#### SIMCHE THE SHAMMOS: HE MAKES HIS BOW TO THE PUBLIC.

My name is Simche, and I am the *shammos* of the Congregation Chevra Py Tumid, of Goatville, N. J.

Mr. Zevin has invited me to write a little of my life—well, why not? With the greatest of pleasure.

When the talk turned to payment for my writings, he asked me to name my price. I in my turn then asked him: According to what measure do you pay—by the line? If so, I want three *schnapps* (drinks of whiskey) for every hundred lines. Asks he: What sort of a pay-rate is that? Says I: If I drink one *schnapps*, of course I am athirst for more. Two *schnapps* would be an even number such as is abhorred by the pious, therefore three *schnapps* is just my right size.

You might think now that I am so very eager after drink? Not at all, I drink as a Jew will drink. First I say: *Lechayim!* then I make the *beracha*, then I take a sip, have a little discourse and take another sip. A Jew drinks like a gentleman—slowly and in sips.

As for example: I drop in on the *rav*. The *rebbezin* asks me would I care to make a *beracha*? Now I know that in the trail of the drink comes a herring, and some cake—and sometimes even a piece of fried fish. Therefore I make a *beracha* and take my drink; that is to say, I have a treat in *this* world with a little balance left over for the next. Or else, if I call on a *bal-habas* to collect his "pledge for the *shammos*," first thing I am poured a drink. If I come, say, to another *bal-habas* who forgets to do the civil, I reach for the bottle myself. A *shammos* is everywhere at home.

I think by the foregoing I have already earned a *schnapps* and a half. Let's go on. I'll tell you about a thing that happened to me this very week.

I went to see the President. Mrs.

Kulka says: Reb Simche, it's well you called around—I stand in need of you. Says I: Since you need me—here I am! And with this I went to the cupboard and reached down the bottle and a glass, saying: *Lechayim*, Mrs. Kulka, may we ever drink and be merry!

*chayim* once again—may we live to drink in joy!

"I want to talk business to you," Mrs. Kulka reminded me, in a serious tone. "Our auxiliary assembles to-morrow, Thursday, in the evening. Therefore, I want you to attend to the *shul*—that is, to put

bit, don't you think?"

"Yes, and air it a little bit," she repeated after me, looking at the bottle I held in my hand like a robber.

Do you think, perhaps, it's an easy job to clean up a *shul* till fit for a gathering of ladies? With us Jews the *shul* is everything: a club, a bar,

behave as if at home: One sneezes, yawns, smokes in comfort—it's just like home. The smoke fills the entire *shul* and the clouds gather as they rise to the ceiling. Scrubbing and cleaning they can't expect of me, because I get altogether six dollars a month. Besides, who cares? A *shul* is not, *lemoshl*, a parlor. But when Mrs. Kulka told me about that meeting of the auxiliary, I thought, with ladies, of course, it's a different thing. One cannot let them see such a floor—and such windows. It will be necessary to do some chores.


I betook myself to work—and I tell you, a pretty job it was! That day's work was worth a month of my salary. As my name is Simche, I tell you that's the truth. I scrubbed the floor, washed the windows, dusted the Holy Ark and the benches, and heated the big stove, after airing the *shul* out and out.

Around *mincha-le-meirif* the *bala-habatim* mused up the floor again with their smoking and spitting. Also, they brought some mud in from the streets. Thus after *meirif* I had to do part of my work all over again, but when the ladies came they found everything in proper order.

Mrs. Kulka was in the chair and presided all through the meeting. I kept away and in the hall—for what concern have I with a meeting of women? I hate to say it, but the truth is that the women folks are conducting a meeting much better and quieter than our men. You ought to have been, for instance, at the last regular meeting of our congregation—that would have taught you not to laugh at the women. I dislike to say that, but the truth is always the truth.

All through the meeting I told myself: There now, Simche, be a good financier and guess how much the women folks will give you in hand for your trouble? Thinks I: Who can know? Maybe a dollar—possibly two—and perhaps nothing. Women are queer folks; one can never guess at their years or at the loose change they carry. Says I to

**BROOKLYN HEBREW HOME FOR THE AGED**

An event of importance to the orthodox Jewish community of Brooklyn will be the laying of the corner stone of the Hebrew Home for the Aged. The ceremony will take place on Sunday afternoon, at 2 p. m. In case of rain the ceremony will be postponed until the succeeding Sunday.

The building, which will be located at Howard avenue and Dumont street, will be modern in every respect. It is the outgrowth of a movement instituted five years ago at the home of Mrs. Flora Groden, which was attended by twelve ladies. The building, when completed, will cost about \$60,000.

# A GREAT MAN

"Hero, Prophet, Poet—many different names, in different times and places, do we give to great men; according to varieties we note in them, according to the sphere in which they have displayed themselves! I confess I have no notion of a truly great man that could not be all sorts of men. The grand fundamental character is that of Great Man; that the man be great."—Carlyle.

It is extraordinary how much of moral stature and individual interest historical figures gain when they are no longer regarded from conventional standpoints. To many of us the prophet Isaiah seems to belong to a past too legendary to recall; or else we view him as a wholly exceptional character, divinely inspired to utter prophecies. Or, once more, we hear his chapters read as part of the lesson for the day, and sheer familiarity dulls our perception of the fact that we have in him one of the most magnificent of the poets of the ages. It is the price we pay for school lessons that we not only lose all sense of proposition, but that we become actually insensible to values.

But read the book of the prophet Isaiah with a fresh eye, and the lineaments of the great hero of Jerusalem will stand out in proper perspective and clearer light. Here's a man, who, alone, preserved an ideal of patriotism and faith when most of the politicians around him were for compromise and time-serving. And it all happened not so very long ago, as history counts time—some 2,600 years ago. A century before, Lycurgus is supposed to have given laws to Sparta; a century later, Draco made his name famous, or infamous, by his institutions in Athens.

The problems confronting the kings of Judah and Israel were sufficiently serious to tax political statesmanship to the utmost. We sometimes think that these Jewish kingdoms were, in some undefined manner, independent at all events, if not prosperous. For a short time, it is true, at the beginning of the eighth century, Jeroboam II. of Israel, and Uzziah of Judah, had a happy interval of tranquility. But that was due not so much to their own power as to the peace existing among surrounding nations. The actual position of Judah and Israel was to exist as a kind of buffer state between two great military powers. Assyria and Egypt, just as Afghanistan, for instance, lies between the rival influences of Russia and Great Britain. For the most part the kings paid a large tribute to Assyria, in order to be allowed to live in peace, and then, when they got tired of this subservience, raised the standard of revolt, and hoped that Egypt would come to their aid. The situation was further complicated by keen occasional animosities between Samaria and Jerusalem. The northern kingdom, for instance, under Pekah, did not hesitate to call on Syria to join in an attack on the southern kingdom, at that time ruled by Ahaz, and the so-called Syro-Ephraimite war was the result, ended by the failure of the northerners. Isaiah alludes

to this when he tells Ahaz not to be afraid of the two "tails of smoking firebrands," already about extinct—in other words, Rezin, king of Syria, and Pekah, king of Israel (Isaiah, vii, 4). But bigger events were now looming on the horizon. The great Assyrian Empire, under its warrior-ruler, Tiglath-Pileser III., had recovered from a temporary depression and begun to extend its borders. The first consequence was an invasion of the northern provinces, the overthrow of Damascus, the death of Pekah, and the substitution for him of an obedient vassal, Hoshea. To this succeeded a further revolt, and a still more signal vengeance. Under Sargon, the Assyrians, after a horrible siege, captured Samaria, transported the inhabitants to the East, and finally ended the northern kingdom. From this time, by the dispersion of the ten tribes, the "Israelites" disappear from history.

But what, meanwhile, during this last agony of their brethren, were the rulers of the southern kingdom content to be doing? Ahaz had perhaps inherited the policy of intriguing from his predecessor; but it was doubtful whether under any circumstances, menaced as he had been by Pekah, in conjunction with the King of Syria, he would have been allowed by public opinion to bring any aid to Samaria. Hezekiah, his successor, at first carried on the same policy, alternately paying tribute to Assyria and coquetting with Egypt, despite the warnings of his prophet. Isaiah always steadily deprecated the Egyptian alliance, inventing a derisive name for the rulers of the twenty-fourth dynasty and the land they governed—"Rahab-sit-still" (the monster who never does anything). Then, almost suddenly, perhaps because he was inspired by an embassy sent to him from Merodach-Baladan, and the rising empire of Babylon, Hezekiah throws off his tributary dependence in Assyria, combines as many of the Palestinian powers as he could to join him, and raises the standard of revolt. There follow the march of the new Assyrian monarch Sennacherib, his successive conquests in the north and west, and the invasion of Judah and the investment of Jerusalem. The siege of the sacred city is, of course, an historic one, graphically painted, as it has been, by Isaiah himself. We know how Rabshakeh came and harangued the beleaguered folk gathered on the wall, how he was implored to speak in the Syrian tongue, and how he refused to use any other language than the Jewish, in order that he might be understood by the famished and hard-pressed inhabitants. We often hear that speech read, a speech full of menace and scorn, with its description of Assyria's invincible career and its utter contempt both for the national God of the Jews and for the broken reed on which Judah was often inclined to trust, Egypt. We are also aware that the Assyrians failed to capture Jerusalem, partly because cholera and typhus broke out

in their camp, and partly because Babylon was causing trouble on the confines of Assyria. There are records of all these events in the wonderful tablets brought over by Layard and other explorers from Nineveh, records which can be seen in the British Museum, and which confirm and illustrate the Jewish story. But what is not referred to, and yet can be gathered as perhaps the main cause of the Assyrian failure and the Jewish success, is the unique personality of the prophet Isaiah. Alone among the panic-stricken inhabitants of Jerusalem, there was a man whose heart never quailed. Think what the issues were. Outside the walls lay the unconquered ranks of the Assyrians. Inside was doubt, despair, the reproaches, perhaps, of Isaiah's enemy, Shebua, the scribe, the vacillations of Hezekiah. No one could know in Jerusalem that Babylon was keeping her promise, or that the Assyrian camp was visited with a desolating pestilence. The fate of David's ancestral throne, of the chosen city, seemed to hang in the balance, suspended by a single thread over a gaping chasm. Yet the prophet's soul is calm, untroubled, dauntless, secure. He bids, without an accent of fear or doubt, both king and people have faith in the God of their fathers.

This is the sublimest point in Isaiah's career, the triumph of his religious and statesmanlike policy. It was not the mere successes of his preaching, but its inner character and quality which are most characteristic of the man. At a time when religion throughout both northern and southern kingdoms was largely local, he asked of his countrymen a wider conception of Divinity than any which could be associated with the sacredness of particular places. Like all true prophets and seers in history he made Yahve's universal sovereignty rest on foundations of justice and righteousness, describing the duty of faith in this universal spirit as it has never been urged before by any of his predecessors. He lifted up his voice against the pride and arrogance of wealth, the military ostentation of horses and chariots, the various forms of what he called "idolatry."

Just as he upheld the fortunes of our country in her darkest hour, so, too, he sought to put before his countrymen, in language of immortal poetry, an ideal of righteousness, simplicity of life, and faith in a God of universal sovereignty.



## ITEMS OF INTEREST IN THE JEWISH WORLD.

A recent organization is the Hebrew Alliance of Pittsfield, Mass.

A Young Women's Hebrew Association has been organized in Boston, Mass.

Aaron Katz, a pioneer of Cleveland, Ohio, died in that city last week, aged 96.

Work has begun on the new synagogue of the Hebrew Congregation of Frankford, Pa.

The average number of inmates in the London, England, Home for Aged Jews in 1911 was 136.

The two Jewish Ladies' Benefit Societies in Leeds, England, have decided to amalgamate.

The Jewish population of Roumania in the last ten years has declined from 260,000 to 215,000.

A branch of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society has been organized in Evansville, Ind.

The Jewish population of Philadelphia, Pa., is estimated to number approximately 135,000.

The deceased Jewish millionaire, Kerpervasser, of Kishineff, has left 100,000 roubles to charity.

The Congregation Oheb Zedakah of Springfield have called Rev. Samuel Cohen as their rabbi.

The famous Cincinnati Club has closed its doors, and now Cincinnati is without a Jewish social club.

District Grand Lodge, No. 6, I. O. B. B., will hold its session at Lake Harbor, Mich., on July 7.

Dr. Jacob Singer, of Budapest, has given 500,000 crowns for various Jewish philanthropic institutions.

Rev. Joshua David Urman has been elected rabbi of the Congregation Ohel Jacob, of East Boston, Mass.

The Russian Senate has permitted Jewish apothecaries to acquire immovable property outside the Pale.

Mrs. Louis Hess and daughter, Rochelle, of Fort Wayne, Ind., are at present visiting relatives in this city.

The Jews have definitely decided to nominate Jewish candidates for the Duma in Wilna, Kovno and Grodno.

At an auction of autographs held in Berlin on the 11th inst. seven letters written by Heinrich Heine brought \$750.

Lieutenant Benedic has been attached to the general staff of General Lyautey, the Resident General of France in Morocco.

Among the professors of the St. Petersburg University forced to resign by M. Kasso's policy is the Jew, M. Kamenska.

The cornerstone of the new synagogue being erected by the Congregation Ahavath Achim, of Buffalo, N. Y., will be laid on June 30.

Great fires have wiped out the largest portions of the Russian townlets, Savran (Podolia), Vonvolitza (Lublin) and Bullak (Kalish), leaving several hundreds of Jewish families shelterless.

The Philmont Country Club, Philadelphia's Jewish social organization, will build a new clubhouse and locker rooms at a cost of \$80,000.

The Emperor of Austria has raised Imperial Councillor Moritz Doctor, a manufacturer on an extensive scale, to the rank of the nobility.

Thirty-six thousand dollars has been subscribed toward the Orthodox Jewish Federation of Charities now being organized in Chicago, Ill.

At the request of the Holy Synod, the Russian Police Department has forbidden all Jewish gramophone dealers to sell records of orthodox hymns.

The strike of Kosher meat dealers in Chicago has been settled, the packers agreeing to fix a stationary price for meat for the next three months.

Herr Emil Kuh, editor of the Neuen Wiener Zeitung, died last week in Vienna. In addition to his journalistic work he was also esteemed as an author.

The Federation of German Jewish Congregations recently held its thirteenth general meeting in Berlin. No less than 1,020 congregations were represented.

Rabbi Oscar Levin, who graduated from the Jewish Theological Seminary this year, has been elected superintendent of the Norfolk, Va., Hebrew Institute.

Rabbi Eugene Kohn, of this year's graduates of the Jewish Theological Seminary, has become minister of the Congregation Chizuk Emonoh of Baltimore, Md.

The Governor of Wilna has refused to permit the holding of a Jewish Emigration Conference in the city, and recommends that other Governors should act likewise.

In San Francisco, Cal., a memorial tablet has been unveiled to Sergeant Maurice Justh, of the First California Volunteers, who was the first to fall in the Battle of Manila.

Nine ringleaders of the Osh (Turkistan) blood libel riot, during which one Jew was killed and several were wounded last year, have been sentenced to eight months' imprisonment.

Plans for rebuilding the Jewish Alliance Building in Baltimore, Md., have been filed. When finished it will be known as the Levy Memorial and the improvement will cost about \$80,000.

Nathan Straus has opened ten additional milk depots this year, making eighteen in all as his contribution for this year in the campaign for Pasteurized milk which he started twenty years ago.

The German Emperor has conferred the Red Eagle Order on Privy Councillor Boas and Herr Adolph Salomon, in recognition of their services to the Jews' Deaf and Dumb Home at Weissensee (Berlin).

At the St. Petersburg Conservatoire (the highest college of music in Russia) Jews this year gained prominent successes, and even the Novoe Vremya had to describe the work of the Jewish students as praiseworthy. Jewish students obtained six gold medals (out of eight) and fifteen silver medals (out of sixteen) as well as the most valuable scholarships.

The annual graduation exercises of Graetz College, Philadelphia, Pa., were held last Sunday. Nineteen students were graduated, eight from the regular class and eleven from the School of Pedagogy.

The Finnish Senate has forwarded to the Czar its decision in favor of abolishing the prohibition of Shechita in the principality. The Czar yielded to its advice, confirming the abolition of the restriction.

Senator Ferdinand Dreyfus has been appointed president and Senator Paul Strauss a member of the French extra-Parliamentary Commission charged with the establishment of a code for the protection of children.

In following out the provisions of the will of the late Samuel Kohn, of Philadelphia, Pa., leaving a sum of \$75,000 to charities, his executor has donated \$50,000 of this fund to the Jewish Hospital Association.

The subscription list opened by the Alliance Israelite for the relief of the sufferers by the outbreak at Fez amounted last week to about 400,000 francs. One-half of this sum has been contributed in Paris alone.

The Russian repressive policy against the Zionists seems to be spreading. At Kharkoff the police have instituted proceedings against a number of Zionists "for belonging to an illegal organization and supporting financial institutions abroad."

A delegation of orthodox rabbis called on President Taft at the White House on June 11. In response to their greeting President Taft remarked, "I have never met more loyal people than the Jews. I consider the Jews among my best friends."

Mr. Abraham Brill, of Jaffe, Palestine, representing the Jewish Colonization Society, is at present in Los Angeles, Cal., investigating fruit growing. Mr. Brill was recently the guest of Luther Burbank, and gleaned much useful information from him.

Rabbi M. M. Eichler, of Cong. Ohabel Sholom, of Boston, Mass., who received a unanimous call from the Cong. Bnai Jeshurun, of Cleveland, O., has announced his decision to remain in his present charge, where he has still a two-year term to fulfill.

That wealthy Jews are patrons of the turf is evidenced by this year's English Derby. The horses that came in first and second are owned by Jews, Mr. Walter Raphael and Mr. L. Neumann. Last year's Derby winner was also owned by a Jew, Mr. J. B. Joel.

Mr. Leopold Fauerbach, who was superintendent of the Hebrew Sheltering Guardian Society of New York City from 1879 to 1903, died at his residence last Saturday, aged 79. During Mr. Fauerbach's incumbency, over 11,000 pupils graduated from the institution.

Notwithstanding the assertion that Jews despise agriculture and the mining industry, an advertisement from Kattowitz, announcing the need of a few hundred such laborers, together with an intimation that Jews are not objected to, has been answered by several hundred Polish Jews.

The Governor of Silivria (Turkey), where the Jews were being boycotted by the Greeks, has been dismissed. In the neighboring village of Caradjaa similar movement was being organized, but it was nipped in the bud, thanks to the prompt and wise measures taken by the prefect, Ahmed Effendi.

The Polytechnic Institute at Haifa, Palestine, has received a donation of 20,000 marks from Madame S. Cravtsoff, of Warsaw, through her son, Mr. Jehes-

kel Cravtsoff, who was recently elected a member of the Haifa Town Council. A library will be formed which will bear the name of the donor.

Last year the Chevra Kadisha of Budapest, the largest of its kind in the world, undertook 2,920 burials at a cost of 326,000 Austrian crowns. It has 14,600 contributing members—several distinguished non-Jews, including an Imperial Archduke, have figured as honorary members—and its annual budget amounts to 2,000,000 crowns.

The anti-Jewish newspaper Carmel has resumed publication at Haifa, and with more violence than before is continuing its attacks on the Jews. The editor, a Christian Arab, has started an active propaganda, and as a result of his agitation a large number of Christian workmen assaulted the Jewish workmen who were employed in the building of the Polytechnic and demanded that their services should also be utilized.

Leopold Auer, the teacher of Mischa Elman and Efram Zimballist, has introduced another great violin prodigy in the person of Jakob Heifetz, an 11-year-old Russian boy, who made his debut in Berlin last week. He is reported to have been playing since he was 3 years old, and his mastery, both technical and intellectual, of Tschaiowsky's violin concerto amazed an audience composed of professional musicians and critics.

Herr Martin Peltasohn, a Radical member of the Prussian Parliament and judge of one of the courts, died last month at the age of sixty-three, in Berlin, where he was buried last week. The fact that he was a Jew in no way impeded his judicial career, for his marked ability as a lawyer was widely recognized. He was one of the most loyal and industrious members of the Radical party, which suffers a heavy loss by his death.

An influential committee, including the Jewish millionaires, Brodsky, Margolin and Zaitzeff, has been formed at Kieff to co-operate with the Ito in the establishment of the proposed colony in America bearing the name of Mandelstamm. It is contemplated to settle here at the beginning twenty-five families selected from among the recent exiles from the villages. The estimated amount required for this initial stage is 100,000 roubles.

A conference of delegates of the Jewish congregations in Bulgaria has been held at Sofia. All the twenty-four congregations in the kingdom were represented. The conference agreed to proposals for a Congress of Bulgarian Jews, and unanimously passed a vote of confidence in the chief rabbi, Dr. Ehrenpreis, who has been the subject of attacks from certain quarters. The conference in a body was received in audience by the Prime Minister.

The President of the French Republic has conferred the grade of Officer of the Order of Public Instruction on a number of Jews, among them being Dr. Blok, rector of the University of Leyden, and M. Leopold Ketten, professor at the Conservatoire of Music at Geneva. The considerable number of Jews appointed officers of the Academy include Madame Albala and Madame Falcon, respectively headmistresses of the Alliance Israelite Girls' Schools at Bagdad and Tetuan.

A new anti-Semitic party was founded in Leipzig last week. The founders are the theoretical leaders of the "all-Germans" and several scholars who preach purity of the German race. The members of the new party must agree never to marry a Jewess or to allow intermarriage with Jews. The purpose of the organization is a "social" one, to exclude the Jews from German society, as they cannot be excluded from the German State. The Berliner Tageblatt calls the leader of the new party "Schwindelmeyer et Cie."

### Central Conference Against Sectional Bodies.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, held in Cincinnati, O., on May 29, resolutions were adopted discouraging and discountenancing the formation of sectional conferences of reform rabbis. The resolutions were caused by the formation of the recent Eastern Conference of Reform Rabbis and were passed after discussion by a vote of 13 to 2.

On behalf of the Eastern Council the following statement has been issued:

"As a communication has been received from the Executive Committee of the Central Conference, it devolves upon us to issue a reply.

"The dogmatic statement that our council (unless a strictly city organization) will be inimical to the Central Conference, to union, and to religion, is indeed remarkable in the light of actual precedents. An Eastern Conference existed prior to the Central, and continued for a time parallel with it.

"A Southern Conference was formed later, and received the blessing of the Central Conference.

"A New Jersey Conference Association and similar State bodies exist today. We have heard of no threat being launched that each must limit its activity to a city.

"The Eastern Council was formed to deal with pressing local Jewish problems peculiar to the East, and where reform is being undermined and its interests brushed aside. Numbers, brains and means are being pitted against it and enthusiastically directed toward what has been styled a counter reformation.

"Our duty here is as plain as it is urgent. No unbiased colleague can believe that concentration on these problems in the East will in any way tend to enjoin a separation from the West.

"The Central Conference has been called into being not for destructive, but for constructive work; to foster Judaism, to reiterate and reinforce those progressive principles in which we intensely believe, and to reach our young people who are drifting away from the synagogue and from all religious moorings.

"Let us unite in this great cause."

### Federation of American Zionists.

The fifteenth annual convention of the Federation of American Zionists will be held in Cleveland, Ohio, from Sunday morning, June 30, to the evening of July 2, 1912. There will be preliminary events connected with the convention on the Sabbath, June 29, and on the evening of the same day. The Executive Committee has selected Cleveland as the convention city because it is a large Jewish centre, central for the Zionists of the Middle West as well as for the Zionists of the East.

# NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

(Exclusive Correspondence to THE HEBREW STANDARD.)

**Interminable Rabbinic Discussions—Federation of Synagogues Versus United Synagogue—An Angry Correspondence—Order of Ancient Maccabæans and the Work of Their Convention—Meeting Missionary Activity in the East End of London—Jewish Shopkeepers Organize—Jewish-Owned Horse Wins Blue Ribbon of English Turf—The Two Cantors in London and a Community Discussion.**

London, June 7, 1912.

The Rabbinic question continues to provoke a large amount of discussion in the community, and the pity of it appears to be the development of a spirit of captious criticism and internal jealousy. It will be a good thing for the community when the selection of a Chief Rabbi is made and the endless controversy with regard to the rights of certain of the constituent bodies represented at the Rabbinic conference over and done with. The Federation of Synagogues which represents the East End Jews of London particularly, and whose principal mouthpiece is Lord Swaythling, considers that its views are not being given due attention, and some severe remarks have been made upon its behalf. These have not been received charitably by the other and wider interests represented in the discussion, and perhaps a vigorous and alert Jewishness is not helping toward calmness by giving conflicting views such prominent attention.

The last contribution in the discussion came as a result of the meeting of the Federation of Synagogues when Lord Swaythling made a long speech, in which small matters as to whether the Federation contributed \$100 to the Chief Rabbi's fund or \$700 were given special prominence. A strong point was made of the fact that the Federation, with 65,000 members, were to have 28 votes in the election of Chief Rabbi, while 9 seat-holders who were honorary officers of the United Synagogue were to have 72. The Federation delegates have withdrawn from the conference, and Lord Swaythling declares that the body he represents will take no further part in the election, the Federation neither favoring nor opposing any particular candidate.

His Lordship is careful to point out, however, that in his view under this scheme the United Synagogue can select a Chief Rabbi, but can only elect a Chief Rabbi of the United Synagogue. When he is also accepted by the Federation he may be called the Chief Rabbi of London, and when he is also accepted by the provinces he can be called the Chief Rabbi of England, or if they prefer, of the United Congregations of the British Empire. But not till then. "Everything has been done," he continued, "and everything will be done by us to avoid a split. If the United Synagogue will not retire from their false position, then let them only, as I firmly believe they will, think and think long in making their selection. We are prepared to make great sacrifices to meet them, but not of principle. We must have an orthodox and a great rabbi. It rests with them. I feel sure their intentions on this question are good, but the Jewish community as a whole cannot afford a mistake."

As a result of this debate a letter was addressed by the Federation to the United Synagogue mentioning most of these points. A reply was received expressing the regret of the United Synagogue that the Federation persisted in its intention to take no part in the election and pointing out that the choice of the Chief Rabbi was not vested in the United Synagogue, but that the large number of synagogues throughout the British dominions which are taking part in the election is sufficient evidence to refute the allegation.

The Order of Ancient Maccabæans has held its convention and discussed the various motions on the agenda dealing with Zionist work. The Maccabæans expressed their satisfaction with the results of the tenth Zionist congress and pledged their support to Professor Warburg. It was made obligatory on each member of the order to contribute for the next two sessions in addition to the shekel an annual sum to the central fund. Fraternal relations were established with the Order "Sons of Zion" of New York and the "Knights of Zion" of Chicago and other orders. Arrangements were made for raising a fund to purchase land in Palestine for a Maccabæan colony.

The matter of the National Insurance Act was also raised and a scheme for fitting the Maccabæan fraternal dues and benefits in with the new system of things was asked for. The next convention is to be held in Liverpool.

The Board of Deputies held an important meeting on June 2, at which the question of meeting missionary activity in the East End of London was specially raised. Sir Isidore Spielmann has made this question his own and he suggested to the board that its work in this direction should come under the four following heads: (1) Exposing the methods and activities of the missionaries; (2) stopping their supplies; (3) the issuing of cautions on the part of ecclesiastical authorities and schoolmasters; and (4) visitation with a view to prevention and reclamation. The committee of the board was of opinion, however, that the best method of dealing with the evil would be to strengthen the Jewish defences, the weakness in which was caused by poverty and the insufficiency of medical treatment and nursing offered to the poor, and the want of religious training; and that all of these weaknesses were due to an insufficiency of means, the removal of which was beyond the scope of the board's work. The services of the Board of Deputies' Law and Parliamentary Committee were, however, placed at the disposal of Sir Isidore and his committee for use in connection with any legal questions which may arise.

The Jewish Shopkeepers' Association, whose formation was chronicled last week, has been discussing the hardships of early closing. A mass meeting held on June 4 was attended by the Rev. Dr. Gaster and the Hon. Harry Lawson, one of the Jewish members of Parliament, and speeches were made in which the lesson of organization was driven home. So many attacks are being made upon their rights and privileges that the association now formed is declared to be long overdue.

Two windfalls have come to the community during the past week. In the first place, the Derby, the principal horse race run in England each year, was won by a well-known member of the community and financier, W. Raphael; and secondly, Marcus Cotton, a Jewish merchant in Birmingham, won the first prize in the great sweepstake on the Derby known as the Calcutta Sweep, from its headquarters in the Indian capital. Mr. Cotton bought six tickets for a total cost of about \$20 in the sweepstake and was fortunate enough to draw the name of the Derby winner, owned by the above-mentioned Mr. Raphael. The exact amount he wins is not quite known at present, but it will be between \$200,000 and \$300,000. Mr. Cotton is not a racing man, but the tickets came his way and he bought them.

The visit of two cantors to London at the same time has aroused a great amount of musical interest and has also given rise to rather heated controversy within the ranks of the community. Some Jews resent the public performance of the music of the Jewish ritual and are even more incensed by the sandwiching of operatic excerpts like the Prologue to "Pagliacci" and "Eri Tu" from "Un Ballo in Maschera" between the sacred numbers. It is not desirable

to take part in the controversy, but it is interesting to know the point at issue. The central facts are two. First, the music of the synagogue is not art music. Beautiful as it is, and though it has not been uninfluenced by the evolution of the music of the West, it has proceeded in the main along its own lines of development, and is therefore hardly a fit subject for artistic criticism in the ordinary way. Secondly, the singers are ordained ministers of religion who are performing part of their ritual functions in public for remuneration. This puts these performances on quite a different level from the singing of church music by church choirs or the performances of oratorios and Masses. The fact that many eminent operatic artists and concert singers are, or have been—especially in America—church singers has no bearing on the argument here.

English views on this subject and on the cognate question of the treatment of religious music in the concert room have changed a great deal in the last generation. There is the historic instance of the clergyman who withdrew his subscription from the Birmingham hospital because it benefited by the proceeds of a musical festival at which Mozart's "Requiem" had been performed—even though in those days it was the custom to alter the text.

Without going into the possibilities of the question there is no doubt that adverse influences were responsible for the sparse audience that attended Cantor Steinberg's concert at Queen's Hall on June 6. What these were it is all the more difficult to imagine, seeing that many influential Jewish dignitaries were present.

Concerning Dr. Steinberg's claims to serious and critical consideration, there can be no doubt as to its justification. He has a voice of natural richness and fullness of quality, always mellow and pleasant to the ear. Just such a voice, in fact, as would adorn the music and sentiment for which it is principally employed. Hence the various selections taken from the service used in the synagogue were the numbers that challenged the least comparison with familiar presentation. In the operatic number, however, namely, the prologue from "I Pagliacci," although the scope and range of the cantor's voice were further exhibited, the limitations both in experience and training in this class of musical expression were even more emphasized. It must be confessed that when Mr. Steinberg sang a trivial love song and followed it closely with an extract from the most intimate part of the Jewish services, some notion of the reason of the many empty benches was suggested. The cantor was assisted by a very capable, if small, mixed choir.

### Manhood.

"If youth is the time of opportunity manhood is the time of achievement. Manhood may be a time of dissipation and undesirable notoriety, of moral shipwreck, or an hour of spiritual triumph. It is an opportunity for domestic loyalty, of commercial and professional integrity and of social righteousness, such as must make for happiness and soul satisfaction. We can make life with Bailey a bridge of groans across a stream of tears, or with Thoreau a stroll on the beach. Which shall it be?—Rabbi Harry Levi."

The Governor-General of Adrianople recently visited the neighboring towns of Mustapha Pasha, where he inspected the Jewish School. In response to a request from the Council of the community for a grant toward the cost of building better school premises, the Governor-General has prevailed on the Administrative Council of Adrianople to vote a large appropriation.

With the coming of summer in the last few years there has always been a kosher meat strike in some form in this city. One begins to think that the one is just as regular and usual as the other.

Ex-Comptroller Herman A. Metz, of Brooklyn, is mentioned as a Vice-Presidential possibility. He has thus come nearer to the nomination for this office than any other Jew in the history of this country.

Will the national conventions of the two great political parties, taking place in these days, firmly declare themselves on the subject of immigration in the true American spirit? On the subject of passports, fortunately, they need not voice their sentiments.

A Jewish lawyer in a legal argument the other day called Commissioner William Williams the "Czar of Ellis Island." Not a bad cognomen for one who has made an immigration statute in its enforcement more inelastic and unhuman than many a bureaucrat in the chancelleries of despotic governments.

George V of England has made Charles Waldstein, the distinguished archaeologist, a knight. Thus the number of Jewish knights, large as it already is, is increased by one. Sir Charles Waldstein was, if we mistake not, born in this city; at all events, here he was educated. So his knighthood interests the Jewries of two countries.

Oscar Hammerstein, the irrepressible, has not found, regrettably enough, that success in London to which his talents undoubtedly entitle him. But he is so persevering that it is altogether possible that he will return here, to the scene of his first triumphs and disappointments, and reap the reward which cold and perfidious Albion denied him. Then, what is London's loss is New York's gain.

The author of the paper on the Jewish pioneers of South Africa, read the other day in London before the Jewish Historical Society of England, committed the grave blunder of judging his pioneers in many instances by their names. Many Dutchmen, who are no nearer to Jews and Judaism than was Queen Victoria, had Hebraic-sounding first and last names, and the historian who judges them by these adventitious belongings will very often be led irreparably astray.

In a recent issue of *Liberty*, a magazine devoted to such subjects as the enforcement of Sunday laws, appears a brief paper entitled "Why the Jew Hates Christianity." *Liberty* is published by an association controlled by Seventh Day Baptists and Adventists, who, needless to add, are strongly philo-Jewish in their outlook. As a matter of fact, the Jew hates Christianity much less than Christianity, or some of its misguided professors, hates the Jew. Where the dominant faith does not persecute the Jew for his belief the adherents of the respective religions dwell together in peace and harmony. For the Jew is, above all, a man of peace.

Believing as we do that Jewish services in the house of God ought not to be omitted simply because the thermometer hugs the higher ranges of the glass, we are curious to know if this summer there will be more than the usual sparse and spasmodic summer services conducted by our friends, the Reformed rabbis. Too much vacation is not good for these gentlemen. Let them take an example from our orthodox brethren, with whom God is as much the Creator of the universe, the Giver of all good, in summer as in the colder seasons of the year. In this, as in many other respects, the Reformers have much to learn from the Orthodox.

## WEATHER-VANE KOHLER

WE admire a man who is consistent, even if his principles and views are not the same as ours. Dr. Kaufman Kohler, the head of the Hebrew Union College, is and always has been an outspoken Reformer, and as such we have ever recognized him and paid due tribute to his undoubted worth as a scholar. Dr. Kohler is, too, what the Germans call "eine Kämpfernatur," and this penchant of his brings him oftentimes into collision with the men and the principles of opposing schools of thought and life.

Only a fortnight ago we had occasion to berate the learned president of the Cincinnati college for some ill-considered and unwise remarks he saw fit to make at the recent meeting of the Eastern District Council of Reform Rabbis in this city. One would naturally think that those who participated in the deliberations of the Eastern Council were in sympathy with its objects, and willing to further its purposes. Of such is not Dr. Kohler.

We read, with much surprise, that at a meeting of the executive of the Central Conference of American Rabbis Dr. Kaufman Kohler is recorded in the affirmative on the adoption of a resolution by the terms of which sectional conferences of Reform rabbis are distinctly laid under the ban of the "annual picnic." It was there resolved that in the opinion of the executive of the C. C. A. R. the formation of such rabbinical associations such as the Eastern Council should be discouraged and discountenanced because 'prejudicial to the development of the religious interests we (i. e., the Central Conference) endeavor to serve.'

Now, how can a man possibly ride two horses at the same time? Will Dr. Kohler please inform the Jewish community which of his actions represents his sober sense? Was he in earnest when he participated in the work of the Eastern Council of Reform Rabbis? Or, did he but jest when he joined his colleagues at the head of the "annual picnic" in putting the Eastern Council in *Cherem*?

Gaston Lichtenstein, of Richmond, has compiled the history of his family and published it in an interesting brochure, which he calls "The Virginia Lichtensteins Amplified by Historical and Biographical Data." This sort of genealogical writing deserves to be assiduously cultivated by Jews. Some of our people have been in America for many generations and the records of their achievements in all walks of life are writ in water. The Lichtensteins, while only here since the middle of the last century, have been made the subject of a monograph by an enthusiastic scion, and who will say that this labor was not worth while?

Sir Sidney Lee, an English Jew whose fame as writer and historian was established by his brilliant editorship of the "Dictionary of National Biography," seems to have stirred up a hornet's nest by his frank and critical biography of the late Edward VII. We are not concerned with the more delicate phases of the question which has been raised by his account of the King. We do believe, however, that the verdict of history will uphold his views. Edward VII., who, by the way, was a loyal and sincere friend of Anglo-Jewry's leading figures, carved no lasting niche for himself in the Hall of Fame of the world's great ones. He was amiable and pleasure loving, a *fin de siècle* man of the world. His position brought him naturally into great prominence. But aside from this and his lasting friendship for the Jewish millionaires what did he accomplish?

Mayor Gaynor has always been a man of "safe and sane" views on almost all public questions. Especially commendable have been his opinions in regard to the use of Sunday as a time for recreation by the masses of the population. He knows that for city-bred men and boys Sunday is the only time for true recreation. They do not work in the fields and woods during the week, and so of necessity have not to keep still on the first day. Many of them have indeed no opportunity to see the greensward and the turf under the blue of heaven on any other day of the week. Why should innocent pleasures be denied them? The advocates of the Puritanical type of Sunday find, or claim to find, a precedent for their contention in the Sabbath of the Jews. This idea is without any basis in fact. To the loyal Jew the Sabbath is not a day of terror, of deep and thoroughgoing searchings of the heart. It is that day of the week on which, through communion with God, he draws renewed strength for the battle of life.

In two respects the present English cabinet has defied precedent. First, in the number of professing Jews who are members of it. Secondly, in that for the first time the British attorney-general takes cabinet rank. The two subjects are related, for the attorney-general in question is Sir Rufus Isaacs, one of the leading barristers of England to-day and a prominent member of the Jewish community of London. Sir Rufus' advent into the Asquith cabinet increases the already considerable number of our co-religionists in this body. And his inclusion therein shows that in England, as well as in this country, the lawyer is coming more and more to be the one from whom the governing classes are recruited. Whether it is well or the reverse for a country to be governed by a large number of lawyers is an open question. The layman here, as in other lands, looks upon the lawyers in legislative and governmental halls as somewhat of an unmitigated nuisance. The lawyers themselves are possessed, naturally, of quite different feelings. These considerations have, however, nothing to do with Sir Rufus Isaacs. The interesting point remains that he in his proper person forms the break with tradition. Thus the extraordinary career of this extraordinary man is rendered still more extraordinary.

## THE POWER OF BELIEF

יען, לא-האמנחם כי לחקדישני לעיני בני ישראל לכן לא  
תביאו את-הקהל הזה אלה-הרץ אשר נתתי לרם:

Because ye believed me not, to sanctify me in the eyes of the children of Israel, therefore ye shall not bring this assembly into the land which I have given them.—(Num. xx:12.)

ACCORDING to the plain meaning of our text, Moses and Aaron were disqualified from further leadership because they had not shown a sufficient amount of faith in God. How far the incident of the striking of the rock justifies this charge, is not for us to determine. We cannot but accept the testimony of Scripture on this point.

Belief in God, then, is an indispensable requirement of leadership. He alone who has the faculty of believing in the Divine Being and in the divine contents of life, is in undoubted possession of the faculty of leading his fellowmen. A great leader must be a great believer. The measure of his greatness depends on the measure of his faith. Such is the teaching we derive—obviously enough—from our text.

Consider the functions of a leader. They are many and varied. And because some of these functions may be tolerably well performed by men of the lower order, therefore are there so many claimants to leadership. But such men are very far from true leadership. The simplest of all functions of leadership is to unite men and compel their obedience. The ward politician fulfills this task with some measure of success; yet—who would call him a leader? Who would call him a great leader?

The chief function of a leader is to guide his fellows toward a noble aim, an ideal goal. He who guides men towards material things is not a great leader. Moses did not merely lead his people toward a material Promised Land, he guided them toward an ideal condition of life. The Promised Land he saw was not merely a soil that would be yielding "seed and figs and vines and pomegranates," but a soil out of which there would sprout justice and righteousness and truth. Similarly, all leaders deserving the name pointed the way not to the obvious, not to that which bodily eyes may readily discern, but to that which is latent, to the divine meanings hidden beneath the surface of superimposed facts and circumstances. A great leader leads not toward the visible but toward the invisible.

The people, to be sure, do not discern things invisible. For this very reason do they require leaders who should be endowed with spiritual discernment. Leaders must be above all else Seers gifted with the power of visioning, which is the power of faith in invisible realities. To them the Unseen must be as real as the Seen, the Future as vibrant with life as the Present. Nay, in their eyes the Unseen must be endowed with an attractiveness and lofty fascination which no material thing, be it never so fair, can ever possess. And toward this unseen life, ideally present in their own prophetic soul, they must be able to direct the laggard masses. How can they do this unless they are thoroughly identified with the divine life that throbs beneath the husk of material appearances, unless they are—as our text teaches us—staunch believers in God?

It is, I hope, no abuse of the allegorical method to say that the incident of the Striking of the Rock supports the teaching of the text that the capacity for leadership is commensurate with the capacity for grasping the reality of the Unseen. The waters gushing forth miraculously from the bosom of the rock though no bodily eye can detect therein the presence of a well—is this not a symbol of that latent divinity with which all things are instinct, of that ideality that is to be found under the rough surface of material existence? Moses was merely to speak to the rock—that is, he was to use spiritual power to charm forth the hidden streams; but he used, instead, physical force and thus failed to teach the people the reality of the Unseen.

Had Moses but spoken to the rock He might have taught them a splendid lesson. The people might have received an incentive to spurn the material husk of things and look for the spiritual significance beneath. They might have learned that the Unseen proceeded from the Seen, the Future from the Present, even as the miraculous waters welled forth from the mysterious concealment of the rock. Nor would this lesson have been of more theoretical importance. The lesson would have been of immediate practical value. For the trouble with Israel had been that they were too much bent upon the material things; their outlook upon life was thoroughly material; their constant grumbling about bread and water showed them incapable of sustained effort in behalf of an ideal; their very Promised Land was a land flowing with milk and honey. They were not able to lift up their gaze toward a glorious future that would plant Israel's feet upon the height of its divine destiny as Humanity's redeemer. They lacked spiritual vision. Theirs was a bread-and-water philosophy. Now was the time to show them, by means of the rock, that Israel would conquer not by force but by faith, not by the Seen but by the Unseen.

But the lesson was not taught. And as Moses brought down the rod upon the rock, he brought down upon Aaron and himself the rod of God's wrath together with the stern rebuke: "Ye believed me not to sanctify me in the eyes of the children of Israel!"



### AN UNMIXED EVIL.

The Chazonuth advertising business is to be thoroughly condemned. It discredits religion and drags down the solemn services of Israel all but to the plane of a vaudeville. It is a particular shame that hereabouts everything is done with the idea of money getting, but when the synagogue, too, lends itself as a factor to such commercialism, we wonder whether our people are entirely bereft of leaders and of the sense of protest in the name of what is most holy. Shame on certain rabbis who sit silent amid all this evil. Why does not the "great and glorious Kehillah" manifest itself here, and take resolute measures forthwith to quell the nuisance, and put a stop to such an insult to the faith of our fathers?

A sorry pass, indeed, we have come to when the synagogue and its ritual are a matter of barter and sale by unprincipled and unscrupulous individuals and congregations too—though miscalled such—that stop at nothing when dollars and cents are the paramount question, and the honor of Israel's devoted faith comes last of all.

Anatole Leroy-Beaulieu, a member of the Institute of France, who died in Paris last Sunday at the age of seventy, was a firm friend of the Jews. Many years ago he published his epoch-making volume, "Israel Among the Nations," which at once created a furor. In this M. Leroy-Beaulieu rather distinguished himself by his manner of putting his facts than by the facts which he brought to light. His book was immediately translated into a large number of languages and is to-day still a classic in its field. The author's fame as a great philo-Semite rests chiefly upon this work. M. Leroy-Beaulieu was a man of vast scholarly attainments, for he was a teacher at the celebrated *Ecole des Hautes Etudes* of Paris, a position which implied that his scientific worth and importance were established. When he visited this country as a French lecturer less than a decade ago, he was greeted on all sides with loud acclaim by the Jews of America. He made some notable utterances at that time concerning the Jews of Russia and Roumania which confirmed the high opinion theretofore held of his friendly sentiments toward the Jewish people. His loss we mourn; he was our friend, and of friends the Jews of the world, especially of Europe and most particularly of France in Europe, have all too few.

*reichische Wochenschrift*, paid a visit to these shores. #### To the Memory of E. H. Meisel.

The scanty obituary granted Elias Halyim Meisel, rabbi of Lodz, Poland, recently demised at the advanced age of 71 years, by the Jewish periodicals, may hardly be taken as sufficient. Your correspondent, somewhat connected with the rabbi and his family, and stopping at the rabbi's house on many occasions during his visit in the city of Lodz, may indeed reveal mysteries in the life, activities and achievements of the marvelous man, whose rank and station can barely be filled by any Russian, Polish, German, English or American contemporary.

Though of insignificant appearance, E. H. Meisel towered above his colleagues spiritually, ecclesiastically and discretionally. Having but one son, Nathan, the rabbi extended him secular education on a par with his religious one, school and gymnasium being equally shared with the Heder and Yeshibah.

Far from feminine superstition and womanly prejudice, the latter's daughters, the rabbi's grand-daughters, graduated with honors from girls' high school, in addition to their Hebrew Stud-

ies and religious training, differing thus widely from other Jewish womanhood.

When the epidemic wrought havoc in Lodz and its vicinity some years ago, Rabbi Meisel heroically displayed fearlessness. The government sent out specially fitted ambulances for the reception of cholera-stricken patients and their conveyance to the various city hospitals. The semi-barbaric population, Poles, Germans and Jews condemned the ambulances, the physicians and the hospitals, dreading them much more than the plague itself, some rumor having circulated far and wide that the infected people are taken to the hospitals for their ultimate destruction, so as to save others from infection and contagion. As a refutation of the nonsensical reports, Rabbi Meisel mounted the vehicles time and again, accompanied the physicians, headed the ambulances and urged his co-religionists, as well as the Poles and the Germans, to submit to authorities and be conveyed to the hospitals for treatment and improvement. Rabbi Meisel, moreover, encouraged in those trying days the inauguration and installation of balls, dances, parties and weddings with music and hilarity, so as to check the melancholic spirit and frustrate the public gloominess.

These rabbinic sacrifices and yeoman achievements reached St. Petersburg, the Russian capital, and Czar Alexander III. presented Meisel with a golden sword and knightly band, which paraphernalia the rabbi donned on Russian holidays and Polish festivals. Stopping at Warsaw a short time afterward, Czar Alexander telegraphed for Rabbi Meisel to come and meet him. Responding to the call, Meisel was closeted with the Czar of all the Russias for quite a while, leaving the imperial quarters with a bronze medal in his hand. It goes without saying that the local powers that be had to acknowledge the rabbi's sway and prestige, and a new era dawned upon the Jews of Lodz since the recognition and elevation of Meisel. A new cloister was in the course of erection in the city's neighborhood, to the dedicatory ceremonies of which priests and bishops gathered in great numbers. Rabbi Meisel being likewise among them, his snow-white beard conspicuously distinguishing the rabbi from the Catholic ministers. And the Kiddush Hashem, the sanctification of God's name, was triumphantly manifested there and then. The first and foremost honorary performance was sold for 10,000 roubles; the buyer, however, a devout Catholic, transferred the function to the rabbi, who administered the rites, thanking the audience and the generous donor in a fluent and eloquent speech. The language Meisel used, it must be borne in mind, was neither Hebrew, nor Yiddish, nor Targum; it was the native medium of expression and conversation, the pure and refined Polish tongue, which Rabbi Meisel mastered to a wonderful degree, an ability and quality that very few Russian and Polish rabbis may boast of.

In the course of the revolutionary outbreaks throughout the Russian Empire, the severities and the cruelties of police and secret service men were appalling. The city of Lodz underwent a similar misfortune, 600 people of the Jewish persuasion were arrested at a meeting place, charged with revolt and conspiring against existing conditions. Rabbi Meisel visited local authorities, pleading the cause of his co-religionists and asking for their immediate release. Failing in his attempts, the rabbi thought that the number was too great, and he could not believe under any circumstances that his people would produce so many revolutionists, and as their guilt was never established, he would advise the granting them the benefit of the doubt and setting them all free. The prefect of the police, however, would not hold to the rabbi's view, admitting, nevertheless, of the possibility of some innocents falling in the clutches of the law with the guilty ones, and he would gladly have the unfortunate ones liberated if the rabbi could offer some expedient to solve the problem. The rabbi thereupon advised the prefect to have all the male members examined and see whether they wear a special vest, the four corners of which being adorned by fringes or Tzitzith in accordance with the Mosiac command (Numbers XV., 38-40), the wearers of the Tzitzith turning immune and let free, whereas those who failed to show their loyalty to religion displayed thus their faithlessness in the government. Vague reports that reached the writer of these reflections estimated the number of the disloyal Jews as 200. One is certainly sorry for their fate, the

rabbi being, perhaps, too harsh and zealous in his ingenious artifice.

But, then, when confronted by a perplexing dilemma, King Solomon had to resort to cunningness and cleverness; Rabbi Meisel, likewise, failing to secure the freedom of all the suspected criminals, could do no better under the pressing circumstances, and some subterfuge had to be adopted.

E. H. Meisel was modern and tolerant, nevertheless, the Tzitzith encounter notwithstanding. And but recently he installed Hayim Heller as rabbi and spiritual guide of the Orthodox Jews of the city of Lomza, Poland, Meisel's own former incumbency. It is of interest to note that Hayim Heller is a graduate of the Berlin, Germany, University with the degree of doctor of philosophy, the first instance in the annals of Russian-Jewish history of having a university graduate swaying the religious destinies of Orthodox Jewries of a great city. Dr. Hayim Heller was a resident of Lodz, an intimate friend of the departed Rabbi E. H. Meisel, and is my brother.

#### Dropsie College Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Board of Governors of Dropsie College was held at Philadelphia on June 12. Messrs. Louis Gerstley and Paul Warburg were elected governors for the period of three years and the following officers were re-elected for one year:

President Cyrus Adler, Vice-President Mayer Sulzberger, Secretary Ephraim Lederer and Treasurer Oscar B. Teller.

A letter was received from Mr. U. Ginsberg, stating his inability to come to America and deliver his course of lectures on "The Principal Ideas of Jewish Ethics in Their Historical Development" during the autumn of 1912-1913. This course will therefore be postponed till some future time. Other courses of lectures will be arranged for during the coming year.

In response to an invitation, the college agreed to become a contributing member of the American School for Oriental Study and Research in Palestine. This school is carried on under the direction of the American Institute of Archaeology.

The report of the president showed the college at its various terms during that twenty-one students have attended the past year.

It was the sense of the board that the next department to be established in the college as soon as the funds permit should be a department of history.

Memorial services will be conducted on Sunday afternoon, June 23, 1912, at 4 p. m. sharp, in honor of the late Sender Jarmulowsky, under the auspices of the Congregation Derech Emonuh, at its synagogue in Arverne, L. I. The vast number of Jewish organizations with which the late Mr. Jarmulowsky was identified will be represented, and among the prominent speakers will be Dr. Philip Klein, Prof. Mordecai M. Kaplan, Rev. H. Masliansky and Dr. J. L. Magnes. The public is invited.

**The Talmudic Refutation of Jesus' Messiahship.**

Editor HEBREW STANDARD: Says Rabbi Hillel: "There is no Messiah for the Israelites, as they have enjoyed his bliss and blessings during the reign of Hezekiah" (Senhedrin 98, b). This remark is indeed sweeping and the theory radical to the extreme. Imagine a Jewish minister openly denying the advent of the Messiah! Fancy an Orthodox rabbi publicly renouncing the belief the rabbi is immune and his sacrilegious be condemned as Epicurean, heretic and scoffer, written out of the ministry and banished from the fold. Here, however, the rabbi is immune and his sacrilegious utterances are quoted in the very Talmud without reproach and censure! Again, Rabbi Hillel invests Hezekiah in the Messianic robes, lifting him thus above David, Solomon, Assa, Jehoshaphat, Jotham and Josiah, while, as a matter of record, the other worthies were as good and perhaps better than he.

The reason is obvious; the passage at issue needs a fuller explanation and elucidation, timely conditions and surrounding circumstances impeding, apparently, the rabbi's outspokenness and checking, presumably, the divine's bold statements. It must be borne in mind that sinners and falsifiers meddled with Scriptural passages and misconstrued Biblical sayings to justify their perverse notions and fallacious ideas. Isaiah's prophecy of "Behold, the young woman shall conceive and bear a son," is turned into a virgin who conceived and bore a Christ; such a one is indeed refuted by Israel, knowing as the latter does that Isaiah had addressed King Ahaz, telling him that his wife would give birth to a son Hezekiah, signifying Eternal Strength, or Emanu-El, God-be-with-us (Isaiah VII, 3-14). Rabbi Hillel then impeached the Christians who accepted Jesus as their Messiah, Savior and Christ, telling them frankly that Israelites are far from accepting such a Messiah, the prophecy alluding but to Hezekiah.



Dear Children—Could you picture to yourself a land where all are rich? Where the feeling of pity is not known because "it is not needed"? Where the heart is stony because it ne'er was made tender by the pity for the misery of others? Such a land there was in ancient times. Its name was Sodom. The abundance of wealth that they all enjoyed was so great that it swelled them up with pride, and woe to the poor and the needy of another land who were unfortunate enough to come to their land and ask them for food! Not only did they refuse to help them, but they treated them with the greatest cruelty. The result was that God destroyed their land and all its inhabitants.

The feeling of pity is needed, and it is the law of life that such a feeling should exist. "And if thy brother become poor and fall in decay with thee," says the Torah, "then shalt thou assist him, whether he be a stranger or a sojourner, that he may live with thee."

How this assistance should be given is beautifully explained in the Midrash: "If he is in error," counsel him wisely," says Rabbi Jeremiah. "If he is poor, give him some money," says Isaac. "If he is dead, with no one to bury him, then do him the last honors," says Rabbi Jochanan. "If he is in the power of a tyrant, help him to escape," says the Rabbins. "If he is sick, pay him a visit," says Rabbi Huna.

"And when you do assist him, do not put him to shame," says Rabbi Jonah. When Rabbi Jonah saw a man of good lineage who had lost his fortune and was ashamed to accept charity, he used to go to him and tell him, "Because I have heard that you have fallen heir to a fortune in a foreign land I give you this property, and when you are in good circumstances you can return it to me," and when he gave it to him he told him it was a gift that he had given to him.

Rabbi Phineas said in the name of Rabbi Reuben, "If one gives a penny to a poor man, not only will God repay him handsomely for it, but even his life will be restored to him, because with his penny he restored the poor man's life." How is that? The price of a loaf of bread was ten cents; the poor man stood in the marketplace with only nine cents in his hand; a man came along and gave him a penny; the poor man bought a loaf of bread, ate it, and his life was restored to him. Says the Holy One to that charitable man, blessed be He, "When your soul will be about ready to leave your body, I, also, will restore it to you."

In this materialistic age it is well for you to remember, dear children, what the wise King Solomon said: "The rich and poor meet together; the Lord is the maker of them all." Also what the Midrash comments thereon: "The poor man says to the rich man, 'Please give me some assistance.' The rich man does not give him anything. The Lord is the maker of them all.' He who made this one poor can make him rich, and He who made this one rich can make him poor. Says that rich man to that poor man, 'Why don't you go to work for your food? You have good limbs; you look healthy.' Says the Holy One, blessed be He, to the rich man, 'It is not enough that you do not give him anything of your own, but even upon

what I have given him you cast an evil eye; therefore, these riches will be lost through an unfortunate event, and you will beget a son who will have nothing of your possessions."

Alas, dear children, how many able-bodied men have we seen perishing from hunger for the lack of work that they sought for and could not obtain! But the stony-hearted rich man did not consider that. Unfortunate, indeed, would the poor be if all rich men would follow his example.

Let us rather follow the example of King David, of whom it is said: "And David did what is just and right (performed charity) unto all his people." Says Rabbi Judah, "He rendered a just verdict, acquitting the innocent and convicting the guilty, and if the one against whom judgment was rendered had not the money to pay the plaintiff, King David paid it himself, thus performing justice and charity at the same time."

Thus should we also temper justice with charity. For "the more charity," says Hillel, "the more peace."


