Daniel Frohman, dean of the dramatic profession in America, is a native of Sandusky, Ohio. The theatrical business early claimed his attention, and after managing road companies several seasons, he finally located in this city as manager of the old Lyceum Theatre, Fourth avenue and Twenty-third street, whose stock company was the foremost dramatic organization of its time, and this reputation was obtained largely through the undiluted devotion of Daniel Frohman to the highest ideals of the thespian art and to which he has always adhered, eschewing commercialized drama at all times. His indomitable spirit in matters affecting dramatic art, has had much to do with whatever good remains in the profession from an artistic standpoint. Mr. Frohman has written his memoirs, and as published they are a review of the development of theatrical enterprises and histrionic endeavors during his momentous career, but they omit the information that it was in Sandusky, Ohio, in a little theatre hall he got his first idea of the drama. There his father was a member of a German amateur theatrical company and Daniel at the age of nine years was often engaged as "prompter." It was an early experience, and it proved irresistible. Mr. Frohman is proprietor of the new Lyceum Theatre and is president of the Actors' Fund of America.

grand success. All our *landsleut* turned out in full force. I meet there some of my home-folks that I hadn't seen for the last ten years. People said that the actors played wretchedly, that they fell down on their songs, that the stars didn't come at all, and that their roles had been taken over by cheap understudies. But what of that? Who gave a thought to the songs, the stars, the play? For my part, they needn't play at all. All our folks could hardly wait till an act was over—and then they went calling on each other. We were talking over old times, swapped the news from Kapulia, talked politics, business, and I distributed among them cards, with the number of my telephone.

Had the actors asked us after the first act whether they should go on with the play or not, we would have told them unanimously that they were excused and that we prefer to talk among ourselves. Each time the curtain went up and we had to go back to our seats we abused the actors and the theatre, and each time it went down again we applauded them with all our heart.

My high-toned son-in-law, Thomas Barclay Chaprinski, was displeased with the entertainment. He said that the *goyim* behave more dignifiedly in their theatres, and that even Jews going to *goyische* performances keep quiet while the play is going on—save only that they cough now and then, but that, of course, they can't help.

"You are a fool," said I to my son-in-law. "What call have we to compare ourselves to the *goyim*? The *goyim* are in *golus* and we Jews, we are a free people. Let me tell you something, oh, son of mine; The *Kelmer maggid* told me once as follows: It is written that the Uppermost declared that all Jews shall be as a nation of kings. How comes it then, the *Kelmer maggid* asked, that the Lord has sent us into exile and into slavery among the *goyim*? The truth is that we are kings even as it is and that the *goyim* are in *golus* with us. How is this? The *goy* plants the earth, he carries water, he stokes the Jews' fires, he builds him houses and considers a piece of fish or *chalah* from his table a royal favor. Wherefore it mani-

festly appears that not we Jews are in exile but the *goyim*, and that the Lord was true to his word. Thus for the *maggid* of Kalem. And that my son, holds true in our own times, and most of all—of the Jews of America. Only look what true enjoyment our Jews have in their theatres, and then see in what anguish the *goyim* are sitting for several hours in theirs. What do *goyim* know about a lodge benefit? What do they know of the pleasure of paying calls between the acts and to renew acquaintance with *landsleut*? And look you, oh, son of mine, *goyim* are riding in a car, they are afraid to speak a loud word, and we Jews, we are in the car as if in our own dwelling. The same you may observe in summertime, in the parks: the *goyim* walk timidly on the pathways, afraid lest they step on the grass, but our Jews look out for a grassy spot, make themselves comfortable, and there cook tea and hard-boiled eggs. I might instance a score of such examples showing that it is not we that are in *golus* but the *goyim*.

"You are all right, papa," said my son-in-law. "You are a great joker, but I wouldn't advise you to talk like that in public, because there might be fools around and they would take you serious."

"Never you mind," says I, "our Jews understand a joke. They sometimes let on they don't, but they are no fools. Nay, son of mine, our Jews are a bright people."

"Chaim, what are you arguing here?" butts in my *Yiddineh*. "Better go and distribute a few more cards with our telephone number among our *landsleut*."

"Let me alone!" said I. "I had some sixty and odd cards and they are all distributed."

The next day our wire was kept very, very busy. Now I begin to believe in advertising. The sixty odd cards I distributed brought me calls without end.

The trouble began early in the morning. At six o'clock in the morning a *landsman* of mine rang up and asked me, would I give him a show and buy from him *pesachdige* crockery—he had just opened a crockery store in Brooklyn. Ten minutes later another called up. He offered me the biggest bargains ever seen in *pesachdige* prunes, dried peaches, almonds and other good things—bargains so great that it would pay to go after them to Harlem. Right thereafter somebody inquired after my supply in *pesachdige* wine. I went right out of the house and on my business errands, because I hadn't the nerve to say no to all of them. But my *Yiddineh* had to stand for them *nebach*: the whole day.

### JUDAISM AND ARISTOTELISM



As far back as 1867 Matthies J. Schleiden, the celebrated naturalist, wrote a very fascinating paper entitled "The Importance of the Jews in Preserving and Reviving the Sciences in the Middle Age," wherein he pointed out the remarkable services performed by the Jews as translators of the philosophical writings of ancient times. All the same, even in many cultivated circles of the present day, it is hardly known at all that Jews and Arabs rescued from oblivion the literary treasures of Greek antiquity. They thus brought about the renaissance of philosophy and science after the hordes of barbarism had almost destroyed the culture\* of the ancients, and the Emperor Justinian had outlawed philosophy by closing in the year 529 the Athens School of Philosophy. But no thinker of antiquity exercised so great and decisive influence upon the Jews as did Aristoteles. When Rudolf Eucken in his "Views on Life by the Great Thinkers" says that "Aristoteles became the chief philosopher of Medieval Ecclesiasticism," we must, in order to make his statement complete, add that the Jews made the Greek philosopher's writings accessible to the Christian scholastics. Horovitz gives the reasons why Aristoteles became the most influential philosopher to the Jews. Among them are his sublime idea of God, his decided tendency to monotheism, and his theological way of thinking, which caused him to recognize in all nature the wise purpose of eternal reason. At this point, however, Horovitz should have laid stress, for the benefit of those ignorant of Aristoteleian philosophy, upon the difference existing between the Aristoteleian and the Jewish idea of God. For the God of Aristoteles stands, according to his idea, much too high to concern himself with individual men and women, and therefore fails to satisfy the heart. On

the other hand according to the Jewish view "God is enthroned upon high, and looks down upon the poor so that he may elevate them from the dust" (Psalm 113). Our author very pertinently calls attention to the fact that Plato with his views regarding communism, the entire cessation of family life, and his inhuman demand that the chronic sick and infirm should be doomed to destruction, was incapable of permanently influencing the Jews. Herr Horovitz's essay is written in so clear and intelligible a style that it may be read with interest even by those who have not studied philosophy.—*Neue Freie Presse*.

## How to Overcome Prejudice

"Ye shall be guiltless towards the Lord and towards Israel."—Numbers 32-22.

At the outset of my remarks I desire to frankly and regretfully admit that prejudice against our people, which has existed for so many years in despotic countries like Russia, will perhaps continue to exist in a more or less degree for years to come. We, however, who are fortunate enough to live in glorious America, which breathes liberality of thought, must realize that the tendency in this great country is to properly recognize and appreciate true manhood and womanhood regardless of race distinction. We of the Jewish faith enjoy a full share of this spirit. We have recently had as a prominent member of the Cabinet of the President of the United States, Honorable Oscar S. Straus. Many Hebrews also hold important national, State and city offices. In New York a number of the Judges on the Bench of our high courts are of Jewish faith. Therefore, we have every reason to believe that by right living and right doing, prejudice can be overcome.

Let me relate a few incidents which will show that we have many thoughtless Jews whose conduct creates prejudice. Last summer I stopped for several weeks at a resort in the Catskill Mountains. The main hotel was composed entirely of Jewish guests, the proprietor being a Christian. Dancing was indulged in every evening, with the exception of Sunday. The owner of the hotel, out of respect for the Christian Sabbath, did not permit dancing on Sunday evening, but arranged a concert of classical music instead. There were about 150 guests at the hotel, and none of them took sufficient pride in their day of rest to suggest that they refrain from dancing on the Jewish Sabbath. Not only was dancing indulged in, but hay-rides and other social functions frequently took place on Friday evening. For the sake of argument, we will suppose that most of the guests of this hotel were so-called Reform Jews.

About a half mile from this place there was another resort known as a strictly kosher boarding house. In passing one Sabbath afternoon I was mortified to notice that a number of the male guests of the place sat coatless on the porch, indulging in card playing, with money lying before them and children grouped around. When I passed there on Sunday afternoon the performance was repeated. Of such Jews it has been truly said: "They have *kosher* stomachs but *Trefar* hearts."

A couple of years ago I strolled on the boardwalk of a nearby watering resort one Friday evening. I met there one of the leading members of the synagogue of that place. The subject of conversation turned towards the synagogue, and my friend spoke of the large attendance and the strict orthodox manner of worship. He told me the sexes sat apart, there was no organ, etc. This happened to be during what is known as Carnival Week at that resort, and while he was talking and telling me all this, it was all I could do to understand what he was saying on account of the noise and boisterous conduct of the young people on the boardwalk. Confetti was thrown about and everything had the

appearance of the circus in town. Notwithstanding that it was the Jewish Sabbath and many of these young people were the sons and daughters of trustees and members of the synagogue.

Sabbath observance is not a question of Orthodoxy or Reform; it is one of self-respect. Owing to economic conditions many of us are obliged to toil on the Jewish Sabbath in order to earn our livelihood. It is, however, a very poor argument to advance (as many do) that on this account there is no need to observe the Sabbath when we have the chance to do so. Nor is it an excuse for non-attendance at public worship for spiritual uplift when we have the opportunity to take part in a service such as this—just as you and I are doing to-night. How can we hope to overcome prejudice and command respect of our neighbors if we disregard our sacred Sabbath?


In one of our Bible readers we find the following lines relative to the Sabbath: "Our Sabbath is not a day for bodily rest only. It is for freedom from daily cares, not a day for mere idle lounging, but for quiet and peaceful enjoyment, never forgetting its sacred character, but seeking only such recreation as refines and elevates the mind."

Let me now speak of a few ancient customs which are still in vogue among many of our people and ought to be discouraged, as a continuation of such practices will certainly not aid in dispelling prejudice. In some orthodox synagogues when the Megillah is read on Purim, the name of Haman is hissed and hooted every time it is mentioned, and little instruments made specially for the purpose of making a noise are used to help jeer his name. Such a custom detracts from the sacred associations of the House of Worship. Haman paid the penalty of his crime with compound interest centuries ago. He died ignominiously on the scaffold and left a dishonored name to his descendants. Why therefore should we dig up his ashes? Let us rather show our contempt for his conduct by seeing to it that we possess none of his traits of character in our own lives!

Another ancient custom that is obnoxious and which has a strong tendency to create prejudice is the practice of taking up a collection in tin boxes at Jewish funerals. This habit is so abused that when funerals pass through the crowded streets of the lower East Side many imposters take up collections on their own account, as they know that many persons do not stop to ascertain who are the official collectors. This practice is not at all in keeping with the times, is also un-American, and should be discouraged.

During the recent festival of Simchas Torah, I attended services in one of our strictly orthodox synagogues. I love this festival because it recalls many happy childhood recollections. I shall always treasure in my mind's eye the expression of pride and pleasure on the face of my own dear father of blessed memory, when he received a letter from the president of the synagogue which he attended informing him that the honor of Bridegroom of the Law (Chosan Torah) had been conferred upon him, and it was always with boyish pride that I witnessed the march of the good men of the congregation and the impressive scene it presented as they carried the scrolls

ITEMS OF INTEREST IN THE JEWISH WORLD.

At present there are 2,140 boys attending the London, England, Jews' Free School.

M. Cattini has been elected president of the Credit Founcler Egyptian of Alexandria.

Dr. David I. Macht, of Baltimore, Md., has been appointed Coroner by Governor Goldborough.

A new congregation known as Shomrey Amonah has been incorporated at Batavia, N. Y.

The dedication of the new Dropsie College Building at Philadelphia, Pa., will take place on March 11.

The Hebrew Sisters' Loan Association, of South Bend, Ind., has been incorporated with a capital of \$10,000.

Among recent incorporations is that of the Hebrew American Benevolent Association, of Milwaukee, Wis.

The Congregations Temple of Truth and Adas Kodesh, of Wilmington, Del., are considering an amalgamation.

There were 1,674 Jewish boys out of a total of 8,015 arraigned in the Children's Court in New York city last year.

A federation of all the Talmud Torahs of Johannesburg has been effected and a new syllabus is in course of construction.

The French Academy of Fine Arts has elected the celebrated Berlin painter, Herr Max Liebermann, a corresponding member.

Mrs. Rebecca Summerfield, a well-known charity worker of Baltimore, Md., passed away on February 11, aged fifty-eight.

Dr. Julius Leopold Pagel, Extraordinary Professor of the History of Medicine at the University of Berlin, died last month.

The City Council of Rotterdam has decided that the Jewish method of slaughter cannot be used by Christian butchers.

Dr. Solomon Goldenkranz has been appointed a State Transfer Tax Appraiser for New York city at a salary of \$4,000 per annum.

The seceding Chicago, Ill., section, Council of Jewish Women, will in future be known as the Chicago Association of Jewish Women.

It is reported that the Portuguese Government is considering a project of inviting Jews to settle in Angola, one of its West African colonies.

The Young Men's Hebrew Association of Bayonne, N. J., have purchased ground on which they purpose erecting a home of their own.

Bavaria has 364 Jewish congregations which consist of 65,000 souls, a figure that equals about 1 per cent. of the total Bavarian population.

Prof. Samuel Langer, of New York, has been appointed Superintendent of the Pacific Hebrew Orphan Asylum at San Francisco, Cal.

A French Jewish newspaper will shortly be issued at Alexandria, Egypt. It will appear fortnightly and will be called La Revue Israelite d'Egypte.

Among recent appointments to the Royal Victorian Order appears the name of Bunin Menahem Messa, head of the Jewish Community at Aden.

Second Lieutenant Leonard D. Rothschild of the Eighteenth London Regiment (London Irish Rifles), has been appointed to a first lieutenantcy.

The King of Roumania has conferred the Grand Officer's Cross of the Crown order on Herr Felix Kuranda, Director of the Vienna Bankverein.

The society organized to build a new Jewish Home for the Aged in Kansas City, Mo., is meeting with success. Already 350 members are enrolled.

The scheme of rebuilding the Beth Holim Hospital in the Mile End Road of London, Eng., will most likely be realized in the very near future.

The Riga District Assizes have sentenced a converted Jewess to six months imprisonment in a fortress for entering her boy into the Abrahamic covenant.

It is announced that Julius Rosenwald, of Chicago, Ill., has given another \$5,000 toward the erection of a Colored Y. M. C. A., this time for New York city.

At a recent banquet in aid of the London, England, Educational and Aid Society, Sir Rufus Isaacs, the Attorney-General, made an impassioned plea for funds with which to carry out the work of the society; \$5,200 was raised.

Services were held at the K. A. M. Synagogue, Chicago, Ill., last week in commemoration of Liebman Adler, who at one time was rabbi of the congregation.

The new Sinai Temple and Social Centre at Chicago, Ill., has been completed and will be dedicated to-day. The building represents an outlay of over \$500,000.

Although Chicago, Ill., has 110,000 Jews, it is the only large city in the United States without a Y. M. H. A. A movement to organize such a body is now on foot.

The efforts of Portchester, N. Y., Hebrews to build a Hebrew Institute for their city are bearing fruit and at the next meeting plans and specifications will be submitted.

Mayor Harrison of Chicago, Ill., has appointed Rabbi Julius Rappaport a member of a special commission to take care of Chicago's small parks, playgrounds and bathing beaches.

The trustees of the Moses Montefiore School, of Chicago, Ill., have decided to erect a modern four-story and basement building to cost about \$60,000, on ground which they recently purchased.

Mr. Julius Rosenwald has offered to duplicate any subscription made by a Jewish citizen of Chicago, Ill., for the Hebrew Gymnasium at Jaffe, Palestine. The offer holds good for ten years.

Jewish members of the University of Michigan have refused to attend an annual dinner given at the University Club, of Chicago, Ill., owing to alleged anti-Semitic conduct of the club in the past.

Boston, Mass., last week lost through death one of its pioneer Jews—William Cobe, aged eighty-two. He was the first president of the Congregation Mishkan Tefila when it was organized fifty-one years ago.

Meyer Froehlich, a Newark, N. J., pioneer, passed away last week, aged ninety-one. Mr. Froehlich was a charter member of the Bnai Jeshurun congregation and was active in its affairs for over sixty-five years.

Colonel Isaac Hirsch, a leading citizen of Chillicothe, Mo., died on February 17, aged seventy-six. The deceased was proprietor of the largest store in the city and had been Mayor of Chillicothe for three terms.

Imperial Councillor Jacob Silberstein, president of the Jewish Congregation at Teschen, died on the 7th inst. in Vienna at the age of sixty-two. He had for ten years acted as a magistrate, and had held numerous honorary offices.

In the 7th of April, the Sixteenth Congress of Orientalists will meet in Athens, Greece. The congress will be under the high patronage of the King, and will comprise eleven sections, seven of which will be for Semitic languages and literature.

The official casualty list of Russian soldiers killed in Persia contains 7 per cent. of Jews, which percentage is higher than the Jewish population of the country and exceeds the percentage now fixed for Jews in most of Russia's higher educational institutions.

A bill was recently introduced into the Massachusetts Legislature to prohibit the sale of liquor on the Day of Atonement. It was understood that the general purport of the bill was to kill by ridicule another measure prohibiting the sale of liquor on Good Friday.

Leading Jews of Ottawa, Ont., supported by a number of clergymen of other denominations, have filed a protest against the proposed charter for Queen's College, alleging that Jews are greatly discriminated against in what is intended to be a non-sectarian State University.

Dr. Simon Flexner of the Rockefeller Institute of New York, who is lecturing this week before the London, Eng., Royal Institute on public health on the specific treatment of infectious diseases, is the first American ever invited to speak before that body. Dr. Flexner will go to Edinburgh and lecture before the university on March 3 on the serum treatment during an epidemic of meningitis.

Ernst Thalmann, senior member of the firm of Ladenburg, Thalmann & Co., one of the leading international banking houses, died Monday morning at his residence in New York city. Mr. Thalmann was born at Mannheim, Germany, June 9, 1851, and came to the United States in 1867, at the age of sixteen. He became a member of the New York Stock Exchange December 11, 1879, and was as well a member of the Cotton and Produce Exchanges, of the Philadelphia Stock Exchange and the Chicago Board of Trade. Mr. Thalmann was a liberal contributor to charities and was a trustee of the Hebrew Orphan Asylum.

Yorkville Congregations to Unite?

A movement is on foot to amalgamate the three orthodox congregations in Yorkville, Zichron Ephraim on East Sixty-seventh street, Kehillah Jeshurun on East Eighty-fifth street and Orach Chaim on Lexington avenue near Ninety-fifth street. A committee of five from each congregation has been appointed and have had joint meetings and they have all reported to their bodies favoring the proposed consolidation. It will be some time before the final details are arranged and a vote taken by the membership body of each congregation.

The general plan is to have each synagogue maintain its autonomy and have Rabbis Hertz and Margolies equal leaders, each to alternate in what will practically amount to circuit preaching. The main object of the amalgamation, and one which will most likely be carried through in any event, is the building and maintenance of an up-to-date Talmud Torah to be centrally located in Yorkville, and to be run on strict orthodox lines.

Young Women's Hebrew Association.

On Saturday evening, March 2, the annual Purim masquerade dance will be given, and on Sunday, March 3, there will be a Purim entertainment for children in the morning, and an entertainment with musical numbers and tableaux in the evening, under the auspices of the Esther J. Rusky Religious Circle.

Great interest was shown by the many people who attended the ninth annual meeting of the Young Women's Hebrew Association, which was held on Sunday evening, February 25. The opening prayer was given by Mr. Aaron Robison and the report of the year, which was read by the president, Mrs. Israel Unterberg, showed not only a marked increase in the activities, but also the efficiency of the work that has been accomplished. An earnest and inspiring talk of the aims and purposes of the association was given by Mrs. Charles H. Isaacs, and the same subject was further elaborated upon in talks which followed by Mr. Avram I. Elkus and Dr. David de Sola Pool. Plans for an active campaign for the building fund were spoken of, and there was an attractive exhibit of students' work.

Warburg, chairman of the nominating committee, were re-elected for a term of three years: Mrs. Waldemar Dorfman, Mrs. Israel Friedlaender, Mrs. Simon Liebovitz and Mrs. Israel Unterberg. Young Men's Hebrew Association.

Mr. Nathan Ullman has loaned to the association, for a short time, the famous picture of "Washington Taking the Oath of Office as the First President of the United States." The picture presents Washington and a group of some twenty statesmen of that period, each face of which is a perfect portrait as they stood in the gallery adjoining the Senate Chamber in Federal Hall. This building was situated on the present site of the Sub-Treasury at the corner of Wall and Broad streets, where the statue of Washington now stands. The picture is admitted free every day, excepting Saturday and every evening, to see this very interesting work of art. The beautiful picture, "Peace," the gift of an unknown donor, is also on exhibition in the main hall.

On Saturday evening the 2d, and Monday evening, the 4th, the children of Dr. Benderly's classes will have their Purim entertainments.

On Sunday evening, March 3, Amelia Morgenroth will present to the members of the association "An Evening with the Children of Dickens." This will be a selection of the best known child characters, selected from his various writings.

around the synagogue, while the choir sang in Hebrew:  
 "We beseech Thee, Oh, Lord, save us now,  
 We beseech Thee, Oh, Lord, prosper us now."  
 With such hallowed memories, I would be the last one to make light of this time-honored festival. I can only relate to you what I witnessed and the impression it made upon me.  
 When the time came for that impressive part of the service, when the scrolls were about to be taken from the Ark, the various honors were auctioned off to the highest bidder. The synagogue was packed to the doors with men, women and children. As soon as the march began there was almost a frantic rush to kiss the scrolls. The cloth covering was kissed right and left, and the scrolls in turn hugged tenderly and passionately. In the midst of feeling and excitement that had been aroused the little fellows in the synagogue imitated this performance and little girls came running down from the balconies to do likewise. What would the Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis say to this? Other practices are also indulged in on this festival which are not at all in keeping with the dignity and sanctity of the synagogue. I shall not take up time by dwelling on them here.

As I looked at the bright faces of these little children, I realized what a splendid field of work presented itself for a society similar to the Emanu-El Brotherhood, to teach these young minds that instead of hugging and kissing the coverings of these Sefar Torahs, true religion requires that we should cherish in our hearts the lessons contained in the scrolls handed down to us by the Almighty through our great leader Moses.

The Bible tells us that we are to be a peculiar people. The word peculiar, however, as used in Scripture does not mean that we must be strange and freakish in our customs and habits and not in sympathy with our surroundings. It means rather that our standards and ideals should be just a little higher than those of other nations, and that as a priest-people we must be ever mindful of our sacred heritage as teachers, with the holy mission of spreading peace, truth, good will and love among all men.

We must not make the mistake of being impatient and disrespectful toward those who cling to many of these fanatic customs and forms of devotion. Let us learn to be tolerant and sympathetic and properly appreciate the forces that have been at

# NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

(Exclusive Correspondence to THE HEBREW STANDARD.)

## Serious Endeavors to Secure Unity in Rabbinical Conference—An Appeal to the Ashkenazi—Death of Prominent Jewish Peer—Interesting Debates at English Zionist Conference—The Function of Women in Zionism—British Press Discusses Jews as Agriculturists.

London, February 16, 1912.

The differences between the Rabbinical Conference and the Federation of Synagogues still remain acute. Lord Swaythling, president of the Federation, is abroad, but it is hoped in many quarters that this does not mean the shutting of the door upon the Federation delegates. A circular has been issued by the sub-committee of the conference to all the Ashkenazi congregations in the British Empire in which it is pointed out that it is desired to form a scheme which would secure regular visitations of all the Ashkenazi congregations here and in the colonies that recognize the authority of the Chief Rabbi. Such a scheme it is hoped would satisfy the demand for efficient local Din where required and would tend to the advancement and well-being of Anglo-Jewry as a whole. The circular asks for statistics with regard to the number of male seatholders of each synagogue and the gross revenue for the last three years—these with a view to getting out a proper scheme.

The Federation of Synagogues has sufficiently concerned itself with the current trouble to issue a disclaimer with regard to a few press misconceptions. Federation Secretary Joseph Blank writes as follows: "It is scarcely correct to state that there is a 'schism'—the fact is that the United Synagogue, about to elect a Chief Rabbi of the United Congregations of the British Empire, has taken steps to ensure that the bulk of Anglo-Jewry—as you properly state the proportion—shall have practically no voice in the election of their spiritual chief. Against this indefensible proposition the Federation of Synagogues has consistently protested, and has for the present—thus leaving room for reasonable compromise and for the avoidance of 'schism'—withdrawn from the election."

The present position is that the United Synagogue, with a smaller number of members than the Federation, offers the latter body twenty votes to its own 340, and leaves important bodies of Provincial Jewry totally unrepresented.

"The United Synagogue has ignored the offer made by the Federation on January 25 last to join a consultative conference on the basis of one representative from each synagogue in the whole community (London and Provincial), as moved at the conference by Mr. Stuart M. Samuel, M. P., to advise the executive of the United Synagogue, if that body thinks such an advisory committee could be of any assistance to it."

"The Federation is perfectly willing that the United Synagogue which pays the bulk of the salary of the Chief Rabbi should keep the election entirely to itself if it so desires, but the gentleman so elected could scarcely be designated the Chief Rabbi of the United Kingdom." If the provinces and the Federation are to be called into consultation it must be on equitable terms and not as poor relations. In the former case there may be elected a Chief Rabbi of the United Kingdom, but in no circumstances can there be two Chief Rabbis as stated in your article on February 11, which entirely misconceives the position which the Chief Minister of the Federation is to occupy."

A member of the Jewish peerage in this country has passed away with the death of Lord Wandsworth. The late peer's family name was Sidney James Stern and he was a member of the banking firm of Stern Brothers. Of late years he has devoted himself to politics and was the first Jew to sit for the rural division of Suffolk, a constituency which is now again represented by another Jew. While a member of the House of Commons, Mr. Stern showed his living interest in urgent questions by introducing a bill for the better housing of the working classes in rural districts. He sat as a Liberal and received his peerage from the Liberal party for similar services to those for which his kinsman, Lord Michelham, received his from the Conservative party. Curiously, it was not until his later years that Lord Wandsworth took any special interest in Jewish communal affairs. Eventually he presented to the Home for Aged Jews a roomy building and adjoining land. His special recreations were coaching and fishing; he was unmarried and as there is no heir to the peerage the title becomes extinct. Although not a particularly observant Jew, his convictions were strong and he was particularly opposed to mixed marriages, which he urged were always rank disloyalty to Judaism.

Jewish delegates from all parts of the

country met at Liverpool, on February 13, for the annual conference of the English Zionist Federation. Joseph Cowen, of London, who presided at a public meeting in the evening, declared that what the Zionists were out for was not any evasion of the law, but a legally assured and publicly recognized home in Palestine for the Jewish people. The total income of the Zionist movement could not be far short of £500,000, and that had been raised not by nobles and the rich of Jewry, but by the poor. The weakness of the movement in England was due to one silly reason—that it was considered not quite good form to be a Zionist. The patriotic objection was also raised against the movement. Lord Rothschild, who was loved and was a pretty good Jew, had called himself the lay head of their community. He had called himself virtually the king of the Jews in England, and if he liked to put the crown on his own head he must remember that as king he must not take sides. Mr. Cowen spoke of the persecution of Jews in Russia, and said it was infamous that the fair name of England should be linked with that of such a country.

The conference was fairly brief. Presiding in the morning Joseph Cowen said that he had had satisfactory assurance from the Actions Committee that there was no foundation for the report that Turkey had forbidden settlement in Palestine. "Our movement is a people's movement; and, although there may be waves of depression, based as it is on the spirit of the people, it is bound to succeed. Things are much brighter than they were, but when I see the activity in other countries I am glad, as a Zionist, but disappointed as an English Zionist." He referred to the growth of the movement in Germany and America, and urged the conference not to divide on small points of difference but to look for points of agreement. All organizations included individuals with divergent views; but all Zionists, without exception, were agreed upon the principle laid down at the first Zionist conference at Basle in 1897, viz., to obtain a legally secured, publicly recognized home for Jews in Palestine. Let every Zionist work to the best of his ability in that direction; let not their enemies be in a position to point out a lack of agreement among themselves. In all countries where people had secured freedom and liberty they would find that individuals had been contented to throw their differences into the melting pot. He concluded with the intimation that he could not again accept the presidency of the Federation, and expressed his thanks to all who had so loyally supported him during his term of office.

S. B. Rubenstein referred to the dispute between the Federation and the Maccabaeans, which, he said, was chiefly responsible for the lack of enthusiasm. Zionism was a great charitable movement because it aimed at removing the greatest trouble which burdened the Jewish people. The difference between the Federation and the Maccabaeans was one of personality—not principle. "England," he declared, "is not large enough for two federations."

Leon Simon proposed the formation of a joint council with the O. A. M., which could take in hand all propaganda work in connection with Zionism in England, and would abolish the dual system which already existed. The right claimed by the Maccabaeans to enter into direct communication with the Actions Committee was a privilege which would be exercised only on special occasions when circumstances should demand it.

The following resolution was finally adopted: "This conference is of opinion that the only satisfactory solution of the local differences in this country is to have one federation; failing that a joint council (without any conditions) consisting of an equal number of representatives of the E. Z. F. and O. A. M.; but, in the interests of Zionism in this country accepts the conditions of the O. A. M., providing that the Actions Committee has already approved of them."

Helena Weisberg moved the following resolution, which was adopted: "That the women's societies pay their annual contributions to the women's propaganda and organization committees, who will pay a certain proportion of it regularly for each society to the English Zionist Federation."

The success of Russo-Jewish agriculturists in Argentina is arousing special attention in this country at the present time, and numerous references to it have appeared in the daily newspapers. In one it is clearly pointed out to those who do not know that popular mind connects the Jew with finance and commerce rather than with the cultivation of the soil. But the truth is that the Jewish aptitude for business, which is so conspicuous, is not innate but acquired. He is by origin and by nature a laborer in the fields. Even after Judaea had begun to lose its distinctive character under the reign of Herod, the historian, Josephus, who flourished in the first century A. D., was able to write: "As for ourselves we neither inhabit a maritime country nor do we delight in merchandise \* \* \* but the cities we dwell in are remote from the sea; having a fruitful country for our habitation, we

take pains in cultivating that only" ("Contra Apionem," I. 12). When, however, the Jewish State fell, in 135 A. D., the interest in agricultural pursuits began to decline, because the Jews no longer had any land to cultivate.

Two causes drove the Jews towards finance and away from the soil in the Middle Ages. First, they were a wandering people liable to be expelled on short notice, which compelled them to attach value to movable goods. Secondly, in most European countries, as in Russia to-day, Jews were forbidden by law to acquire landed property. But a revival in agricultural work is taking place in Jewry to-day. It started about thirty years ago with the emigration of some Russian Jews to Palestine, where they founded a small colony. Now the country is studied with farms, vineyards and garden cities. And during the last few weeks a scheme has been promoted for acquiring an estate of four or five thousand acres in England with the object of establishing a school of agriculture. The future will undoubtedly see larger and larger numbers of Jews renewing their ancient attachment to the soil.

Make the most of Purim.

Purim comes but once a year, and when it comes it brings good cheer!

Some people there be who will not celebrate the feast of Purim because they deem it "out-of-date." They are the ones of whom the proverb speaks: Drunk all year and sober on Purim.

Are there any Hamans in the world to-day? Each Jew can best answer this question for himself and so live and act for the balance of 5672 that our modern Hamans will be literally shamed into silence.

Anglo-Jewry is infested with an epidemic of public communal dinners in these days and, as the English order of post-prandial oratory is much superior to its American variant, the disease is not as dangerous as might at first sight seem. Then, too, the motive for many of the dinners is either sweet charity or the worthy desire of rendering honor to him whom honor is due to. In such instances, of course, one will easily agree that the diners have not dined in vain.

Because Rabbi Samuel Schulman, president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, is interested in the work of the Hebrew gymnasium at Jaffa, for which Dr. Mossinsohn is now making propaganda in this country, therefore the Conference is no longer the body which declares, "America is our Zion, Washington our Jerusalem." This startling exhibition of logical thinking we owe to the American correspondent of *Die Welt*, the international Zionist organ, whose reports have heretofore contributed to our entertainment and that of our readers.

The movement for the consolidation of Orach Chaim, Zichron Ephraim, and Kehilath Jeshurun, to which we refer in our news columns, deserves to succeed, for it will enhance the importance and impregnability of traditional Judaism in the central portion of this city. We speak thus because we particularly have in mind the effect this unification of forces will have on the united Central Talmud Torah of Yorkville. "United we stand, divided we fall" may not apply to each of these strong and independent congregations, but the union of their forces cannot but make for the greater prosperity of orthodox Judaism in their section. The cause in which the different committees of the three congregations are now working has our sincere and unmixed well-wishes.

In *The Review*, of Philadelphia, for February appeared an article on the *Kehillah* of the City of Brotherly Love, written by Dr. Cyrus Adler. Dr. Adler makes out an excellent case for his *Kehillah*, and refers to it as a federation of all the various Jewish organizations of the city, without interference with their autonomy or religious principles. Although the paper does not, in so many words, declare that the *Kehillah* of Philadelphia regards the congregation as its highest form of individual constituent, yet this is what we believe Dr. Adler's plea for it does amount to. Such an interpretation of the functions of a *Kehillah*—that it exists to unite all the congregations—is one that we are glad to loudly applaud. If our own "great and glorious" example had been built upon these lines, some of the criticism directed against it would have been impossible.

Rabbi Emil G. Hirsch of Chicago, celebrates the attainment of its majority by his publication, *The Reform Advocate*, in a lengthy and characteristic editorial statement of principles. He contrasts the situation prevailing in our American Jewry when his journal began to appear and that with which we are now confronted. He admits, evidently with considerable regret, that the German Jew has been crowded to the rear and that with him the dominant position of the reform movement in Judaism has been rendered more than doubtful. Yet he attempts to snatch away from us the comfort held out by these words, by the statement that the generation now in control of our Jewry does not observe, does not practice the religion of our fathers. This is, of course, erroneous. The German Jew has been crowded out, but the American Jew who has taken his place is at once Jewish and American, patriotic and punctilious in his observance of the ceremonies of traditional Judaism.

## REVENGE IS SWEET!

THE *cause celebre*, now locally so largely in the public eye, has nothing to do with our community. It is true that many of these directly occupying the center of the stage in the drama that is being unfolded before our gaze are of our race and religion. This fact does not entitle us to draw any credit to ourselves, as a community, for what they have done, and none the less does it not permit others to point the finger of scorn and contempt at us, as a community, for what they, the individuals, should have done.

We should never have referred to the matter at all in this place—for we as a community have and can have no interest in or connection with it—were it not that *The Evening Mail*, a newspaper of good repute and of distinct sympathy with our people, in one of its recent issues printed a tale which we hope has not a shred or patch of truth to support it. According to this "story" the Brandt case is simply a cloak for the battle of national issues which is being fought behind the scenes. One of the "national issues" has to do with a gentleman of the name of John Hays Hammond, a name which we recall was prominently "mentioned" at the time the abrogation of the Russian treaty was not yet an accomplished fact. *The Mail's* enterprising reporter would have it that Mr. Hammond is the "power behind" the Brandt case, and that his purpose in prosecuting the cause of the principal figure in it is to obtain revenge, oh, such sweet revenge!

If the tale be true, was ever a conception executed more diabolically?

With the suggestion, deliberately fomented by the exponent of "yellow" journalism in this city, by its attaches, wise and otherwise, and by those whose vocation in life is to obtain justice for the poor and the humble before the law, that this case will call into life a race issue as terrible as it is to be all-consuming, we shall not deal. We cannot dignify it with our notice! The American people will never be led astray by such a "guide."

But when, in the future, this medium of public opinion, of a sort and in a manner of speaking, ventures to defend our people from attack, let us remember the old Vergilian line, *Timco Danaos et dona ferentes!*

## UNANSWERABLE ARGUMENTS

THE memorandum in relation to the Dillingham bill on immigration which is now under advisement in the United States Senate and to which we have hitherto referred in this place, deserves a country-wide consideration and the earnest attention of our solons at Washington. It is the joint product of the brains of Louis Marshall, Max J. Kohler, and Abram I. Elkus, three men whose judgment on matters of this nature is entitled to serious heed.

This document points out with convincing force that the Dillingham bill provides in effect for a literacy test of arriving immigrants, which, carried out by bureaucratic officials, would render the entrance of certain classes of aliens into our country almost impossible. These classes of aliens have hitherto, and with right, been deemed wholly desirable.

Moreover, if the Dillingham bill be enacted into law as it now stands, the effect will be that our Chinese exclusion laws, reposing upon altogether different economic and political considerations, will be consolidated with the general statute on immigration. Consequently, any immigration officials inclined to adopt bureaucratic methods in their administration of law, will have abundant scope to deal with arriving aliens who are not Mongolians by race just as the officers charged with the enforcement of the Chinese exclusion law now treat the contraband Mongolian. From such a circumstance—one may well call it an impending disaster—we pray to be delivered!

The foregoing remarks serve to show how important it is that the friends of liberal immigration laws keep a close and strict watch on the doings of the Senate and House of Representatives at Washington. Public opinion should always make its voice heard by means of newspaper comment and by direct appeals to the representatives of this or that constituency. Those who believe, as we do, that this country is, and always has been, a refuge for the weak and oppressed of all the earth, are deeply grateful to the three gentlemen whose names we have given at the beginning of these remarks for their competent safeguarding of their interests.

Rabbi Magnes came to Congregation B'nai Jeshurun in April, 1911, and resigned his post there late in January, 1912. Mathematically speaking, then, he was with this synagogue one and one-half years—according to the American correspondent of *Die Welt*, the international Zionist weekly. Many things we have "learned" from this reporter of "news"; now we are under a debt of gratitude to him for showing us how figures are not what they seem.

Rabbi Spitz, the editor of *The Jewish Voice*, in a lengthy rejoinder to our strictures of his protest against the entrance of ethical culture Judaism into the communal organizations of St. Louis Jewry, undertakes a defence of himself and of his local community. We are free to assure our friend, Editor Spitz, that so far as he is concerned his defence is altogether unnecessary. We recognize in him one of the important factors in the religious and journalistic life of our co-religionists in the region from the Mississippi to the Pacific in this country. So far as his Jews go, we regret we again cannot see eye to eye with it. We entirely overlook his "modest" assertion that, "We dare say the Jews of St. Louis are the peers of any of their brethren in this or any other country, and this community is the equal of any community, religiously, socially, and intellectually." We prefer to let St. Louis Jewry, in default of the needed corrective, rise or fall by their example of a charitable fair held on our holy Sabbath!

## JUST A PURIM-THOUGHT

JUST a Purim-thought!

From this announcement the reader is not to expect a particularly merry thought. But is not the matter of Purim merriment a serious business with us Jews? Is it not indulged in through earnest and thoughtful compliance with the Law and its minutiae? Well then—where merriment becomes a subject for serious thought, there a serious thought may well become a subject for merriment. We may well get our special fun out of seriousness. A paradox, did you say? A small, midgety paradoxlet, indeed, compared with that Giant of all paradoxes: the Jewish Nation! Yes, the Jew is the Paradox of History! Were I not afraid of the charge of blasphemy, I should voice my suspicion that it must have been around Purim time that the Lord God created the Jew. And so here we are—the result of a divine Purim-jest! Born under such auspices, we came into the world with an invisible hunch of paradox on our back. We carry this burden through life and the burden lifts us up. Our crooked paradoxical back straightens us out....

No wonder they do not understand, us. Of course, you know whom I mean when I say they. If you know who we are, you must know who they are. They are constantly trying to straighten us out and, naturally, make us all the more crooked. For instance, their favorite orthopedic instrument is—the Cross! But is not the cross itself in its very shape—crooked? When the Cross, unaided, did not work, they picked out another instrument that was still more crooked—the Rack of the Inquisition! Other favorite and frequent instruments were crooked swords, crooked knives, crooked methods, crooked laws, crooked conversions! How did they ever hope to accomplish their self-chosen task? And how is it that they still cherish the hope of accomplishing it? The only straight thing in this crooked business is a consistent following of the line of crookedness. But they did not succeed and never will succeed. They never can succeed. And this simply because, never having understood the art and science of *Paradoxology*, they make a sorry job of it whenever they turn to it. You see, they are unlike ourselves. They were born straight—therefore they are crooked....

Take a classical example—*Haman*. He wanted to see Mordecai arch his back before him. But Mordecai, as the Bible tells us, kept a straight back, while all the world was bending down wherever and whenever Haman strutted past. Then, in punishment, Haman desired to straighten out Mordecai's back, by its own weight, on the gallows, while he himself would be doubled up with laughter. In order to encompass his dire purpose, he had to come to Ahasuerus and try to explain to him the Giant Paradox. How he must have stuttered and stammered while doing it! "There is a people—one though scattered, unique, different, this and that." At least, I imagine, his presentation must have run some what like this—just a series of hemming-and-hawing and by no means the smooth-flowing phrase found in the Bible; just a helpless, blundering, school-boyish grappling with a knotty problem. How could you expect Haman to grasp the meaning of the Giant Paradox? And yet, with the fiendish insight that ferocity sometimes gives, he realized that there was a paradox. Nay more, he even realized the seat of the paradox: it was not in Mordecai alone but in Mordecai's people! And Haman began to dream of curing the paradox wholesale. But what happened? Whose back was straightened in a peculiar perpendicular manner? And who was doubled up with laughter?

The Bible, as said, gives us an intelligible recession of what Haman tried to hammer into that impervious skull that harbored poor Ahasuerus' addled brains. "Their laws are different"—helps us to understand the paradox, to understand ourselves that is. "But the more they afflicted them, the more they multiplied and grew"—is a perfect expression of the paradox. The words taken from this week's portion, "pure olive oil beaten for light," have the same meaning according to our rabbis. The latter say that Israel is like unto the olive; the harder beaten and pressed the greater the yield of light-giving oil. You see, the Bible understands the paradox thoroughly. And since we understand the Bible fairly well—despite the effort of German theologians to befuddle us—we understand our national paradox fairly well. But they? How can they be expected to understand the Bible? And the result is that the Bible itself has become a great paradox. A Jewish book, the fruit of the undying genius of the Jew, the mirror of his soul and the reflection of his life, the Bible has been used by them against us! Whenever they tried to apply to us their perverse orthopedics, they first scanned the pages of the Bible to find the proper rules of procedure. And they said that they found them there. Whenever they consigned us to doom and damnation, they first intoned one of our Jewish Psalms, saying that our doom was written in them. According to Midrash, the Book and the Sword came down from heaven bound together. According to my view, the Bible itself proved the sharpest sword they wielded against us....

Ourselves a paradox, our life a paradox, our Book a paradox—are we not tired of *paradoxing* it for so many centuries? Tired? Yes a wee bit. However, perish the thought: it is just a Purim-thought....

sworn statement should be made  
when there is a covenant that the  
property is free and clear of all in-  
cumbrances; that no blanket mort-  
gage covers the land, and if there is  
one, that the lien of the mortgage has  
been released.

The number of provident people  
is legion who have invested there  
little all in well advertised lots in the  
suburbs, and after paying install-  
ment after installment, until the  
whole of the purchase price has been  
paid—then receive a full coven-  
ant and warrant deed—free and  
clear of all incumbrances, suddenly  
awake, often years after, to find a  
foreclosure suit begun because a  
blanket mortgage covered a whole  
plot in which their lots are located,  
and the seller or grantor—the house  
and land company or the like, ap-  
propriated the money paid by these  
small investors and failed to pay it  
over to the mortgagee to release his  
lots.

In many cases these irresponsible  
land concerns, always corporations,  
thriving under a State charter, are  
out of existence or operate in some  
other, or even adjacent, locality un-  
der a different corporate name, and  
thus the defrauded land owner has  
no redress.

Now and then one of these pur-  
chasers luckily consults a friend who  
suggests that he have some lawyer  
make a search, and the discovery of  
the failure of releasing the property  
from the lien of mortgage is made  
in time to confront these schemers  
with their fraud in delivering a deed  
free and clear when it is subject to  
the lien of a mortgage, and the threat  
of criminal proceedings, if the com-  
pany is still alive, makes the officer's  
hustle to get a release. But these in-  
stances are rare. In hundreds, if not  
thousands of cases, the so-called free  
and clear deeds are lies, the land be-  
ing subject to a mortgage incum-  
brance which is discovered too late.

Hence the State which grants  
charters to these companies ought to  
have a supervision over their opera-  
tions. This is just as necessary as  
running down the mail frauds.



work in forming their ideas of true worship. These customs are in great measure the result of being compelled to live within narrow limits and in constant dread of persecution with little or no opportunity to develop mind and character. We should also recognize the fact that our conception of religion would perhaps be no better if we had been oppressed in like manner.

A thoughtful writer says "Emancipation of the body often means enslavement of the soul." Let us teach the immigrant that "Liberty is not license," and to be grateful for the true blessings of freedom in this glorious country under the protection of the Stars and Stripes, and that religion counts for nothing unless its teachings are brought into daily life by correct conduct and adherence to truth, honor and strict integrity in all dealings with our fellowmen.

In a recent issue of one of our Jewish weeklies there appeared an article which deplored the fact that what is known as the "Christian spirit" is so prevalent in this city. The writer stated that it is very noticeable in the press, in public places, in the pulpit, and on the stage, and that we Jews should show our indignation and protest against it. I, for one, have no hesitation in stating that I am not at all in sympathy with this article, and feel confident that when I explain you will sympathize with my views.

As I understand it, the Christian spirit stands for culture, refinement and the higher things of life. If our Gentile neighbors succeed in making this spirit manifest everywhere, as a liberal-minded people, having been taught "Love thy neighbor as thyself," we should esteem and honor them for it. There is but one thing to do and that is to "get busy" and show by our conduct that the things we uphold and glory in are the noble aims of life and represent the true Jewish spirit. If we wish prejudice to disappear, let us so conduct ourselves that when the Jew is referred to, he shall not be spoken of as one who is purse-proud, arrogant, ostentatious, selfish and eager to indulge in lavish display of luxury, boisterous conduct and reckless extravagance. Let our Jewishness be characteristic of unassuming manners, modesty, simplicity, refinement, loyalty to faith, and patriotism; also earnest enthusiasm in the support of philanthropic, charitable and educational institutions.

Rather than find fault with the influence of the Christian spirit, we can well afford to profit by the example

How to Overcome Prejudice

it sets before us. For instance, in a recent address I called your attention to the fact that the sum of \$400,000 was raised not long ago with considerable enthusiasm in a comparatively short time by the Young Women's Christian Association of Brooklyn for a new home.

We have for years heard so much about the dangers that beset our Jewish boys and how important it is to provide for them opportunities for mental, moral, social and physical advancement. This is a great and noble work, but how about the trials and temptations that confront our girls and the importance of surrounding them with similar influences? Let us also see to it that good, old-fashioned Jewish manhood and chivalry are not lost sight of. For it teaches the young man that when he comes in contact with the innocent girl who is sent out into the world to earn an honest livelihood, that she is entitled to and should receive the same respect, courtesy, consideration and protection he would have shown his own sister, whether it be in the factory, department store, or counting room.

Some months ago the Young Women's Christian Association, of Boston, announced the erection of a new home, and with it came the statement that no young woman over thirty-five years of age would be entitled to receive their dormitory privileges. Letters appeared in the press inquiring if this was in line with Christian ideals to discriminate against any young woman because she had reached the age of thirty-five. In reply a splendid letter was published by the general secretary of the association which clearly explained the entire problem. The letter stated that the officers of the association appreciated the fact that the woman of thirty-five and over was just as good as her younger sister, and entitled to the same consideration, but the facilities of the new building were limited, and experience proved that thousands of young girls came to the city of Boston from neighboring towns attracted by the glowing accounts of opportunities to earn a livelihood there. Many failed to secure employment, some became ill and disheartened, others met with disappointment of all kinds, were stranded and penniless and surrounded with temptation. The institution felt that its first duty was to the younger girls less schooled in the ways of the world than their older sisters.



# CHILDREN'S PAGE.

## Purim

Dear Children:

Our beloved Sage Hillel in seeking to determine the causes that prevent one from obtaining knowledge came to the conclusion that the bashful will not become learned. The reason for that is that bashfulness is a vicious shame arising from the pride of one who would rather remain ignorant than show that he does not know a certain thing by asking about it, and if you do not ask you can never learn.

Our holy religion encourages you, dear children, to ask questions, and learn, for it is through your learning of the Torah, little innocent ones, that salvation comes to the Jewish people.

Thus it was with the miracle that God has performed for us on Purim, which we are about to celebrate with great rejoicing.

After Haman, the accursed descendant of Amalek, may his memory be blotted out from under the heavens, had succeeded in persuading the foolish King Mhasnerus to sign the decree ordering the people of every province of his kingdom to destroy, to kill, and to exterminate all the Jews, from young to old, little ones and women, on one day, on the thirteenth day of the twelfth month, which is the month Adar, and plunder their property as spoil; and Haman and his companions with the letters containing the decree went, rejoicing, to distribute them amongst the runners to the king's provinces; he saw Mordecai, who was walking ahead of him stop three Jewish children on their way home from the Jewish school and ask them the same questions; he quickly ran up to hear what Mordecai would ask them. "What verse did you learn to-day, my child," asked Mordecai of one child? "I have learned this verse," said the lad. "Thou needest not to be afraid of sudden dread, neither of the unlooked for tempest over the wicked when it cometh."

"And what did you learn, my child," asked Mordecai of the second lad? "The last verse I learned in the Jewish school to-day was, 'Take counsel together, yet it shall come to naught; speak the word, and it shall not stand firm; for with us is God.'" Said the third lad, "I have learned this verse. And even unto old age I am the same (says God), and, even unto the time of hoary hairs will I hear; I have done it, and I will carry you; even I will bear, and deliver you."

When Mordecai heard these words he was full of joy. "Why are you so joyful at the children's talk," demanded Haman?

And Mr. Schiff does not know yet why he was interrupted with roars of laughter, in which the Colonel joined.—Saturday Evening Post.
