassin (an emissary of the Church); the Temple remained in ashes, and the "Black Fast"—alive!

V.

And as his lucky star, so to say, was in the ascendancy in the West, so it was in the East. The same tenacity of life it had shown in the Roman Empire, it also evinced in the Babylonian kingdom—the second Jewish centre of gravity at that time. There, too, periods of sunshine and prosperity, of peace and good will, which might have cut the life of **יְהוָה** short, were succeeded by periods dark and gloomy, stormy and torrential that helped to prolong its life.

The last parthian king, Artobanus (the friend of Rab) was swept away in that political tempest which put an end to the parthian kingdom; and with him disappeared (for a time) the peace of Babylonian Jewry. The Neo-Persians (the fire worshippers) who succeeded to the monarchy had, in their first flush of victory, deprived our people of all their long-enjoyed privileges—had even exhumed their dead. True, the Jewish horizon soon brightened up again; for the liberal-minded monarch, Shabur I. (the friend of Mar Samuel), restored to the Jewish community all their former privileges, and the good times returned. But that state of things did not last long enough to sap and undermine the stability of the "Black institution." Shabur II. was already no friend of the Jews; and but for his mother (Ifra), who was a great admirer of our people, they would have been harshly treated on more than one occasion. Under Jezdijird II (428 to 457) their position changed from bad to worse; while under Firuz (the Babylonian Hadrion) it became des-

perate. And as if the Jewish cup of sorrow were not as yet brimful, came the Communistic Avalanche, i. e., the Zentic Reformation (500) with its cataclysm of debauchery, whose attack on the honor of Jewish womanhood, countenanced by the King, had forced the semi-independent Jewish community—as Jews, or even as moral men—to take up arms and resist this diabolic attempt at the edge of the sword; with the lamentable result. That this justifiable resistance had spelt death to the intellectual portion of Babylonian Jewry, and life to the "black Fast!"

VI.

In Arabia, North and South, if ever the "Black institution" did obtain a footing, it was not likely, at one time, to settle there permanently, because (a), there was at one time a small Jewish state on the Island of Jizbau (Red Sea); and because (b), our people, both in the North and South, had enjoyed full liberty on an equal footing with the Arab. But, alas, Arabian Jewry allowed their religious zeal to outrun their discretion—engaged in proselytism on a grand scale. They would increase the Jewish nation on the Gentile's expense! Himyaria thus became a Jewish kingdom! And after thirty years this misspent zeal brought death to thousands of our people, and long life to the "Black Fast." And as if this "Black institution" were not yet firmly rooted in Arabia, came Mahomet, a little later, and granted it a new charter in the memorable war of the ditch!

VII.

And as in the Roman Empire, in Babylonia and Arabia—in Asia and Africa, so it was in Europe—wherever the "Black Fast" had once put in its foot there he remained to stay. In Europe, as elsewhere, the exactness and rapacity of the kings; the hypocritical zeal, or the irreligious religionism of the Catholic Church; the fanaticism of the populace; the consequent persecution; the humiliation; the leper-like isolation; then the crusades; the false accusations (fourteenth century); and the repeated expulsions, all helped to make the "Black Fast" suck in afresh so much Jewish Blood and tears as to keep it moist still—as to strike its roots deep down the Jewish heart, deeper than ever. Jewry felt, with every succeeding year, how much reason they had to mourn for Zion!

VIII.

With the advent of the nineteenth century, when an era of freedom, fraternity and equality had begun to dawn over Western Europe, and so many people began to think that the long drawn out—night, i. e., the ages, had entirely passed away before the rising sun of modern civilization—that the millennium was fast approaching, when the leopard would lie down with the kid—not inside, but side by side. Our people, too, fondled the hope that with many another sad relic of the past the "Black Fast," too, would disappear—would find its grave in European civilization, in universal brotherhood, if not in its own native land. Events, however, have demonstrated that the so-called light of modern civilization proved for the Jew but an ignis-fatuus, an optical illusion! That for him there is no permanent salvation

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outside a home of his own! The glorious nineteenth century passed away; we are already in the second decade of the twentieth century, and the Jew is still as homeless as ever, while the "Black Fast" finds its home all the world over!

IX.

The "Black Fast" is still alive. It will never find its grave outside Palestine! Some people, I know, may remind me that this institution is already resting in its grave for some years—in its grave in the Reform Temple! Yes, true. But there, the "Black Fast" did not die a natural death. There, the institution was simply executed! And even there, it is not quite dead, for all that—the Reformers themselves know it! They experience occasionally a kind of a misgiving as to the certainty of its death, as, for instance, when they are refused admission into some aristocratic clubs, or excluded from certain hotels!

No! The "Black Fast" cannot die by the hand of the executioner! It will only die a natural death, on its own native soil; and buried, not in indifference; on the quiet; and by a small minority: but by Jewry at large; with due public proclamation; and laid to rest in a grave which will assume the form of a national joyous festival! So says Prophet Zechariah; and so expects the Jewish nation!

Will Zionism accomplish it?
"O Lord God, thou knowest!"

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FRANKFORT AND THE ADLER FAMILY.

In view of the death of the late Chief Rabbi Hermann Adler, the following article, which appeared in the *Frankfort English Mail* under date of August, 1909, is pertinent at this time:

"We need not here repeat the biographical facts of Dr. Hermann Adler, D. C. L., C. V. O., except to say that he was born in Hanover and was the fifth son of a former Chief Rabbi, Dr. Nathan Marcus Adler. His father had been Dayan at Frankfort, with which the Adler family had been connected for fully four hundred years. Our remarks must necessarily be brief, but, being an English newspaper published in Frankfort, we shall confine our attention chiefly to the family's connection with the old "Freistadt" on the Main.

"After the death of Rabbi Simon 'an der Pfort' the Jews of Frankfort and of Germany generally suffered from a series of persecutions which reached their climax in 1349 at the time of the plague in Europe. The Jews, through their temperate habits, were comparatively immune from the scourge, a fact which led to the cry that they had poisoned the wells. This led to fearful massacres and to the expulsion of Jews from most of the German towns. Twenty years later it was found that the accusation was unfounded and that the outgoing of the Jews had brought with it commercial ruin. Frankfort felt their absence the more keenly, as the Jews were found so useful at the periodical fairs for which Frankfort was noted, and they were consequently invited to return to their old quarters. They have remained there practically ever since. In 1355 the German Emperor, Charles IV., having granted the country a charter called the Golden Bull, was induced by the Jews of Frankfort, on payment of 15,000 pounds of silver, equivalent to about £60,000, to issue letters patent safeguarding their persons, homes and property, and giving them some of the rights of citizenship. Frankfort had its Romer where the Emperors were elected and its Cathedral where they were crowned. There all the nobility of the empire had to appear in person to swear fealty. These gatherings gave the Jews the opportunity of coming in contact with strangers and with cultured people, and to this circumstance may be ascribed their comparative polish, their keen business habits and cosmopolitan good sense. Of course, at each coronation they had to pay heavily for the renewal of their privileges as Kammerknechte. Meanwhile the citizens reaped the benefit of the flourishing trade of their free city and the stimulating influence of the Jews. In the reign of Emperor Sigismund the citizens had prospered so much that the Burgomeister and Town Council were able to purchase from the Emperor the ownership of the Jews and the right of taxing them. An elaborate code of regulations was drawn up by the municipality, called the *Stattigkeitgesetz*, which was stringent in the extreme. The Jews had to wear distinctive badges on their outer garments. These were circu-

lar in form, about four inches in diameter, and yellow in color. They were henceforth strictly confined to the Judengasse. Every house therein had to bear a distinctive sign. They were restricted to 500 families in all and the annual marriages were not to exceed twelve. Even the privilege of harboring a stranger overnight had to be paid for. The Jews were entirely at the mercy of the Town Council, who really formed an oligarchy such as existed in many trading cities of Italy. This mode of government irritated the common folk and under the leadership of a confectioner, Vincenzo Fettmilch, riots broke out. On the 22d of August, 1614, the Judengasse was attacked and the houses plundered. About thirteen hundred Jews who had escaped were allowed to embark on ships and found an asylum at Mayence. It was not till the 10th of March, 1616, that the German Emperor Matthias, having taken up the cause of the Jews, sent troops to punish the ringleaders, and Fettmilch, the Frankfort Haman, as he liked to be called, was seized, drawn through the town and quartered according to the then barbarous fashion. Then, escorted by infantry and a troop of cavalry, the Jews were brought back in triumph amid the sound of drums and trumpets. At the head of the band, according to family tradition, marched one of Dr. Adler's ancestors, carrying the Imperial standard with the Reichsadler, the black eagle, emblazoned thereon. This incident, it is said, led to the family adopting the name of Adler."

The cornerstone for the new Machsika Hadas Synagogue, Pittsburg, Pa., was laid on the 16th inst.

Professor Herman Senator, a noted physician and an authority on medicine, died in Berlin on the 16th inst.

A new Brith Abraham lodge has been instituted in Malden, Mass., with fifty charter members.

Mr. David Solis-Cohen has been appointed a member of the Portland (Ore.) Board of Education.

Governor Dix has appointed Mr. Joseph W. Rosenthal manager of the Rochester (N. Y.) State Hospital.

The United Hebrew Congregation of St. Louis, Mo., will ratify a call to Rabbi G. Lipkind, of Milwaukee, on the 27th prox.

It is stated that the new anti-Semitic restrictions, part of the Russian Premier's programme, are about to be introduced.

Mr. Oscar Sachs, the Kansas City representative of the German consul, has been appointed consular agent for the State of Kansas.

Rabbi Jacob Meier, of Salonica, has yielded to the wishes of the community and has abandoned his intention of accepting the post of chief rabbi of Jerusalem.

Rabbi Jacob Marcus, who two years ago left the pulpit of the Hight Street Synagogue, Elmira, N. Y., to take up work in Chicago, has returned to his former charge.

Rabbi Isadore Koplowitz has resigned as rabbi of the Keneseth Israel Congregation of Kansas City, Mo., and will organize a new conservative congregation in the same city.

Joshua Levenson, a well-known Hebrew writer, died at Riga, Russia, on July 17. Mr. Levenson, who was 84 years of age, was a frequent contributor to Hebrew publications.

The Adath Jeshurun Congregation of Philadelphia has removed from its old edifice and the premises will be taken possession of by the Ohel Jacob Congregation on August 1.

The collection of old silver of the late Lord Swaythling, considered one of the finest collections extant, has been loaned by the family to the Victoria and Albert Museum of London.

Meyer Jonasson, who was the pioneer of the present large cloak and suit industry, committed suicide last Friday. Mr. Jonasson was 77 years of age, and had suffered terribly from nervousness.

The Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Hertz has obtained a donation of £1,000 from Mr. Otto Beit for the "King Edward VII. Memorial Wing" of the South African Jewish Orphanage in Johannesburg.

Mayor Harrison, of Chicago, Ill., has appointed Mr. David M. Pfaelzer as a member of the Board of Education, Mr. Harry A. Lipsky to the School Board and Dr. M. A. Weisskopf a member of the Bridewell Board.

Miss Harriet Norden has won a trip to Europe, presented by the Chicago Examiner to the most popular young woman. Miss Norden received over 1,000,000 more votes than her nearest competitor.

Mr. Samuel Stern has been appointed to the Board of Managers for the new institution to be known as the New York Training School for Boys to take the place of the House of Refuge at Randall's Island.

For the purposes of securing what he is pleased to term a "loyal" Duma, M. Stolypin has entered into a compact with anti-Semitic heads of churches and monasteries to place obstacles in the way of all pro-Jewish candidates at the forthcoming Duma elections.

Leo S. Herzig, while a guest at the Larchmont Yacht Club, at Larchmont, N. Y., last Wednesday, was ordered to leave the grounds. Officials of the yacht club claim the ejection a mistake, but Mr. Herzig ascribes it to his being a Jew.

The celebrated archaeologist, Prof. Emanuel Loewy, of the University of Rome, has been appointed by the Italian Government president of the Executive of the International Archaeological Congress which is to be held in Rome next autumn.

A number of Toronto (Ontario) Jewish residents who have been denied admission to neighboring summer resorts have purchased a large tract known as the Marshal farm, north of Long Branch, and will convert the same into an ideal summer resort.

Jabez Woolf, the celebrated English swimmer, made his eighth attempt to swim the English Channel last Friday. After being in the water for fifteen hours he was within one mile of his goal, but was compelled to quit by adverse tides.

Commissioner Waldo has appointed the Rev. Abraham Blum, the visiting chaplain of the Board of Jewish Ministers, a chaplain of the Police Department of this city. There are two captains, one acting captain, eight lieutenants, six sergeants and about 500 patrolmen and detectives of the Jewish faith on the force, and the Commissioner thought they needed a spiritual adviser.

The second reading of the slaughter of animals bill, which makes it unlawful to bleed an animal before it is rendered

insensible, has been passed by the London, England, Council. It is understood that the Board of Deputies and the Shechita Board have already laid the Jewish aspect of the question before the authors of the bill.

At a meeting of the Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope the Rev. A. P. Bender was appointed a member of the Literature Divinity, Music and Finance committees. At the same meeting a special committee was appointed to consider the possibilities of including Hebrew in the syllabus of the arts course of the university.

M. Milhaud has been appointed principal secretary to the Minister of Commerce in the new French Cabinet; M. Brisac and M. Levy Ulmann in a similar capacity to the Minister of Public Works and the Minister of Labor, respectively, and M. Strauss assistant secretary to the Minister for War.

Their Majesties the King and Queen held a court at Dublin Castle on the 11th inst. Among those summoned to attend were Sir Otto and Lady Jaffe. At the King's levee on Tuesday, among the presentations were Sir Otto Jaffe and Lieut. A. D. Jaffe, by General Officer Commanding-in-Chief Ireland.

M. Rabinersohn, of Kieff, has decided to form a school for applied arts and crafts in Jaffa, to bear the name of his son, Razel Rabinersohn, who has passed through the Hebrew gymnasium in Jaffa. Dr. Ruppin, acting upon instructions from M. Rabinersohn, has already bought the land for the building. The school will be situated near the Hebrew Gymnasium in the Tel Aviv district.

The result of the elections for the Central Committee of the Alliance Israelite Universelle has just been declared. All the candidates nominated by the Central Committee have been elected. M. Salomon Reinach, around whom the opposition centred, received 13,121 votes, nearly 6,000 more than the candidate most favored by his opponent, who polled 7,337 votes.

Mr. Hyman Levy has just completed a brilliant career at Edinburgh (Scotland) University by taking two degrees at once, viz., M. A., with first-class honors, and B.Sc., with distinction. As a winner of prizes and scholarships both at school and the University Mr. Levy has broken all local records, and in educational circles his name has become a household word.

Alfred Krower, who died July 3, 1911, left \$2,000 each to Mount Sinai Hospital the Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Society, and the Montefiore Home for Chronic Invalids and \$1,000 each to the Educational Alliance, Hebrew Technical School for Girls, Crippled Children's East Side Free School, Hebrew Sheltering Guardian Society, Association for Improved Instruction for Deaf Mutes and Beth Israel Hospital.

Work has been started this week on the new buildings for the Marks Nathan Jewish Orphan Home, Chicago, to be completed in the early spring. Mr. Saul Drucker, the superintendent of the home, who recently tendered his resignation and was about to accept the superintendency of an Eastern institution, has been finally induced to abandon his plan of leaving the institution, and has consented to a renewal of his contract for a number of years.

Nathan Straus Named.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—The President has appointed Nathan Straus a delegate to the third international Congress for the Protection of Infants, to be held in Berlin on September 11 to 15. This body was formed in Paris as the Congress of the Gouttes de Lait, and at the second meeting, in Brussels in 1908, Mr. Straus had the name changed and the scope of the organization broadened. The appointment is regarded as a recognition of his pioneer work in establishing and maintaining pasteurized milk depots and in starting the movement for better milk supplies.

Mr. Straus has also been named as delegate from the Government to the seventh congress against tuberculosis, which was to have been held in Rome on September 24 to 30, but has been postponed until the spring on account of the cholera. Mr. Straus was one of the first to warn against the use of raw milk from tuberculous cows as likely to cause tuberculosis.

CORRESPONDENCE.

In Union Is Strength.

Editor HEBREW STANDARD:

Your journal would be false to the ideals which have guided its editorial policy, from the day its first issue appeared to the present, if it were to criticize the new Conservative Union, launched at the recent meeting of the association of the alumni of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. Any cause which has for its object the strengthening of the conservative aspects of Judaism should have your hearty and unqualified support. The old maxim, "In union there is strength," is particularly apt in this connection and in our community, for on all sides we behold associations for the dissemination and reinforcement of Reform "principles"; while Orthodox Jews are conspicuous by the absence of similar organizations among them.

Therefore the new Conservative Union must be regarded as answering to a distinct need of our people. Traditional Judaism is entitled to have its cause pleaded. And ministers who are persuaded that Orthodox Judaism is a tree of life to-day, who have been trained in Orthodox principles, and know the sources of Jewish tradition, have the undoubted right to call such an organization as this Conservative Union into being. Inasmuch as the prime movers in bringing the union into life are graduates of our local seminary, it may be expected that American conditions and ideals will find a responsive executive in the new association. Are we not weary of having American patriotism the exclusive possession of the Reformed Jews?

One danger, and only one, exists in connection with this Conservative Union. The fact that it was born under the aegis of the Jewish Theological Seminary may cause such individuals as put the man above the cause to condemn it. A conservative union is a union of all the conservative elements in Israel in America and all who declare in favor of traditional Judaism are entitled to membership, and should be expected to lend their aid to the cause. Provisionally the scheme is in the hands of those who are, more or less, identified with the Seminary. This is natural, but, when the time to create a permanent organization draws around, the present leaders should be anxious to find places in the executive for the representatives of every Richtung among the conservative Jews of the country. READER.

Conversionists in the Bronx.

Editor HEBREW STANDARD:

The attention of the Kehillah was called several days ago to the activities of Christian missionaries who, under the auspices of the Evangelistic Committee of New York city, have opened a camp on Boston road, near Charlotte street, the Bronx, a district which is mainly inhabited by Jews. Mr. Bernard Semel and Mr. Harry Sackler, who communicated with the office of the Kehillah about this matter, found that a special effort was being made to attract Jewish children to the camp of the missionaries.

The writer called together a committee of Bronx residents, who met at the home of Mr. Sackler, 1517 Charlotte street, on Thursday evening. Among those invited were Rabbi S. H. Glick, Mr. J. Concors, Dr. J. Sossnitz and Mr. S. Folkoff, of the Leo Pinsker Camp, O. B. Z. These gentlemen, together with Mr. Sackler and myself, called on the missionaries and protested against their efforts to lead Jewish children away from the faith of their fathers. Of course, the missionaries, as usual, thought they were doing good work, and they could not be made to realize that they were taking undue advantage of innocent and defenseless children. It was therefore decided to ask the Jewish press to warn the parents in the neighborhood against the activities of these missionaries and to ask the parents to see that their children do not visit this camp. The committee wishes at the same time also to remind the Jewish residents of the Bronx that the Bronx Church House, Fulton avenue and 171st street, is a missionary institution and that Jewish children should not be allowed to go there.

It is hoped that the Young Men's Hebrew Association of the Bronx, together with the Leo Pinsker Camp, O. B. Z., and Young Judea, will soon be able to

get together with a view of doing more Jewish educational work among the children of the Bronx.

International Arbitration a Jewish Suggestion.

The Deutsche Revue has published an article by M. Emile Flourens, a former French Minister of Foreign Affairs, who endeavors to prove that the entire idea of international arbitration courts and The Hague Congress emanated from the Alliance Israelite Universelle in 1864. During that year M. Levy Bing (of Nancy) published an article in the Archives Israelites suggesting that states should among themselves submit their disputes to arbitration courts in the same way as they encouraged their subjects to rely on the opinion of an impartial judge. M. Cremieu developed the plan to Napoleon III. In 1866, to King Charles of Roumania in 1867 and to Bismarck in 1868. In 1874 a member of the Alliance, on behalf of the council, met Czar Alexander II. in London in con-

nection with M. Bing's scheme. Owing to the difficulties raised by Bismarck and to the subsequent internal and external troubles of Russia the Czar was unable to develop the scheme. His son, Alexander III., was not in favor of arbitration, but his grandson, the present Czar, realized the wishes of his grandfather and summoned The Hague Congress.

At the demand of the anti-Semites the Moscow municipality has intrusted to a veterinary commission the question whether the Jewish method of slaughtering cattle is sufficiently humane to be allowed in the old capital.

Rabbi Gerson B. Levi calls the Central Conference of American Rabbis "a closed corporation," apparently because its president is not to his liking.

For two thousand years Jewry has withstood successfully the hammer-like blows of its enemies from without. What wonder, then, that it is proof to-day against a false cosmopolitanism.

If the Jews in Russia could only acquire the vices, as well as the virtues, of the average non-Jewish Russian! Then their situation would improve, and they would be happier by far. But no! The Jew is no ignoramus; he is no inebriate. The Russian mujik is both ignorant and bibulous, and hence the abstemious and wide-awake Jew.

We need not be surprised over the belief current in parts of Germany and Austria at this late day, in the fable that the Jews make use of the blood of Christian children for ritualistic purposes. For, the quality and nature of the character of man has not changed one bit since the days of Nero, the Roman emperor. And this is so, despite all our vaunted progress, all our railways and aeroplanes.

We call the attention of our readers to a letter, signed "Reader," which we print on another page of this issue. We refrain from accompanying this communication with any editorial comment of our own, and would be pleased to publish the expressions of opinion of our readers on the question which "Reader" has raised. We would simply remark that the new conservative union was, as "Reader" properly observes, "born under the aegis of the Jewish Theological Seminary."

We are shocked to find that The Globe, of this city, finds room in its correspondence columns for a letter on the present investigation into the conduct of Dr. A. H. Doty's office, in which the following appears: "If such things as Dushkind (the attorney in charge of the case against Dr. Doty) and his crowd were kept away from our country there would be no investigation." Such language is highly unparliamentary, irrelevant and untrue.

The Truth, a Hebrew-Christian publication of Jerusalem, is wroth at the Zionists, forsooth! The Sublime Porte, in endeavoring to prevent the acquisition of Palestine by the Jews, has declared that not only may Jews of foreign origin not purchase real estate in the Holy Land, but such certificated converts to Christianity, responding to a Hebrew name or surname, may not do so, either. "Certificated converts to Christianity" is a euphemism for our old friends, the meshummodim, of whom the editor of The Truth happens to be one. We are glad the Porte cannot distinguish such Jews from their fellows for evil; we can for good.

Tisha b'Ab, the annual fast accompanying the destruction of Jerusalem, one of the solemn seasons in the synagogue, is here again. Our brethren throughout the world, with the few, insignificant exception of those who have "emancipated" themselves from our traditions, will observe the day with that contriteness of spirit and searching of the heart which it demands. Although more than eighteen centuries have gone by since the Temple was finally and irremediably destroyed, the pious ones of our community still recall the splendor, the acts of faith, which surrounded that edifice. Eighteen centuries ago we lost our nationhood, in the modern political sense, through the act of Divine Providence. The lesson of Tisha b'Ab is real and purposeful to-day.

Emanu-El, of San Francisco, in commenting on the disposition of Berlin Jews toward the baptismal fonts, sounds a warning against religious indifference and back-sliding in our own country. While, perhaps, we have not had as many examples of Jews forsaking Judaism for Christianity in its various denominations as German Jewry, the "Christian Science" Jew flourishes all too luxuriantly in our midst. We feel that the problem of counteracting the work of the missionaries and exponents of Christian Science among the Jews is one well worth the attention of important and influential communal organizations. Unfortunately, the fight against this evil is waged only desultorily by devoted Jews, who lack both funds and opportunity to do any general and permanent work.

JEW AND GERMAN UNIVERSITIES.

WE read in The Jewish World, of London, under the caption "German Jewish Aspirations," that Jacob H. Schiff's proposed benefaction to his birthplace, Frankfurt-on-the-Main, of a university where Jews would be regarded and accepted as eligible to the rank of Ordinary Professor as Christians has been withdrawn. The Prussian Government found itself unable, we are informed by this source, to give these absolute guarantees, and Mr. Schiff was therefore in duty bound to cancel his offer.

Thus the hopes the Jewish world recently expressed, that the present anomalous conditions obtaining in university life in the German Empire, at least in this particular instance, would cease, are dashed to the ground. The Junker of Prussia will continue his wicked career of prejudice and repression, not only in the army, but also in the field occupied by the men of science and learning, without let or hindrance. Mr. Schiff's attempt to deal this state of things a crushing blow flashed in the pan, as it were. He is richer because the Germans would not accept of his wealth; the world, however, in general, and surely Germany in particular, are much the poorer for this shortsighted action.

After all, such a denouement as this forces one to realize that the millennial age so confidently heralded by the Reformed wing in Jewry after the events of '48 is still far, far off. In Germany, too, the leopard has not yet changed his spots! German Jews who enter one of the learned professions in the future will have the same insurmountable obstacles to engage as in the past. A Jewish teacher, indeed a rara avis in the German Empire, may become a Privatdocent, or perhaps a Professor Extraordinary! Ordinarius, the peer of his Gentile collaborators, equal in worldly position and emoluments to his fellow scientists, he may never hope to be.

More than all these considerations, however, Mr. Schiff's projected gift appealed strongly to us as a valid means to overcome the attractions the baptismal font holds out to so many German Jewish intellectuals. We all know how the Jewish young men of the Empire crowd the halls of Lutheran preachers with the desire that their act will open the door of hope—which spells worldly advancement—to them. Even this, alas, is not to end.

THE CANTORS' SEMINARY.

WE rejoice to learn that definite steps have been taken looking to the establishment, on October 1 next, of the new Seminary of the Cantors' Association of America. The plan and scope of this institution embrace thorough and detailed courses of study for Jewish choir-singers and in Chazonuth.

To say that such an institution of learning will fill a distinct void is to put it mildly. While our rabbis in this country have been allowed, and rightly so, to take up positions of independence, our Chazonim have never been held in that high regard to which they are justly entitled. To fill the position of Chazan in the synagogue does not require simply vox et praeterea nihil. The Chazan should be a man of scholarly attainments within reason, a dignified personality, a sincere lover of his people. If American youths desire to embark upon this vocation in future, here is the institution that will admirably prepare them for their life-work.

The Cantors' Association, however, does not plan to do things by halves. Realizing that the presence of Gentiles in the choir-lofts of our synagogues is an anomaly and a burning disgrace, their new institution will look out for the proper training of Jewish singers. Then, when Jewish singers may be had, the plea in extenuation nowadays heard from many Jews affiliated prominently with the synagogue, that a Jewish singer is a being yet unborn, cannot be advanced.

For our brethren attached to the advancement of the cause of traditional Judaism we think this new institution will prove a veritable boon. Prayer and praise, the divine service of the synagogue, are rendered even more solemn and awe-inspiring if led by a preceptor who is thoroughly equipped for the work of his noble office. This should not be taken to mean that the new institution, so eminently needed and fitted to carry out the work of preparing such men, will imbue them with the insensate desire of displaying their powers of voice and song. For, as to that the association, under whose auspices the Seminary comes into life, will pay strict heed and effectively discountenance.

The Cantors' Association is, therefore, entitled to the unbounded thanks of this community.

Fifty-seven years ago The American Israelite began to appear. In celebrating its fifty-eighth anniversary that journal indulged in some of that self-adulation for which it has become "famous." It ventured to point out that "for fifty-seven years it has been the leading Jewish paper on the continent." It maintains that it has always tried to serve Jewish interests. As a sample of how The American Israelite has always tried to serve Jewish interests we call attention to the fact that recently when Harry Cutler, of Providence, was elected to one of the boards of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, it declared that this was perhaps the first time the Union had given direct recognition to Russian Jews. While the Union has always stood for a Judaism of German origin to our minds, yet the truth is as Secretary Lipman Levy points out that this body has aimed at cosmopolitanism among its directing forces. All of which goes plainly to show how admirably the interests of Judaism in this country are served by The American Israelite, a journal which thus aims to set one section of the House of Israel against the other and to continue to trumpet forth wornout battle cries after these have been consigned to limbo.

ON THE EVE OF THE BLACK FAST.

"HOW can I myself bear your cumbrance?" (Deut. 1:12) "HOW is she become an harlot?" (Isa. 1:21) "HOW does the city sit solitary?" (Lam. 1:1).

A half-lit synagogue—not of the fashionable type—wherein reeking candles struggle faintly against the all-conquering darkness. The Oron Hakodesh is bare of the usual gold-embroidered curtain, for on this night—Tishobov's Eve—the Torah is the chief mourner. When Israel lost its country, the Shechinah—the divine spirit informing the Jewish Nation—was sent into captivity. Tishobov, therefore, is a day of mourning not so much for the body as for the soul of Israel. Yes, behind the undecorated Ark, the soul of Israel wails bitterly. Have you ever seen a mother prostrate upon the chilled corpse of her child? Do you recall her frightfully distorted features, her haggard countenance, her vacant stare? A similar aspect—only still weirder and blanker—does the dark, oaken door of the Ark bear to-night. One shudders at the sight of this dramatic portrayal of the sorrowing soul of an unfortunate nation.

And in the terrible shadow of the uncurtained Ark a few woebegone figures are crouching low, rocking to and fro to the rhythm of a sweetly-sad lilt—the traditional chant of the Kinoth. This incomparable chant, so soulful, so appealing, floats on the dim air, lifting up with itself the souls of the chanters nearer to the compassionate God. To them it seems that God cannot resist any longer the entreaty which this time-hallowed chant voices. God will surely send His redeemer very soon, to give the homeless people a home, to secure for the exiled Shechinah an abiding place. Buoyed up by this hope, the chant grows louder, even louder. Ever more insistent rings out the refrain: Echa—how can it be—how is it possible?

* * *

It might occur to the chanters that, according to our rabbis, the word Echa—this expression of helpless astonishment—describes three stages of Jewish history. Moses saw Israel in its pristine glory, amidst peace and prosperity; and, standing perplexed before the magnitude of his task, he exclaimed: Echa! Isaiah beheld the people dissolute, straying far from the sustaining ideals of Judaism; and, puzzled by the sight of a great nation in a state of decadence, he called out: Echa! Jeremiah saw Israel in utter disgrace, fallen from its high estate; and, bewildered by the downfall of his cherished race, he moaned: Echa! Thus, this one word is the epitome of the career of our people as an independent power among the nations, pointing to a besetting sin peculiar to us. From of old even to our own days, "Israel waxed fat and kicked." Prosperity would lead us to disloyalty and disloyalty to disaster. Many a Zion have we lost through our own fault, many a sanctuary have we burnt up in the fire of our passion, by the blaze of our lust.

Does this thought occur to the chanters?

* * *

Perhaps it does. Perhaps it does not. This is not a night of historic reflection, a night in which the mind might lose itself trying to solve the problem of the Jewish past. This is a night of intense feeling, a night in which the agonized Jewish heart cries out aloud over the unutterable sadness of the Jewish fate. In this night, the Echa is but the unsophisticated, natural ejaculation of a people downtrodden and oppressed, a people bearing the burden of grief for untold centuries, a people which, notwithstanding its prolonged sufferings, has never abandoned the hope of ultimate redemption and never ceased yearning for the ancestral home. As these forlorn figures intone the Echa, one doubts not but that they have caught the spirit of the Black Fast; that they too are on the one hand filled with the gloom of our national misfortune and on the other, with the fervent longing for a speedy return to Zion.

* * *

Is this fervent longing a sincere desire? Would they leave their several occupations and follow the bugle-call of national independence back to the East?

One is haunted by this query, but one scarcely dares to answer yea or nay. Meantime the service is over and the chanters of Zion's dirge disperse in all directions. Snatches of conversation may be heard, half-smothered in loud yawns. The Kinoth of a little while ago seem to be forgotten and the toil and moil, the haggling and bargaining, of to-morrow are uppermost. The one talks of business, the other of strikes, the third of failures, and yet a fourth of the stupendous earnings of his children.

Would they return to Zion? RABBI JOEL BLAU.

The latest report of the Hebrew Orphan Asylum of this city refers at length to the change that has taken place in the conduct of the institution. Speaking of the work, for the year ending April 30, 1911, President Louis Stern observed:

"... The only change of consequence to be noted is one to which reference was made in the last annual report of your Board of Trustees, namely, that, in accordance with what we conceived to be our duty toward the relatives of the children, the dietary of the institution and the kitchen work in all departments have been placed on a strictly Kosher basis."

Thus we see that this institution has at least seen the light! Housing 1,176 inmates, of whom only 84 are full orphans, the trustees were bound so to conduct their establishment as not to put their wards out of religious touch with the homes whence they came. They had and have a duty to the relatives of the children entrusted to their care, to perform, and have set about performing it in the right way.

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Our friend, the editor of *The Jewish Voice*, of St. Louis, calls us the arch-foe of the Reformed rabbis of this country, in annual conference assembled, but remarks that we have now seen the light! He delivered himself thus because we had advertised on the procedure and result of the recent Anglo-Jewish ministerial convention and had compared this, to its natural disadvantage, with the work of bodies like the Central Conference of American Rabbis. We wrote as we did, expressing our honest opinion as we are always at pains to do, because candor and truth required it. The late Jacob P. Solomon, the beloved editor of this journal, who was uncompromising in his hostility to the vagaries of some Reformed rabbis, was ever desirous to accord honor to whom honor was due. Especially distasteful to him was that spirit of "flunkeyism" (we know of no better word to describe it) which is so rife in the rank and file of the Anglo-Jewish ministry. Against that, if our friend in St.

Louis will again peruse our remarks, he will find we inveighed. As our rabbis, with few insignificant exceptions, are not possessed of this spirit, we noted this to their credit.

The Evening Post, of this city, chides Jews with over-sensitiveness in respect of Shakespeare's "The Merchant of Venice." At once, one of our distinguished contemporaries, with whom, of course, the king can do no wrong, supports this opinion, and wishes it understood that Jews regard this play of the immortal Bard of Avon as one of his greatest and most remarkable. We are glad to pay tribute to "The Merchant of Venice" as literature, yet, for all that, we cannot regard it as otherwise than a gross misrepresentation of Jews and Judaism. The Gentile of culture knows this fully and appreciates what conditions obtained in England when Shakespeare wrote his lines. The man in the street, however, and the boy or girl of school age are not in this class. To pre-

vent their minds from being poisoned by this virus of anti-Semitism, we cordially approved, and reiterate our approval of, the action of the Central Conference in the premises.

That the Jewish colonies in the Argentine Republic, notably those planted by the ICA, are growing in number, in material prosperity and in the amenities of organized life, is not surprising. Twenty years have elapsed since the first Jewish colonists went out to the River Plate, and to-day 21,000 of them reside in this golden land of opportunity and future development. Argentina is distinctly one of the lands of unlimited future possibilities. A country which contains a capital of the size and splendor of Buenos Ayres, with its magnificent *Avenida de Cinco de Mayo*, is entitled to be ranked with the leading nations of the world. Who knows but what the Jews in the Argentine, expanding from the few sparse settlements which now exist there, will in course of time assume the hegemony of the Jews of the world? Although Buenos Ayres, Rosario or Mendoza can never be Zion, nor even a substitute for the ancient land of our fathers, it is distinctly within the bounds of possibility that, say one hundred years hence, the Jewish world will look to the South American *pampas* for light and leading.

Men's Summer Wear.

The extremely hot weather which prevailed during the month of July played havoc with the appearance of men. For some days nearly every pedestrian carried his coat over his arm as he jogged along, his hat in his hand, his collar thoroughly wilted and many men were seen without any coat.

In the subway, elevated and trolley cars men who would scarcely ever offend the niceties of personal appearance, without any ado sat without their coat, and some with their shirt sleeves upturned, and all this regardless of what any one else might think or say!

The weather became a general topic of conversation with passengers, because it was really too hot to think or talk of anything else.

All this is the best evidence that the summer garments for men are by no means what they ought to be. Cloth, of varying weights for summer dress of men will probably some time be eschewed, and a lighter material will take its place. There are mohairs, linens and other fibrous materials which should become a ready substitute for wool and wool and cotton mixtures. In the Oriental lands, where the heat could hardly have been severer than that experienced here, gentlemen wear white coats and trousers of linen and lightweight flannels and even at a function in the evening white linen coats with gray flannel trousers are in vogue, and seem to be comfortable and not taken amiss.

Some years ago fine shetland wool shirts in excellent and tasteful designs, with soft collars of the same material attached, were introduced, but failed to maintain their hold. Sometime hereafter it is likely that comfort will yield to style. And a few more weeks of sizzling hot weather may hasten the adoption of a more seasonable dress for men during the heated spell.

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
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ZIONISM IN THE LIGHT OF THE BIBLE.

Pastor Russell in an Address to a Gathering of Independent Zionists, points the Way to a New Zionism:—The Biblical and not the Political Zionism. The Zionism Which Acknowledges the Bible as Its Foundation and the Inspired Word of God as Its Guidance.



Since the attention of the Jewish public at large is now riveted on Zionism and the hope of the Jewish people, owing to the conventions which American Zionists recently held in Tannersville, Catskill Mountains, and the International Zionist Congress to be held next week in Basel, Switzerland, I deem it the opportune moment to present a view of Zionism which is not contained in any programme or couched in any dogmatic statement, and which has, moreover, the greater advantage of being based on the words of prophecy.

The press has of late been full of reports coming from Turkey, in whose hands the Holy Land now apparently is. These reports have depressed the Zionists and have spread consternation among them. It has made many of them doubtful as to the outcome of their efforts. Some in despair have dropped their hands and given up hope. Here of late the Minister of the Interior has openly declared that Turkey will oppose any effort on the part of the Jews to concentrate their forces in the Holy Land and unfurl their flag over the cradle of the religions of the world. Another report is circulated to the effect that Turkey is prepared to send a special governor to Jerusalem to keep a vigilant eye on the maneuvers of the Jews in this territory and to nip conspiracy in the bud should its aim be the separate national existence of the Jewish people.

Another ominous tidings reaches up from the interior of Palestine that obstacles are being placed in the way of Jews who desire, after years of wandering, to pitch their tents and rest their weary heads in the land of their fathers which was promised to them by God Almighty through His prophets.

The burden of another report is that the Arabian tribes are up in arms against the Jew who brings civilization into the land and enlightenment, new forms of life, greater energy, the look to the future. The fierce Bedouins, oppose the efforts of the Jew to bring material blessings into the land which has been desolate for centuries, poverty stricken, whose head has been lowered, whose breasts have become parched, over which the curse of God was said to have been hanging.

No wonder that these reports have brought confusion into the ranks of Zionists who base their hope on political

calculations, and who at all times have their ears strained to catch the not always musical echoes of the political concert of the powers.

They say, and with apparent justice, that Turkey has become a great power, and that she will not consent to the intrusion of new elements into her domain. They say further that since the deposition of Sultan Abdul Hamid, who could have been enticed by the glitter of gold and from whom concessions could have been secured by pounds sterling, we now have to deal with parliaments, public opinion, conflicting national motives, a chauvinist Young Turk party, whose head is turned by momentary victories. Therefore the hope to make of Palestine a Jewish land has dwindled. Can we ignore the words of a minister who has unlimited power and sway? they ask in despair. And surely from their standpoint they are right.

If the only hope of Zionism would depend upon the consent or the favor of ministers of this or another government, upon the good will of one or another wild Arabian tribe, Zionist stock would be constantly subject to the caprice of a fluctuating market and would tend to fall below par.

Fortunately this is not so. To the believer who reads the signs of the times as foretold in the Bible there is no ground for despairing.

As I have pointed out many times, this age of ours is fraught with great happenings. We stand on the threshold of an age which will usher in a new era of felicity, material blessings to the entire world that thirsts for redemption. But the birth pangs precede the fulfillment.

I have read with deep sorrow of the persecution of the Jews that now goes on in Russia. The sword of Democles still hangs over their heads. Thousands of Jews are fleeing for their lives with terror in their hearts to escape violence, carnage and incendiarism. The blood accusation which was fastened on them by a shameless church in Poland under sway of and connivance with the Vatican and by the Greek Catholic Church, which receives its inspiration from the Little Father, the head of both Church and Government, has been resurrected and given new life to the dismay of the people who have always had an abhorrence of blood.

The cry of the House of Jacob, which is with sorrow afflicted, swells in volume, and rolls from one end of the world to the other, from sea to sea. No wonder they cry impatiently, How long, Oh Lord, how long.

Shall we expect, then, that this northern bear, whose stupidity runs an even race with its ferocity, will yield, and raise its paw, and make room for a Jew to enter who bears an American passport? I have nothing to say against the fight which is being carried on by the American Jew for his right to enter Russia as an equal of any other American citizen. But I confess that it does not inspire me with great admiration. I hope nothing of permanence from it. We should not allow ourselves to be satisfied with formalities. The permission of Russia, even if it were granted, is not worth the paper it may be written upon. So long as the evil influences operate effectively in this nation, fed by the evil doctrines of the Middle Ages, you cannot fight successfully, when God wills it not so. The time draws nigh when this power will be crushed and flung into the dust. "Mene, Tekel, Upharsin." The writing on the wall may be seen. Its doom has been pronounced. The text in

Daniel is very clear on that point. The Power of God moves toward St. Petersburg, and the modern Nebuchadnezzar will soon be eating the grass.

A revolution from within will arise; the fires that are seemingly quenched will be blown into life again, and will soon emblazon the firmament of Russia with unmistakable portents. This will merely hasten the day of its downfall, for fall it must; the Word of God has been spoken. Its judgment day is not yet, although it is approaching.

Do we wonder why the Russian and the Poles, who are kept in ignorance of the real meaning of the Bible, who are smitten with the fear of Hell and its torments, who are misled into the belief that those who do not accept the teachings of Jesus, are doomed to damnation and suffering in the life hereafter and are therefore outlawed in this life—that they inflict pain and sorrow upon the heads of the Jews, and shed their blood without compunction?

It is against this ignorance and medieval darkness that envelops Russia and the greater part of Europe that I wage war and raise my trumpet. A fight there shall be, but not a fight of formalities, but a fight for principles. I believe in striking at the heart of the evil, at its roots; to smite the serpent on its head, and destroy it utterly. I call to the people to take the beam out of their eyes, and look into the Bible and see the Word of God in its true light.

The fear of purgatory and Hell is the product of evil-doers; it was born in minds filled with dark shadows; God has not spoken of it, nor is it known to His prophets. Damnation was never a word in God's speech. It was the invention of God's enemies, who sought to erect their thrones on earth and declare that they held His Sceptre, and thus were entitled to reign in His stead. It was the Popes, seeking temporal power, who declared that the Messiah had come, and that they were his representatives on earth, to whom all mortals should bend the knee. Because the Jews refused to believe that Messiah had come, it was the Popes, counsellors of evil, who pronounced the anathema, calling them Accursed of God, and declared that God had withdrawn His favor from them.

The antidote against these teachings is the spread of a true knowledge of the Bible, and letting its own light shine, instead of the false interpretations given by God's enemies. Is there any mention in the Bible of Hell? No. True, there is the word "sheol," but that does not mean Hell, no more than Hell means Paradise. "Sheol" means the grave. Those who know Hebrew will not be misled. There is in the Bible a reference to the Vale of Hinnom, which is usually mentioned as Gehenna, but this, too, is not Hell. The fires of the Vale of Hinnom were fed by refuse cast into it by the surrounding inhabitants.

The idea of Hell is as fallacious and as misleading as the dogma of the Trinity, which is also held very tenaciously by the same Counsellors of Evil. It is these dogmas, false in inception, and the result of evil-planning, that have driven away from the study of the Bible, and from the belief in God thousands and thousands.

The reign of dogma is yet strong, and it is now making its last fight. Because it is its last fight, all the more ferocious are its movements. The Jew suffers; he is the victim, now as always. The anticipation of the day when their power shall be taken from them makes the enemy wild, senseless in their rage, and they wreak vengeance upon the Chosen People.

But, as I have said, these are the birth-pangs of a great era, when out of the ruins of the fallen dogmatic church there shall arise the long-awaited Kingdom of God, in which even they shall also have a portion. "Comfort ye, comfort ye, my people," saith the Lord. "You have been paid double—yea, double for your sins, and your blessings shall not be withheld from you any longer."

It is to this prophecy I ask my Jewish brethren to turn. Its meaning is clear, and the time is ripe for it. It was God's will that through the Jew blessing shall come to the world, to all the inhabitants thereof, and all his suffering and privation, his afflictions, his wanderings, have been merely a preparation for the Great Day that was to come, designed by Providence from the beginning. Why should the Jew suffer? Why all this contumely heaped upon him? The Bible is very clear on that point, also. It is God's desire to help the world through the Jewish people. God chose the Jewish people as the Kingdom of Priests, and not one tear shed by the Jews will

be lost. God will repay, doubly repay, for their sufferings.

I am glad to know that Zionists assemble and discuss the status of their movement. Zionism means, primarily, means a fight for the perpetuation of the Jewish people, in spite of the desire of governments to absorb them and assimilate them. It means the return of the Jewish people to the Holy Land, the land of their fathers, the land promised to them by God through the prophets, the land that now sits like a widow, desolate, with none to comfort her, and waits for her children to return, and to embrace them. It means clinging to tradition, to their own spiritual inheritance, the greatest of which is surely the Bible, the light of the world for ages. It means the declaration of the Jews here, in the land of the free, and of the Jews there, in the land of slavery; the Jews in the Orient, the Jews in the Occident; of the New World and of the Old; here and everywhere; are one nation, one unit, knitted together by one belief in God Who is One, against the entire world. It means resistance against the tendencies for assimilation in their own ranks, against the handful of Sadducees, who would like to clothe the Jew in borrowed apparel. And it means the desire to stand up and be counted separately and severally as Jews.

The student who studies the Bible thoroughly, sincerely, faithfully, and with discernment, and in its own light, must rejoice at the advent of the Zionist movement. It is as "the ginger of God," "the miracles and wonders that happen from day to day" for which the Hebrew prayers daily give thanks. It is one of the important signs of the times. There is manifest in this movement God's wish to make an end of the reign of the dogmatic churches, and their evil influence, and usher in the Kingdom of God by transplanting His people on the Holy soil, and thus bring material blessings to the world, through them, as He promised to Abraham in the words, "In thy seed all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

Wherefore shall the Zionists be downcast when they read the news from Turkey? Empires have been erected—empires have fallen, but God's word stands forever, immutable. Rome, that subjugated the Jews and dispersed them, was mighty; it included all the known world of the time. Now where is Rome? It lies prostrate and its memory is obliterated from the earth. And before Rome, Babylonian, the Assyrians, the most powerful nations of antiquity, that had cultures of their own, and enthralled other nations, and made them pay tribute, and were the fear of the world—where are they now? Sunk in the chasm of oblivion. What became of Greece, with its Jupiter and Muses, oracles and soothsayers? Shattered into splinters before the Almighty God of Israel, Who neither sleeps nor slumbers. Their temples are not only ruined, but their gods were repudiated. The immortality of the Jew, his overcoming his enemies by outliving them, is due to the fact that God has given him a mission, which he must discharge. Why then tremble when a Turkish minister speaks a word of disparage? Does not the Psalmist warn against "faith in princes"? Ministers come, and ministers go. They are but the blind agents of the Providence which works through them, and sees all. Surely God did not intend that the son of Ishmael shall vanquish the children of Isaac.

It was not God's intention that Mohammedans who spread their religion by sword and fire shall occupy the soil promised to the children of Israel, and the Turks know they are but sojourners in the land. As it is said, "I shall bring you from all corners of the earth, from the north and from the south, from the east and from the west, for the good of the entire world." Will Mohammedans who believe Israel owns Palestine be able to hinder God in His providential design? Will Turkish ministers be able to do it? The voice of warning to Turkey has not yet been sounded, but it surely will. The battle between Gog and Magog has not taken place as yet, but it surely will. When this Voice will be heard it will be a strong voice, before which Turkey will tremble and halt.

Palestine, though formally a Turkish province, is no more Turkish than it is American. Palestine has been the slave of many nations, but none of them was in possession. It was given to them only for a time as a leasehold, but not to be the everlasting lords over it. The title is in the Jewish people, given to them by the Almighty, and cannot be wrested from them by any nation. This small territory is a holy land, not for the Jew only, but for the entire world. Through the Jew for the entire world; and Turkey will not be permitted to meddle with affairs that are beyond its jurisdiction. The world will not sanction it; it will resent its arrogance and rebuke it. When? If not to-day or to-morrow, the time is not far distant. The event will be part of human history, just as the humbling of Russia by unknown Japan. That day must be preceded by an awakening to that the Messiah has not come. It the truths of the Bible; by a return to its teachings; by absorbing its truths; by shaking off the yoke of absurd dogma; by repudiating the false comment upon the Bible by the Church; by

disclaiming the false notions read into the Bible, such as hell, damnation, trinitarianism and the Church. It is to this I call my people. And I am glad that the number of my adherents grows day by day. I am glad that my teachings on this point are eagerly received by hundreds of thousands who, emerging from the darkness that blinded them, cling to the light and bless the day their eyes were opened.

I again say there is no reason for being despondent. The Jews will have Palestine as day follows night. The Bible assures me of that. But Zionism means more than that. It is not only a blessing for the Jews, a means for ridding themselves of persecution, but the divine scheme includes all the nations of the earth. Together with its realization there must be the resurrection of the dead to share in the blessings that accrue to the living. And with it also comes the spiritual blessings to the worthies, who will live in an invisible state on a higher plane as the stars shine in the heavens. All these happenings are bound to occur. The same Bible assures me of that. And as for me, I cannot see how one promise made by the prophets is to be separated from the other promises made by the same prophets. They are all threads of one design, intertwined and inseparable. I smile with the great Rabbi Akiba, who laughed at the fulfillment of the prophecies of woe because they assured him of the fulfillment of the prophecies of the redemption.

It is to this conception of Zionism that I wish to see the Jewish people turn. In my sermon, "Zionism in Prophecy," which I preached to thousands and thousands of Jews, I brought to them a word of comfort and this has set their hearts aglow. Many Zionists were present in my audiences and they came to me and pressed my hand and expressed their joy at seeing that a Jewish audience could be so enraptured with a sermon in which Zionism was expounded in the manner employed by me. Some of them even complained of the hardships they encountered in spreading their doctrines among their people. And I told them what is worth repeating here on this occasion:

"My Zionist friends, Zionism is not a political movement. The politics that are in it are incidental to its grand object. Zionism is a religious movement as the Jewish nation is a religious nation. It was religion that kept the Jews together. No one can be a Hebrew who does not believe in the religion of his fathers, just as he is no more a Hebrew when he embraces the religion of another church. The Jewish nation is a kingdom of priests of God's Church on this earth. The ties of blood count for something; the racial affiliation is something, too; but it is the religion that primarily makes the Jew what he is and is necessary for his identity. A Gentile who takes up the Jewish religion is more of a Jew than a Jew who is an infidel. And Zionism is the ideal of a religious people and is nothing but a religious conception, having its basis in the Bible, the light of religion in this world. To divorce Zionism from religion means the suicide of the former. It is like taking the fire out of the lightning and leaving only the reverberating thunder. Zionism without religion is a body without a soul, a wagon without wheels.

"You cannot fire a people with enthusiasm when you give them cold, uninspired formulas. No wonder, then, my Zionist friends, that you have had difficulties in spreading your Zionist beliefs. Zionism is a part of your religion, a part of the world's religion, a great scheme, a national, an international scheme; an overthrowing of the old and the re-creating of the new, a happening which the world has never seen before and will never see again; it is a miracle whose realization was guaranteed at the inception of the world. It is therefore folly to give to the people a narrow, hollow, petty, shriveled idea which is a caricature of the great idea. Why leave the source of living waters to the pit that was just dug? It is not for the Jew to imitate any one in ideals. This political parley and diplomacy and audiences with the powers, this scanning of the political horizon, this waiting in the anterooms of ambassadors is good enough for a Turk, or a Bulgarian, or a Roumanian, or for any other insignificant nation that lives on the smile of a prince or ruler. For the Jews it is below their dignity, for they have their future secured by a covenant entered into by their ancestors with God Himself. It is the religious Zionism that will sway your people as it will sway the Gentile nations. It is Zionism in prophecy that will bloom as the tree that is planted above the living stream of water. To my audiences I have spoken of this Zionism and of no other."

I hope that the Zionists who assembled in Tannersville will not consider it self-assumed interference on my part when I will call their attention to the answer I gave to their comrades who were among my auditors. A hint to them as to their future policy may be found in it. I stand for the outpouring of the soul in the fatherhood of God; knowing that each of His children is in some degree different from the other; knowing as when Jacob blessed his sons that to each there is a distinct blessing; according to his needs, his history and the service he has rendered the Heavenly Father and the earthly brother; yet, knowing with Jacob that there is a blessing common to all. For this reason I can approach those of the Jewish faith secure in the blessing that is my lot, and wishing that they may achieve the perfection of that which will be vouchsafed them in the record which is the light of the world."

BROOKLYN NOTES.

The Parents' Conduct.

Dr. Leon Album addressed the Jewish Mothers' Society of Brooklyn last Sunday evening at the Synagogue Bnai Moshe. In part he said:

"I need not say that the principal care and responsibility of children devolve upon mothers during the first few years of their lives. It is for mothers to give direction to their thoughts, principles and characters. She draws the outline which forms the element of their future history, which in years to come will be occupied in filling up.

"We cannot dwell upon a mother's responsibilities and duties. The physical, intellectual and moral training of her little ones throw upon her duties onerous and important. But in these things she must not be left alone; both father and mother must share in these great responsibilities, each in his sphere, and yet both united and together. Parents must be united in their views of family government and the measures by which it is exercised, and if the parents differ the children should never know it, otherwise there will be division and the children will be seriously injured. The children are to be taught obedience; to yield their will to that of their parents. Obedience to parents is necessary for their happiness. The parents' authority must be enforced with mildness. If you strike a child don't strike him with anything heavier than a shoe lace, is a divine maxim. Parents should train their children religiously. But be very careful in training your children, for the acquisitions of a person in youth stick to him and guide him in old age. Parents should guard their children against evil influences; see well to the company which they keep, teach them to despise none, to love all men, and to conduct themselves in a manner that will insure the respect for them. Remember, parents, the divine maxim, 'He who withholds the rod hates his son.' Is there any father who hates his son? But this means that he who does not train his child in wisdom and in good manners behaves as an enemy toward him."

Hebrew Educational Society.

The Hebrew Educational Society of Brooklyn is planning a course of Friday evening lectures to be given in the auditorium of its building, Pitkin avenue and Watkins street, during the coming season. The subjects will include Jewish religion, ethics, history, literature and social problems.

The farm garden is becoming quite popular. It is a few blocks away from the society's building on a lot situated at Blake and Thatford avenues. There are over sixty plots under cultivation by as many boys and girls.

The Club Leaders' Conference is arranging for an active campaign in the fall for a fund for a new building. It has appointed a committee, with Mr. A. Oscar Bernstein as chairman, to develop several plans among the clubs for the promotion of this object.

Fair for the People's Temple, Bensonhurst.

The fair which has been running all week at the Belvedere Hall, Cropsey avenue and Bay Twenty-second street, Bath Beach, for the benefit of the building fund of the People's Temple, closed Monday evening, the last night being mainly devoted to auctioning off some of the unsold articles.

Saturday night was the gala night, and the hall was crowded to its uttermost and the scene was very bright and animated. Toward the close of the evening the Young Folks' League took possession of the hall and announced the result of their popularity contest, namely, that Miss Emma Zeeman won the ladies' prize of a handsome plume and Mr. Jack Jaches won the young gentlemen's prize of a silver cane, after which an impromptu dance closed the evening. The People's Temple came into existence December 25, 1910, starting with twenty-four members, and has now close on to one hundred.

Associated with the temple are the Ladies' League, numbering eighty-five members; the Young Folks' League, with over one hundred members, and the Children's League, with a membership of fifty.



SHEMAYAH AND ABTALYON.

Dear Children:

Before I will tell you what was the favorite maxim of Abtalyon I will tell you something about these two wonderful men, for these men were indeed wonderful, as they were the descendants of the terrible Assyrian king, Sennacherib, who, with an army of one hundred and eighty-five thousand men, wanted to destroy Jerusalem and kill all the Jews, but God sent his angel and he killed his entire army during the night. Sennacherib alone was left alive in order that he might go home and tell all the Gentiles the wonderful thing that God had done, and thus proclaim the glory of God to all the nations, yet was he too stupid to realize that God alone should be worshipped and when he returned to his capital city, Nineveh, he bowed to his idol, Nisroch, who was nothing but a piece of wood, which the people of ancient times had saved from Noah's Ark, and, as he prostrated himself before his idol, he prayed that it should save him from the vengeful princes whose sons he had led into the war and who were killed by the angel of God. He offered to sacrifice his sons to the idol as a thank-offering if he would be saved. (In the olden times the idol worshippers used to kill their children and sacrifice them to the idols.) His two sons, however, happened to be behind his back, and overheard his prayer and offering. Of course, they objected to being killed as a sacrifice by their father, and, while he was kneeling to his idol, they killed him right then and there. And, just to think of it, dear children, that of such a family there should be descended one who married a Jewish girl and accepted the Jewish faith and from whom there descended Shemayah and Abtalyon—some of the greatest Jewish teachers that ever lived. Let me tell you how popular and beloved they were by the Jewish people: It happened once that the high-priest, the greatest man among the Jews, went forth from the Holy Temple and a great Jewish multitude followed him. When Shemayah and Abtalyon happened to make their appearance among the multitude the multitude immediately left off following the high-priest and followed Shemayah and Abtalyon with every demonstration of joy and love. Of course, that high-priest was very jealous and when Shemayah and Abtalyon respectfully took leave of him he said: "Let the children of the Gentiles go in peace." Stung to the quick, they retorted: "Let the children of the Gentiles go in peace, for they love peace as Aaron loved it; but let not the son of Aaron go in peace, for he does not act as Aaron did." And it served him right to be answered like that, because he had no right to remind them that they were descended from Gentiles as long as they were good Jews now.

Shemayah and Abtalyon were the teachers of Hillel and Shamai, who afterward founded the greatest schools that the Jews ever possessed; the teachers knew what kind of scholars they taught, and they foresaw that each of them would have thousands of scholars attending his school. Abtalyon, therefore, always used to say to Hillel and Shamai: "Ye sages, be cautious of your words, lest ye be doomed to captivity and carried captive to a place of infected waters and the disciples who follow you should drink of them and die, by which means the name of God may be profaned."

He impressed upon them the necessity of teaching the Torah to their scholars in such a way that there should be no misunderstanding of their meaning, because if they will not teach clearly the thousands of disciples that they will have will be split up in hundreds of factions; one faction will say, "this the master meant," and another will say, "this he meant," while no one will know what he really meant. The result will be that many of them will drink the infected waters of atheism and die traitors to Judaism. Therefore, we should always be careful to teach the Torah in a clear manner.
