

**A HERETIC**

By "EMILKRNSTINA."

"Well, and how are we this evening?" I asked of my friend Steibnitz after we had both seated ourselves in comfortable easy chairs and were enveloping the room in clouds of tobacco smoke.

"So, so. The earth moves, and I move."

"Apparently, since you are on it."

"Not so apparent either, my friend, for I may be moving relative to the sun but not to the ear—"

"Already on the warpath! Will you ever allow me to say anything without contradicting me? What is that book over yonder?"

"Pearson's 'Grammar of Science,' the new edition. A wonderful book that. It's the best thing on the subject that I know of."

"Pearson is a clever fellow, but I certainly don't agree with many things he tells us. The trouble is you scientists are so narrow-minded—"

"Ho, ho! That's a good one! Scientists narrow-minded!"

"I say they are, in spite of your derisive laughter. They would attempt to explain everything by so-called 'physical phenomena.' Now I am the last person to disparage the great value of the physical sciences; but when you make use of them to explain the universe, and life, and what not, why then I say that it's high time that you stop. The development of your science will undoubtedly tend to improve the material welfare of mankind, but it cannot hope to solve the riddle of the universe."

"Why? Simply because you say so, I suppose. Not that I claim for science what you say the scientists claim for it. We are indeed very far from being able to explain life and all that. Of course, such extremists as Jacques Loeb may say that the eonic theory will give one a true insight into life's process. But that's far from being an explanation. If anything, it tends to make the mystery still more mysterious. His researches into partheno-genesis prove nothing. But then again the collection of many such facts, and the proper systematization of them, may give us valuable data. You call me an unreasonable scientist; in reality, see how unreasonable you are. You say science cannot hope to solve the riddle of the universe, and you are satisfied that you have answered everything satisfactorily by merely making this statement. But that's hardly a reason. I, on the other hand, freely acknowledge that scientists are far from having solved these complex problems, but judging from the progress of the science in the past and the rapid progress it is now making, I do not see why the solution should lie beyond its realm. True, it may take a long time—a very long time.

"Still, you would suggest, as your confreres do, that we know enough to discard such a barbarity as religion, the remains of a bygone and

superstitious age, would you not?"

"No, I would not. But I certainly do think that science has shown us the necessity of casting our religious views into the refining furnace, and thereby getting rid of the many impurities adhering to them."

"And pray, what sort of a product are you going to get?"

"You wish me to foretell (as did that great chemist Mendeleeff) what the properties of this element, or compound, or what you will, are going to be?"

"To carry the metaphor so far, yes."

"Understand, these are going to be my views, and not necessarily the views of scientists in general. For, after all, upon such things as beliefs we can at best have but opinions. They are not subject to proof. However, reasonable men, men who are open to enlightenment, men who have had the advantages of a good education, men who have made it their business to keep abreast of the times, will probably be able to arrive at a more logical conclusion than others."

"Fire away!"

"In the first place we cannot regard religion as fixed. Time change eth all things, and time must change our religious views likewise. We have gradually developed from the lowest stages of barbarity to a high stage of development, and this process of development is going on, and there is no reason to believe that it will ever stop. The goal, of course, being the perfect man, but humanity knows not of perfection. The 'religious' man—meaning thereby the man who adheres strictly to the 'laws'—would have me follow word for word and letter for letter the rules and regulations as laid down by men thousands of years ago, who undoubtedly represented the highest state of development of their own time, but of their own time only. Of course, the 'religious' man will tell me that these laws are the laws of God. For him I can have no answer. I cannot disprove the view. I can simply maintain that such a view seems highly illogical to any thinking mind. The philosopher of old developed an idea of the universe, and embodied it in a religious code. The philosophy of to-day, rich with the fruits of past experience, sees things in a totally different light. Having passed through a longer evolutionary process, his mind can grasp ideas which were beyond that of his ancestor. One of the most important lessons that our philosopher has learnt is that everything is undergoing change. Religious views, then, must undergo changes, too. They require to be modified—modified with time, modified as the mind expands more and more, modified so as to fit the new knowledge gained. Nothing in this world of ours can remain stationary; it spells ruin. Progress is the watchword."



cupy yourselves with your more immediate surroundings. Don't aspire so high. Think of the world around you, and try to apply your reasoning mind to the betterment of present-day conditions. Emulate the physician who is constantly discovering new remedies, new cures, and not the ascetic, who leads a gloomy and secluded life, who is forever thinking of the Almighty above, of the world beyond; who is useless, and more than useless to his fellow beings. From this point of view the true man of religion is the physician.

"The scientist—the atheist."  
"Why confound the two? The moment you hear the word science you instantly think of atheism. Why should these two go together. In fact, they are very much apart. The genuine scientist can never be an atheist. He is devoutly religious in his own way—his study of Nature and his knowledge of it will make him religious. But he believes in religion adapting itself to the various discoveries which he makes. He believes in a religion which is flexible, which will alter with the alteration of things. As one scientist has expressed it: 'Religion should have the attribute of universality and of adaptability to the rapidly increasing stores of knowledge and power over nature acquired by the human race.'"  
"And elsewhere he says: 'It is bad for any people to stand still in their governmental conceptions and practices, or in the organization of their industries, or in any of the arts or trades, even the oldest; but it is much worse for a people to stand still in their religious conceptions and practices.'"

"And you flatter yourself that these views are going to predominate?"

"I have no doubt of it. One has but to glance over the history of the human race during the past fifty years to see the wonderful changes that have come over us. Despite your theological railings the philosophy of evolution is conquering the world. Despite your persistency in regarding the Bible as the book of all books, inspired by God himself, the tendency more and more is to view it as a book among many others—a book which undoubtedly represents the highest culture of the age in which it was written, but which is very imperfect at best, and should be as subject to criticism as any other. Man is no longer afraid to apply common sense to these things. He is beginning to claim the right to think for himself. He rebels against authority—against the teaching of any church. He allows himself to be advised, but the imperial command of 'Thus says the Lord' no longer frightens him."

## ITEMS OF INTEREST IN THE JEWISH WORLD.

Jewish residents of Tuscaloosa, Ala., have decided to build a synagogue.

A State charter has been granted to the Hebrew Institute of Perth Amboy, N. J.

Rabbi Bennett Grad has resigned his pulpit in Greenville, Miss., and taken up work in Austin, Tex.

The twelfth annual convention of the Federation of Canadian Zionists will be held in Ottawa on June 30.

The Russian anti-Semites are demanding the enforcement of a law prohibiting Jews to employ Christian servants.

The Paradise Country Home for Jewish Working Girls will be opened next week at Mount Washington, Md.

The Russian authorities have confiscated the Bessarabskaya Sizin for an article against the anti-Jewish May laws.

Professor Israel Gollancz will be Secretary of the International Historical Congress, which is to be held in London next year.

The Ladies Friendship Society, of Sioux City, Iowa, is making a campaign for funds with which to establish free Hebrew schools.

It has transpired in the Duma that the Jewish prisoners at the Tobolsk penal servitude jail are compelled every day to read Christian prayers.

Rabbi Levi Shandman, formerly of Marshall, Tex., has assumed the duties of Assistant Professor of Sociology at the University of Chicago.

The Hebrew Sunday School Association, of Philadelphia, Pa., has just closed its seventy-fourth year. Four thousand pupils were enrolled last year.

A convention of Young Men's Hebrew Associations will be held in Rochester, N. Y., in July, and delegates from every association in the country will be invited.

Rev. Dr. Joseph Stolz, of Isaiah Temple, Chicago, Ill., has been invited to open one of the sessions of the Republican National Convention with prayer.

It is a fact worthy of note that the baccalaureate sermons delivered Sunday before the graduating classes of Louisiana's two universities were preached by rabbis.

The Young Men's Hebrew Associations of Buffalo, Rochester and Syracuse, N. Y., will hereafter be known as the Inter-city Alliance of Jewish Young Men's Associations.

The State authorities have granted a charter to the Ladies' Union Aid Association of Providence, R. I., to establish and maintain a home for aged and infirm Hebrews.

The Beth-El Congregation, of Philadelphia, Pa., have called as their rabbi, Rev. Ludwig Roeder, who graduated from the Jewish Theological Seminary last week.

At their annual convention just concluded at Providence, R. I., the Independent Order of Brith Sholom voted to levy a charity assessment of 9 cents per member. This will yield a fund of \$3,150 annually for charitable purposes.

Mr. E. F. Loewe, of London, Eng., a native of Diersburg, in Baden, has bequeathed \$5,000 to the community of Karlsruhe and \$4,500 in trust for the poor at Diersburg.

The pupils of the religious school of the Hoboken, N. J., Hebrew Institute, have organized a charitable society to be known as the Isidor and Ida Straus Charitable Society.

A unique conference of rabbis and others from various parts of Europe was held last month at Kattowitz, Russia, for the purpose of promoting Orthodox traditional Judaism.

Rabbi B. C. Ehrenreich, of Montgomery, has been elected president of the Alabama Home for Incurables, a non-sectarian organization, just perfected in Montgomery.

The Worcester (Mass.) Associated Hebrew Charities have adopted plans for the erection of a building for their own use. It will be two stories high, 40 feet wide and 100 feet deep.

To celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary as rabbi of the Congregation Shaare Emeth of St. Louis, Mo., the members have presented Rev. Samuel Sale with a check for \$2,000.

Miss Hattie Motzma, of Goldsboro, N. C., recently won a competitive essay in the Department of History of the State Normal School. Her subject was "The Jews of North Carolina."

The provinces of Podolia and Volhynia, in Russia, are literally besieged by anti-Semitic agitators, who, with the aid of the police, incite the peasants to demand the expulsion of Jews.

Last year the United Hebrew Benevolent Association, of Boston, Mass., cared for 492 families, aiding 845 adults and 1,394 children. The society will soon celebrate its golden jubilee.

A Jewish paper will be issued in Minneapolis and St. Paul beginning this week. It will be known as "The Jewish Weekly of the Twin Cities," and will be edited by Rabbi S. N. Deinard.

The Philadelphia, Pa., Jewish Consumptives' Institute will inaugurate a night clinic for the benefit of those who are afflicted with tuberculosis and are compelled to work in the daytime.

The Alliance Young Men's Hebrew Association Summer Camp, comprising about 600 acres near Cold Spring, N. Y., together with the Neustadt memorial building, will be dedicated on June 30.

Rabbi Max Raisin, of Meridian, Miss., has received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from the University of Mississippi. This is the first time that a Mississippi rabbi has been so honored.

The Supreme Court of Massachusetts has decided in favor of the local section in the injunction suit brought by the National Council of Jewish Women to restrain the Boston section from seceding.

Enrico Caruso, who is at present in Paris, announces that he has discovered what he believes an extraordinary voice. The possessor is Miss Bessie Hymans, a New York girl, studying singing in Paris. The tenor has chosen Miss Hymans' teachers and is directing her studies. Miss Hymans at one time was soloist in a New York synagogue.

Gen. Morris Horkheimer, of Wheeling, W. Va., died in Atlantic City on the 22d. ult. General Horkheimer was widely known and his funeral was attended by many ex-Governors and other notables.

The Khedive of Egypt has arrived at Alexandria and will spend some time at his summer palace. His Highness received the chief rabbi and expressed his cordial sentiments for the Jewish community.

Jan Blockx, the famous Dutch composer, died at Antwerp on May 22. His "Princess D'Auberge" was produced by Oscar Hammerstein at the Manhattan Opera House, New York city, a few years ago.

A movement is on foot among the Jewish residents of the New Jersey coast to erect a National Memorial Synagogue at Elberon in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Isidor Straus, who maintained their summer home at that place.

M. Andre Hesse, a member of the Chamber of Deputies, has been appointed as the counsel of the French Government at the tribunal of The Hague in connection with the dispute between France and Italy on the Manouba affair.

Rev. Aaron C. Levinson, who has been a rabbi in Baltimore, Md., for the past quarter of a century, died last Saturday. Rabbi Levinson, who came to this country from Russia thirty-one years ago, was well known for his scholarship and erudition.

The dismissal of the Jew Kanegisser from the post of Director of the Nicolaieff shipbuilding yards and docks, and the appointment of Admiral Bostrem as his successor, have resulted in the decision to dismiss all the Jewish employees at the port.

The University of Cincinnati has conferred upon a Jewess, Miss Frances Kohnky, the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy. Miss Kohnky, who is a public school teacher, of Cincinnati, is the first woman upon whom the university has conferred this degree.

Mr. Leon Gaster, the editor of the Illuminating Engineer, and Hon. Secretary of the Illuminating Engineer Society, has been nominated a member of the Council of the Institution of Electrical Engineers in Germany for the years 1912, 1913 and 1914.

Rabbi Samuel Hirschberg has been re-elected as one of the four governors of the City Club, the leading civic organization of Milwaukee, Wis. Rabbi Hirschberg, who is the only minister holding office in the club, received the highest number of votes cast.

The report circulated in the general press that the Mellah in Marrakesh has been pillaged is not true. Perfect tranquility reigns there. The Jews in Marrakesh have, it is true, had one or two panics, but panics have been experienced in other parts also, including Mogador.

District Grand Lodge, No. 5, I. O. B. B., will erect a monument at Washington, D. C., in memory of the late Isidor Straus. A separate shaft to the memory of Mrs. Straus will most likely also be erected as a tribute to "Jewish Motherhood."

The death in Paris is announced of Mme. Edouard Andre, the widow of the French financier, at the age of 72. Mme. Andre, whose maiden name was Nelje Jacquemart, enjoyed before her marriage a considerable reputation as a painter, especially of portraits.

Mr. Samuel Strauss, who was at one time publisher of the New York Globe, has become associated in the management of the New York Times. It is rumored that the Times is about to issue an evening edition, which will be in charge of Mr. Strauss.

A large number of Jews, including emigrants from Russia, have been employed in the construction of the Panama Canal. There is a cosmopolitan Jewish population in Panama, among them being natives of the West Indies, France, Germany, Morocco and Syria.

The Federation of American Zionists has received information direct from the Hebrew Gymnasium of Jaffa denouncing as false recent reports to the effect that Dr. Benzion Mossinsohn, who was recently in the United States, had been dismissed from the Gymnasium as professor.

Commercial Privy Councillor Emil Jacob, an active public worker in Berlin, died last month at the age of sixty-seven. He was otherwise distinguished for his generosity to the poor. The Empress was represented at the funeral by one of her chamberlains, who placed a wreath on the coffin.

Philadelphia, Pa., Jewish charities will receive \$75,000 and non-Jewish charities \$15,000 by the will of Samuel Kohn, of that city, probated June 3. The bequests are to be held in trust by Simon I. Kohn, a brother, who is empowered to select the charities which will become the beneficiaries.

The Russian Ministry contemplates disfranchising a number of Jews at the coming Duma elections by inducing the Senate to declare that Jews outside the Pale, who only possess a temporary right of domicile (e. g., the dentists, artisans and medical assistants), should not be allowed to vote.

A Jewish merchant named Haim Cohen has been murdered at Canea (the capital of Crete) by a pistol fired by an individual whom the police have failed to discover. There are about one hundred Jewish families in the island, about sixty of whom reside in Canea and the remainder in the villages.

The executive of the International Hygienic Exhibition held last year in Dresden, has conferred on Rabbi Dr. Max Grunwald, of Vienna, who organized the Jewish section, the honorary diploma for scientific co-operation in the historical section, as a permanent memento of his valuable work.

The Freundschaft Club, which is the largest Jewish German club in New York city, has bought a large plot of ground on Seventh avenue and Fifty-fourth street, on which they will erect a new clubhouse, vacating the present home which they have occupied for over a quarter of a century.

Rabbi M. M. Eichler, for the past six years in charge of the Ohabel Shalom Congregation in Boston, Mass., has been elected rabbi of the B'nai Jeshurun Congregation, of Cleveland, O. Rabbi Eichler is a native of Hungary and the majority of the Cleveland Congregation are natives of that country.

Under the auspices of the Women's Propaganda and Organizing Committee, a Conference of Women Zionist Societies took place last Sunday at Zion Hall, Bedford street, Liverpool. The conference was attended by delegates from Dublin, Glasgow, Newcastle, Cardiff, Swansea, Leeds, Liverpool and Manchester.

The Jewish colonists in the Argentine Republic were informed from the headquarters of the Jewish Colonial Association (I. C. A.) at Paris that clear deeds will be granted them on all land they are now occupying. This step will do away with much of the unpleasant feeling that existed between the I. C. A. and the colonists.

Recently there took place in Berlin an international Jewish gymnastic fete, the first of its kind. Much interest was centered on a football match between Jewish societies in Berlin, Hamburg and Budapest. There is an international organ-

ization of Jewish gymnastic societies in Germany, Austria, Hungary, Switzerland, Bulgaria and Palestine.

The work of transferring the 1,000 children of the Hebrew Sheltering Guardian Society from their present home to the new cottage colony at Pleasantville, N. Y., is now in progress, and will be completed by the 24th inst. The plant, which cost over \$900,000, includes sixteen cottages, three school buildings, a power house, laundry, infirmary, storage house and superintendent's home.

The New York Federation of Russian and Polish Jews is planning a new Jewish hospital for New York city. The hospital will be known as the Beth David Hospital and will be located at Lexington avenue and 113th street. It will be eight stories high, built of brick, and will cost about \$150,000. The federation at present has 175 societies, with a membership of over 30,000.

Many New York Jewish charities are benefited through the will of the late Hezekiah Kohn, who died a few weeks ago. The Hebrew Sanatorium received \$1,000 and other institutions remembered are the Home for Aged Hebrews; Montefiore Home, Hebrew Orphan Asylum, Mt. Sinai Hospital and the North American Relief Society for Indigent Jews in Palestine.

To what absurdities the Russian anti-Jewish laws may lead can be judged by the fact that the Anti-Consumption League will be compelled to present a special petition to the government to obtain a permit for consumptive Jews to live in any sanatorium situated outside the town, "in view of the difficulties such ailing Jews meet there at present, and having regard to the impossibility of erecting institutions for consumptive patients in the towns where the air is congested."

Subedar Sardar Major Bahadur Isaac Samuel Jawlikar died on the 4th ult. at Thana (a town about twenty-one miles distant from Bombay), at the age of 92. He was a captain of the 103d Light Infantry, and distinguished himself in the wars with the Punjab, and was present at the battle of the Gujeab. He was also in Abyssinia and in China when troubles broke out there. The funeral took place with military honors, and was attended by many of the deceased's coreligionists from Bombay.

The Rev. A. P. Bender, of Capetown, South Africa, gave evidence at considerable length before a Tuberculosis Commission recently appointed by the government, and showed that the Jews in that country enjoyed comparative immunity from the disease. This immunity he attributed partly to their dietary laws, which although restrictive were unquestionably of hygienic value, partly to their temperate habits and partly to the extraordinary care which they bestowed on their children in infancy and early childhood in respect of adequate feeding and clothing.

The British Government appointed Sir Rufus Isaacs, the Attorney-General, as a member of the Cabinet on Tuesday. An Attorney-General never before has been included in the Cabinet. An official explanation says this act is not intended to create a precedent, but that it is intended as a personal compliment to Sir Rufus. No further explanation is given. The step emphasizes the rapid political rise of the Attorney-General. He has been a Liberal member of Parliament for Reading since 1904. He was appointed Attorney-General in 1910, was created a knight in the same year and a Privy Councillor in 1911. He was born in 1860.

Senator Edouard Millaud, who has taken a prominent part in French politics since the establishment of the Third Republic, died last month at the age of seventy-eight. He was appointed First Advocate General at the Court of Lyons, and in July, 1871, he was elected a member of the National Assembly and held his seat until its dissolution. The first division of Lyons sent him to the Chamber of Deputies in 1876, and four years later the same city returned him to the Senate, in which he sat uninterruptedly until his death, a period of thirty-two years. He held Cabinet office twice as Minister of Public Works, first under M. de Freycinet and later under M. Goblet. M. Millaud on several occasions also served as President or Vice-President of Parliamentary and Exert-Parliamentary Commissions.





# NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

(Exclusive Correspondence to THE HEBREW STANDARD.)

**More About the Sassoons—Maccabees in Convention—Dr. Gaster on Zionism—Two Tales from Russia—Great Jewish Tragic Actress in London.**

London, May 31, 1912.

The death of Sir Edward Sassoon, which was chronicled in last week's HEBREW STANDARD, has recalled the history of the Sassoon family. They are one of the oldest Jewish families as well as one of the most distinguished. The first member to obtain distinction was David Sassoon, who was born at Bagdad in 1792, and who died at Bombay in 1864. His father was a wealthy Mesopotamian merchant, who was for many years State Treasurer of the Turkish Governor of Bagdad and was known as the "Prince of the Captivity." In 1832 David Sassoon visited Bombay, where, in due course, he established the famous house, David Sassoon & Co., which was destined to achieve such great importance in the commercial world. Branches were established at Calcutta, Shanghai, Canton and Hong Kong, the business including a monopoly of the opium trade. His sons acted as his agents, and connections were quickly formed in this manner with Yokohama, Nagasaki and other cities in Japan.

Great as was the firm's reputation in commercial circles it was greater in the realm of practical philanthropy. Benefactions were made on a large scale, and soon the family were regarded as the benefactors of all Jews in Turkey, China, Japan, India and Persia. In Bombay and Poona splendid synagogues were built and endowed, the sailors' homes at Bombay and Hong Kong were generously supported, famine funds found in the firm munificent contributors, and numerous institutions owed their existence to the founder of the firm, among them being the Mechanics' Institute at Bombay and the Reformatory and Industrial Institution for Juvenile Offenders. Sir Albert Sassoon, father of Sir Edward, followed the lead given him by his father and continued the munificent benefactions of the firm.

Sir Edward Sassoon, it is worth pointing out, entered Parliament at a by-election, which counts as an important day in English Jewish history. It is the only Parliamentary election that has taken place in which both candidates were Jews. His opponent was the late Sir Israel Hart. Sir Edward Sassoon was not an active communal worker, but he enjoyed a popularity second only to that of Lord Rothschild. The mystic Eastern glamour which surrounded the history of the Sassoon family and the friendship reposed in it by King Edward may have been responsible for this, but it was well known that Sir Edward was deeply interested in the welfare of his co-religionists. His purse was ever open, to such an extent, indeed, that he gave assistance to movements with which he had no sympathy. The Sassoons, by the way, are the only Anglo-Jewish titled folk who have a motto in Hebrew in their arms. Their crest is "On a mount vert, a fern brake surmounted by a dove volant, having in the beak a laurel branch all proper," and their motto means "Speak thy word to the people." The Montefiore baronetage has the word "Jerusalem" in Hebrew on its crest.

The Order of Ancient Maccabees has just held a meeting in connection with the sixth convention of the order in London. Grand Commander Herbert Bentwich in a speech recalled the history of the order and said that for thirteen years it had stood as the representative of that old ideal of the Paoli Zionists—the promotion of practical work in the Holy Land, and they had the satisfaction of seeing all parties united in this programme. By their steadfast adherence to this programme—the programme of the first Basle congress—they had in the newly formed Zionist societies and the old Paoli Zionists a combination of forces that could never be separated. It was by relying on the practical work programme that they had the best hope of winning over those who had been holding aloof. There were those who would remember when all the leaders of Anglo-Jewry rallied to the cause of the resettlement of their people in Jerusalem, and they had longed for the time when they might have a definite programme of work which would induce all Jews to come in and help their ideal. Their duty was to see that the administration set up at the last Zionist congress should have a fair chance of success, to see that they had the means to carry out the duties laid to its charge. The end could not be secured without the means.

The Zionist movement was not a philanthropic movement. One of the things which it sought to accomplish was the introduction into the land not merely of those suffering from persecution in

Russia, Galicia and other countries, but in gathering together other sections of their brethren who had been dispersed for 2,000 years, and forming a rallying point for all sections of Jewry. One of the new elements in Palestine consists of people who after the dispersion went out into the Arabian desert and settled in the land of Yemen, and these people were now one of the most fruitful elements of their organization. The new administration had successfully settled many thousand Yementes throughout the various settlements in the Holy Land.

Mr. Bentwich further showed that the extension of the Maccabean movement had been marvelous. The order had doubled its members during the past two years. The National Insurance act was going to be a blessing in disguise. Since the passing of the act the order had received many applications from existing friendly societies to come into their organization as declared Zionists; and it would not be long before their members, which at present were little fewer than 2,000, would reach the requisite number of 5,000 necessary to become a national institution under the act.

Dr. Gaster, Haham, of the Spanish and Portuguese congregation, who was present as an honorary member, said that he was glad to see the various Zionist forces joining hands for work, but he would be failing in his duty if he gave a tacit consent to all that was going on. They had been priding themselves on the fact that a more friendly feeling now existed toward the movement. Had it not been at the cost of strongly expressed Zionist views? Had they not toned those views down to make them palatable to the jaded taste of those outside? It was a serious problem, and he was not a man of compromise. Practical Zionism was admirable, but it was not all. Practical work was only the laying of the foundation stone for the great political work which was before them. He was glad to see the revival of the Hebrew language in Palestine, and the economic work—the work of the Bezalel—was admirable, but that was not Zionism entirely. If they went to Palestine and dotted colonies here and there, that was admirable work, but if they took these colonies and planted them next to one another that was much better, for they were creating a Jewish province.

A correspondent who has been in Russia tells us that Jews have odd surprises in that country. The other day a man was arrested on a charge of blasphemy in Kieff, the city where the trial of another Jew for sacrificing a Christian child is to take place. The blasphemer had gone on some business to the house in which the chancery of the General Governor is situated and had happened to meet Prince Erestoff, an official on the staircase. His Highness shouted to him to go away and told the hall porter with some asperity to be careful not to let any more Jews into the place. The offender meekly replied that, after all, Christ was a Jew. The Prince then sent notice to the police that the man was to be charged with blasphemy, and, as a matter of fact, the statement of a plain fact has cost him a week in prison, for the court decided that the remark he made, in the mouth of a Jew, was blasphemous. Princes, policemen and judges, of course, are all good Christians.

The phonograph is very popular in Russia, and in St. Petersburg, at the earnest entreaty of the business community, the Chief of Police had to forbid its use during the busy hours of the day. The other day the Holy Synod discovered that records of Orthodox Church music were being sold in the shops, and that in many cases the owners were Jews. The matter was solemnly discussed by the ecclesiastical dignitaries who make up that body, and it was decided to ask the police to forbid all Jews to sell records of church music. The police went one better; they went round to the Jewish shops and seized all records of "sacred" music and rescued them from unhallowed hands.

A personality renowned in two continents as the leading tragic actress of the Yiddish-speaking world has just arrived in London from New York and opened a season on May 24 at White-chapel's new Yiddish theatre. This is Mme. Feinman, widow of the Jewish actor-manager of that name, with whom she played the principal feminine parts until his sudden death during a rehearsal in Russia not long ago.

As a matter of fact, Madame Feinman, who is considerably younger than her late husband, was to have opened London's new Yiddish theatre. Unfortunately, however, she had to go through a serious operation just at the time, and was not able to act at all for some four months. Her first care since her recovery has been to visit the London Ghetto, where she spent her childhood and made her first appearance on the stage.

Although she has not had the long struggle with starvation of which Mr. Feinman used to tell, her life has been a romance in its own way. She was born of poor Jewish parents in Russia, and came with them in exile to this country

when she was nine years old, the youngest of five children. None of the family, of course, knew a word of English, but a compatriot found the father a place in a little tobacconist's shop in Spitalfields, and there they settled.

"As you can understand," said Mme. Feinman to a newspaper representative who had a talk with her on May 24, "we were none too rich, and the only schooling I had in England was a year and a half at the Jewish Free School. My father and mother were very strict orthodox Jews, and they had a sterner disregard for the theatre than most English Puritans. I had hardly heard of a theatre—much less entered one—until I was thirteen.

"It was then that I happened to see a paragraph in a Yiddish paper to the effect that young Jewish girls were wanted for some performances given by Jacob Adler, at the Prince's Club, in Brick Lane. There was, of course, no Yiddish theatre then, and this club was the nearest thing to it of which the Ghetto could boast. Without saying a word to my father or mother I applied. I did not want particularly to go on the stage. My sole reason was to try to earn something, however little, to help my father and mother.

"At first, of course, I only got a very small part, but Mr. Adler thought I had talent. He very soon promoted me to be 'leading lady' of the little company. He even went to my father and persuaded him to let me go on the stage altogether, instead of going in for business, as was intended.

"It was a rough little stage, of course, at the Prince's Club—just a room and a curtain—and I don't think any prince ever went there. But I often look back with tenderness to those old days in Spitalfields. We used to play quite serious plays, such as adaptations from Schiller, and I remember vividly playing 'Leah the Forsaken' in Yiddish quite as a girl.

"The rest is simply told. Mr. Adler went to America after a while and took me with him. There I met Mr. Feinman, who was already famous, and became his leading lady and his wife. As you know, the Yiddish-speaking public in New York is far larger and richer than it is here. It supports four theatres and fifteen music halls of its own. But even though my father and mother are now in America, I still have a very warm corner in my heart for dear old London.

"My last tour with my husband was, of course, in Russia. I was with him when he died—and I am glad to say that we found the condition of our people very much improved there since the 'pogrom.' They seemed comparatively prosperous wherever we went, and every large town has a more or less flourishing Yiddish theatre. We traveled as American citizens, and had no trouble whatever with the authorities."

As has been said, Mme. Feinman's trend upon the stage is tragedy. Ophelia and Desdemona are her favorite parts in Shakespearean adaptations. Off the stage she is wholly cheery and genial—a pleasant little body with chestnut hair and rich natural complexion. She brings with her her daughter, who takes the "soubrette" parts. These are generally to be found even in the most serious Yiddish plays. As Mme. Feinman observed, "Our people like a dash of everything—to laugh and cry both in one evening."

Mme. Feinman appeared on May 24

before a crowded audience in "The Orphan," a tragedy of Jewish life, by J. Gordon, and later on will produce Israel Zangwill's play, "The Melting Pot."

The Zionists attach considerable importance to the recent election of Dr. S. A. Hirsch, of Jews' College, London, as president of the English Federation of Zionists. Well they may! In no other Western land, unless it be in our own, has Zionism latterly been under so total an eclipse.

A local Zionist suffers from the delusion that the German-speaking Zionists of this city can be united into an organization to aid in the spread and development of their cause. The German-speaking Zionists could probably be so united if there were German-speaking Zionists here.

For the first time perhaps in the history of the Masonic fraternity in the Empire State a considerable number of brethren of the house of Israel have been appointed to high office by the Grand Master. We note with satisfaction, too, that they have been rewarded with "working" and not merely ornamental posts, a testimony to their zeal and fidelity in the cause of this eminently praiseworthy institution.

The means to combat the inroads of Christian Science among our people lie at hand. They simply and solely are to provide a thoroughgoing and truly Jewish education for our children. More than this, however, our houses of worship should be kept open throughout the year. The orthodox Jews do not err in this regard, but, to their shame be it noted, the Reformers think that God looks out for and protects His creatures only during eight months of the year.

The modern school of German Jewish novelists has latterly devoted some attention to depicting the lives and doings of baptized Jews. This is a recurring enterprise, for previously this facet of life occupied their notice. But now their treatment is not flattering; quite the reverse. The *meshummodim* to the third and fourth generation are held up to the unmitigated reproach of all good men and true, and thus these writers prove their own sound common sense.

The advocates of the restriction of immigration in the committee of the House of Representatives, where the Dillingham bill as enacted by the Senate was "scotched," succeeded in having the equally objectionable Burnett bill substituted for the altogether indefensible Senate measure. Judge Goldfogle announces that he will fight the passage of the Burnett bill; if it be reported out, on the floor of the House to the uttermost limits of his strength. Good! We wish Representative Goldfogle well. He is in a fight for the traditional American principles.

*Die Welt*, the international Zionist weekly, has begun the publication of a series of "Letters from New York." In the first of these the writer holds up to condign contempt the chauvinistic policies of our Reformed rabbis. Unfortunately for the argument sought to be derived therefrom the Reformed pronouncements are contrasted with the "work" of the "great and glorious" *Kehillah*. Our readers have often heard of such distinctions as are without a difference. They now have the opportunity to read of and thus perceive a contrast without opposing elements.

Apropos of the recent graduation exercises of the Jewish Theological Seminary, we note that one of its new rabbis has been selected to office in Philadelphia, in a congregation which is about as far from the professed objects of the seminary as it is near to those of the Cincinnati College. Moreover, we are told that in the aforesaid congregation "during the summer, there will be no services." The meaning of it all is inevitable, particularly in view of what the seminary's president said and constantly reiterates in his charge to the graduates of that institution. Profession and practice seem to be entirely different nowadays, nor dare we expect any explanation from the seminary authorities. Dumb silence is their invariable answer to anything and to everything.

## LOOK ON THIS PICTURE

THE picture which appears on the first page of this issue furnishes an interesting object lesson to the student of Jewish conditions in the world to-day. It will be noted that our illustration depicts the persecuted and down-trodden Jews of Fez, Morocco, who have taken refuge in the empty cages of the wild animals in the menagerie to save themselves from the Mohammedan oppressor.

While our sympathies naturally go out in fullest measure to these our unfortunate co-religionists, the fact remains that as soon as France took active hold of the internal government of Morocco the troubles of the Moroccan Jews ceased at once. While the Sultan's government, or rather misgovernment, of his country rendered the Jews at all times the legitimate prey of every rapacious Mussulman who could wreak his diabolical vengeance upon them, when one of the powers of civilized Europe stepped in order was immediately evolved out of chaos and perfect security and tranquility guaranteed to every peaceable inhabitant of the land.

Here is something for our friends the Zionists to ponder. They contend, and their movement derives considerable stimulus from the suggestion, that in countries where the Jews are persecuted there is no possible relief or escape for our brethren in faith. These must hence go to Palestine to create there and build up and maintain a public, legally secured home for the Jewish people. Russia, Roumania and Morocco are not secure or comfortable places of habitation for the Jews. Away! To the East! There is the Jewish haven of refuge!

In the light of what French intervention in the Empire of Morocco has accomplished arguments such as these are peruerile. Morocco was, and, perhaps is, a country in which Jews resident therein are persecuted. But if this objectionable abiding place remains under the suzerainty of the French, although they had their Dreyfus case, Jewish persecution in Morocco is wholly at an end. Morocco, as a French protectorate, is as safe and comfortable for a Jew as is England, France or America.

The argument, then, of the Zionists that Zionism offers us the only corrective of persecution of the Jews falls to the ground with so resounding a thud that naught is left of it.

If we call the attention of our readers to recent articles in *The New York Herald* on the subject of the gangs with which some sections of our metropolis are infested it is because these are couched in the usual style our contemporary adopts in such matters. Wherever the *Herald* has what it pleases to call an opportunity to show how Jews are addicted (?) to criminality that idea is worked up to the fullest extent. The criminals *in spe* are labeled as Jews when, as often is the case, they are not Jews at all. The *Herald* of all daily journals, because it is so munificently patronized by the members of this community, ought to accept the recent ruling of the Associated Press in this connection. Cannot we bring our own community to a realizing sense of these persistent and flagrant violations of the ethics of journalism by the *Herald* to the end that their altogether disproportionate use of its advertising columns cease?

William Morris, the enterprising *impresario* of the equally enterprising Sirota, in defending his *protégé* from the charge of committing *Chillul ha-Shem*, in *The Jewish Chronicle*, cited the Rev. Stephen S. Wise as proof positive of the value and effectiveness of Sirota's performance. For did not the reverend gentleman leave a sick bed to occupy a box at a Sirota concert in this city lately? This tempted a reader of our London contemporary to ask the proper and sensible question: Would Dr. Wise have occupied a seat in a synagogue to hear Sirota? For the answer we pause; we have no desire to put a sentiment of any nature into the pastor's mouth. The opinion, however, expressed by the London writer that Dr. Wise has a poor opinion of *Chazonuth* because at the Free Synagogue the *chazan* is *non est*, will not hold. At the Free Synagogue there is as yet no *chazan* because the exchequer will not permit this extravagance!

Two of the papers presented at the National Conference of Jewish Charities, which concluded its sessions on Wednesday at Cleveland, seem to us to call for special comment. The first of these is the very elaborate and wholly adequate report on the problem of desertion, as to which the conference has already done such excellent work in the past. Monroe M. Goldstein, the writer of this paper, shows how of late years the Jewish deserters have not been allowed to escape without punishment. By the co-operation of a number of agencies, chiefly those of publicity, the decamping deserter has almost invariably been apprehended and brought to book. Thus the newer methods of dealing with offenders of this class, as well as the recently created tribunals for such, have altogether justified their existence. Into the details of this brilliant excursus, space forbids us from entering. Suffice it to direct our readers' attention to the papers of this conference, once they appear in print. The other paper is one that intimately concerns the newer profession of the paid social worker. It is on pensions and annuities for Jewish social workers and is written by Prof. H. L. Sabsovich, one of our leaders in this field. If the paid social worker among our people has come to stay, there is no reason why his livelihood and future should not be as well guarded as those of any other laborer, for he is eminently a laborer (in the highest and most dignified sense of that word) who is worthy of his hire.

## STANDING BETWEEN THE LIVING AND THE DEAD

ייעמד בין המתים ובין החיים ותעצר המגפה

"And he stood between the living and the dead and the plague was stayed." (Num. xvii, 13).

OUR text suggests a picture worthy of the brush of a Rembrandt. There stands Aaron in the midst of the plague-stricken people, a majestic figure clad in the garbs of priestly purity, holding aloft the burning censer, confident and unshaken while terror has every one in its grip, wrestling prayerfully with the spirit of destruction until the plague is stayed. Round about him lie in heaps the dead and the dying, whose ghastly faces reflect the horror of the last moments; the living, too, crowd up to him appealing ever so pitifully for help. To whom shall he turn first? Whose needs shall he first minister unto? To the needs of the dead and dying, or the needs of the living?

Aaron ministers unto both. He stands *between* the living and the dead. He cheers here, he consoles there, and dispenses healing everywhere. His magic presence blunts the sting of death, inspires courage and faith. The very agony of the battle against the Angel of Death is mitigated; and, finally, Death is routed—the plague is stayed.

I fancy that I recognize in Aaron as he stands there between the living and the dead, the ever-living Genius of Judaism. Holding aloft the burning censer of Religion, does not this deathless Genius stand at all times between the dead and the living? On the one hand, massed behind Him in silent array, there are the generations and generations of faithful Jews and Jewesses whose life had been a continuous sacrifice for Judaism. The Genius of Judaism looks at them and is profoundly moved by the thought of the martyrdom which the great dead have had to endure. On the other hand, thronging before Him in teeming multitudes, there are the children of the present, the living who are still engaged in the battle against evil, who oft grow weary and faint-hearted with the heat and the horror of the combat. To them, too, the heart of the Guardian-Angel of Judaism goes out in infinite pity.

I fancy that the Genius of Judaism as He stands there "between the dead and the living," between the Past and Present, is Himself a prey to a keen inner struggle whose anguish no tongue can tell. The Genius would fain shield both the dead and the living. But whom shall He turn to first? Whose needs shall he first minister unto? Whose appeal shall he first hearken to? There come to Him the voices of the martyrs of the past lifted up in fervent prayer that the life they have led, the life for whose sake such sacrifices of blood were brought, may be continued through the devotion of the living. There come to Him the thousand and one voices of the living—voices so insistent and powerful that they well-nigh drown the voices of the dead—asking that they be permitted to partake of the life of the present, the life that surges round about them, the life whose pulse throbs in accord with their own heartbeat. What shall the Guardian-Angel do? The appeal of the dead is for the Past, the plea of the living is for the Present. Death struggles with life. Yesterday battles with To-day. Heredity is locked in combat with Environment. The pale, ghostly shimmer of Days Gone by wrestles with the broad, blazing light of Actuality....

What shall He do? "The wrath has gone forth, the destruction has begun." Surely both the living and the dead have legitimate claims. The dead command reverence and respect; they have a right to expect that the spiritual bequest left by the ancestors shall not be neglected, let alone abandoned by the descendants. The living demand consideration and sympathy; they have a right to expect that the struggle for existence shall be made lighter for them; that the new impulses germinating in their soul, prompting them to spontaneous work and original activity such as the forefathers had never undertaken, should be allowed free play; that they too be given a share in the up-building of the world's spiritual structure. Yes, both have their rights; but neither has claims that are exclusive. If the rights of the dead alone were honored the world would soon be a sorry place to live in; if the rights of the living alone were admitted, life would lose all stability and solidity—the very ground under the feet of men would move with the impetuous sweep of every passing whim.

The Genius of Judaism ponders over all this; he weighs both sides of the problem with equal deliberateness; for to Him both the Children of the Past and the Children of the Present are equally dear. And forthwith, He sees where His duty lies. His duty is toward both. He must minister unto both. He must consider the needs of both. He must soothe and encourage both. Nay, he must reconcile Past and Present to each other. There shall be no conflict. There must be no warring factions—one speaking in the name of the dead, the other vociferating in the name of the living. There shall be a *United Jewdom* inspired by both the Past and the Present, working harmoniously in behalf of God and Goodness until the dawning of the glorious Future of which Prophets have spoken, towards which the eyes of the Seers of all ages were looking.

In a word, His position lies "between the dead and the living." The Genius of Judaism, I fancy, bears a luminous shield upon which is embossed in flaming letters the telling device: "I Stand Between the Dead and the Living!" And I somehow fancy that the word BETWEEN shines more dazzling than the rest of this blazing motto. It is as if the light of God's Love were beaming through this master-word.

Professor Sombart, the German economist, must by this time be able to divide Jews into two classes. Those that are Zionists and by the same token his friends; those that are opposed to his views, and consequently anti-Zionists. This classification is not a whit more strange than that concatenation of circumstances which has made the Zionists of all Jews the defenders of Professor Sombart and his cause.

A delicious touch in the recent account of the services of the London Liberal Synagogue is the statement that the Rev. Mr. Mattuck, the minister, "has no American accent, and he is most careful to avoid Americanisms of speech." The distinguished graduate of Cincinnati seems to have very quickly been influenced by his environment. Perhaps the time is not far distant when his environment will influence him to the greater extent that his "Liberalism" will altogether disappear in the face of the real and deep and true Judaism about him!

The Jewish Publication Society of America has gone beyond the 10,000 mark in the number of its members of all classes. This is an excellent exhibit, and we congratulate the association on this success. We only hope that once a member is acquired he will remain a member of the society. The great problem which the organization faces is the securing of funds with which to print and publish its new English translation of the Bible. We have hitherto referred to this enterprise in terms of the highest praise and know of no reason which would lead us to reverse our verdict. The community ought to hold up the hands of the

financial officers of the Publication Society to the end that their wholly commendable desire may be attained.

In the Turkish Empire the problem of the mutual relations between *Ashkenazic* and *Sephardic* Jews presses for solution. The former are, naturally, ten times as numerous as the latter, and it is believed to be only a question of time by expert observers for the complete annihilation through absorption of the *Sephardim* to occur. In the centuries of Jewish history the *Sephardim* have, little by little, but none the less appreciably, lost ground, and to-day the dominant section in and of Jewry is the *Ashkenazic*. The obliteration of the *Sephardim* may be regarded with some degree of equanimity if their noble traditions are preserved for us. This can be easily accomplished; if by no other means by the adoption of the *Sephardic* way of life by some if not many *Ashkenazim*.

The late Sir Edward Sassoon, the English baronet, was an important and useful member of the Anglo-Jewish community by reason of his wealth and distinguished ancestry. He seems, too, to have been inordinately proud of his connection with the *Sephardim*. Witness the remark attributed to him which he uttered at a public dinner where many Gentiles were present. Sir Edward referred to that "disparity of ritual and differences in pronunciation which in themselves may be insignificant, but to which I myself attach the utmost importance, by which we are technically apart, and we *Sephardim* have not yet been submerged by the advancing billows of the German Ocean." On such an occasion emphasis might properly have been laid on the ties that bind all Jews together as members of the House of Israel, and unfortunate flings at the *Ashkenazim* reserved for more suitable opportunities.

"Everybody's doing it now." This well-known line from an equally well-known music hall ditty would appear to be especially applicable to the successive *chazonim* who, one after the other, are entering upon the exploitation of their ability as sweet singers of Israel on the concert stage. To the loyal Jew their action must appear quite incongruous: A man who has a voice has the un-

doubted right to use it as the spirit moves him. But a *chazan* is a quasi-public personage, and he ought to have a realizing sense of his obligations to his people to refrain from bringing shame upon them. We write dispassionately, without singling out any particular *chazan* as the object of these remarks. Some *chazonim* on the concert stage give a wholly creditable performance. Of others again the less said the better.

### WOMAN, THE STRONGER VESSEL.


There are those who persist in calling woman the weaker vessel. There never was a greater error, so generally accepted as a truth. The power of woman is greater than that of man. I don't refer to her physical address, her ability in coping and competing with brute force. She can't handle and smash baggage with such exquisite skill as those of the antipodal sex. She would make but a sorry exhibition as a treader, and a poor showing as one of the chief figures in a gladiatorial contest, but she is, nevertheless, competent, and she has given, time and again, proofs of her ability of bringing the treader and the gladiator to her terms, and making them cringe in abject obedience to her will. Warriors bold, and many of them, for whom a Hercules would inspire no fear, have been known to approach with fear and trembling the presence of a woman whom, physically considered, they could have crushed to death by the simple pressure of the digits of their thumb and forefinger upon her throat.

Compared to woman, man is a weakling, a piece of wire which she can twist into any shape, a most yielding clay, which she can mold or pommel into such fantastic designs as will suit her taste or pleasure. Do you doubt it? Pick up your romances, and you will find them to abound with the creatures which, I contend, are more mighty, and, by the exertion of their influence, are stronger than the strongest of men. And what are the tales of the novelist, after all, but the reflex of the happenings of actual life? If you haven't been a reader of novels, look around you into the arena of real life, read the daily press, turn over the back numbers and make a census of the so-called strong men who have succumbed to the influence and power of women—men who have destroyed themselves through crime because they were too weak to resist the power, the magnetic thralldom of those so-called weaker vessels.

Show me the man—aye, the mightiest, who ever lived or ruled, who has been able to rule women as well as women have ruled him.

Women know their power, and they know how to exert it. The history of our government, if it could be read between the lines, would expose to the bright sunlight of publicity a sort of petticoat influence in political affairs which we would hesitate to believe. Ask, however, some of our grave Senators, Representatives and public officials who, at one time or another, served as spokes in the revolving wheel of our Wash-

ington government, and they will tell you of woman's power and influence in the politics of our land, and it is not to the present era alone that these remarks apply. No, go back into what we call the good old times—Jackson's—yes, and further back, and it will be found that the political life of our capital is honey-combed with the influence of women.

Was not Alexander Hamilton possessed of great intellectual powers and all the qualifications which were the envy of the great men of his time? And did he not fall under the evil empire of a woman, who made him such an abject subject that he sacrificed his family honor to save his personal integrity, giving the world the history of his low intrigue with a worthless woman so illiterate that she wrote the name of God beginning with a little "g."

If it were not for the influence of Eve—with all due deference to his crawling, serpentine lowliness—Adam would to-day be sitting upon God's footstool in the Garden of Eden, eating figs and enjoying its treasury of sweets amid a life of ease and complacency, and his suffering offspring would be spared the continual wrestling in its struggle for existence, and the fear which troubled Malthus and which gave

rise to his theory would never have been born.

Yes, woman excels man in power, if not in strength. Not long ago the newspapers told us of a case arising in the classic precincts of the East Side, wherein one woman procured the aid of six men to hold on to her escaping bridegroom until the minister could be fetched and the marriage celebrated. Nothing is here said in disrespect of women. We acknowledge their power, and we respect it. We object, however, to having them called the weaker sex. Let us bow with reverence to our masters. Avoid it as we may try, we are bound to acknowledge the truth, nevertheless, that in this world here below, though men ostensibly rule, the real rulers are women; they are the arbiters of man's earthly existence.

## CORRESPONDENCE.

Woman's Standing in the Jewish Community.

Editor HEBREW STANDARD:

I have read with great interest your Sixth Annual Jewish Woman's Number. It is a grand and fitting tribute to the womanly women in general and to the Jewish woman in particular.

However, I desire to take exception to a broad and sweeping statement of Dr. N. Mosessohn. In the article entitled "Women's Standing in the Jewish Literature," the versatile rabbi asserts: "The known fact that all Talmudical interpretations of the laws of the Bible were only Horoath Shoooh—to suit them to the spirit of their time and never intended for permanent law, which fact may be discerned from the many changes the Jewish law has undergone by Talmudical authorities.

Dr. Mosessohn makes here a double misstatement. The rabbi does not seem to understand the meaning of the term "Horoath Shoooh." It is not a fact that all Talmudical interpretations of the laws of the Bible were only Horoath Shoooh!

What is the meaning of Horoath Shoooh? It means temporary, special legislation, a decision under emergency, a special dispensation (not to be taken as a precedent). Opp. "Horoath l'doroth," a permanent law, for all times to come (Gastrow's Farg. Dict. Dor Horoah, Shoooh). "Doroth m'shooh lo yalpinon" (a permanent law cannot be derived from a special temporary legislation), Menachoth 19b.

It is thus evident that not all Talmudical interpretations of the Bible were only Horoath Shoooh—and it is equally certain that Dr. Mosessohn has either overlooked or forgotten the Talmudical term "l'doroth." Seeing the rabbi's great charity, I am willing to give him the rabbinic benefit of "agav d'charpho mishtabsho," which I beg leave to assume the great doctor holds good even l'doroth.

In conclusion permit me to say that I, too, am to a great extent a "pashtan," and that I, too, love to subscribe to the Talmudical saying: "Ein mikro yotze midey pshuto" (Sab. 63a). But, dear doctor, look at the soph davor: "d'lignmor inosh v'hozor lishor" (ibid).

Said Rabbi Levy, woe is to the wicked conspirators who strive and scheme for the extermination and extinction of Israel, each and every one, observing the failures and the miscarriages of their predecessors, ingeniously attempt subtle means and cunning methods, which may prove more effective and turn to better advantages for their evil designs and vicious projects. Cain killed his brother with the sole purpose in view of becoming the only master of the great universe. He erred, his father soon possessed another son. Ridiculing the shortsightedness of his forerunner, Esau thought he would be the wisest, intending, rather, to slay his brother at the approach of the death of his father, when the latter is unable to produce issues any more. Scorning this idea of Esau, which gave all the chances on earth to the very brother to turn fruitful and become multiplied in the interim, Pharaoh contemplated to down all the offsprings, the old folks doomed to death by natural causes, sooner or later, the destruction would follow. The Pharaonic notion proving likewise impractical, the female members being left unmolested, they certainly married husbands, continuing to add considerable links and joints to humanity's chains, Haman devised the killing of all the Jews, old and young, men and women, children and adults. God above reverting the last vatsatrophe, Gog and Magog contemplated the sending of an ally to the Heavenly Father, inducing Him to exterminate Israel, as it is written: "The kings of the earth raise themselves up and rulers take counsel together, discussing the idea of uniting Jehovah with Christ (Psalms II, 2). At the sight of the latter at His side, the Holy One, blessed be He, says: "Dost thou wish to combine with me? knowledge of "the Lord being king over all the earth" (Zechariah XIV, 3 and 9). This is taken from the Midrash Rabba Leviticus, chapter XXVII, paragraph 11.

Your correspondent admits of having infused some of his own opinions in the Midrashic clause which refers to Gog and Magog, especially in the translation granted the Psalmic quotation, maintaining, however, his rights and privileges to deviate from the accepted definitions and the Massoretic interpretations on the ground of the severe censorship being exercised over the sayings and the renditions of the rabbis in the course of institutions of the Midrash and during the construction of the rabbinical citadels for the preservation of Judaism and the abhorrence of the new-fangled cult parading under the euphonic title of Christianity. The Psalms of David, the Book of Isaiah and prophecies of Zechariah have been, indeed, exploited by Christians by all means and media, fair and foul, for the propaganda of their fetish and the agitation of their heathenism, the very mentioned second chapter of the Psalter falling prey to their iconoclastic machinations.

And now about Gog and Magog, Spanish inquisitions, Portuguese autos da fe, German crusades, Austrian blood accusations, Italian kidnappings and Russian pogroms, copying the systems and methods of Cain, Esau, Pharaoh and Haman, having failed in their attempts and enterprises to divert the Jews from their God, religion, law and traditions, Gog and Magog, England and America, supposedly enlightened peoples and refined nations, instituted missionary quarters and proselytizing agencies for the salvation of Israel and the redemption of the Hebrews from tortures, sufferings, trials and struggles, elevating by these processes a mere man, Jesus by the name, to a seat of honor in the Heavenly Premises, next to God Almighty. Sensational rabbis and preachers for notoriety respond to the call and offer frankincense to the demigod or demagogue of a Jesus in temples and synagogues. God Almighty will not suffer this alliance. He will fight both, the Golyim and their idol!

Dr. Emil G. Hirsch, who has been in receipt of the largest salary paid any Jewish minister in the world, has been given a further increase of \$2,000 per year by Sinai Temple of Chicago, Ill., which brings his salary to \$20,000 per annum. In addition he has been presented with a purse of \$3,000.

At the last meeting of the Council of the Jewish community in Berlin it was reported that the expenditure for all purposes during the year 1911 amounted to 4,432,470 marks. Whereas the year 1910 ended with a surplus of 412,909 marks, there was a deficit of 77,029 marks at the close of last year.

The annual report of the Jewish Consistorial Association of Paris shows that the number of contributing members of the community has risen from 3,854 in 1910 to 4,222 in 1911; that the receipts for the year amounted to 924,759 francs and the expenditure to 911,672 francs, and that the cash in hand on December 31 last was 91,376 francs.







An association of Jewish young people under the name of "Kehillah Jacob" has been in existence in Jerusalem for some years. Its object is to acquire a plot of agricultural land in the neighborhood of Jerusalem in order to establish a new Jewish colony which should devote itself principally to vegetable gardening and dairy farming. A suitable tract in the immediate vicinity of the Holy City has been acquired, and the establishment of the colony may therefore be regarded as assured.

The cable announces the death of Sir Edward Sassoon, a son of the founder of the famous Sassoon family. He was born in 1856 and succeeded to the baronetcy in 1896 on the death of Sir Albert Sassoon. He was a major in the Duke of Cambridge's Hussars Yeomanry, and in 1888 was elected a member of Parliament. He was largely interested in Jewish philanthropies, and was married to a daughter of Baron Gustave de Rothschild.

A conference of Jewish agriculturists from the Galilean colonies took place recently in the colony of Sedjera, and was attended by representatives from Merchavia, Kinereth, Medjel, Poria, Dagania, Sedjera, Mizpeh, Milchamieh and Mes'cha, as well as of the workmen's club of Haifa. Reports were delivered upon the position of the Jewish agricultural laborers in the various settlements, and measures were discussed for strengthening their position and improving their conditions of life.

Last month an imposing assembly filled the spacious hall of the German University of Prague, Bohemia, in honor of the celebrated Professor Przbiram, who died recently. The highest official circles in the capital, civil and military, were represented and paid a tribute to the memory of the Nestor of the faculty of medicine. Professor Przbiram, who died a professing Jew, was born in Prague in 1841.

Three Jews, who have recently completed their studies abroad, have been appointed inspectors of finance of the Turkish Empire, and have been assigned the most difficult posts. They are Ziz Bey Matalon for the Vilayets of Janina and Scutari in Albania; Ferid Bey Asseo for the Vilayets of Van and Bitlis (he will at the same time be a commissioner for political reform in those districts); and Zaki Bey Hayon for the Vilayet of Erzeroum.

Sheriff Julius Harburger has appointed Mr. Herbert N. Straus, as a sheriff's juror, second panel, in place of his father, the late lamented Isidor Straus.

Among the charitable bequests of the late Irving W. Bamberger, of New York city, Mt. Sinai Hospital, \$2,000; Montefiore Home and Hebrew Orphan Asylum, each \$1,000 and Temple Emanu-El, \$2,000.

**Rabbi Jacob Joseph School Cornerstone Laid.**

There was a large gathering present on Sunday, June 2, despite the intense heat, to witness the laying of the cornerstone of the new building of the Rabbi Jacob Joseph School, which is being erected at Nos. 165-167 Henry street. The Rabbi Jacob Joseph School has been in existence for over eleven years, and from an original enrollment of twenty pupils has grown to a point where there is now a daily attendance of over 400. In addition to Hebrew in every branch the curriculum includes an English department in charge of licensed teachers, who give the pupils an education enabling the graduates to enter the high schools or the City College.

Mr. Nathan Lampert was chairman of the committee in charge, and delivered an address showing the progress and aims of the institution. He was followed in order by Rabbi Wolf Margolies, Coroner Feinberg, Deputy Comptroller N. Taylor Phillips, Joseph Levinson, Samuel S. Koenig and others.

There was a collection made for the benefit of the school, over \$8,000 being received and pledges made bringing the amount up to \$25,000.

**Memorial Services for Emanuel Marx.**

On Sunday afternoon last services were held at the Grand Lodge rooms in the Masonic Temple, Twenty-third street and Sixth avenue, in memory of the late Emanuel Marx. They were under the auspices of Centennial Lodge, No. 763, F. A. M. of which he was a charter member and secretary for the past eighteen years; Manhattan Lodge, No. 156, I. O. B. **Jewish Maternity Hospital Auxiliary.**

Deeply imbued with a realizing sense of the practical importance of the mission to which the Jewish Maternity Hospital is dedicated, a group of serious minded young people from various communal institutions throughout the city have organized themselves into a Young People's Auxiliary to the Jewish Maternity Hospital, to assist the hospital so far as possible in increasing the available sources of revenue, mainly by the creation of a fund from which may be met the immediately pressing demands.

All young men and women who desire to enroll may communicate with the chairman, Mr. Max Levy, of the Young Men's Hebrew Association, or attend one of the meetings, held Wednesday evenings at the hospital rooms, at 270 East Broadway.

**Columbia Religious and Industrial School.**

The graduation exercises of the Columbia Religious and Industrial School for Jewish Girls were held last Sunday, June 9, at the Hebrew Technical School for Girls. Nineteen girls received diplomas. Mrs. S. Schechter, in the absence of the president of the school, Mrs. Pauline Sternberger, addressed the graduates. The valedictory was given by Annie Schuster, the salutatory by Annie Dolgenas and Miss Gussie Garfinkel read an essay, "The Jewish Home." An address was delivered by Mr. A. Nawak, superintendent of the religious work. The prizes were awarded by Miss R. G. Affachiner, superintendent of the industrial work.

**Summer Work of the Sisterhood of the Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue.**

At the Neighborhood House of the Sisterhood of the Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue, 316 East Fifth street, the resident worker, Miss Tucker, has planned the summer work to include frequent excursions for adults and children of the district. Arrangements are being made to send the boys and girls of the clubs who need a vacation to some healthful resort.

In connection with the relief work the New York Diet Kitchen Association will assist in supplying pure milk to babies. The girls of the Tucker Charitable Club

visit at frequent intervals the sick poor of the district to whom emergency relief is granted. The orchestra of the Sisterhood will give concerts at various institutions during the summer.

An exhibit to include a lecture and stereopticon views on the prevention of tuberculosis will be given at the Neighborhood House on Wednesday evening. The Anti-Mission League is helping the Sisterhood in its efforts to counteract the influence of Christian missions. The Committee on Delinquent Girls, in connection with its Bureau of Advice and Information, at 316 East Fifth street, has printed and distributed circulars, "Helpful Hints to Jewish Parents." The committee hopes thereby to prevent the indiscriminate taking of children to court.

The Sisterhood has conducted morning and evening classes in English at 316 East Fifth street for the Oriental Jews. On June 3, through the efforts of the Sisterhood, the Board of Education opened evening classes for these foreigners at the public school in Fifth street, to which the Sisterhood transferred its pupils.

The Sisterhood will continue the morning classes for men who work at night and who want to learn English, so as to earn a better livelihood.

Although the regular Sabbath services will be discontinued for the months of July and August, efforts will be made to give the children religious instruction and to continue the choral class, which is a feature of the religious services.

**New Zionist Organization.**

In the rooms of the Young Women's Hebrew Association on June 2 a Zionist organization was formed by boys and girls attending High School. The society will be known as the Inter-High School Zionist Organization, and is officered by the following: Mr. J. Golub, president; Miss S. Pitkowsky, vice-president; Miss B. Roth, secretary; Mr. J. Miller, treasurer.

The next meeting will be held at the Y. W. H. A. Building on June 23, at 7.30 p. m., and a cordial invitation is extended to all boys and girls attending High School to become members.

**Young Men's Hebrew Association.**

The dedication of the Sigmund Neustadt Memorial Building at the Alliance Y. M. H. A. camp will take place Sunday, June 30. This building, the gift of Mrs. Sigmund Neustadt, was presented in honor of the memory of her husband, Mr. Sigmund Neustadt, an old friend of the Educational Alliance. A large number of prominent people have been invited to attend the dedication and a great many have already accepted. **After the Riots in Fez, Morocco.**

Translated from the French Illustrated weekly, L'Illustration.

As soon as a little order had been established, an official inquiry was conducted at Fez by the French authorities and also an independent investigation by the correspondents of the Matin, the Temps and the Havas Agency, which fully demonstrated the gravity of the insurrection which broke out on April 17.

"If the rebels had been better organized" telegraphs the correspondent of the Havas Agency, "and if they had not been enticed by the booty and the spoils which the Mellah offered them, perhaps not a single European would have escaped death, and the wild tribes, who only waited a signal to come and take part in the pillage, would have entered Fez."

The Jewish quarter of Fez, upon which fell, after the first assassination of the French, all the rage of the mob, sheltered about 12,000 souls. It was, like all the Mellahs in Morocco, a city at the side of a city, with closed walls and with gates which are closed at sundown—a swarming, dirty city of high houses, in which there is huddled together a seething population, industrious but reduced by draconian regulations, which appear to have been relaxed a little since our arrival, to a condition of veritable sordidness and subjection, full of frequent extortionate demands.

Of this quarter, so full of life and so picturesque, the mob has left nothing but a mass of ruins—a death house.

During three days, they pillaged, demolished and set fire to everything in sight. Shops were broken into, houses were overrun by the horde and they stole everything that they could carry away. Everything that remained, was smashed by blows of their rifle butts, with hatchets and with sledges. Not the smallest piece of furniture was left intact, even in the humblest dwelling.

There was nothing but disaster, desolation and death! "The most violent earthquake," wrote Hubert Jacques, who in the Matin has described in the most graphic manner, these scenes of horror, "could not have created a more mournful or a more harrowing scene."

On the first day there were found there fifty corpses. How many more are there to be found under the debris as soon as it can be cleared? The rebel Aikris left their barracks and crossed the city, killing every one in their path, and the dregs of the population were with them when they arrived at the Mellah. The gates had been closed, but the siege did not last long. In a few moments, riddled by bullets, attacked by pick axes and hatchets, the rotten planks gave way, giving free passage to this mob.

The Mellah is right next to the Dar-el-Maghzen. As soon as the Sultan became aware of what was going on he had a door of the Palace opened, which permitted him to shelter all these terror-stricken fugitives.

The unfortunate Jews were housed in the gardens and a large number of them in the lions' houses. In the imperial menagerie there is an immense enclosure, where around a fountain, in rows, there are arranged a large number of cages for wild beasts. Most of these cages are unoccupied, and into those which were vacant, they put these homeless people. Perhaps many of them in their hovels of the Mellah, were housed less comfortably than in these dark chambers, with their strong iron bars, where before them the lions and the tigers paraded at their ease. Into the midst of the poor wretches, saved from the sack of their homes, they threw some flimsy garments and in the basins of living water which occupied the centre of the immense court, they left them to their ablutions. It was a picturesque, heartrending spectacle.




