Morris Lasker Building at Farm School

The Morris Lasker Hall is now being erected at the National Farm School, Farm School, Pa., as a memorial to Morris Lasker, of Galveston, Texas, by his family.

Its main purpose is to provide a general living room and dining hall for the students and officers. In one direction the building is 150 feet, in the other 85 feet. Its position on the grounds will be at one end of the main axis of the layout or general plan which the architect has made for the placing of future buildings; on the other end of this axis, facing this building, will be the future new administration building. A large central gardening treatment, to be developed on this axis, will bind the various buildings of the future developed scheme into a connected and complete group.

The first floor, which is of fireproof construction, is divided into three great rooms—the living room, carried out in English half-timber work, with a big fireplace and containing the stair to the second floor; the dining room, of a size to accommodate 150 students, at one end of which will be a fireplace with a space above for a painting of the donor, and the kitchen, spacious and supplied with up-to-date equipment for cooking and serving.

The second floor is devoted to suites for the director, matron, assistant matron and instructors, with an officers' living room, a small infirmary and sewing and linen rooms.

A large attic, at present left undivided, is arranged to afford future rooms for dormitories.

The basement contains the heating and power plant, a modern laundry, a butcher shop, with a large refrigerator for storage of whole beefs, fruits and vegetables, preserve kitchen, preserve store room and large store rooms for dry groceries and canned goods. A feature of this part of the building is the sub-basement, sunk deep into the cool earth, for the storage of potatoes and vegetables.

The cornerstone is to be laid on Sunday of Succoth week, October 7, at which the members of the family of Morris Lasker will be present. Prominent speakers will participate in the exercises.

Champ Clark tells many amusing stories about the various Jewish Representatives and Senators he had known personally, as well as of those who were before his time. He regards Judah P. Benjamin as the ablest statesman that the American Jews produced, and as the right-hand man to Jefferson Davis, the President of the Confederacy. One story he told me made an especially strong impression on me.

About sixty years ago there was a member of the House named Levy. This Levy later inherited a fortune, but on condition that he change his name to "Wooley." Mr. Levy accordingly became Mr. Wooley, and later this same gentleman was elected to the Senate from Florida, and served twelve years in that capacity. Congressman Levy and Senator Wooley are, therefore, one and the same.

Such stories, episodes and sidelights of Jews Speaker Clark has by the hundreds. All of which goes to prove the particular interest he pays to Jews and affairs Jewish.

Jewish Regiments and Valor.

The daily press comments with satisfaction on the organization in London of a regiment composed entirely of Jews. It seems to believe that such a fighting force, exclusively Jewish, will remove the occasional, always baseless, slander of Jewish lack of patriotism made by anti-Semites.

It will take far more than the formation of a Jewish regiment to change an anti-Semite's prejudice or to convert an anti-Jewish heart!

The curious difference between the non-Jewish and the Jewish attitude on Jewish matters is indicated by the way in which the organization of a Jewish regiment is viewed.

The non-Jew and the secular press imagine it to be a creditable and praiseworthy thing, while the Jewish people and the Jewish press, almost without exception, condemn and disapprove of such an action most emphatically.

The logic of the Jewish objection against a Jewish regiment is very clear and most convincing.

Either the Jewish people are a part of the citizenship of the country in which they live, clothed with all the rights, equalities and obligations that go with such citizenship, or else they are a separate group of aliens and outsiders.

If they are citizens, what excuse is there, outside of religious worship, for separate classification in distinct groups or regiments?

To think that Jewish patriotism or valor can be proven or prejudice disproven by establishing the Jewish soldiers in separate fighting units, apart from their fellow-citizens, is shallow, superficial thinking and a most pernicious and offensive theory.

The separation of Jewish soldiers into separate regiments, whether English, French, German or American, only accentuates the dividing lines between Jewish citizens and their fellow-countrymen.

To approve such separation or formation of Jewish regiments is almost equivalent to admitting that Jews are unpatriotic and that they need some proof of their militant ability or willingness to help fight the battles of any country wherein the Jew is recognized as a citizen and peer.

We have sufficient evidence (if proof is required) of Jewish valor, courage and devotion.

In England, where this same Jewish regiment is said to have been formed, the fourth Jewish soldier has just received the Victoria Cross for exceptional heroism and gallantry! In the Russian ranks, in Germany and in America, Jewish daring and intrepidity go hand in hand with those of his non-Jewish military comrades.

This very evening (Saturday) a farewell is being given at the Y. M. H. A. to the many Jewish young men who are leaving St. Louis to do their share, even to the extent of life itself, in various regiments of the national forces. The young aeronaut, Charles Fleischmann, who met a tragic death while flying in the aviation corps, was a Jewish boy, son of the former Jewish mayor of Cincinnati, Julius L. Fleischmann.

We strongly resent the idea that Jewish men must fight as a separate unit in order to prove that the Jew is a patriot. Courage, cowardice and creed are not related in the Jewish case.

The formation of Jews into separate bodies is either a sign of prejudice from those outside of or clannishness of those within. Both are evil. Neither should be tolerated.

Jewish valor, like true courage anywhere, is in the individual and in the cause for which he fights.

Give the Jewish man a lofty cause and worthy country, and there is then no need of putting him into a separate group to bring out the fullest measure of his patriotic fealty, allegiance and devotion.

Jewish valor is effectually established by its many living examples and its silent heroes in the seas and in the graves and trenches that mark each bloody battlefield.—*The Modern View.*

refrain from expressing my surprise. And he, the Gentile, saw no reason for it. How can one get along without a knowledge of the Jewish heroes? Only recently he had re-read, for probably the tenth time, the life of Benjamin Disraeli, and examined a biographical account of the life of Judah P. Benjamin.

It is difficult, if not impossible, to remember all that Clark had to say, especially as I did not take notes. But as far as I can remember, he assured me that he was proud of the fact—that several years ago the Federation of Roumanian Jews elected him as one of its honorary vice Presidents, and that in enumerating his various political activities he rarely fails to mention this particular honorary post.

Born 57 years ago in a village in Kentucky, he knew nothing of Jews except what he saw of the few peddlers and rig-pickers that found their way to his place in common with the other children of his native village, he inherited a natural dislike and prejudice feeling against the Jews. He had, in his own words, "no use for them". He had heard all sort of stories concerning the "damned Jews" and accordingly developed an aversion for the race. This dislike he maintained throughout his entire boyhood. Later on, Clark moved to the State of Missouri, whence he was subsequently elected to Congress. He studied there, but did not make the acquaintance of any Jews. Later on he became a teacher and then principal of a high school in Missouri State. There were at that school several Jewish pupils, and he observed that they were not such impossible people after all. On the contrary, he was quick to perceive that in most respects they resemble the others, and that in some things they were even better. He became especially interested in one Jewish boy at his school. The name of this boy was Milton Leason. "Good, sweet-tempered, polite and a very attractive boy"—Champ Clark put it. He became interested in the lad whose father ran a small store in that city, and soon made his acquaintance. Later on the then teacher and present Speaker became even more interested in Milton Leason. He commenced to visit the boy's home regularly and spent some time with the boy's parents, family and their Jewish friends. And all the time Champ Clark could not stop admiring the "pretty lad" Leason.

In his capacity as teacher and enlightened person, Champ Clark promptly recognized that his prejudice against the Jews was unfounded. He began to take a greater interest in our people, in their suffering and in their problems, so that Clark is to-day one of the very warmest friends the Jews have in this country. "His" Leason subsequently left for New York, where he went in business and did not succeed. When his health gave way he left for Maine. And to this day whenever Clark is within a radius of a hundred miles from the place where Leason resides, the two friends meet and renew their old friendship.

Champ Clark loves the Jews. He does not flatter them, but he knows from experience that there are fewer criminals, homicides, beggars and other "terrible people" among them than among other people; that notwithstanding the fact, that Jews have no land of their own, they are the most devoted and loyal patriots in all countries where they are found. For this alone, if for no other reason, it is possible in the opinion of Champ Clark that the Powers will exert themselves on behalf of our oppressed people, both because of their universal suffering and unexcelled loyalty.

CHAMP CLARK—CHAMPION OF JEWS.

WASHINGTON.—In the course of my journalistic activities at Washington, I had occasion recently to spend an interesting hour with Speaker Champ Clark in his private room at the Capitol. I seized upon the opportunity to discuss, among other matters, several important Jewish affairs and to gauge Clark's knowledge of Jews in general. It is significant that, next to President Wilson, Champ Clark is probably the most important figure in the political life of this country. For in the person of the Speaker of the House of Representatives there is usually reflected the party which holds the balance of political power. Speaker Clark is a Democrat, and that means that the Democrats are in power, else Clark would not be the Speaker.

Champ Clark is undoubtedly one of the most popular and at the same time esteemed figures in America's capital. It is an open secret that but for a single successful manipulation on the part of Mr. Bryan during the Baltimore convention, five years ago, Clark and not Wilson would have been in the Presidential chair. This fact becomes even more clear when one recalls that Clark had several times in succession at the Baltimore convention received the majority of votes. This would have gotten for him the nomination in the Republican party, but lost him the nomination, and also the election, because of the special plank in the Democratic platform which requires that a candidate must receive full two-thirds of all the votes cast. Nor will his friends easily forget the brilliant, historical speech for peace and against conscription which Clark delivered several months ago in Congress. All friend and foe alike, and colleagues as well as political opponents, feverishly applauded Clark and literally carried him on their shoulders, regardless of whether they agreed with his views or not. His popularity among the people is explained by the fact that it is known that he belongs to the better class of American politicians. Just as he is personally neat, clean, and without a blemish, so is his political record, and it is for that reason that his enemies can be counted on one's fingers.

It was a very hot day when I called on Speaker Clark. In his immaculately clean white silk suit, with his clean-shaven face, penetrating eyes and white head of hair, he resembles a Christian saint. He has a forbidding look, smiles but rarely, and yet one feels that he is dealing with a friend, with one who regards himself as the other man's equal and whose attitude is that of good will toward all. He takes his time although he has more to do than a good many others around here. He is prepared to talk about anything in the universe and, what is truly noteworthy, he is posted on all things, especially on history and biography. I had known before that previous to his coming to Congress, Clark was first an instructor and then president of a college in his State. In spite of that I could not help wondering at the broad and deep knowledge which he displayed in everything that came up in our conversation. That he should be familiar with general historical and biographical data of the world was not so surprising. But that he should be perfectly at home with the familiar Jewish personalities, and posted on all Jewish historical figures, especially of the last century—this was truly surprising. I could not

Jewish Relief Commission Named.

Announcement that the Jewish relief bodies have reached a solution of the problem of distribution of American relief moneys in Europe, through the sending abroad of a commission duly accredited by the United States Government, was made last night by Albert Lucas, secretary of the Joint Distribution Committee of the Funds for Jewish War Sufferers, of which Felix M. Warburg is the chairman.

The commission, which is composed of Dr. Boris Bogen and Max Senior, has left an Atlantic port for a port in Europe, and will establish in Holland a bureau of the Joint Distribution Committee during the duration of the war and for purposes of rehabilitation after the war, with such clerical and other employees as may be necessary to administer the relief work for the Jews in all the war zones and in Palestine.

The commission, through the new bureau, will co-operate with the committee of Dutch Jews that has been formed in Amsterdam, under the chairmanship of Frederick Solomon Van Nierop, president of the Amsterdamse Bank, in Amsterdam. The committee of Dutch Jews, acting with the bureau of the Joint Distribution Committee, will apportion remittances from the \$10,000,000 fund and subsequent funds transmitted from America for the relief of Jews in the warring countries.

Dr. Bogen and Mr. Senior carry with them letters from the American State Department to the American Ambassadors in the neutral and allied countries, urging that they be given every opportunity to successfully perform the duties allotted to them. The establishment of this bureau in a neutral country will permit American relief funds to be distributed directly to the war sufferers in all the war zones, and is the first step of the kind which has been taken.

Dr. Bogen was born in Moscow, Russia, in 1870, and came to the United States in 1891, graduating from New York University in 1895. He is nationally known as a social worker and has been connected with the New York Educational Alliance and has been a teacher in the Baron de Hirsch Trade School and the Hebrew Technical Institute of this city. From 1900 to 1904 he was principal of the Baron de Hirsch Agricultural School at Woodbine, N. J., and he was superintendent of the United Hebrew Charities in Cincinnati, Ohio, from 1904 to 1916. Up to his departure for Europe he was field secretary of the National Conference of Jewish Charities.

He has traveled extensively in both the United States and Europe, and has made an intensive study of problems affecting philanthropic disbursements.

Mr. Senior was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1862, and is a retired merchant, having devoted his entire time for the last twenty years to social work. He was one of the organizers of the Jewish Federation of Charities in Cincinnati, and in 1900, initiated the National Conference of Jewish Charities.

As president of the National Jewish Charities of Cincinnati Mr. Senior has been associated in social work with Dr. Bogen for the past twelve years. He is a member of the National Conference of

The Jews of Palestine—The Heart of World Jewry.

For over three years hundreds of thousands of Jews have fallen victims to the war juggernaut. Invasion and counter-invasion have pulled over them, crushing their lives out. There the Jewish Communal Association had a meeting on May 22, and in a very few minutes had raised and forwarded \$15,000.

This remarkable manifestation of the closeness of Palestine to the heart of Jewry—to the heart of the world—has elicited a striking article from Menachem Mendel Ussishkin, the great leader of Russia's Zionists, which is published in the Yiddish Times of London.

"What we have feared so much has come to pass. Our beloved, precious Palestine has become the arena of military operations. The political and strategical needs of both alliances do not halt at the border of the Holiness of the Earth which is so precious to all the nations of the world. The English invaded southern Palestine and the Turkish government began the evacuation of that district. The news was flashed to all corners of the globe.

"All of us have taken steps to alleviate the conditions resulting from the evacuation. But that is not so important, after all. Most important is not to lose courage, awe, and to grasp the significance of the situation. After all, what happened is, in itself, of but small consequence by contrast with the great world catastrophe. A little Jewish community—3,000—was evicted. A few excesses, a few robberies! Did not such things happen these past three years before our very eyes, everywhere and every day?

"And if the occurrences in Jaffa have stirred up the whole world—not only the Jewish world, but the non-Jewish world too—it is clear how powerful is the force of our ideal. It proves that Tel-Aviv is not merely the Hill of Spring, but that it is the Tel Shehakel Ponim Alo—the Hill Toward Which All Faces Are Turned; that it is the heart and mind of scattered Jewry, and that the 3,000 Jews in Palestine have, for us, a greater value than 1,000,000 Jews in the Diaspora. In this thought we find the strength to endure this blow.

Chief Rabbi of Sweden Believes War Will Solve Jewish Problem.

Dr. Marcus Ehrenpreis, Chief Rabbi of Sweden, is firmly convinced that the world war will bring in its wake a permanent and satisfactory solution of the Jewish problem. Even as the French Revolution proclaimed the Rights of Man, so this war will proclaim the rights of the peopled, is the opinion of this distinguished and learned leader in Israel.

"I firmly believe," said Rabbi Ehrenpreis to a representative of the London Jewish Chronicle, "that this world war, in which we Jews have participated in a proportion of three to every Serb and four to every Belgian, and in which a great part of the Jewish people has suffered far more than even the Belgians or the Serbs—I firmly believe and sincerely trust that this world war and all the Jewish blood that has been shed—which we hope will not have been shed in vain—will also bring to our question a satisfactory and permanent solution."

Dr. Ehrenpreis could hardly suppress his emotion as he referred to the plight of the Jews in Palestine. "It is shocking and deplorable in the extreme to see the work of tens of years being foolishly, wantonly, destroyed—work which had been brought together by the whole of Jewry the world over—all destroyed in a few hours by the military," said the Chief Rabbi. "There is really not much that we Jews have not suffered in this war, but this blow is the hardest of all that has descended upon us, for it caught us in a very tender and sensitive spot.

"But our only answer must be, 'The work must go on!'" he declared. "Our projects and our plans in Palestine, which at all times have been loyal and without *arrière-pensée*, will remain unchanged by these happenings. The coming peace conference will have to declare the right of the Jews to an unhindered development and the emancipation of all Jews who at present are not free. We must very strongly emphasize the point that the Russian emancipation does not in any way minimize the meaning of Palestine for us. Thinking men have never asserted that Jewish colonization in Palestine could ever solve the economic question of the millions of Jews in Russia. But Palestine must become the place where the Jewish absolute culture will be fostered and from which a radiance shall spread in all directions. It must constitute the solution of the question of the future being of Jewry.

"Millerand said recently that as the French revolution proclaimed the *droit de l'homme*, so the present war should proclaim the *droit des peuples*. Now, we demand the right of that part of the Jewish people who do not want to live in their present domiciles to live their own life on their own historic soil. And it is the whole logic of the war that this right must not be denied us. Further, whatever may be the fortune of war, concerning Palestine we have the right to proclaim our demand, and this we should proclaim, no matter in which our inner sympathies may lie."

German Zionists Greet Russian Zionists.


Evidently with the permission of the authorities, the Central Executive Committee of the German Zionist Federation has sent a remarkable letter of greeting to their brethren, the Zionists, in Russia.

The following are excerpts from this letter, which is signed by Professor Otto Warburg:

"The Russian revolution has brought freedom to the Russian Jews. Deeply moved, we greet our Russian brothers. We were one with you in your strivings and experiences. Your fight was our fight. It was in your struggle for freedom that we all found our dearest inspiration, and it was this struggle that was most strongly expressed in the Zionist movement. Full of hope, we look to the future, when we may work together for our people in their national aspirations. Out of the cry of the oppressed peoples of Russia for freedom there came loud and clear the demands of the Jews of Russia. They made their demands fully conscious of the deep significance of the time through which they were passing.

"The Jews of Russia have ever been the truest, the most active, the most devoted in the ranks of the Zionist cause. Our gratitude is deep beyond expression. Russian Jewry, freed from its chains, and thoroughly aware of its national aims, has infused new hope and strength into our movement, and has brought nearer the day of the realization of our age-long ideal.

"The message was sent in the name of the Central Executive Committee of the German Zionist Organization, and obviously with the sanction of the German authorities."

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Eggs a la Stanley.

Set into a small saucepan one tablespoonful of wine vinegar, a little white pepper, a dash of cayenne and a pinch of sugar; reduce this somewhat on the fire, then add a little horseradish, grated. Poach the eggs as usual, dress them on separate toast and cover them with sauce, arranging for each egg around the platter a small cluster of grated horseradish.

Macaroon Custard.

Cover one-half pound of macaroons with hot cream and when cool beat well. Then add the yolks and whites of six eggs, beaten separately, and a teaspoonful of vanilla. Fill buttered molds with the mixture and bake for ten minutes.

Spanish Tomato Soup.

Simmer three onions, thinly sliced, in one tablespoonful butter for ten minutes; then add to them the juice from one can tomatoes and two of the tomatoes, and let cook slowly for twenty minutes; strain, pressing through a sieve. Return to the fire, add one tablespoonful butter, pepper and salt and stir in two well-beaten eggs. Do not let the soup boil after adding the eggs.

Green Tomato Pickle.

One peck green tomatoes, one dozen large white onions, six red pepper pods, vinegar, one cup mixed whole spices. Cut the tomatoes into slices one-fourth inch thick, discarding the small slice at stem and blossom ends. Cut the onions (peeled) in similar slices. Pack the vegetables in a jar with layers of salt between. Let them stand over night. Drain off the brine. Repack the vegetables; then cover with vinegar scalded with the peppers and spices. These will keep in an earthen jar but may be stored in cans. The onions may be omitted.

Tomato Catsup.

Slice a peck of ripe tomatoes and two dozen onions. Let them boil one hour, then press through a sieve. Add one quart of vinegar, one pint of port wine, one tablespoonful of ground cloves, one tablespoonful of allspice, half an ounce of mace, four grated nutmegs, one and a half tablespoonfuls of pepper, one scant teaspoonful of cayenne, and a half cup of salt. More vinegar may be substituted for the port wine if desired. Scald over the fire and store in fruit jars or in bottles, covering the corks with sealing wax.

To Slice Peaches.

Peel peach, then hold firmly and mark with peeling knife the number and size of slices desired from each peach; then, still holding the entire peach, cut slices all around and you have the entire peach sliced without having removed any. In this way you can more accurately count the number of pieces on each dish, also get desired sizes with less work.

The moment meat, fish, milk and eggs are allowed to get warm they begin to spoil. Bacteria and germs multiply rapidly in slightly warm food, and quickly make it dangerous or unfit to eat.

Do not keep perishable foods in a hot kitchen or pantry or in a sunny place a moment longer than is necessary.

If your stove needs blacking, take a little brush (an old shaving brush) and go over it quickly with a little cold water; this moistens the blacking that is already on, then shine as usual.

A time saver is a large glass salt shaker, containing a mixture of salt and pepper. While cooking this saves time in flavoring food calling for both these ingredients.

On a hook above a kitchen table put rubber bands and as you clear your table after meal put remains of salmon, gravy or sauces that can be used again in small jars or crocks or cups, use pieces of tissue paper for covers and hold them firm with a rubber band. This keeps things protected from dust and air, and also keeps the smell of such things as salmon from going through the refrigerator.

For dusting the kitchen range nothing is better than a whisk broom covered with a piece of old black stocking. Dip the whisk when covered in kerosene oil, then expose it to the air until the oil has evaporated. Treated in this way the brush will absorb the dust, not scatter it.

When kettle lids are otherwise good, but have lost their tin ring or wooden knob, a strong wire hairpin pushed partly through and ends bent in opposite directions will lengthen their usefulness.

Try adding a spoonful of milk and a little cracker or bread crumbs to each egg used and scramble them in hot butter. The quantity can be almost doubled and the quality improved rather than otherwise.

To keep lettuce fresh for over a week, put it in a paper bag and this in a tin pail, covered, and leave it where it is cool. Have no wet leaves when lettuce is placed in the bag.

WHEN GHETTO MEN FIGHT CHANCE FOR THE DAUGHTERS OF ISRAEL.

Once upon a time—it seems almost ages ago—they were hard-worked Ghetto tailoresses, cigar-makers, milliners. Today finds them most ardent of recruits to the ranks of the merry munitioneers making shells instead of shirt-waists. You can hear them talk of their change of occupation, as they sip their Saturday night cup of chocolate on the marble-topped tables in the regions of Aldgate. It is a different life entirely; one and all will go back to the workshop with something of a qualm. But the Daughter of Israel is an adaptable entity. There are more openings for her than munitioneering.

Passing through one of the byways of Aldgate, the other day, I came across a sturdy woman, most evidently of foreign extraction, bearing a weighty sack of coals upon her shoulder. Quite oblivious of the interest she was arousing, the woman coalie shot the contents of the sack into a near-by cellar with an ease and an expertness that was truly amazing. Then she made her way to the van for a further load, and drove away with all the assurance of an Amazon.

That the Ghetto should have led the way in, so startling an innovation, is certainly typical of those unconventional days; though I would not dare to suggest that the woman coalie is going to find very many imitators. Still, it set me wondering.

How are the daughters of the Ghetto to meet the coming departure of their menfolk for the trenches? How fill the industrial gaps that must necessarily ensue? There are ever so many Ghetto callings, quite apart from berths in workshop and factory; in which woman has seldom, if ever, appeared, occupations rendered sacred to the mere male from time immemorial, almost as long as the Ghetto has been.

But military exigencies take no heed of custom, and so it comes about that some queer phases of Ghetto activity find representation in the list of the men who will be called upon to fight Britain's battles, if they haven't gone already.

Here are just a few occupations for which the energetic Jewess of the humbler class may or may not care to adapt herself. Will she care to usurp the place of the auto-cra of the fish-stall, a genus long a thorn in the side of the mothers in Israel? Will she hie to Billingsgate fish market long before London is awake; bargain with dealers as shrewd as herself; set out her stand; pit her wits against those of her sisters-in-faith; clean and chop the fish and dispose of it at a profit?

Already, I have observed one or two elderly women presiding over fish-stall in the neighborhood of Wentworth St., E. They seem to enjoy fair patronage, and no-one appears to resent the invasion. Fish-selling is not an occupation for the average lady typist. But somebody must take the place of the men who are serving. Maybe, the fact that a man may take as much as £10 in a

few hours will act as a stimulant to would-be candidates.

Another occupation that offers it self to the Jewess of energy and initiative is that of "Chevra Collector"—representative of friendly, philanthropic and provident societies who have hitherto employed exclusively the male collector. The collector invariably represents at least half-a-dozen societies. The fact that the Chevra man never mixes the subscriptions of the dowry club with those of the Pass-over Society, or confuse the Widows Fund subscribers with patrons of the Homes for Aged Jews, points to the need for mental clearness on the part of his feminine successor. It is a highly interesting and healthy occupation, one that will appeal to the woman who loves to mingle with her sisters. It is essential, however, that she should make herself conversant with every class of social news—births, marriages, betrothals and burials—if she would get near to the hearts of her weekly subscribers. Likewise she must not object to the stairs of the model dwellings. She will grow to appreciate this form of healthful exercise.

If she be of a literary turn of mind, there should be scope for her—as a sort of side-line—in the attractive realm of letter-writing. It is really surprising how many Ghetto folk are ever needing epistolary assistance. Love letters, letters reminding of overdue accounts, there is a sufficiency of correspondence for the unlettered class to occupy the wits and the spare time of the sympathetic young lady. Letters from parents to the boy at the front represent quite a large proportion of the letter-writer's output. So that if our friend does forsoke the pen for the sword, his feminine competitor may yet create a lucrative connection.

Up to quite recently, the scraping of horseradish, one of the most tearful of Ghetto occupations, was almost exclusively monopolized by the masculine element. Now these erstwhile scrapers are bringing tears to the eyes of the enemy. But I would not advise the daughters of the Ghetto to choose this as an outlet for their activity. The pay is out of all proportion to the tears that must be shed.

Already the butcher's wife is becoming expert in the use of knife and cleaver, and many a Ghetto mother, whose realm was compassed by the kitchen walls, has found a larger horizon. For the womanhood of the Ghetto, as for the womanhood of England, things will never be as they were.

Jewish Bakers to Co-operate with Hoover.

The Government of the United States, through the Commercial Economy Board of the Council of National Defense, has recently asked the bakers of the country to discontinue the practice of exchanging unsold bread for freshly baked bread. The board is now asking the consumers of the country to assist the baker in his efforts to do away with this wasteful practice.

A countrywide investigation conducted by the Commercial Economy Board convinced it that fully five per cent. of the bread baked by wholesale bakers was returned to them by bread retailers. Part of this bread was sold to the poor and to charitable institutions, but nearly half of it was disposed of for chicken and hog feed. The result has been that some 500,000 barrels of good wheat and rye flour, made up for human consumption at great cost of manufacture and distribution, has been fed to animals or thrown away. Ultimately, the public has paid for this waste in the higher price necessarily charged by the baker to cover this loss.

Bread one day old is good food—it is, in fact, better and more digestible than fresh bread. When the Jewish public considers that all of Europe is eating war bread—bread in which potatoes, oats, barley and even fiber is substituted for wheat, and that no fresh bread whatever may be sold in England, it will be ready to do its share by accepting day-old bread, when necessary. Even this will not be necessary if the consumer will assist the retailer by ordering her bread in advance. The bakers of this city have loyally agreed to abide by the wish of the Council

of National Defense, made doubly urgent on account of the war and the paucity of flour. The public has proved itself ready to co-operate with the large department stores in limiting the return-goods nuisance, a costly and unnecessary waste of human labor. There is as much or more need for the whole-hearted co-operation of the public in this movement to abolish the return-bread nuisance, which has meant so un pardonable a destruction of the bread of human life.

The Jewish public of this city, which buys its bread to so large an extent from small retailers and delicatessen stores, will prove their patriotism and their Jewish traditional sense of the wrong of food wasting by making it possible for these retailers to co-operate with the bakers in abolishing the costly and unnecessary return of unsold bread. One of the unexpected results of the movement for food conservation necessitated by the diminishing supply of food in the world has been the action of the Jewish bakers in resolving to discontinue Saturday baking. This action is at once a patriotic one and one that is of peculiar appropriateness for Jewish bakers to take. It is a tribute to their willingness to forgo personal profit for the sake of the country. It is a splendid sign of their readiness to make personal sacrifice when the country calls.

In order that this action shall be sustained and shall have the widest influence, the co-operation of the public is necessary. The public must show that they approve of the patriotic action of the bakers by accepting the new situation gladly and without complaint. The public must show that they appreciate both the gravity of the situation created by the world-wide food shortage and the motives of action of the Jewish bakers. Particularly the Jewish public should, and undoubtedly will, support the bakers in this move, because of the Jewish value of rescuing the Saturday Sabbath for a group of hard-worked purveyors to the public need. The old Jewish law of "six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath," is a law the fundamental wisdom of which has been vindicated every day more and more in these times of fierce economic stress and competition. The universal movement for shorter hours of labor and a legally fixed working day, which has been gaining in strength for the last century, is in spirit nothing more than the working of the old Jewish law of the Sabbath. Assuredly the Jewish baker is entitled to his Sabbath rest, and the public will readily and gladly accept the new regime of no baking on Saturday, admirable as this is both from the Jewish and from the patriotic American point of view.

No Hope for Jews of Poland Without National Rights.

The Jews of Poland look forward with dread to the possibility of being left without national rights in an independent Poland. Should that happen, their only recourse would be a mass migration. Life in Poland under such conditions, they fear, would be impossible. Short of massacre, every possible outrage that Polish malice can invent—and the famous "boycott" shows Polish adeptness in malevolent invention—would be perpetrated against them.

In their plight, in the fear of being unable to win national rights unless they are aided in their campaign by their brethren in other lands—they turn to America and to the American Jewish Congress. The Provisional Zionist Committee has received a letter from one of the most distinguished Jews of Poland—a man who has almost single-handedly brought succor to the tens of thousands of Jewish war victims in that country, and who has won the confidence of all elements of Jewry, even including the "assimilationist" groups of Europe—which is in effect a clarion call to the Jews of America to stand by their brethren in Poland in this hour of their greatest need.

Under existing circumstances it would be dooming the writer of this letter, of betraying him to the enemies of the Jews of Poland, and exposing him to the extreme measures of their malevolence, to reveal his identity. The description given above must suffice as a guarantee for the fidelity of his statement—that together with the guarantee of the Provisional Zionist Committee of its correspondent's absolute responsibility.

He writes, among other things: "It is very probable that Poland will become independent, that the Jews will be left entirely at the mercy of the Poles, and utterly dependent upon their good will.

"Should this happen, hatred and contempt, boycott and oppression will be our lot. A new Galuth will begin. Our American brethren must begin thinking now of a mass migration from Poland, in that event. True, some of us will migrate to Russia, but in view of the unsettled conditions in that country most of the Jews of Poland will flee to America, in even larger numbers than our brethren fled from the Czar-ridden Russia of the '30s. It is only they—the Jews of America—who can alter the situation in Poland, and we look to them to help us.

"The roots of anti-Semitism have found deep and secure lodgement in the hearts of the Polish people. No, they will not make pogroms, but they will do everything short of pogroms—every devilish thing they can think of short

of murder—to make life for the Jews so unlivable that pogroms will not seem so terrible in prospect.

"Even now, while the question of Polish independence is a matter for the peace conference to decide, and that conference still far off in the distant future, our condition is so terrible that we shudder to think of what the future has in store.

"You Jews of America must see to it that when the question of Polish independence comes before the peace conference our rights as a national minority be secured. You must begin action now, to press the claims and the rights of the Jews of Poland to their own life, to their own culture.

"Is not this a war for the freedom of the smaller nationalities? Help us—take care of us!"

Distinguished Jews of America

Every New Yorker knows the combination of Cohan & Harris, and what it stands for. Good amusement of a whole and nature to what they do is to give this city for some time past and a mark on a play stamps it as something worth while. A new generation and a new type of theatrical business is what they represent. They have ideas—novelty articles—ideas, but ideal concerning the duty of a manager to the public and the duty of a man towards his fellowmen, which sound the new note in the business life of this country.

Sam H. Harris was born on the Bowery, on February 3, 1876. He attended elementary school in Kingston street and after his graduation in 1894 at the age of thirteen became a messenger boy for Lohmeyer & Son, Grand street, at \$2.50 per week. Later on he secured a job in a printing office where he was obliged to carry heavy forms from the third floor of one shop to the second floor of another shop; there was nothing in it, however, to satisfy the lad's ambition, so he began to peruse diligently the daily want-ads division of the city papers, which led him to the Empire Travel Supply Company as a salesman. He was highly successful in his new position, but he stayed in it for a few years only. Mr. Harris became the business manager of a young pugilist, Terry McGovern, the whirlwind boxer of his time.



It was to feature Terry that Mr. Harris bought a half-interest in a burlesque organization known as "The Gay Morning Glories." Melodrama was then just about on the height of its glory, and Mr. Harris started a number of productions with P. H. Sullivan and A. H. "Al" Woods. To this period belong: "The Bowery After Dark," "For Her Children's Sake," "The King of Detectives," "Wedded and Parted," "The Evil Men Do," and "The Fatal Wedding." The last named thriller is said to have realized greater profit in the so-called popular priced theatre than many of the two-dollar hits do on Broadway at the present time.

In 1904 Sam Harris first met George M. Cohan and they started a partnership, which was to last for all the years to come and prove so fruitful for the future of the American stage. Their first venture was "Little Johnny Jones," that never-to-be-forgotten musical play by George M. Cohan. Its success was phenomenal. But long before the success of this play had begun to wane, other compositions and plays began to stream forth from the pen of Cohan. Among others there were: "Forty-Five Minutes from Broadway," "The Talk of New York," "Fifty Miles from Boston," "George Washington, Jr.," "The Honeymooners," "The American Idea," "The Yankee Prince," "The Man Who Owns Broadway," "Get Rich Quick Wallingford," "The Little Millionaire," "The House Next Door" and "The Fortune Hunter."

To a reporter of a New York paper, Mr. Harris once expressed the following ideas about the suitability of plays: "Good plays are made, not written, at least that is the fact in the case of almost every successful play we have presented. Some of them have been entirely rewritten in this office and some have been rebuilt and reconstructed right here in this room. We are always glad to buy a new play if it has one new and good idea in it. The central idea is the main thing. If that is a winner, everything else can be supplied by us. Of course, we like the original author to do the rewriting if possible; and we always give him the opportunity to do it, but if he does not carry out our ideas we have others do so.

"It is only fair to Mr. Elmer L. Reizenstein, the author of "On Trial," to say in this connection that he did practically all the re-writing himself, with the assistance of Arthur Hopkins, in our office.

"On Trial" is probably the greatest dramatic success that the American stage has even known. The returns at the box office indicate that to be a fact. It is a very extraordinary play, but much in it that makes for its wonderful success was developed in rehearsal. It has been our policy to give plays a try-out, and then to work upon them until we get them into satisfactory shape for a metropolitan hearing. There is an immense amount of work to be done in 'polishing up' a play after it is produced. Characters have to be strengthened, new lines must be written, situations and climaxes must be rearranged, and all this constitutes a lot of hard work, which never ceases until the first night on Broadway.

"Mr. Cohan and I believe we are under obligations to our public and owe a duty to people. We consider every patron who buys a ticket to one of our shows, places us under a personal obligation to him, and we try to discharge it to the best of our ability. All our employes, have instructions to feel the same way, and to act accordingly. We regard the confidence of the public as the greatest asset a theatrical manager can have."

At the present moment, Cohan & Harris are in the first rank of theatre managers. They are the lessees and managers of the Geo. M. Cohan Theatre at Broadway and 43d street, New York. In conjunction with Klaw & Erlanger, they control the destinies of the Gaiety Theatre at Broadway and 46th street, and are the lessees of the Geo. M. Cohan Grand Opera House of Chicago, Ill.

Mr. Harris is the executive head of Cohan & Harris' enterprises and gives his direct personal attention to every detail that comes to him for supervision. His offices are in the Cohan & Harris Theatre Building, 226 West 42d street. Although he is an exceedingly busy man, he always finds the time to greet his numerous callers and to lend his presence to social functions and the world of sports. He is a member of the Friars, Lambs and Greenroom Clubs, and generally

conceded one of their most active and tireless workers. He is also a thirty-second degree Mason and a Shriner.

As a man, Mr. Harris is one of those sweet characters, whose absolute fairness and interest in his fellowman make him dear to his employees and beloved by all.

In New Brunswick, N. J., there is a growing Jewish community which for a very long time was deprived of any social center where the various elements could meet on common ground and a Jewish life could be maintained. It was Mr. Jesse Strauss who first organized a Young Men's Hebrew Association in the town. It was very little then, with ten members and one room where meetings were held and a library maintained—now the association has 200 members and a cosy little building of its own, practically clear from debt.

The merit of having accomplished this revolution, within the short period of six years, is due almost entirely to Mr. Jesse Strauss. Born in the city of New York, on August 14, 1884, he is the son of Emanuel and Mathilde Strauss. His career is brief and remarkably American. He attended public school and evening high school. At the age of thirteen, he took a position in a law office, where he stayed for five years. He then became a clerk in the General Cigar Company, Inc. This happened in 1900, and from that time on, he rose from position to position until he became the district manager of the company for New Brunswick and vicinity. It is in this position where he enjoys the greatest esteem of all with whom he comes into contact.

Mr. Strauss is a member of the Denver Sanitarium, a director in the Charity Organization Society of New Brunswick, of the Middlesex General Hospital, vice-president of the New Brunswick Board of Trade, a member of the New Jersey Chamber of Commerce, a director of the New Brunswick Building and Loan Association, president of the Young Men's Hebrew Association, which, as we have stated above, he had organized and directed from its inception, and also a vice-president of the New Jersey State Federation of Young Men's Hebrew Associations, he is a Free and Accepted Mason, a member of the New Brunswick Country Club, member of the Maccabees and vice-president of the Temple Anshe Emeth. He also served for some time as Fire Commissioner of New Brunswick.

Mr. Strauss was married November 7, 1909, to Miss Frances Goldsmith, daughter of David and Rachael Goldsmith. He is a man of a remarkable personality, clean-cut and full of life, and a contact with him is very inspiring and his magnetic personality had won him many friends.



The writer spent more than an hour in the company of Mr. Nathan Fluegelman discussing business and business principles. Mr. Fluegelman is not only a successful business man, but a thinker as well. His business principles are sound and his wise sayings readily explain his personal success.

"Success," Mr. Fluegelman declared, "does not lie in imitating the methods and ideas of others, but rather in the ability of the individual to originate new ideas."

In discussing the subject of manufactures, Mr. Fluegelman assumed a somewhat skeptical attitude. "There is a great difference in the manner of manufacturing in this country from that of the European countries," Mr. Fluegelman resumed. "Every man in Europe prides himself on the improvement of his wares year by year, whereas in this country the tendency is for each manufacturer to introduce poorer material until eventually the poorest kind of material is turned out. Every man tries hard to make all that he possibly can in the present and cares little about the possibilities of the future. That explains why it is that in this country there is no such thing as sons following sincerely the trades of their fathers."

In addition to these statements, Mr. Fluegelman had much to say on the subject of success in the younger element. He feels that a father should make every effort to interest his own son in his business if the child shows any inclination whatsoever to learn it. Mr. Fluegelman's oldest son, who is only fourteen years old, is taught to take an active interest in his father's business. He is also taking up Spanish in order that it be possible for him to sell in South America. Mr. Fluegelman is trying to make his son understand his business thoroughly. He will send him to the mill where he shall work in the factory; he will allow him to sell and do everything in his power to make him understand the business from the very bottom. If in addition to a thorough knowledge of an industry a youth would persist in the field of his endeavor he would surely succeed.

This is the theory upon which Mr. Fluegelman worked throughout his lifetime, and that explains his success in the business world. Nathan Fluegelman was born in Galatz, Roumania, November 26, 1872. His mother's father, Marcus Shoen, was the organizer of the Red Cross in Roumania and among the first to help the Zionist movement in his native country where he did much to help the colonization of Palestine. His death was mourned by public prayer in Palestine. Mr. Fluegelman's father, Moses, is a retired merchant of New York, descended from a fine Jewish family.

Mr. Fluegelman came to this country in 1888 and began his commercial career by selling piece goods at \$2.50 per week. He worked



with one firm over twelve years, gradually working his way up from errand boy to manager, having in these twelve years worked in the capacity of assistant bookkeeper, bookkeeper and salesman. In 1900 he entered into partnership with a capital of about \$250. His partner invested \$5,000 and accepted Mr. Fluegelman's note for the additional \$2,250 that he should have invested, and which he redeemed after two years. His partner later became ill and died, and for three years Mr. Fluegelman supported the family of the deceased.

Today Mr. Fluegelman is recognized among the largest converters of cotton in New York, his specialty being fancy goods and novelties, for he makes original designs of his own, a fact which explains his great success.

On the 5th of June, 1892, Mr. Fluegelman was married to Miss Jennie Blank and they are parents of two sons, Arthur and Milton. Mr. Fluegelman is a member of Temple Anshe Chesed, and a contributor to the Federation. His children are reared in an environment of orthodoxy, and his son, Arthur, has often surprised his elders and friends by his unusual knowledge of Hebrew.

A WANDERING JEW

As I entered a dark and dreary room (which lay in the vicinity of my residence) I perceived an old man with a long gray beard and snow white locks throwing themselves over his shoulders. A weary countenance which bore traces of hoary age and deep sorrow, but this very feature indicated freshness of spiritual ardor as if recently born. His large and protuberant eyes shone out in this dark room like the sun's radiance of a spring morning and every now and then lifted them up and gazed at the ceiling, then buried them in the book which lay open. A small twinkling candle standing next to the book and the aged man enveloped in a long black cloak nodding his head to and fro with a trembling voice he began: How does the city sit solitary that was full of people, how is she become as a widow, she that was great among the nations and princess among the provinces, how is she become tributary! Soon his voice began to sing lower and lower, drowning itself in a veil of tears, bent his head deeper and deeper in the book, suddenly raising his head and staring with his glimmering eyes, with a cry of horror and distress which penetrated my heart, he exclaimed: "Remember, O Lord! what is come upon us; consider and behold our reproach."

My anxiety grew greater every minute. I was terror stricken at this pitiful and heart-breaking sight. Not understanding then the Hebrew exclamations of the old and venerable man, not having the slightest conception of this dismal and gloomy scene? With a beating heart, convulsive nervousness and childish fear I ran over to the old man and cried out impatiently, "Why art thou weeping, father? Why sittest thou on the ground? What happened to thee? Has thou lost thy fortune?" The aged man gazed at me with great astonishment at my sudden appearance, and said, grasping my arm, "My dear child, son of Israel, you are too young to help me. How can I refrain from weeping? I have lost my mother. Have become an orphan. Have had many step-mothers since my natural mother was robbed from me and every one abandoned me."

"What meanest thou by it, old father?" I do not comprehend thee. Tell me who was your mother after whom you weep so passionately?" "Hear me, son of Israel," said the old man with a shivering voice. "The mother after whom I weep is not of flesh and blood and not only my mother but the mother of the whole nation of Israel. It is Jerusalem which has given birth to this great nation, which is now being scattered on all the four corners of the earth."

"Woe is to the nation of Israel," ejaculated the old man on the highest pitch of his voice. "Alas!" I cried out fearfully. "What hear I of thee? Thou gray bearded old man with glittering eyes, behold I fear thee, old father."

"Fear me not, son of my nation," said the old man with a trembling voice, pointing to his long gray beard and snow white locks of his head. "Know you my child that I am wandering nearly two thousand years, and cannot find a resting place where to lie my head down? Know you, son of Israel, that I am like a thorn in the eyes of my neighbors? They devour me, maltreat me, ridicule me, spit at me, drink my blood and tears, feed on my body and soul." Here the old man hid his head in his long cloak, sobbed bitterly and could not proceed.

These words struck me like a thunder-bolt. They entered into the innermost regions of my heart. The susceptibility of early feeling and cold indifference had been torn asunder. I was imbued with a spirit of patriotism to my suffering people. The words of the old man were imprinted on my heart. An ardent fire enkindled itself in the deepest bosom of my heart. I grasped the old man's arm and pressed it with vehement passion, and shrieked out at the top of my voice: "Relate to me the history, thou noble soul. I have never heard such thrilling words as you have uttered."

He lifted his head and stared at me impudently with his eyes, which were now overclouded with tears, and said in a low but impressive tone, "Sit yourself down on the ground, my child, and participate in my mourning."

As I sat down he embraced me with a filial love, and thus began his narrative: "Dear child, take no heed, at my

wrinkled face and wearisome features, I still possess my youthful vitality as I did three thousand years ago. The wandering and long enduring suffering has only worn out my body, but my spirit, my greatness, of hoary antiquity, still dwells in me."

Here he paused a minute and a heavy sigh came out of his breast and proceeded:

"I was the greatest among the nations I was esteemed by them. People from far came to look at me. I was a prince among the nations. I was defied by them. I had my country, my beautiful enormous woods. Magnificent wine gardens, my charming meadows were of milk and honey. The sun's radiance shone brightly over my country. I had my kings, generals, high priests, prophets; I had my temple where to worship God. Now my country has been robbed from me. I have become a prey to the enemy. Plundered that was holy and dear to me. Oh Lord! they burnt my temple. How could I behold such a scene? The shrieks of despair. The fierce hissing of the flames making the very earth tremble, and the air vibrate. The flames of sanctuary rose heavenwards. The temple was burnt to the ground, and only a few smouldering ruins were left, rising like gigantic ghosts from the ashes. Murdered the high priests; slaughtered millions of souls and the survivors were drowned in the blood of their brethren. And I was carried away a captive, sold as a slave into Rome. Was ransomed by my free brethren. I could again breathe somewhat freely and pursue my mission, but Israel was doomed to suffer. A new king ascended the throne of Rome, who embraced the newly founded Christian religion, which was also a limb excised from me. He was very hostile to me. I was compelled to grasp my wander staff and seek for a new home."

"Thus I was wandering day and night until I reached Babylonia."

"Knocking at the gate with my withered hand, it was opened, and the gatekeeper asked me who I was. After relating to him my past glories and making humiliating prostrations, I was admitted through a back door."

"My former greatness revived, I began to bossom again. The wound which was inflicted upon me, recovered gradually. The seed that I had sown in Jerusalem produced fruit. In Babylonia I found the great Talmudical Epoch, which is, until the present time, the torch bearer of morality and ethics. I have given birth to the greatest examples of humanity. Filled them with moral ideals, enriched their dominion, but I have been the creed to suffer. I was carried away on a ship thrown off in the wilderness of Arabia, strolling through the deserts in light and darkness, and there are still traces of my footprints. I have left a great poet who shone out like a bright morning star."

"Thus dragging myself I reached Spain. My far-reaching fame had penetrated already to this peninsula. I was greeted like a king. They flattered me. Exalted me to high positions. I was again enabled to lay aside my wander staff and to continue to exhibit to the universe my great spiritual power. I cleared out the thick clouds of barbarism which hovered over their heads. My sons shone forth like a heavenly fire. Its rays pierced through the hearts of my virulent enemies."

"I produced great poets, philosophers, statesmen and men of every branch of human knowledge. Taught them morality, purity of religion. I have also replenished their empty coffers. I exerted my whole power to satisfy them. Woe is to Israel! They wanted my very soul to abandon my religion. 'No,' said I; 'I would rather die a martyr's death than desert my religion.'"

"The fire of the inquisition was enkindled. My children were thrown into the gloomy dungeons. They were tormented; their sighs of anguish reached the heavens. They were dragged to the stake. They were cast into the fire. The smoke of the ghastly fire filled the air. The husbands were burned alive and the women were made widows. Children became orphans. tormenting cries of my children, which make children of the very earth shiver. They are driven like cattle, and I fear—What hear I?" exclaimed the old man when suddenly two knocks came at the door. Before he bid come in, the door was opened and an officer entered with a paper in his hand. Handed it over to the old man. After reading it over I observed a change in the old man's face. His entire body shrank together, and uttered a cry. "Oh, merciful God, whither shall I go?"

"What happened?" I asked, impatiently. "My child," said the old man, with a trembling voice, "I am compelled to wander. They need me no more. I have enriched them already—given them everything I possessed. I have extricated them from a stage of barbarism. Now they say 'Go!'"

He took his sacred bag hung over his shoulder, grasped his wandering staff, then embracing me with a fiery love, the old man said shiveringly: "Hear me, son of Israel. I have related to you my whole suffering history. You shall always bear it in your mind. Let it be engraved on the tablets of your heart. When you grow older, my child, take vengeance for my sufferings, fear not your enemies! Show the world that the heavenly fire which dwells within Israel has not extinguished yet. Your voice shall reach to one end of the universe to the other. You shall fight for your nation, that it should regain the Holy Land of Israel."

Thus the old man wandered out in the darkness of the night, and knew not whither.

CORRESPONDENCE.

The Zionist Circular Letter.

Editor HEBREW STANDARD:

We appreciate very much the compliment you have paid the Zionist Organization describing it as the strongest organization that the Jews have. We admit that, especially since you have asked us to do so.

But at the same time we must ask you to acknowledge that it was not necessary to distort the meaning of the circular letter which is the inspiration for the editorial in question, in order to make a point. There is no journalistic trick that is older nor yet so unethical as that one of taking a sentence out of its sequence in order to give it a false interpretation.

Here is the purpose of the circular which accompanied the "affiliation" slip: The Zionist Organization, like all other organizations, has found difficulty in bringing its various appeals to the attention of a large number of lodges and societies. If you are a member of societies you know that all circular letters and all appeals are at the mercy of the secretary.

The Zionist Organization intends that its circulars and appeals shall be read to all organizations to whom they are addressed, and, therefore, it has sent out a slip whose purpose it is to ascertain to what other societies affiliated Zionists belong.

In explaining to the Zionists why we desire this information our circular states: "It would provide us with a means of compelling the attention of the organizations to our communications. If when writing to a non-Zionist organization, we could at the same time write to the Zionists who happen to be members of that organization and urge them not to allow our appeal to be withheld from the meeting by a negligent official, or to be sidetracked by the indifference of the members."

I submit that instead of making this a basis for an onslaught on the Zionist Organization, that this method might be commended to the members of other organizations that have occasion to send appeals to societies. In this way, we might ultimately bring about a reform in Jewish societies which would be of benefit to every Jewish interest.

TO BE A JEW.

By Rabbi David B. Swiren.

"To be a Jew was a costly luxury, the price of which was either money or blood," says Mary Antin. Yes, the story of the Jew is a sad one. He not only suffered poverty, torture and pain, but oftentimes found himself on the verge of death.

As I reflect upon the history of our people I recall the Talmudic legend about Rabbi Ben Levi, and I see the life of the Jew mirrored in it.

When Rabbi Ben Levi was about to die, so runs the legend,

"He saw the Angel of Death before him stand,
Holding a naked sword in his right hand."

Upon the rabbi's request the Angel of Death handed over to him the sword. Taking advantage of this, Rabbi Ben Levi entered Paradise alive. The Angel of Death, joined by a host of angels, complained to the Lord, whereupon

The Lord replied, "My angels be not froth,
Did ever the son of Levi break his oath?"

Let him remain; for he with mortal eye,
Shall look upon my face and yet not die."

Even so runs the history of the Jew. Time and again he had come face to face with the Angel of Death, and the sword of destruction was pointed at him. The Angel of Death who sought the destruction and annihilation of the Jew and Judaism came at various periods disguised in the form of different people.

More than two thousand years ago the Greeks did not leave anything undone as to prevent the observance of Israel's Holy Law, and they had made all efforts to destroy the Jewish nation. They wanted the Jew to give up his Sabbath and holidays in exchange for Olympic games and Bacchanalia. They forced him to forsake his religion, the religion of righteousness, purity and holiness, and accept theirs, which was based upon immorality and vice. Had he refused to accept this, then death would await him.

However, the Jew escaped death and remained alive, both he and his religion.

The Maccabees and their followers conquered Antiochus Epiphanes, with his powerful army, and their heroic deeds are still kept alive in our memory. When the Christians came into power they did likewise. Germany, France and England were during the Crusades the scenes of inhuman manslaughter, and the sword of destruction threatened the entire Jewish nation.

In Spain and Portugal thousands upon thousands of Jews were burned in Autos-da-fe, only because they adhered to the religion of their forefathers and professed their belief in One Eternal God.

Later on, in the seventeenth century, Bogdan Chmelintzki, with his Cossacks, wiped out many a Jewish community of Russia. In Nemirov, in that city alone, more than six thousand Jewish men and women were slain. Still at present there are in Russia alone about six million Jews, more than the total sum of Jews in the world at the time of Kings David and Solomon.

The Mohammedans, on the other hand, offered to the Jews the alternative of "The Koran or the sword."

Today, however, many a prominent statesman maintains that the Jews stand a chance of regaining Palestine in the near future and making it as their secure home, a Judenstaat.

In the City Hall park of New York, there stands a monument erected to the memory of the American patriot Nathan Hale. Sent by Washington as a spy to the English Army he was taken captive and executed on September 22, 1776. He, while facing death, said: "I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country."

In the history of our own people we

find some noble acts of patriotism which surpass even that.

Rabbi Meir of Ruthenburg, a Jewish prominent leader of his time, was cast into prison, some wealthy Jews offered a large sum of money as a ransom, which was acceptable to the government. Rabbi Meir realized that this would only lead to the imprisonment of many other Jews of prominence in order to exact an enormous sum of money from the community. He therefore offered his own freedom and remained in prison at Alsace, where he breathed his last on May 2, 1293.

Thus we see that the "Death Angel's sword" was time and again hovering over the heads of the Jew. Nay, the sword was placed in his own hands, giving him the choice of destroying either his body or spirit. But he the Jew, like Rabbi Ben Levi, escaped death because he never broke his oath.

Yes the Jewish nation is still living and active, only because they kept their oath, which was made at Mt. Sinai—Naaseh V'nishma.

These words Naaseh V'nishma—we will do and obey—marked the starting point of our national life; and owing to the fact that our people lived up to them in all times and climes, we of today are able to erect institutions where the rising generations are taught in living tongue what it meant to their forefathers and what it means to them to be a Jew.

May Naaseh V'nishma ever continue to be the motto of the Jewish nation, so that the Jew may ever escape the "Death Angel's sword," and live on without end.

In the Old World, war is raging. All the nations find themselves in a horrible state of affairs. Men-of-arms have taken the place of master minds, and the sword was exchanged for the pen.

Germany, the land of Lessing, Goethe, and Schiller; France, the birthplace of Jean Jacques Rousseau; and England, the native land of Shakespeare, are all now engaged in barbaric and destructive work.

Mankind's lofty ideal of universal peace is shattered and has been turned into "Love's Labor's Lost." We, of the New World, are fortunate in abiding in a land of law and love under the Stars and Stripes.

These institutions of learning are either destroyed or closed whereas here they are constructed and stand wide open to all those who seek knowledge.

Let us, then, with more zeal, "do and obey" the word of the All-Wise, and instruct our youth in the creeds and deeds of our nation.

Let the Jewish youth learn to know that it was their people who first declared to the world the oneness of God and equality of men. Let them set a living example of what it means to be a Jew.

The Defects of Herzl.

Rather than talk of the greatness of Theodore Herzl I shall talk of his defects, because I am convinced that his greatness can be more easily gauged from his deficiencies rather than from a recounting of his wonderful qualities. His personality was sufficiently great to stand the test of his weaknesses, and thirteen years afford a sufficient perspective for a study of the defective side of this great Jewish leader.

Originally Herzl was an assimilationist. This, obviously, is no virtue from the Zionist viewpoint. He was a dreamer—indeed, rather a fantastic dreamer—and this characteristic in a man is not looked upon with great favor by the world at large. There was also something theatrical about his methods. He was of a decorative disposition, leaning toward the artistic, and decorativeness has always failed to appeal to so ancient and serious-minded a people as the Jews, who, as we are all aware, care more for intrinsic values than for outward forms. Still another defect of Theodore Herzl was his scanty, his almost negligible, knowledge of Jewish affairs. He was totally ignorant of what is known as Jewish science.

But with Herzl all of these limitations were converted into great qualities. His assimilation stood him in good stead, in that he had thereby absorbed all of the finer sentiments of the other nations. His was not the assimilation of those sycophants and semi-Jews who laboriously and vainly imitate the non-Jews. He applied his assimilative spirit to the Jewish people. That national dignity, that national pride, which he had absorbed from his non-Jewish surroundings he infused into the Jewish people.

I have said that he was inclined toward display and decorativeness. That is very true. But the result of this very display, this decorativeness, was the Congress, the greatest of all Zionist institutions. He was ignorant of Jewish science, and yet this very defect was veritably a great virtue in the man. We have enough who are Jewish scientists, and if he were one of them he could have, at best, merely added one or two new suggestions in that field. But had he been hampered with Jewish science he could not have approached the Jewish question with that directness that was so epoch making. Nor could he have commanded the authority of the whole of Jewry, because then he would have leaned toward one form of Judaism or another. He might have been a reform Jew, or he might have been an orthodox Jew or a Hebraist or a Yiddishist.

It is clear, I think, from this analysis that these limitations, which would have been a terrible disadvantage for a lesser man, were of great advantage to Herzl, because Herzl was a truly great man.

It is absurd to ask what Herzl would have done in this great, historic move-

ment. One may as well ask what Mazzini or Garibaldi would have done, or what Bar Kochba had he lived several centuries later. Herzl accomplished his task. He did all that it was destined he should do. He belongs to history. And history is like a river—the streams that have passed have achieved their purpose. Life is like a flowing stream. We are now the flowing stream. Upon us devolves the duty to build upon the foundation laid by Theodore Herzl. But Herzl is the embodiment of our great ideal.

Lo! the Poor Arab.

Great solicitude has recently been displayed in "high" places, both in England and America, for the unfortunate Arab, who, if the Zionists are to have their way and gain possession of Palestine, will "be deprived of his 'home' and banished to wander, with his lares and penates, over the face of the world. Indeed, an article, penned by a distinguished elder statesman of American Jewry, protesting, in behalf of the Arabs, against the outrage which the Zionists are contemplating, has recently been published in several Jewish weeklies and in about a dozen secular papers that subscribe for the National Editorial Service.

A capital reply to this solicitude has been made by the London Jewish World in its issue of July 18. It runs like this:

"Whenever the faint-hearted-and-weary-soul Jew wishes to put what he thinks is a 'capper' on Jewish national strivings he has always recourse to the Arabs, and asks what are you going to do with 'those Arabs,' who form such a large majority in Palestine. There is, in any case, nothing substantial in the argument, because under any plan these nomads would be amply protected, and Jews would not be such fools as to give them the least cause for any reasonable grievance. But the following piece of news throws a different light upon the subject:

"Dr. Abul, an Arab of prominence, who is at present residing in Paris, delivered an address before a Zionist gathering in Paris in which he called upon all Arabs to support the Zionist ideal and to develop a more intimate friendship for the Jewish people. So that, when the F. H. and W. S. Jew, anxious to put a spoke in the national wheel, roars out, 'What about those Arabs?' perhaps it will be as well to reply, 'Go ask them.'"

Congress of Jewish Soldiers in Russia.

Moscow.—A congress of Jewish soldiers from the Moscow district was held here, in which a great number of privates participated. In addition to that, several students of the officers' training school and a number of military physicians attended this gathering.

Dr. Shulman, an army physician, urged the organization of a permanent soldiers' organization which shall combat anti-Semitism and protect the Jewish population from pogroms. Members of the "Bund" and assimilationists opposed the formation of such a league on the ground that it would foster anti-Semitism. After lengthy discussions a committee of twelve, consisting of four privates, four physicians and four students, was elected to work out the plan for such an organization after a part of the assemblage left the meeting.

Petrograd.—The well-known Nadziratel Kratowski, who investigated the Bailis trial and proved his innocence, has now been appointed chief investigating justice of Kiev. He had lost his post as chief of police during the reign of Nicholas Romanoff because of his investigations in the Bailis trial. The director of the Kiev police, Mischtechuk, who refused to believe in Bailis' guilt and was therefore removed from his office, has been reinstated and is at present chief of police of Riga.

FROM THE JEWISH WORLD.

Former Secretary of State Edward Lazansky is a Democratic candidate for supreme court justice of the second department, which includes Brooklyn, Queens and Staten Island.

One thousand members of the Order Achei Brith and Shield of Abraham are now serving in his majesty's forces. This number was reached on Monday last. The order has lost twenty members on active service.

In the August number of the Jewish Farmer mention is made of the fact that the first woman cow-tester in the United States is a Jewish young woman named Miss Bessie Lipsitz. She holds this unique position in Avoca, Wis.

The Right Hon. Herbert Samuel, Sir Charles Henry and Mr. Percy A. Harris are members of the select committee of the House of Commons which has been set up to consider the national finances. It is understood that Mr. Samuel will be chosen chairman.

Hon. Alexander S. Finelite, who is serving the last year of a ten-year term by the Democratic party. One of city, has been renominated for a full term by the Democratic party.

It is announced in the Berliner Tageblatt that a Socialist interpellation will be presented in the Reichstag concerning the expulsion of Austrian Jews from Posen, Opoln and Breslau, although they have been residents there for decades and lived as good and prosperous citizens.

Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, of the institutional Synagogue, was a member of the committee which received the Russian Commission on Wednesday morning, August 14, and also a member of the committee which received the Belgian Commission on Tuesday morning, August 21.

Rabbi Emanuel J. Jack, formerly of Temple Emanuel, Pueblo, Colo., who recently accepted a pulpit on the Pacific coast, has been drawn for the new National Army for service in France. He declares he welcomes the opportunity to fight for his country in the trenches, and will not seek exemption.

With the permission of the military authorities of Kromenitz, Wollner, Gubernia, there has been organized a volunteer regiment of Jewish soldiers who wish to fight for the new Russia. More than two hundred men have already enrolled. While some of those joining deserted previously, most of the volunteers are men who were freed from military service or whose age places them in classifications which have not yet been reached.

The Department of Justice, with the consent of the Department of War, has liberated about 5,000 Jews who had been sent to Siberia as spies and suspicious characters. In most instances, these victims of Czarism were sent off without even the slightest pretext, and in none of the cases were those unfortunate people under the old regime allowed trial. Some of the returned Jews will have to stand trial.

Facts have come to light showing that General Yanushkevitch, the former chief of the general staff, wilfully sought to cover his mistakes and the failures of his associates during the great retreat from Poland by throwing all blame on the Jews and by the wholesale expulsions of our coreligionists from the war zone. This discovery has led the government to appoint a com-

mittee to establish the responsibility for the expulsions. Deputy Freedman was invited to join the committee.

The Russian ministry has permitted the Jewish committee assisting the war sufferers to send 25,000 roubles to Warsaw for distribution among the local Jews. The Petrograd Jewish community requested the Danish minister to acquaint the Austrian government with the serious state of poverty of the Galician Jews transported to Russia by the old government, and to induce Austria to come to their assistance, as large funds were needed for that purpose.

Professor Joseph Michael Rosenblatt, of the faculty of Krakau University, died in Baden, near Vienna, at the age of 64. This professor, who held many honorable posts, among them vice-president of the Chamber of Advocates of Krakau, was among the best of Poland's jurists and one of the greatest authorities on criminal law. But despite his genius he remained, because he was a Jew, for a number of years only extraordinary professor of this Polish university.

Foundations were laid last week to have Atlantic City, N. J., made the permanent headquarters of the National Council of Jewish Women, and the local organization launched a movement to have the next convention, to be held in Chicago, adopt the Fireside Section, developed here, and which plans to devote itself to providing homes for members of the order and to do essential and effective social work among the Jewish people of the United States and Canada.

The Jewish Board for Welfare Work in the United States Army and Navy, which has already been doing work at seventeen points, is to extend its activities immediately to twelve additional points. Provision will be made for the welfare of the enlisted Jewish men both in the army and navy training camps throughout the country. The points to which the board is now extending its work are Petersburg, Va.; San Antonio, Texas; Waco, Texas; Norfolk, Va.; Yaphank, L. I.; Gulfport, Ala.; Columbia, S. C.; Ayer, Mass.; Anniston, Ala.; Spartanburg, S. C.; Annapolis Junction, Md., and Hattiesburg, Miss.

Miss Frances Stern, co-author with Miss Gertrude T. Spitz of "Food for the Worker," has been called to Washington to work for two months in the home economics department of food administration. Miss Spitz has been in France with Dr. Hugh Cabot's surgical unit. Miss Stern has served as visiting housekeeper with the Association for the Relief and Control of Tuberculosis and the Boston Provident Association and as inspector for the Massachusetts Board of Labor and Industries. Miss Spitz, as secretary to Dr. Edwin A. Locke, assisted in the preparation of his book, "Food Values."

From The Hague comes the news of a new movement started there with the purpose of establishing a Jewish settlement on the island of Java, which belongs to Holland. A deputation of prominent Jews of Holland will soon depart for the island to investigate conditions there and present a complete report. Java is possessed of a very fruitful soil, which grows some of the most delectable fruits in the world. It is expected that under the beneficent rule of free Holland, a very prosperous Jewish colony could be established there.

The Swiss press is indignant over the condition of American Jews from Palestine and Syrian towns who have arrived in Switzerland after eight weeks of constant traveling under terrible conditions. The Suisse says: 'We have seen many unfortunate refugees of several nationalities pass through our country, but never have they been so miserable as the Americans.' The American consular service in Switzerland is taking care of the refugees, many of whom will not be able to continue their voyage to America for some time owing to bad health.

The twentieth convention of the Progressive Order of the West was held in Detroit, Mich., August 5 to 7. Mr. H. W. Busch, representing Mayor Oscar Marx, who was out of the city, welcomed the delegates to the city of Detroit. On February 1, 1916, the total number of lodges in the order was 117, with a membership of 19,615, and during the past term 6,423 members have been initiated and 5,001 members have been suspended, showing a net increase in membership of 1,202 members. The capital is \$99,851.76, showing a net gain of \$22,107.95.

A cablegram from Kiev announces that the members of the Ukrainian Congress have elected a member of the Jewish Socialist Territorialist Party, Silverfarb, as Minister for Jewish Affairs in the Ukraine. The Yiddish language has also been officially recognized as one of the government languages in the Ukraine. All official documents of the government will be published simultaneously in Yiddish and Russian. Silverfarb has been very active in the Territorialist party. He was known to his followers as "Basin," a pen name by which he became familiar to all sympathizers and opponents of Jewish freedom.

In the hope of blocking strikes, quarrels and labor troubles of every kind in one of the country's most vital industries, the government has appointed

Mr. Meyer Bloomfield, of Boston, to maintain good feeling and to keep happy the thousands of America's ship-building laborers. Approximately \$100,000 has been put at the disposal of Mr. Bloomfield. Before accepting the government post he was head of the Vocation Bureau at Boston, and is organizer and president of the Employment Managers' Association of America. He is a graduate of Harvard and has been identified for a number of years with settlement work and is a close student of social, industrial and educational problems.

A delegation consisting of Mr. Joseph Rosenzweig, president of District No. 1, Independent Order B'nai Brith, the Hon. Samuel Campner, Mayor of New Haven, Conn.; Mr. Charles Hartman and Dr. Bernard M. Kaplan, of New York city; Mr. Joseph H. Ullman, of New Haven Conn., and Judge A. K. Cohen, of Boston, Mass., visited Portland, Me., to attend the celebration of the first anniversary of the founding of Israel Lodge of the Independent Order B'nai Brith. The distinguished visitors addressed the local community and created much enthusiasm for the work of the order. Special emphasis was laid upon the Red Cross Ambulance which the district is preparing to send to France in the name of the order. Dr. Elias Caplan, the well known physician and communal worker, presided.

Ashkenazim and Sephardim of Turkestan Unite.

One of the gratifying results of the Zionist conference held in Samarkand, Turkestan, last May is the complete union of Ashkenasic and Sephardic Jews, of whom there are 40,000 in that section of Russia.

There were delegates from the towns of Aschabad, Novo Bokhara, Staro Bokhara, Tschartschin, Tashkend, Kokand, Antschan and Samarkand, as well as delegates of Bokhara Jews residing in Europe. The Sephardic delegates and visitors wore their traditional garments. The conference was entered in the Golden Book of the National Fund with a contribution of 3,000 roubles.

Simultaneously with the Zionist conference, a general conference of Jews of Turkestan was held in the same city, which, in addition to a large number of delegates, was attended by 5,000 visitors. The general Jewish conference demanded that the Jewish Congress of Russia consider the question of Palestine as a fundamental necessity for the Jewish people. The Executive Committee chosen by the general conference consists of both Ashkenazim and Sephardim.

The hall in which these conferences were held was decorated with Russian and Zionist flags, portraits of Herzl and a banner reading, "Techi hamemschalah hasemanith" (long live the Provisional Government!).





Jewish Soldier "Learn" Blatt Gemarah Battlefield
 Dr. Bloch's Israelitische Wochenschrift, published in Vienna prints the following interesting extract from the diary of a Jewish soldier serving in Hungary:
 "For the past three days we have been pursuing the Roumanian enemy. Yom Kippur morning during the Shachrith prayer we were compelled with heavy hearts to close our machserim and place them in our haversack for the cry 'March' was heard. We marched across hills and through valleys, through forests and villages without a stop.
 "On the third day we were permitted to rest. I, however, went to look for a place where to daven schachrith. In a little street in the village which I reached the signs of Roumanian 'freedom' could be seen. Doors and windows were shattered, the furniture broken and littered in front of the houses. At the door of an empty store I noticed a mezzuzoh. In a corner of the store I found shreds of a talith covered with the torn leaves of a Hebrew book. I picked up the leaves and found them to be pages of a Gemarah Pesachim. Deeply moved and with love I fondled these pages. I forgot everything; the reason of my coming around about me was no longer in my mind. I did not hear the cannonading of the big guns. I became again the Talmudist. I thought that I was sitting in the Yeshibah and began learning a blatt Gemarah in the well known, sad sing-song melody. My hunger was gone and I immersed myself in the intricacies of the Gemarah.
 "I do not know how long this would have lasted, had not another Jewish soldier who had also gone in search of a place reminded me that the army was marching on. Full of sadness I wrote upon the margin of a page of the Gemarah 'I passed through this place and have seen the churban. Because of this I weep and my eyes shed tears.' A Jewish Soldier.
 "You old Jew when you will learn this Gemarah, think of the enthusiastic Talmudist who was torn away from the Pressburg Yeshibah and immediately grasped a gun. And thus I learned a blatt Gemarah on the battlefield, to the accompaniment of a bombardment in the year five thousand six hundred and seventy seven, since the creation of the world."

Palestinian Refugees in Switzerland.

The Joint Distribution Committee of the Funds for Jewish War Sufferers has received the second list containing the names of the forty-six additional American refugees from Palestine, who have arrived in Switzerland. In this party are the following—twelve men, seventeen women and seventeen children: Hanna Berman and two children, Hyman Berman and one child, Mordchai Cohen, Frieda Yenta Cohen and two children, Samuel Jacob Davidson, wife and one child, Rachel David, Rachel Elsenstein and two children, Jacob Joseph Friedman, Sara Feiga, Harris Eksther, Deborah Levin, Leib Lewensohn, wife and one child, Molke Liv and one child, Peshe Liv, Mollie Meltzer, Jacob Miller and wife, Chlaven Neiditz, Sarah Reichman and one child, Elke Reichman and three children, Isaac Nucham Rothschild, Moses Isaac Hurwitz, Rothfelder Wolf Savitzky, Ida Schaplin and two children, Nathan Max Seltzer, Noah Weinberg and wife, Face Frieda Winigraj and one child.

Mr. Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, has given instructions that everything possible should be done for the comfort of these refugees and that any funds that may be necessary shall be advanced by the representatives of the American Government, who will have them in charge, until their arrival in this country.

Some of these refugees are not included in the lists of the Joint Distribution Committee, and in order to facilitate their landing, it is necessary that the relatives should communicate with Albert Lucas, secretary Joint Distribution Committee, 20 Exchange place, New York City.

A War Office Mistake.

We do not know who has been advising the War Office in regard to the details of the proposed "Jewish" regiment, but it is certainly some one who is hopelessly out of touch with the Jewish sentiment if he has counselled the employment of the device known as the Shield of David as regimental badge. That device, which has quasi-sacred associations, since it is frequently employed in and about the synagogue and its appurtenances for divine worship, has long come to be regarded as the mark of what is specifically Jewish. Even its employment as a masonic sign, by virtue of the tradition which identifies the foundation of the Order with King Solomon, confirms this. In an especial degree it has, in latter times, been associated with Jewish nationalism, the Zionists using it largely as the symbol of their strivings and their aspirations. To turn it, as is now proposed, into the badge of a section of a non-Jewish army, carrying out military operations in obedience to British, not Jewish policy, adopted by a non-Jewish Government, is nothing short of prostitution though let us hasten to add we have not the remotest doubt the War Office intended it as a compliment to our people. But in that case the authorities have sinned from ignorance.

We have all along been in favor of the formation of a unit of our people as a matter of comfort and convenience to those enlisting in it. We have pointed out, besides, several ways in which such a unit might be of particular service to the country, among others in the operations in Palestine in reference to their fellow-Jews there. But those who compose this regiment will be in it as British (or say Russian) soldiers not as Jews, and to place upon them the badge which is proposed and which would mark them as Jewish and not British (or Russian) soldiers is upon the face of it ridiculous, and to any Jew of spirit a deep humiliation, as must be, to any worthy man, his being compelled to take part in a sham and a make-believe. There is another consideration. If, as would seem from the War Office announcement the main object of the regiment is to conscript the Russian Jews here, then the Jews of this country, if the Jewish symbol be its badge, will be specially and prominently identified with that portion of the British Army composed of Jews belonging to a section of our people associated in the public mind—rightly or wrongly entirely, we will not stop to argue, though it is impossible to say altogether groundlessly—with shirking and disaffection, and job-snatching. That is grossly unfair to the Jews of this land in general. But it is an execrable injustice to the thousands upon thousands of brave Jewish lads who volunteered for service, who went out to suffer and to die for the sake of the country, and whose good fame the War Office will recognize as its especial charge.—London (Eng.) Jewish World.

Rumania and the Jewish Question.

The recent decision of the Rumanian Government definitely to grapple with the Jewish question, which has long been demanding solution in that country, is, to a large extent, one of the many indirect consequences of the revolution in Russia. With her great neighbor determined, once for all, to clear her records of all abuses in this connection, the position of Rumania, maintaining, as she does, anti-Semitic legislation that is almost medieval, promised to become extremely difficult, while it has, for some time past, been recognized at Jassy that, with the Jewish problem unsolved, Rumania would hold a precarious position in the great councils of settlements which must follow the war.

The only excuse for the restrictions imposed on Jews in Rumania up to the present time has been that restrictions, hardly less drastic, have been imposed on

the great mass of the people. Owing to the Rumanian law, however, which forbids a Jew to hold land, his lot is a particularly hard one.

The question of reform as it affected the Jews came prominently into notice some four years ago, as the result of the extraordinary loyalty and devotion displayed by the Rumania Jews toward the close of the second Balkan war. Rumania's share in that war was confined to a practically unopposed march from the Bulgaro-Rumanian frontier toward Sofia, and was a matter of only a few weeks; but that was long enough for the Jew to prove to his fellow country that he was ready to make sacrifices for his country and to show himself a devoted Rumanian citizen. As a consequence, immediately after the signing of the treaty of Bucharest the Jews were promised political equality. M. Take Jonescu, the prominent Democratic-Conservative leader, took up the matter, as did many other statesmen, with enthusiasm, and the Minister of Justice was instructed to prepare proposals for the necessary revision of the constitution. The party of reaction, however, had no intention of giving in without an effort, and every method to produce delay was resorted to. The matter, consequently, dragged on from month to month without any settlement being arrived at, and the outbreak of the European war found the problem still unsolved. In spite of these disappointments, however, when mobilization was ordered in the August of last year the Rumanian Jews once again rose to a great occasion, and since then they have distinguished themselves by many heroic deeds on the battlefield and also by the material sacrifices they have made for their country. The position, therefore, is peculiarly favorable for a settlement. Not only does the political situation urgently demand a solution, but the popular opinion that it ought to be found—and found quickly, is stronger than ever before. The authorities at Jassy would do well to hasten the matter.—Christian Science Monitor.

REFLECTIONS

On the Untimely Demise of Rabbi Samuel Margolies, of Cleveland, Ohio, Caused By An Automobile Accident.

"And Aaron, the priest, went up on mount Hor by the order of the Lord and died there, in the fortieth year after the going out of the children of Israel from the land of Egypt, in the fifth month, on the first of the month" (Numbers xxxiii, 38).

Samuel Margolies, the son of Rabbi Moshe Zebulun Margolies, the latter being the dean of the American Orthodox rabbinat and the incumbent of Kehilath Yeshurun Synagogue, Eighty-fifth street, New York. Samuel Margolies, rabbi, educator, social worker, leader in Israel and publisher of the Jewish World, a Yiddish and English daily paper, Cleveland, Ohio, met with death as a result of an automobile accident almost at the prime of his life, at the comparatively young age of 35 years, leaving his young wife, small children and aged father to mourn the irreparable loss. American Jewries of all shades, beliefs, stations and affiliations will join with the immediate members of the stricken family to deplore and lament the early demise and the unfortunate departure of Rabbi Margolies.

Having enjoyed the hospitality, friendship and brotherly love extended to him by Rabbi Margolies, some three years ago during his visit, stay and sojourn in the city of Cleveland, the writer considers it his duty to render homage and pay tribute to his martyred friend and demised colleague. The introductory passage of the death of Aaron of the Biblical fame may assume, indeed, a metaphoric interpretation, alluding as it might to Rabbi Margolies. Though not of the Aaronitic dynasty, of the priestly descent and of the tribe of Levi, Rabbi Margolies deserved the title of priest of Cohen just the same, this cognomen substituting the terms and sobriquets of Rabbi, sage and scholar, every now and then, in the Scriptural, Talmudical, Midrashic and Responsive literatures. Of Aaron it is written that he was a "lover of peace and a pursuer of peace, a lover of mankind and bringing it to the Torah" (Ethics of the Fathers I, 12) and Samuel Margolies, discharging numerous obligations and dispensing with multifarious responsibilities, approaching all sorts of people and communicating with men and women of various persuasions and different denominations, furthered and fostered fellowship, concord, harmony and peace. A college graduate, a Yeshibah student, a stirring speaker, an eloquent Rabbi, an excellent teacher, a qualified pedagogue, a genial scholar and a nobleman in the true sense of the word, Samuel Margolies achieved wonders and performed marvels for the good causes and the best effect towards the betterment and the amelioration of the conditions and environments of his fellowmen, press, pulpit, rostrum and tribunal turning accessories to the Rabbi's command and biddings.

Of Aaron it is said that he "stayed between the dead and the living and the plague was checked" (Numbers xvii, 13); similarly Rabbi Margolies by his convincing arguments, advanced ideas, rhetorical diction and powerful force stopped the assimilatory plague and the contagious epidemics of the infidels, agnostics and skeptics, pointing towards the path of life and the way of law, order, righteousness and justice.

An Egyptian by birth, training and education, Aaron understood, felt and sympathized with the Israelitish wanderers in the wilderness, in the course of the latter's long, tiresome and dreadful journeys, catering to their whims, overlooking their faults, allowing discount for shortcomings and forgiving their iniquities. Samuel Margolies, of Russian origin, learning and culture, never deserted his brethren and kinsmen, neither forsook them, nor has he divorced himself from their associations, organizations and congregations, unlike other young Rabbis and youthful ministers, who broke away from the ranks, deserted the Orthodox camp, disassociated with former comrades and sought shelter in the reform wing, selling thus the ancestral inheritance for a mess of pottage and some illusory allurements. Rabbi Margolies withstood all temptations, disregarded all prospects and defied all snares. He remained with his own people, the Russians, the immigrants, the older folks, at his own expense and detriment of a minimal salary and insignificant perquisites, endeavoring, however, to conciliate and affiliate opposing parties and antagonistic actions, tions, the very plights and traits of Aaronites, priests and prophets.

By the order of the Lord Aaron, the priest, died, and by the order of the Lord Samuel Margolies died, though the latter's death was a horrible shock to his venerable father, relatives, friends and colleagues, the writer inclusive.

It is customary in Israel to mourn the demise of the just and the righteous in public places, open forums and assembled gatherings; discoursing at the same time Scriptural verses and Talmudic sentences. Your humble servant may, likewise, consecrate the explanations and definitions of the following Psalmic reflections to the accidental death of Samuel Margolies. "Come, look at the deeds of the Lord, who hath made desolations on the earth. He causeth war to cease, unto the end of the earth, he breaketh the bows and cutteth the

spear; he burneth wagons in the fire" (Psalm xlvi, 9-10). Wise, and otherwise, as all the Biblical proclamations and prophetic promulgations are, one wonders, indeed, at the grouping, construction and combination of the wording of the given verses. Why, where are the desolations coming in when war ceases? The reverse is, rather, the case, war bringing in its trail desolation, destruction and ruin, and we, part and parcel of civilized mankind of the twentieth century, see and behold the havoc and terror that the universal war is wreaking vengeance on the earth, while the breaking of the bow and the cutting down of the spear are but means and media for introduction of public peace and good will among men of various races, religions and colors. In other words, these divine promises certainly correspond with, resembling, prognostications of Isaiah and Micah. Where then is the desolation coming in? Again, the finishing touch of the burned wagons are somewhat out of place here, there certainly being nothing in common between broken bows, cut spears and burned wagons, this last implement never being associated with brutal forces and cruel efforts working but its own salvation of mere carriage and simple conveyance?

The desolation, one is inclined to believe, should be transferred into wonder, which the stopping of battles and the ceasing of war by God Himself, without consulting on the subject of European potentates and American statesmen, is really astonishing, since the attempt at universal peace, inaugurated on the sceneries, some fifteen years ago, by Nicholas the Second of a gloomy repute, failed to become an actual reality, the Christian nations never being fitted for such lofty ideals and uplifting ideas as yet. And as for the wagons that are keeping company with bows and spears, why, they are not ordinary vehicles of a common mould and unimportant stock. They are automobiles, able to destroy life and ruin property as well as their neighborly spears and friendly bows!

The palmist, indeed, ascribes it to supernatural phenomena and Godly appearances, when there shall be no war because of the lack of bows and the want of spears, neither will be life or property destroyed and ruined by the abominable automobiles, these killers and destroyers being destroyed and ruined themselves, saving thus humanity and working this wise for better causes. Who knows, if not for the automobile the precious life of Samuel Margolies might have been saved, neither would the war have him affected, the spiritual leaders and ministers of the gospel, but the automobile that turned war-like in times of peace and dangerous in places of safety! May the Lord bring about the prophecy of "He will destroy death to eternity, and the Lord eternal will wipe away the tear from off all faces, and the shame of His people will He remove from off all the earth, for the Lord hath spoken it." (Isaiah xxv, 8). May the memory of Samuel Margolies rest in peace!

Chairman of Economy Board Urge Cooperation Against Bread Waste

Washington, Aug. 15. — An appeal to the Jewish public of New York City to cooperate in conserving the flour supply of the country by regulating their purchases of bread, was made to-day in an interview by A. W. Shaw, Chairman of the Commercial Economy Board of the Council of National Defense. "For the week of July 26, in New York city alone," said Mr. Shaw, "fifteen tons of stale bread—forty thousand twelve ounce loaves—were fed to poultry. This is the startling fact that an investigation conducted recently by the Commercial Economy Board of the Council of National Defense has just disclosed. This is in spite of the fact that on July 16th all wholesale bakers throughout the United States pursuant to the Board's recommendation had generally ceased to accept back from retailers any unsold bread the latter might have on their hands. Because a number of New York bakers had not been complying with this recommendation, enough bread to feed ten to twelve thousand women and children was fed to poultry every week in that city. It is an example of the loss of food bound to result where there is a continuance of the trade practice that has been prevalent among bakers—the taking back of unsold bread from retailers.

"Such a waste would be had enough in time of peace, but what can we say of ourselves as a nation when we permit it in time of war? Forty thousand twelve ounce loaves! When we know there is a shortage of that most essential of all foods—flour for bread. With Congress having enacted a bill that gives wide powers of food control, and with Mr. Hoover calling on the American housewife to 'Save the Bread,' the public should have a vital interest in seeing that all bread that is baked shall be baked for human beings alone. The waste last week in New York City is but a fraction of the waste in that city before July 10th, and is but the merest fraction of the waste there was in the country as a whole. All this has now been stopped—except in one or two places, and New York is one of these.

"Fortunately, however, the last remaining vestige of this waste seems now about to be wiped out. At a meeting of the leading Hebrew bakers held on July 25th at the City Hall in response to the request of the Commercial Economy Board at Washington, those bakers patriotically pledged themselves to inaugurate the discontinuance of bread re-

it resolves itself in an act of the highest patriotism. It is particularly in the interest of the poor as well, for if every step is not taken now to prevent a flour shortage, and such a shortage actually does come, it will be on the shoulders of the poor it will weigh heaviest.

Early in April—just after war was declared—the office of Markets of the United States Department of Agriculture suggested that the Commercial Economy Board look into the reported waste of food occasioned by the exchange of wholesale bakers of fresh bread for unsold bread returned by the retailer. The board did so, and after a thorough, country-wide investigation the definite recommendation has been made that this practice should be discontinued. This finding has been approved by the Council of National Defense and has the unqualified support of Herbert Hoover, Food Administrator. All, therefore, should help to make possible this essential reform as an emergency measure that has for its object the conservation of our food supply. Baker, peddler, retailer, consumer should all pull together to carry out our recommendation in this matter.

"The Commercial Economy Board at Washington is a subordinate body of the Council of National Defense. It has no executive powers. It depends for its success on the hearty acceptance and support by the country of its recommendations. Its functions are to supply disinterested, impartial advice to the public and to business men, and, based on its investigations, to recommend from time to time such revision of trade customs and practices as the national emergency may seem to call for. Better than drastic regulation are laws self-imposed, resting for their enforcement on general acceptance by our people. Most exemplary in a people—as in an individual—is that self-control founded on the rock of sound opinion, consciously and voluntarily imposed.

"It is a matter of vital public importance that the Jewish bread buyers of New York city should understand the efforts that are being made to conserve flour, so they may know that, in discontinuing bread returns, the Jewish bakers of the city are simply doing their duty as outlined to them by their government, and are in no wise acting from selfish motives."

THE BLESSINGS.

Dear Children: The merriment instinct of a mother is remarkably displayed in the stories of Sarah and Rebekah. Sarah knew that Ishmael was not a good companion for Isaac, and Rebekah knew that Esau was a bad son, although he deceived his father, he could not deceive her, and the time came when even his father recognized the truth, for when Esau was forty years old he took to wife, Judith, a daughter of Beer, the Hittite, and Bahsemath, the daughter of Elow, the Hittite, and they were a grief of mind unto Isaac and Rebekah. Rashi very forcibly characterizes Esau's actions in marrying at the age of forty, as follows, "Esau may be compared to the boar of the forest, and he is so compared by the Psalmist, who laments that the boar out of the forest (Esau), doth gnaw at the vine that the Lord remove out of Egypt, meaning Israel" (Psalms 80), for the boar, like all other swine, when he lies down, spreads out his feet displaying his divided hoofs, as much as to say, "See I am clean," in the same manner do the descendants of Esau rob and commit violence and then make a show of virtue. The entire forty years Esau stole other men's wives and committed outrages, and when he became forty years old, he said, "my father was forty years old when he took a wife, I will do likewise," and Esau's wives were a grief of mind unto Isaac and to Rebekah, all their actions were purposely to provoke them and especially by their worship of idols, and Isaac's eyes became dim from the smoke of the incense that these women offered to their idols; the Sifse Chachomin (a commentary on Rashi) explains why only Isaac's eyes grew dim from the smoke of the incense and not Rebekah's, because she grew up amidst such surroundings, her father and brother having been idol worshippers and she was used to that smoke, but Isaac was not, therefore were his eyes affected—his eyes were also dim for the following reason. When he was bound upon the altar and his father was about to slay him as a sacrifice to the eternal, the heavens opened up and the ministering angels beheld it and wept, and their tears dropped down and fell into his eyes, therefore they became dim—a third reason for the dimness of his eyes is because Providence so arranged it that Jacob might take the blessings. And it came to pass when Isaac was old and his eyes were too dim to see, that he called Esau, his eldest son, and said unto him, "My son," and he said unto him, "Behold, here am I," and he said, "Behold now, I am growing old, I know not the day of my death." In reference to this paragraph, Rabbi Joshua Ben Korcha says, "when a person has arrived at an age within five years before or after the death of one of his parents, he should be concerned about his own end, and thus it was with Isaac; at the time he spoke to Esau, he was one hundred and twenty-three years old, and his mother had died when she was one hundred and twenty-seven years old, so he thought I am within five years of my mother's period of life and I do not know the day of my death, whether it will occur at the period of my mother or whether I will

live as long as my father. And therefore take, I pray thee, thy weapons, "teleychah," thy sword, it is called here by this unusual Hebrew word, because it is derived from "teliah," "hanging," as it is customary to hang it up—"Soh noh," which is translated, "take, I pray thee," means according to the Medrash "Sharpau," I pray thee. Isaac exhorted Esau to "sharpen the knife well and slaughter the animal, do it in order not to feed me with nerelah," forbidden food, and go out to the field and hunt for me some venison, "hunt for me of those animals that roam at large and do not rob any one of their herd. "And make me savory food, such as I love, and bring it to me, that I may eat, that my soul may bless thee before I die," and Rebekah heard as Isaac was speaking to Esau, his son, and Esau went to the field to hunt for venison, and to bring it. Unmindful of his father's admonition he made up his mind to rob some one and bring it, if he could not obtain it otherwise. And Rebekah spoke unto Jacob, her son, saying, "Behold I heard thy father speak unto Esau, thy brother, saying 'Bring me venison, and make me savory food, that I may eat and bless thee before the Lord before my death'—before the Lord—with his consent, if he will agree with my action (Rashi). Here the Sifse Chachomin points out that Isaac did not say he would bless Esau "before the Lord," then why did Rebekah tell Jacob that, but that is just what Rashi is answering, she impressed upon Jacob's mind the fact, that the Lord would never consent that Esau should get the blessing, because he went with the intention of robbing in order to bring the venison and he would not be scrupulous about feeding his father on "Nerelah," forbidden food, therefore she said to Jacob, "Go I pray thee to the flock and fetch me from there, they are mine" (and not from robbery), as Isaac had settled a marriage portion upon her of two good kids daily (Medrash). Did Isaac partake of two kids at a meal? No! But it happened to be Passover Eve (the Patriarchs performed the commandments before the Torah was given) and he sacrificed one as a Paschel lamb and one he used for his meal. "And thou shalt bring it to thy father, that he may eat, for the sake that he may bless thee before his death," said Rebekah. Jacob protested that his father by touching him might discover that he was not Esau, as he was smooth, whereas, Esau was hairy, and he might curse him instead of blessing him. But his mother assumed all the responsibility, and she clothed him with Esau's goodly garments which he stole from Nimrod and which he did not trust his wives to keep because he suspected them, and for that reason kept them in his mother's house.

Hebrew and Religious Education.

It matters not in what corner of the earth the Jew resides; it matters not where the cradle of his birth once stood; it matters not whether we live in the east or the west of this great city, or of the world—there is one bond that knits Jew and Jew together, and that is his religion, and secondly his language.

While he is true to his religion, and while he cultivates his sacred language, the Jew will continue, as he has ever been, the riddle of the nations, the miracle of ages—"Bent, not broken," his motto. Is not Great Britain showing the same fiber to the world at the present hour? We may suffer disaster—this is inevitable; we may be brought low; men, women and children may be destroyed; but "Semper Eadem" will yet be the verdict of history when this monstrous war is ended, for England and her allies will, beyond doubt, come forth from the trial, if not unscathed, yet what is of greater importance—unsullied. And so the Jew, be he British or foreign, will in the long run prevail by virtue of his faith and practice.

He, too, has from the dawn of his nation's story employed in self-defense an engine which has always borne him aloft. The name may be different, but the purpose was the same. The aeroplane which he employs, which he has ever employed, to assure his safety in the conflicts of existence, is not laden with death-dealing explosives, but it is lifted up on high, charged with the energy of those vital principles of true humanity and divine religion, which have helped him through all winds and weathers to keep afloat and to preserve himself alive, while bringing to his fellow-creatures on earth not destruction and desolation, but life and blessing. This engine of defense is the Holy Torah; its fulfillment was Israel's mission. Has it not been in accordance with the divine plan from the beginning that he should be banished for a time from his own land, in order that, scattered throughout the whole world, he might carry this mission unto the uttermost ends of the earth? It is in order to impress this ideal upon our people from the very earliest years of life that Hebrew and Religion Classes are established in direct connection with the various Houses of Prayer. At one time it was the Beth Hamidrash, the House of Learning, today it is the Synagogue Class.

That the children of the community should receive instruction in such subjects in common in institutions specially set apart for the purpose, is as old as Joshua ben Gamla, high priest about the time of the destruction of the Temple, and in quoting this important departure in the educational history of the Jew (for the father was originally expected to teach his own child), the Talmud exclaims, "May Joshua ben Gamla be remembered for a blessing!" It was R. Jehuda the Prince who remarked: "It is but by the atmosphere in which the school-child is reared that the world itself is kept in place," and this truth is further attested by the opinion of the heathen sage: "Close the schools of the Jew, and you annihilate the Jewish people."

It is for this reason that I personally have never looked with favor upon the practice of denationalizing—i. e., secularizing—our Jewish denominational schools for the sake of obtaining the government grant, and certainly I am not in favor of starving our religion classes, be they synagogal or otherwise, for want of an adequate grant that should be cheerfully forthcoming from the body that ought to have at least as much interest in the Hebrew and religious education of our youths as in the erection of expensive structures for public worship, designed to meet the requirements of the adult portion of the community, in some instances for but a few days of the year. Why this callousness, why this niggardliness, with regard to the preservation of that *Mattanah* "gift"—Hebrew and religious education, which is our *Nahiel* "divine inheritance" from the days of old, the only possession on earth which has the power to lead man onward in this life until he reach *Bamoth*, "the heights," of spiritual living? In very truth we might re-echo: Cease to teach Jewish boys and girls the language and literature and religion of their race, and you destroy Judaism. Nay, more, the Jewish problem will then solve itself, for there will be no Jews left to offer a problem. Nor is it simply the dry letter or dry facts which, in the course of training, should be presented to the Jewish child. When all is said and done, the object of religion and religious training generally is to satisfy and uplift the human soul; the purpose of specifically Jewish training is (in addition to this) to strengthen Jewish feeling, Jewish consciousness, Jewish brotherhood and the sense of the Jewish mission throughout all times.

Men and women of Israel! If there be one thing in the world able and strong enough to sustain us amid the mystery of life; if there be one thing able to appease us amid the "why and wherefore" connected with the tragedies of war; if there be one thing able to help in the difficult task of reconciling the thought of God's overruling Providence with the barbarous impulses and acts of humanity, it is the religious spirit in man, the spirit of faith, buoyed up by historic association.

The religious spirit it is which is continually striving with man's baser nature; it is the spirit of faith which looks beyond and into the future, though it cannot prove and demonstrate scientifically; the historic instinct it is which derives its hope from the past and bends its head to the present.

The Chicago Tribune voices the suspicion that three columns of Smiths go to the credit of ancient Cohens, but adds that, all things considered, the shifting of numbers means no harm to Gotham and redounds to the credit of the Jews.

tinguish them from others, there was added the distinction that this particular Abraham, Isaac or Jacob claimed descent from Aaron the Cohen (priest). It happens occasionally that one Abraham Cohen finds that in New York, with forty-nine and a half columns of namesakes in the city directory, he is not sufficiently individualized, and he calls himself Webster, or that in Yanketown he is overindividualized and he prefers to be called Robinson. This mimicry, in itself harmless, is, at least to some extent, neutralized by the Baltrimanzkys and Wistinetzky's, who, coming to these shores, call themselves Cohen for short. There is a great deal of fiction current among both Jews and Christians as to legitimate Jewish names. Most people believe that if a Jew is not called Cohen or Levy, he can only be a Feilchenfeld or a Baltrimanzky. They do not know that we already find in medieval times Spanish, Italian and Arabic names among Jews who had no desire to hide their identity, and that before German Jews were compelled to adopt regular family names there were among them Fuersts, Schuhs and Goldschmidts, as afterward they had, and still have, their Bauers, Vogels, Fleischers, Freys, Brunners and Muellers, as have their Christian neighbors. As to change of names it is inconceivable why a Stern should have less right to metamorphose himself into a Lord Wandsworth than a Harmsworth has to evolve into a Lord Northcliffe. If King Nebuchadnezzar had the right to change the name of Prince Mattaniah into Zedekiah when he made him King of Judah (II Kings, xxiv, 17), Queen Victoria had the right to change Mr. Montagu Samuel into a Sir Samuel Montagu, and King Edward followed a precedent, established from pre-Christian times, when he made Sir Samuel Montagu a Lord Swaythling.—Dr. G. Deutsch in American Israelite.
