Life so passionately. Early in the morning, after prayers, the keeper of the House of Rest came quietly into the Synagogue. He was pale and frightened. He was a tall, strong Jew. His face was animated. I knew him for a man—with a straight-forward, firm, healthy mind. And now desolation and pale fear were stamped on his face. He went over to the Rabbi and said:

"The piling around the House of Rest has fallen down! Graves are broken open!"

All those who were in the Synagogue were torn by the heart. They folded up their "Tallisim" and "Tephilin" and went off to the House of Rest. They looked at the broken graves and were downcast. Tears filled their eyes. With broken hearts they begged forgiveness of the dead and recited the Psalms. With great sanctity they repaired the broken graves. And on the same day they began to build around the House of Rest a high, strong, beautiful wall.

I stood in the House of Rest with all the others. I looked at everybody. I looked at the faces of the people in whom life overflowed. I did not understand this:

"Why did Life care about Death?"

I loved a woman. At the beginning of my happiness I felt that Death had cast its angry glances at her. Death began to paint her cheeks with its own colors. And from day to day it fastened its arms more firmly about her. I took it upon myself to do battle with the cold, sullen Death. I tried to shelter my beloved from it in my hot, strong arms. I hid her from it in my warm, living heart. I blew off her face with my hot breath the cold dews of death. I did battle with Death. I did not want to surrender to it. And when the face of my beloved was already dark with the color of death, I kissed her beautiful hair. And when Death made her lips two thin, cold threads, I kissed her cold white teeth. But Death was the conqueror. He took her from me.

When they took my beloved from me and put her into her grave, my greatest wish was that I should be there, too—there beside her, in the arms of Death. It was easy for me to attain my wish. I knew how it could be realized. But I remained

When I was a boy I had a teacher, an old Jew named Isaac. He was the best teacher in our town. He was a man of ninety, tall and thin, with long, snow-white eyebrows and a long snow-white beard, and a face that was like death. It was covered with a network of quiet, cold wrinkles. It was death which had woven this web of wrinkles. Dead thoughts had left their mark on him. When Reb Isaac used to sit amongst people, sunken in thought, everyone felt that death was in their midst, thinking its moribund thoughts of an existence on the other side of movement, on the other side of our existence. Everyone in the town knew that Reb Isaac was a guest amongst the living—a dead guest in the midst of life itself. And everyone knew that soon, one of these nights—on a dark, still, dumb night—he would disappear from among the living. He had already prepared a place for himself in the House of Eternity. He had had grave clothes made for himself; and every night he put them on, lay down on the ground and buried himself in thoughts of death.

Along with me there were other boys who were taught by Reb Isaac. When he was teaching he gave himself up to his work. His dead face used to frighten me. But he was inspired. And when we did not understand what he was teaching us he became very excited. More than once his dead hand felt on our faces. He was so excited and agitated that he used to cough. His body and his limbs trembled. He coughed and coughed, and barely managed to catch his breath.

It happened sometimes that who ever stood by would ask him:

"Reb Isaac, what is the matter with you? Calm yourself. Well,

JEWISH DIPLOMACY AT THE CAPITAL.

(By Joseph L. Tepper.)

Ever since the ancient days of Cyrus, who helped to rebuild the second temple, and of Oliver Cromwell, who aspired to restore the house of Israel to its erstwhile glory, no government has done as much for the uplift of the Jews and the improvement of their condition here and abroad as the government of the United States. The intercessions of John Hay, in behalf of the Roumanian and Russian Jews, and the comparatively recent abrogation of the commercial treaty with the Russian government under the czaristic regime, will suffice as notable examples. Of all administrations none has exceeded and few have equalled the present administration under the peerless leadership of that liberal Democrat, President Wilson, in the zeal, earnestness, and bona fide sympathy displayed in behalf of every Jewish cause.

This opportunity, therefore, requires cautious and well considered treatment at the hands of Jewish leadership. Every step, every move that is made in the direction of the utilization of the political good will of the government should be carefully weighed, reasoned from every angle and above all should represent Judaism's best thought. It should never be lost sight of that whatever power of influence we command, it is not of numbers or quantity—we are an insignificant minority almost everywhere—but rather of quality. There is, therefore, no excuse for us when we blunder and muddle.

Unfortunately, matters are far from ideal in that respect. True, they have been slightly improved over conditions of a decade ago, when there was almost a total lack of responsible leadership, and self-appointed leaders misrepresented us. Since the American Jewish Committee undertook that task, they have done it with a good deal of skill. But conditions are still far from being perfect. The American Jewish Committee at best does not represent all of American Jewry, and the judgment of its ablest men is not the sum total of the collective will and judgment of all Jews. It ought to be manifest to everyone who thinks that nothing less than the very best of Jewish thought and Jewish brain should be employed in and devoted to the consideration of the many delicate problems arising in connection with Jewish diplomacy.

Let me illustrate just what I mean by referring to an incident that took place very recently. Representations were made by the American Jewish Committee, through its able spokesman and leader, Mr. Louis Marshall, to the State Department in behalf of the Bessarabian-Roumanian Jews entreating it to use its good offices for the improvement of their conditions. Seemingly, it was in itself a laudable and thoughtful act, and unquestionably would be so regarded by everybody in normal times. Yet, if the matter had first been put up to a directorate of Jewish diplomats, publicists, and leaders of thought, the request upon our government at this time would not have been made, and I am confident an awkward situation would have been avoided.

I have not the least intention of casting any reflection on Mr. Marshall or to belittle his judgment. Every person, no matter how able, or even brilliant, can see but one angle of a problem at a given time; and no more can be claimed for Mr. Marshall. That is why prime ministers have cabinets and advisers. No one is all-perfect and all-sufficient. If this question for instance, or now invoking the aid of our government to intercede in the matter of certain interpretations of Jewish rights under a treaty between the Roumanian Government and the governments of the Central Powers had been submitted, as I stated, to a sort of Jewish cabinet sitting even in New York, its impropriety would most likely have occurred

to some one. To begin with, Roumania is a recent ally. For reasons that we may acquiesce in or disapprove, she dropped out of the conflict and entered into an alleged contract or treaty of peace with our enemy, agreeing to certain territorial and other modifications, and to offer provisions and stipulations, including the one of the so-called Jewish rights. We, the United States government, do not recognize that treaty nor any of its provisions, because we hold that they were obtained under duress—by force and threats. Indeed, that is the only theory that can explain Roumania's conduct; otherwise she is guilty of rank treachery. And even if we felt at the bottom of our hearts that she had betrayed us, this is no crucial a time to adopt that view. It is no time to add diplomatic complications; hence, we ought to adhere to the former view that she was forced into it. How, then, can we, directly or indirectly, ask her to observe an agreement we do not recognize to exist? Besides, near Eastern conditions in general are too complicated and the situation presents too much of a live volcano to deal with any phase of it.

These considerations, I say again, would have and should have suggested themselves, and the matter would have been dropped for the present. As it is, I hear the government has been placed in a predicament where a responsible representative Jewish body, has made a demand that our government is not in a position to comply with, yet the usages of diplomacy prevent it from exactly pointing out the reasons.

This brings me to another phase of Jewish diplomacy at the capital that is relevant to what I said as to the desirability of a well-considered centralized policy. Within the last few days members of Congress have been canvassed by different factions or parties of Jews—Bessarabian Jews, Roumanian Jews and other kinds of Jews—in their respective interests. Now, the average Congressman and Senator is not well informed concerning the multitude of problems confronting the several branches of Judaism. It must be understood that, even in normal times, and surely more so now than ever, there are a vast number of questions that members of Congress must delve into. Their time and energy are pretty well used up. Therefore, when these letters and exhortations came almost at the same time, preventing varying problems of the different factions of Jews, they necessarily became confused, and, with the best of intentions, could not comply. Again we work at cross-purposes and waste our energies. Aside from that, such occurrences do not improve the political valuation of the Jew in America. The matter is worthy of consideration by leaders of American Judaism. They ought to devise means to make such occurrences impossible in the future.

The Chief Organ of the Swedish Social Democracy on the Jewish Question.

The "Socialdemokraten" (Stockholm) publishes in its copy of May 27 an article which is characteristic of the changes in the ideas of the members of the International on the Jewish question. We reproduce the article almost fully. "A Forgotten People" is the heading of the article. The article itself runs as follows:

"We speak about the Jewish people; not about the Jews, but about the Jewish people."

The public opinion in Western Europe has occupied itself very much with the Jewish question. It was split into anti-Semites and non-anti-Semites. The standpoint of the latter can be rendered in a few historical words: "Jews as men must be given everything, Jews as a people—nothing." The French revolution has disenchained the Jews as men and citizens, and in the French National Assembly the deputy Clermont-Tonnerre in the above-cited words formulated the Jewish emancipation.

Civilized Europe would not know anything of Jews. It knew only Germans, Frenchmen, Englishmen of Jewish persuasion.

The Jewish people was forgotten. But the Jewish people itself reminds little of itself in the west.

But it lives in the east.

In Russia there have lived and still live as many Jews as there are Swedes. And they live as a nation. Of course, they are dispersed over all districts, but they live everywhere in Jewish communities with a language, a culture and customs of their own. They form a people which is socially divided into a proletariat and a bourgeoisie. The Jewish proletariat is a mass of 600,000 people, and the entire working class exceeds 2,000,000 souls. Thus, it is also easy to understand that there exists a Jewish labor question.

It is true that it is difficult for us to imagine the Jews as a people because our ideas of a nation is connected with the ideas of a land, with a territory, which the Jews have not. But let us imagine for a moment that the entire country population of Sweden is non-Swedish, and that only the town population is Swedish. Shall we just, therefore, cease to be Swedes? Not in the least. All towns of Sweden would then form a union for promoting their common interests. First of all, for the Swedish school and the Swedish culture, but also for other things which stand in connection with their language and their mode of life.

This is just what the situation of the Jews in Eastern Europe is. They do not form the entire town population there, but a very considerable section of it, where they lived in organized Jewish communities. They desired to unite themselves into one nationality and to form a link in the chain of the great Russian Federation Nation. They desired to do so, but the Brest-Litovsk peace crushed all their hopes. The 6,000,000 strong Jewish front against Tsarism is broken up. Torn like Russia itself, 1,500,000 Jews remain in great Russia, 2,500,000 in the Ukraine, more than 1,500,000 in Poland, and several hundred thousands in Lithuania.

The 6,000,000 Russian Jews formed a strong and solid block. They fought against Tsarism side by side with other oppressed nationalities of Russia. The aim of this struggle was to overthrow Tsarism and to establish a Federation of Nationalities, a federation based on a principle which alone could solve the complicated national question in Eastern Europe, i. e., on national autonomy independently from territorial frontiers.

There is no doubt that in this respect as well as regarding the solution of the land question, Russia would pare new roads for the development of Europe if it were given the chance of freely settling its affairs without the interference on the part of the German imperialists.

Particularly fatal is the fall of Russia for the Jewish people, for by the Brest peace it was thrown into the chaos of nationalities, in which chaos the allies of yesterday become the oppressors of tomorrow. The Russian Jews disappear, and in their place come the Great Russian Jews, the Ukrainian Jews, the Polish Jews, the Lithuanian Jews, all weakened by being split and all left at the mercy of the national oppressive ambition of the newly created small states. And those who are themselves under the pressure of the all-powerful at the Spree try to take their chance to revenge their own miseries on the other nationalities, and, first of all, on the Jews, who are a minority, and who have no centre for standing by their interests. Every one knows the unbearable sufferings of the Jews before and during the war in the Russia of the Tsars. The Russian revolution was for the dawn of resurrection. The fall and the defeat of the revolution has on no one dealt heavier blows than on them, not only politically, but also culturally.

They will also suffer economically, because Germany strives to convert all the conquered territories into their colonies. Commerce and industry will be crushed, and not only by way of establishing walls of customs duties against Russia—Germany's old market. Commerce and industry were the chief Jewish occupations. As is usually happens, those suffer most who possess little or nothing—in this case the Jewish proletariat; and their only hope is that what happened in Brest will not persist, and that some day the Internationale will rise as a firm kernel of the community of nations that alone can secure the free development of the Jewish people.

In the Internationale the Jewish proletariat, the Jewish Social Democracy and the Jewish masses found their hopes. As for no other people are the national Jewish problems into national ones, and this people spread over all trenches, and not only because an agreement between the belligerents is the first condition for the union of the Jewish people, but also because their aspirations for equal rights in all countries and national personal autonomy in those where they live in considerable masses can become a reality under the guarantees of an international organization which stands above the states.

Also the dream about regaining Palestine, the scheme concerning the establishment by a gradual colonization of a really national home for the dispersed people, also these plans and hopes can be realized through the agreement of nations and through their good will to give a place in their brotherly circle to the Jewish people, which for centuries suffered from servitude and expulsion.

Rabbi Newman Ordained.

Louis I. Newman was ordained as rabbi by Rabbis Martin A. Meyer of Temple Emanu-El, San Francisco; Sidney E. Goldstein, and Stephen S. Wise, of the Free Synagogue, New York, on Friday evening, July 19, at the Bronx Free Synagogue, Community Building Auditorium.

Rabbi Newman is a pupil of Rabbi Meyer, under whose mentorship he has entered the rabbinate. He received his A.B. degree in 1913 at Brown University, where he was a member of the "Varsity debating team, and won several high oratorical honors. For three years he studied under Professor William Popper at the University of California, where he secured his A.M. degree in Semitics. His master's thesis has been published in a volume entitled "Studies in Biblical Parallelism," written in cooperation with Professor Popper for the Semi-Centennial Anniversary Series of the University of California. In 1916 Rabbi Newman received a fellowship in Semitic Languages at Columbia University, New York, where he completed his studies for the doctorate under Professor Richard Gottheil. His Ph.D. thesis entitled "Judaising in Christian Reform Jewish Influence on Christian Reform Movements" will appear early next year. Rabbi Newman is president of the Intercollegiate Menorah Association of America, and is an active Zionist. He has been fellowship assistant to Rabbi Wise in the Free Synagogue, and will continue his work as rabbi of the Bronx division.

Capt. Edward W. Markens, son of Isaac Markens, of New York has been assigned to active duty with the medical corps of the national army at Camp Greenleaf, Ga. His departure from Sea Girt, where he was serving as a surgeon of the New Jersey Guard, was the occasion of a pleasing demonstration by the Fifth Battalion of the guard, which formed an escort to the station, headed by a band of eighty pieces playing appropriate music.

# NEWS FROM ENGLAND

(Exclusive Correspondence to the HEBREW STANDARD)

**Welcome to Judeans from America—Universal Tributes to Their Enthusiasm and Energy—Major-General Sir John Monash and His Record Jewish Military Appointment—League of British Jews State Their Differences with the Zionists, But Change of Policy Believed to Be Foreshadowed—Lionel de Rothschild Joins Russian Bondholders' Committee—War Communal Kitchens in Britain and a Successful Jewish Example—Newly Published Study of Jewish Child-Life—An Interesting Message from Jews in the British Army in Italy.**

London, June 21, 1918.

So far as we have been allowed to see them, the Judean recruits from America have created a very favorable impression over here. They are in training for various operations and have recently been inspected by a general officer who has commented with great satisfaction upon their keenness and soldierly bearing, their fine physique and healthy appearance. He concluded his remarks with the following words: "Nothing has given me more pleasure than to be making the acquaintance of you brave men, who have come thousands of miles over the sea to throw in your lot with the British Empire, and to strike a blow for freedom and for your own country. I hear most excellent reports of your conduct, your anxiety to learn your work and your cheerfulness in the hard life you lead here. I can assure you, for myself and those with me, that we are glad to welcome you here, to help you, to teach you, and we are going to send you over the seas to fight for what is right and what is true. I am also pleased to congratulate your commanding officer on the progress you are making. I wish you every success, and the speedy end, assisted by your brave spirits, of this war."

As an indication of the American contingent's enthusiasm, it is reported that the men ask their instructors for extra training after ordinary work is finished.

Major-General Sir John Monash has been given full command of an Australian Army Corps and promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-General. This is the highest position in the army ever held by a Jew. Major-General Monash, who is a civil engineer, introduced the method of reinforced concrete construction into Victoria, Tasmania and South Australia. He has served with the Australian Imperial Force continuously since the landing in Gallipoli in April, 1915. Monash Valley, at Anzac (site of Pope's Hill and Quinn's Post), is named after him.

The ideals of the League of British Jews in regard to the future of Palestine as distinct from those of the Zionists were expounded by Dr. Israel Alrahams, of Cambridge, in London this week. What divided the league from the Zionists, he said, was that the former could not assent to the setting up in Palestine of a state composed exclusively of Jews. They maintained that, whatever the government, the state should be absolutely free from any racial or religious test. Citizenship and nationality had nothing to do with religion. As to the Jews outside, the league could not assent in the statement that they constituted a nation. They belonged to many nations, and could neither control Palestine politics nor be controlled by them. The Jews of the world were not united, but divided by nationality, and now were actually fighting each other. The Palestine of the future was for the Jews who desired to live there, and for those who wished to escape from countries where they had no home. In a discussion which followed, some opposition to the lecturer's point of view was shown, and one speaker asserted that the league had hindered the colonization of Palestine.

About this league of British Jews great controversy has waged in the community for some time. A note has been made, however, of the fact that Major Lionel de Rothschild, member of Parliament, has cabled to the American Jewish Committee the following message: "Though we have some objections as to details, which we will send you by letter, and which we believe to be capable of adjustment, we desire to inform you of our substantial agree-

ment with your statement on the Palestine question, and, further, of our readiness to co-operate with you in giving effect to it." The general Jewish press here and the Zionists trust that this cable indicates that the league is making a departure in policy which would bring it more into line with the majority of Jews in this country. This is as far probably as it is wise to go into this particular discussion at the moment.

Lionel de Rothschild, on behalf of the firm of N. M. Rothschild & Son, has been asked to join the committee formed for the protection of the interests of British holders of Russian Government, municipal and railway guaranteed bonds. It was announced some time ago that certain issuing houses and banks had agreed to act together for the protection of holders of such issues of Russian bonds as were domiciled with them, and the present appointment of a committee is the outcome of that arrangement. The addition of the name of Mr. de Rothschild is a guarantee of excellence and fair dealing.

Communal kitchens, as they are called, have now been opened in a good many parts of this country. They are organized for the purpose of retailing hot cooked food at low prices, partly to be useful to munition workers and school children and partly to educate some of the backward housewives in the art of economical cookery. A very good example of this kind of enterprise is the Jewish Communal Kitchen, which is now flourishing at Camperdown House, London. Unlike most of the kitchens, purchasers can, if they so wish, partake of the food on the premises. An account by an eye-witness tells me that the diners are a democratic and catholic assembly. School teachers, Sisters of Mercy (for the kitchen is non-sectarian, although strictly kosher) sit happily beside Dayanim, ladies engaged on care committees, and men and women whose toil is of a more manual description. One tie unites them—the appreciation of good food, prepared with cleanliness. The "waitresses" have a smile for each and all, and the general atmosphere that prevails—the absence of bustle and confusion—is as much an aid to digestion as it is an incentive to appetite. So much for externals. But to even the most philosophical partaker of the goods that are vouchsafed, there must occur the question whence this Mecca of the City and East End diner has arisen. Sojourners in the modern wilderness have, alas, looked in vain for the manna that sustained their ancestors. The Jewish Communal Kitchen Association has as its president Sir Charles Henry Gustave Tuck, the treasurer of the association, has, however, been chiefly responsible for bringing the undertaking into being. It was he who conceived the idea of adapting the eminently suitable premises at Camperdown House, the headquarters of the Jewish Lads' Brigade, for the purpose. The chairman of the kitchen is Mrs. Eichholz. Twenty-four lady helpers work in rotas as waitresses and servers. The utmost is done to save food, and to this end no bread is supplied, and all flour used has a percentage of potato in it. The prices charged are the lowest possible, and correspond almost entirely with the cost of the food. Over 600 portions are served daily. After five months' working, the kitchen is self-supporting.

A young Jewish lad, Jack Werner, aged only 14 years, has just been awarded the gold medal by the Athenaeum School of Music in Glasgow, Scotland, which means passing a very difficult examination in the face of wide and keen competition from all parts of the country.

A very interesting book has just been published under the title of "The Jewish Child." It is an attempt to give a comprehensive account of all the phases and aspects of child life in the Jewish family, its history, folk lore, biology and sociology. The author of this book, Dr. W. Feldman, is an authority on this matter, being a lecturer on child physiology at the Infants' Hospital, Westminster, London, and also lecturer and examiner in general and infant hygiene to the London County Council, which, besides being London's administrative body, is also the educational authority of the metropolis. The question is one of such enormous extent, however, that a single volume is certainly unable to accommodate it. Probably this publication will lead to others on the same lines which will supplement and bring more up-to-date some of the features and dates presented by Dr. Feldman.

Interesting news comes from the British Army in Italy with regard to Jewish observances in the contingent. A British Jewish officer writes in the following vein: "Whatever may be the case elsewhere (his remark is called forth by some recent strictures from Jewish soldiers as to their being neglected by their chaplains), our religious requirements are well looked after by our chaplain, the Rev. Louis Morris, for whenever an opportunity occurs, he arranges services for us. I see that one of the men out here has already sent home an account of our Passover cele-

brations. A Shevuoth service has also been held here. There was a fair attendance of officers and men, and we had the pleasure of including in our congregation an Italian Jewish officer and a number of privates. Though the Italian Minhag differs somewhat from ours, our visitors were thoroughly at home, thus demonstrating once again that Kal Yisrael Achim. The Rev. Louis Morris officiated. By the way, he tells me that he has a little Sepher Torah and a miniature Aron Hakodesh which he takes about with him, as also a blue velvet pulpit cover with the Magen David worked on it. This was worked by and is the gift of a Christian lady."

**Heir to \$3,000,000 Enlists in Palestine Unit.**

When the next contingent of the Jewish battalion embarks this month for Palestine, a slender, quiet young Canadian will join the file of recruits on the Hudson River pier, says a writer in the New York Evening Mail. Few in that jostling, tear-stained, farewell crowd or among his comrades in arms—the student, the cutter, the "businessman" and the rest—will know that he is Gustave Schulman, just twenty-one, with a brand-new inheritance of three millions. With his grandfather's stocks to make his dreams come true, with a girl wife and a love of life, he has chosen to follow "the light of humanity," as he sees the allied cause.

He is a young man of few words, except when the conversation turns from money and success to matters far more material. Then he pours out his strangely mature ideas on man and life and living, with a whole-souled warmth. Not that he scorns money, which he insists he would have made a plenty, if fate had not heaped it upon him. But he believes in deeds, not words, and stops to discuss the philosophical only because he cannot help himself. "It's in the blood."

His belief in action led him to the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission at 220 West Forty-second street the first of June. He had seen motion pictures of the Jewish Battalion in Montreal, which decided for him just where he should serve. Weak eyes sent him to the deferred class. He promptly put himself under an Atlanta specialist's treatment for seven weeks and has just qualified to sail with the next detail.

"I think my place is in the Jewish Battalion," he explained at the mission, "because we must show our sincerity in the Palestine cause. The only way to do that is to go out and fight for it. Action alone will prove that we deserve Britain's confidence."

"I am not a Zionist, but as far back as 1915, at the first Zionist convention in Boston, Judge Brandeis in a speech set me thinking about a Jewish homeland. I have since realized that we need it for future generations."

"The Jews have a wonderful future if they will only look their faults squarely in the face. We must face the truth instead of painted, sugar-coated words. We have learned much from the melting pot experience in every land to build up a new Palestine. But the Jews must lay aside their narrow, racial prejudice. It has warped and distorted their minds. And the mass must learn more about hygiene."

Money, to Gustave Schulman, is just so much raw material, to be developed to help humanity. How? He does not know yet. He believes in helping as he finds the individual need. A future day may bring a broader plan. It may have something to do with Palestine. Who knows? Just now he is bent on investigation, and in the meantime follows the method of dividing the price of a \$60 suit into two "ready-mades" for himself and the other fellow.

"I have never had any dreams about money," he says. "Money is not worth dreaming about. Besides, the man who stops to dream never gets it."

The three millions that have come to his rescue were gathered by his grandfather, Frederick Goldsmith, late of Montreal, in mining ventures. Young Schulman himself, one of two children, was born and bred in plenty. Everything his own father touched in England and later in Canada seemed to turn to gold.

Gustave Schulman cannot understand why three millions of his own should make his pulse beat faster. "Why should I get excited about the money?" he asks, in surprise. "In life a man can only eat and wear so much. He cannot get more than the best service. The normal pleasures do not cost much. The trouble with most millionaires is that they soon exhaust their normal desires and begin to chase phantoms, to try to create new pleasures, as if that could be done."

According to the New York Herald, Ben Altheimer, a foreign-born citizen, of Ladenburg, Thalmann & Co., 25 Broad street, is the "father of Flag Day," he having suggested the holiday for the first time in 1912, when he was a resident of St. Louis, Mo. He suggested the plan to certain citizens of St. Louis, and they endorsed it. Exercises were held in churches, synagogues and Sunday schools. That was the first celebration of a "Flag Day" in the United States. The following year there were celebrations of the day in many cities. Now it has become a recognized institution and been made official by the President's proclamation.



**ITEMS OF INTEREST IN THE JEWISH WORLD**

A St. Louis (Mo.) chapter of **Hadassah** was instituted last week. The organization starts with 50 charter members.

Justice Julian W. Mack's brother, who is with the American forces in France, was recently promoted to be a major.

Ferdinand Kurzman, many years since president of Temple Beth-El, of New York, left \$4,000 to philanthropic objects.

More than 300 American volunteers of the Jewish regiment that will be sent to Palestine arrived at London, Eng., last Sunday on leave.

Efforts are being made to effect a merger of the Federated Jewish Charities and the United Hebrew Charities of Baltimore, Md.

News comes from Paris of the marriage of Mme. Pauline Donaida, the Canadian soprano, to Mischa Leon, a famous Russian tenor.

Judge Israel H. Peres of Memphis, Tenn., is a candidate to succeed himself as Chancellor of Division 2, Chancery Court of Shelby county.

An effort is being made to raise a fund by popular subscription in order to convert *Der Kämpfer*, the Zionist Yiddish weekly, into a daily publication.

Announcement has been made by the American Jewish Relief Committee of Rhode Island that the \$50,000 campaign instituted last May has been oversubscribed by nearly \$1,300.

Julius Rosenwald, of Chicago, Ill., has contributed \$1,000 to the fund which the N. Y. World is raising for a proposed memorial to the late Mayor John Purroy Mitchel.

The Congregation Shaarey Zedek, recently organized at Edgemore, L. I., have purchased a plot 135 by 175 on the west side of Beach avenue, 150 feet north of Spray avenue.

The Synagogue property at 22 East 113th street, this city, formerly occupied by the Congregation Shearith B'nai Israel, has been acquired by the Congregation Beth David Ansel Wilna.

The Albany (N. Y.) Chamber of Commerce will undertake an Americanization campaign, early in September. Rabbi Joseph Jasin, of Schenectady, N. Y., has been engaged to conduct it.

Louis W. Wolfenson, professor of Semitic languages at the University of Wisconsin, has resigned and been appointed assistant to the superintendent of the Wisconsin employment bureau at Madison.

The Zionists at Charkov have organized a transportation company which will operate steamships between Odessa and a port in Palestine as soon as the war is ended, and have subscribed 5,000,000 rubles for this purpose.

The members of the American Jewish Legion for Service in Palestine, who are in training in England, have organized four baseball teams and ask the Zionist organizations of America to obtain for them complete paraphernalia.

A number of Jews have been executed at Kherson in the Ukraine, for hiding their grain from the Germans. Some Jewish men only have been hanged because they refused to reveal the names of peasants who were secreting grain or who were trading and had dealings.

Mr. Adolph Leisner has agreed to further finance the summer concerts to be given in the Stadium, this city, by an orchestra of 90, and their debut concert, which was hinted at, will be staged off. The concerts will continue through to the end of August at least.

The *Odessa Inzatchi Zeitung*, the semi-official organ of the German authorities in the Crimea, announces the discovery in Odessa of a Jewish organization engaged in recruiting all the old fighters of the imperial army and sending them to Vladivostok and from there to the Palestinian front. Many arrests, including two rabbis, have been made by the German military authorities.

Twenty Jewish soldiers, former war prisoners, were killed, and many others were seriously wounded in a massacre in Golben (Moldavia) Roumania, which was the direct result of an anti-Semitic speech made by a priest. The priest openly called upon his audience to massacre the Jews and offered presents amounting to 5,000 francs to those who would obey him. The massacre followed.

Prof. Julius Steiglitz, chairman of the department of chemistry at the University of Chicago, has been appointed as special expert in the United States Public Health Service of the Treasury Department. The government assigns him two assistants, who will be in the employ of the public health service and will carry out their work in Kent Chemical Laboratory, under Professor Steiglitz's direction.

"Ita" (Italian Jewish Community) elected Cavaliere A. L. Bianchini and Dr. G. Artom to go to Palestine as delegates to Zionist Commission now in that country. The presence of Italian and French delegates on the Zionist Commission is another mark of the complete harmony existing among the Allied governments with regard to the establishment of a Jewish national home in Palestine.

Rabbi Louis Feingold, of the Ohel Jacob Congregation, of Philadelphia, Pa., has resigned to assume charge of the Adath Israel Congregation (known as the Avondale Synagogue), of Cincinnati, Ohio. Rabbi Feingold, who is 30 years of age and a graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, will be the first graduate of that institution to occupy a Cincinnati pulpit. He has been with Ohel Jacob since 1918.

A movement has been begun in Sweden to obtain the Nobel prize this year for the famous Hebrew poet, Nahman Etalik, of Odessa. Dr. Ehrenpreis, the Chief Rabbi of Sweden, who is himself a Hebrew writer, is very much interested in the movement. A number of Etalik's poems have been translated in the Swedish language, and some of the most prominent writers expressed enthusiasm for the fine work of the Hebrew poet.

The transfer department of the Zionist Organization of America reports that 2,000 receipts have come from Palestine covering moneys which have been forwarded there from individuals in this country to their needy relatives in portions of Palestine occupied by the British forces. These receipts, which came in duplicate, cover one-quarter of a million francs. Some of these receipts cover moneys which have been paid as recently as May 18, 1918.

The Jewish Correspondence Bureau at The Hague announces that at a meeting of the Belgian Zionists on May 28 a resolution was adopted declaring that they can in no wise agree to the Palestine program of the German Zionists. A resolution was also adopted condemning Dr. Hantke, a member of the Main Committee of the Zionist organization, for joining the Union of Jewish Organization in Germany (V. J. O. D.).

The Joint Foreign Committee for Jewish affairs (successor to the London Conjoint Committee) received from Secretary Balfour reiteration of assurance already given that the British Government has the closest sympathy with the emancipation of the Jews in Eastern and Southeastern Europe, and is anxious to do everything in its power to secure just permanent settlement throughout the regions concerned.

The Leipzig magazine *Prometheus* recently contained an article entitled "The Technical Development of Syria and Palestine," which gave interesting details concerning new railways, buildings, aqueducts, etc. The article confirmed the statement recently made by a neutral observer that the years of war had benefited the Sinaitic peninsula and South Palestine more than fifty years of peace.

To obviate any controversy that might arise by reasons of Jewish chaplains objecting to wearing the cross as insignia, the War Department has decided to adopt the shepherd's crook as the regulation mark of army chaplains. The shepherd's crook was the insignia used until 1898 by chaplains in the army, but at that time the cross was determined to be the most symbolic decoration of the army's clergy.

Speaking recently at a luncheon given to the American Jewish soldiers in London, Sir Adolph Tuck asserted that there were 50,000 Jews fighting in the Allied forces on the western front. Describing a visit which he recently paid to an American division in France, Mr. H. Perry Robinson, war correspondent of the *London Daily News*, stated that some of the best non-commissioned officers in the American units were Jews.

The Finnish government has ordered all Jews expelled from Finland before September 30, and has instructed all communities to deny food to Jews after that date, according to reports reaching the Jewish Press Bureau at Stockholm. The Finnish Jews have issued an appeal to the world for assistance. The Finnish Senate, it is said, will grant naturalization to only a few Jews, especially those who fought in the ranks of the White Guards.

Apropos of a canard spread by the Russian reactionaries in Paris that the Maximalists had started a second "official" daily paper in Yiddish in Petrograd, the *Oesterreichische Wochenschrift* states that no Bolshevik daily appears in Yiddish. The Commission for Jewish Affairs, it is true, intended to bring out a weekly in Yiddish, but even should this plan be actually carried out, which is very doubtful, the paper might have an editor, but it will find no readers, as Bolshevism is utterly repudiated by the Jewish masses and by all the Jewish labor parties.

**New Parochial Schools.**

The Jewish parochial school movement is making rapid progress in this country. Within the last few weeks several campaigns have been undertaken for the establishment of parochial schools in different parts of the country. In Philadelphia the Yeshiva Mishkan Israel, which has been in existence for fifteen years, has been reorganized through the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary of New York, which sent one of its members to assume charge of it. There are in the Philadelphia Yeshiva about 75 students, all studying the Bible, Talmud, Jewish history and literature. It is now possible for Philadelphia boys to prepare themselves properly to enter the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary. The rabbinate of Philadelphia and prominent Jews take an active part in directing the work of this Yeshiva.

Several weeks ago the Jewish community of Baltimore dedicated the school building for the Yeshiva Torah We-Ermineh, which is the first Jewish parochial school in the State of Maryland. This school has an elaborate program of studies, in which the Talmud and Commentaries, Bible and Jewish history are taught under the direction of Rabbi Schwartz, of Baltimore, and Messrs. J. Newhausen and Zar. This Yeshiva is also a preparatory school for the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary. In Montreal a new Yeshiva has been opened some time ago, under the direction of Rabbi H. Cohen, of Montreal, and it is the aim of this school to prepare its students for admission to the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary.

A parochial school was recently established under the name of "Eitz Chaim," in Borough Park.

The organization of other Yeshivath in different parts of the country has been undertaken by the Committee on Education of the Agudas-Ha-Rabbonim, of which Rabbi Dr. Bernard Revel, the head of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, is chairman. It is hoped that in time a national system of Jewish parochial schools for America will be made possible.

The Parochial High School of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary will have its first graduation next June. During the regular high school work the students devote five hours daily to the intensive study of the Bible and commentaries, Jewish history and literature, Jewish laws and ethics and Talmud and commentaries.

The regents' examinations held in the seminary have shown a better average than the regular high school examinations.

**Orthodox Convalescent Home to Be Opened.**

Arrangements are being completed for the opening in a few weeks of the Hebrew Convalescent Home at 235-237 West 120th street.

The institution was founded by Mrs. Goldie Diamond, who, having passed through a serious illness, found her complete recovery retarded by reason of the fact that there was no orthodox home to which she could go during the period of convalescence.

To the poor sick the Hebrew Convalescent Home, which will accommodate about 2,000 patients during the year, will be a veritable godsend. Each patient will remain for at least two weeks, and if the medical board deems it advisable, a longer stay will be permitted.

No charge will be made and patients, men and women and boys and girls of the age of 15 years and upward, will be received upon the recommendation of the social service departments of the various hospitals.

The Hebrew Convalescent Home will be conducted on strictly orthodox lines, and it has been fitted up with everything conducive to the comfort of the convalescents. The institution has at present a membership of about 700.

**Germany's Treatment of the Jews in Poland.**

A writer in the *Univers Israelite* of June 7 calls attention to the following items of information which have come through from Eastern Europe, and which constitute a grim commentary on the professed love of the German Government for the Jewish people.

1. The National Jewish Council of Russia has protested against the atrocities committed by the German troops in the occupied Russian districts, particularly in the government of Mohilef, and the Jewish Communities of Russia have called the attention of the Jewish organizations of other countries to the fact that numerous pogroms have been organized by the German authorities, who have incited the peasants against the Jews.

2. At Kiev, on May 10, the German authorities arrested three members of the National Council of Ukrainian Jews, one of them being the well-known advocate, Halperin. They will be tried by a German court-martial, so that one may guess the fate in store for them.

3. For some time past proclamations tending to provoke anti-semitic outbreaks have been distributed at Warsaw, Cracow and Lemberg. They are composed in Polish full of Germanisms and are printed in a type used in German presses. The Town Council of Warsaw has published the following protest against this maneuver:

"The Town Council expresses its indignation at the proclamations inciting to violence against the Jews. It regards them as proceeding from provocative agents, who must be sought outside the ranks of the Polish people."

The writer thinks that the German Government's object in this policy is to excite and pander to popular passions.

**Two Cities in Minsk Terrorized by German-Poles.**

The German and Polish soldiers continue their pogrom activities against Jews in the Province of Minsk. Their brutalities become more unbearable and more terrible every day.

tants of Starodoroga and Uzda, both towns in the Province of Minsk. In Starodoroga the soldiers brutally attacked the two Jews, Frankel and Feldman; they tied a third one, a certain Rosmach, to the back of a horse and drove the horse for many miles; they shot to death the Jewish soldier, Solonietzki, and whipped the elders of the community, Messrs. Kapelowitz, Chermowsky and Goldstein.

They then plundered Jewish houses and stores and announced that they would burn the entire town and massacre all the inhabitants unless the Jews would give up alleged hidden guns and ammunition.

After the Jews paid the commander of the soldiers a considerable sum of money he recalled the order to burn the town, on condition that all the Jewish inhabitants would work on building roads, dig trenches and do similar work.

In Uzda the same soldiers stripped all the inhabitants of all their clothes and then drove them through the streets.

Attention is called in the *Israelitisches Wochenblatt fur die Schweiz* (May 10) to a book recently issued by Dr. Rafael Becker on "Nervous Affections Among the Jews" ("Judische Nervositat"), in which the author finds support for Zionist aims in purely medical considerations. He attributes the liability of the Jews to nervous maladies to the fact that "disease tends to attack most severely that part of the organism which is most used," and in the case of the Jews this part is the nervous system and its central organ, the brain. This again is due to the abnormal legal and social status of the Jews in the diaspora, which leads them to give an undue preference to professions involving severe mental strain. The remedy is that the Jews should return to a more normal distribution of occupations, such as prevails among other peoples, and re-instate agriculture and handicrafts, which "provide every people with its groundwork of sound nervous systems," in their ancient place of honor. This can be done only in Palestine, only in the ancient Jewish homeland can a sufficient portion of the Jewish people devote itself to these occupations to repair the constant decay in the nervous energy of the race.

**Jewish Refugees at Alexandria.**

An account of the Jewish refugee camps at Alexandria is contributed to the *Zionist Review* for June by Mr. Leon Simon, a member of the Zionist Commission. There are two camps, at which, at the time of writing, about 1,500 refugees were left, out of some 5,000 who had passed through the hands of the Refugee Administration. The rest have found work outside, and no longer need government assistance, but even those that remain are by no means unproductive, though, of course, unable to support themselves and their families completely.

Each camp has a synagogue, a school and baths, and there has been a great improvement in cleanliness and hygienic habits since the refugees first came. The schools, which were started by the Anglo-Jewish Association, provide instruction for nearly 600 boys and girls from the age of three upward. The writer pays a high tribute to the head of the Refugee Administration, Mr. William C. Hornblower, both for his efficiency and for the warm-hearted interest he takes in the refugees, particularly the children.

**The Hilfsverein Schools in Palestine.**

According to a report read by Dr. Paul Nathan at the general meeting of the Hilfsverein der Deutschen Juden, held at Berlin on April 28, communications that came through from Palestine showed that the educational work of the Hilfsverein schools in that country was still in full swing, while, by agreement with the German authorities, the Hilfsverein was permitted to forward to Jerusalem, occupied as it now was by the British, the money required for keeping the schools there going.

These schools, according to the speaker, included two kindergarten schools, 350 pupils; one girls' school, 450 pupils; one boys' school (the Lamel school), with 350 pupils; a commercial school and teachers' institute, with course for rabbinat attached, 100 scholars; one girls' home, 30 children; one "cheder," and two Talmud Torah schools.

According to a telegram received from Palestine on May 12, these schools had been closed for a time after the British occupation, but have now been taken over and reopened as Hebrew schools by the Zionist Commission.

We are sorry *The American Israelite* has only quite recently learned that the deceased wife of the late Theodor Herzl was a Jewess. She was such, indeed. Yet, it is fair to add that Herzl's wife was and to the end of her early days remained as much a Jewess as her husband was a Jew before he published "The Jewish State," and was acclaimed by the adherents of the infant Zionist movement as their heaven-sent leader.

It appears that within the London *Ashkenazic* community there is no such custom as prescribes a form of burial ceremony at the house of mourning or synagogue of a deceased person before the cortege with his remains wends its way to the place of interment. Only at the burial ground are the ceremonies of commitment carried out. We observe that an effort is making in Anglo-Jewry to introduce this unknown custom, and lend the support our words may afford thereto.

Judge Julian W. Mack, the new leader of the Zionists of his country, is certainly the one man in their organization who has up to the present time enjoyed the complete confidence of prominent non-Zionist or even anti-Zionist Jews. Moreover, he has been able to work with the latter in perfect harmony while he maintained a more or less intimate connection with Zionist aspirations and activities. At times it was whispered that his position of friendship with the opposing camps presented the appearance of a "straddle" the ultimate outcome of which was questionable. Be this as it may the Zionists have selected their best possible choice to lead their forces, and, if their cohorts do not impose too many inconsistent demands upon him, he should be able to harmonize Zionism quite successfully with many of the divergent facts of American Jewish life.

It is strange, to say the least, for *The American Jewish Chronicle* to warn us that we have no right to question such of our Reform rabbis as have joined forces with the Zionists on the compatibility of their religious views with their Zionism. This is a sacred topic, it would seem, which should never be ventilated. To save the faces of the few Reform rabbis which Zionism can muster such an attitude is quite defensible, but scarcely for *The American Jewish Chronicle* which has constituted itself the guardian of our religious and communal morals and is preternaturally active in ferreting out Jewish religious traitors wherever concealed. But our local contemporary is so hidebound and thoroughgoing a supporter of the Zionist cause, as is its right, that in this case it lapses into inconsistency. We, for our part, have always condemned the large irreligious element present under the banner of Zionism and can explain this only because of the inherently irreligious quality of this movement.

We are not at all surprised to learn that the Jews of Austria-Hungary incline now to the cause of the *entente* allies, although obviously it is impossible for them to exhibit their sympathies publicly. Probably the same situation exists in the case of the Jews of Germany. The Jews of the Central Powers must forcibly realize to-day, if they have not realized this heretofore, that only from the *entente*, on whose side victory in the conflict must and will eventually stand, can help for Jewry proceed. The Central Powers have furnished a striking index of their disposition toward Jews by the treaties of Brest-Litovsk and Bucharest, and the world is now appreciating the fact that the "rights" vouchsafed to the Jews of Roumania by the latter instrument are a snare and a delusion. In short, every element in the population of the Central Powers is slowly but distinctly beginning to understand that there are no sides to the great war, a right and a wrong one, and that the Central Powers are on the wrong side.

## THE PAN-GERMANS AND JEWS

TWO items of recent news from abroad are eloquently indicative of the real sentiments of the Germans for the Jews who may be subject to their jurisdiction or control. The first of these is a report that the present *de facto* government of the former grand duchy of Finland, of which the Germans are notoriously the moving force, has ordered all Jews expelled from the country by the 30th of September under the most stringently inhuman and drastic provisions that may be imagined. The second concerns itself with the agitation of the Pan-Germans in the German Empire, who are now in full possession of the government and have a death-like grip on the vitals of the nation, in favor of a special tax on Jews.

To parallel these incursions into brutal barbarity we must hark back to mediaeval times, for Finland under German pressure is following the action of the monarchs of Spain who expelled their Jews under conditions of unexampled cruelty from that country in 1492, and with the development of individual liberty under British and American auspices in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries special taxes on certain elements of the population of a state ceased to be either leviable or defensible.

We did not require these unrelated incidents to demonstrate that Germany and the countries under her surveillance are crassly brutal and grotesquely mediaeval. When the fighting forces of a nation sink and bomb hospitals on vessels flying the Red Cross and land stations similarly distinguished, any excesses of rapacity are believable, in fact may be anticipated. But there are members of our own community in Germany who fancied that their rulers have, indeed, seen the light; they delude themselves into the easy idea that their own gigantic sacrifices have moved their masters to adopt another tone and a different intention in respect of their position in the state. What an egregious blunder, what a grievous blunder they have made!

The *entente* allies are, indeed, waging the warfare of liberty and humanity on behalf of the suffering and oppressed nations of the earth against the dark forces of rapine and murder. Rapine is but another name for a special tax and murder for the wholesale expulsion of an unoffending race. Jews everywhere will do well closely to observe the actions of the Pan-Germans and to work and pray for their final and engulfing discomfiture.

The Zionist organization in this country, by means of a questionnaire addressed to each member of the United States Senate and House of Representatives, has undertaken to obtain authoritative expressions of the sentiments of our national legislators on the subject of the aspirations of Zionists with respect to the Balfour declaration on Palestine. The queries concern particularly stress the thought of our lawmakers on the wisdom and practicability of our Government's adopting some steps calculated to advance the realization of the aims of the Zionists. It is very probable that in the course of the next few weeks the Zionists will thus come into possession of a considerable number of benevolent expressions of interest in their cause emanating from these highly-placed leaders of American public opinion; but, unless the sentiments are translated into the practical action of an appropriate Congressional joint resolution, we see little or no immediate good resulting from the expenditure of so much energy, thought, paper, printing-ink and postage. As a matter of fact, since the British, French and Italian Governments have in a sense stated their benevolent interest in the latest phases of Zionism, no good reason exists why our authorities should not follow their exalted example, with positively useful effects.

We now learn that the recent *impasse* in the relations between Dr. Moses Gaster, the *Haham* of the *Sephardim* of Great Britain, and his congregation, never particularly cordial and frequently marked by storms and squalls of some intensity, has resulted in open rupture, the learned spiritual guide retiring from his charge after having held this for upwards of thirty years. The provoking cause was Dr. Gaster's removal to Brighton from London to protect his family and himself from the danger involved in German air-raids, and the somewhat arbitrary and peremptory direction of his *Mahamad* or ruling council of elders, that he return immediately to the scene of his labors and cease to carry these on at a distance. Dr. Gaster is a versatile scholar of high rank and distinction, a loyal Jew, and, by those who have heard him preach or lecture, an orator of striking attainments. But he has ever been a difficult man to get on with and for years was the stormy-petrel of British communal affairs. The wonder to us is that such a man should have endured in a high ministerial post for so many years and that his occupancy of his dignified and venerable office should have terminated through what is, after all, more or less of a quibble. Dr. Gaster's numerous and estimable virtues of personality in a communal sense by his grievous defects of personality. For, it is personality which in the ultimate analysis counts for much in the enduring regard in which men, and particularly spiritual leaders, are held and which keeps green their memories after they themselves, with all their great scholarship, have passed away. Perhaps Dr. Gaster, now that he is relieved of congregational cares, will be happier and unfold a large measure of real scholarly usefulness. If he come to this country, as is suggested in certain Zionist circles, there is great danger that he will set our communal house by the ears.

## RELIGION—A KEEN VITALITY

"Man doth not live by bread alone, but by everything that proceedeth out of the mouth of the Lord doth man live."—(Deut. viii, 8.)

RELIGION is essentially an enhancement of life, a form of buoyant unleaping aliveness, a *keen vitality*. Man lives, according to our text, not on the purely physical plane but pre-eminently on the spiritual plane, where he finds the meaning of his existence in the self-utterance of God to man: "by every thing that proceedeth out of the mouth of the Lord." On this plane, man finds a fulness of being, an abundant satisfaction, a living, breathing, palpitating sense of *I-am-ness*, he can find nowhere else. The philosopher said: "I think, therefore I am!" The believer says: "I believe, therefore I am!"

Whatever else religion may be: ritual, rule of conduct, tradition and history, it must be above all this passionate and enhanced sense of being. The gestures and vestures of religion naturally appeal to certain religious natures, and none should quarrel with them on this account. But all that religion prescribes by way of outward action has no meaning if it be merely mechanical and uninspired, without the inner grace of God-passion that fills the heart of man with a peculiar life. This life of faith—an atmosphere, an illumination, a haunting beauty that lies like a bloom upon the face of creation—is the highest and most significant achievement of the human spirit.

Man is the only creature that asks for a *meaning* of living. This quest of the why and wherefore of existence may, indeed, become morbid until it leads to darkness and despair. An *escape* is sought from the meaninglessness of being, and not always found. Sometimes—as in the case of Christianity—the escape is found in an other-world of bliss and beatitude—a method which strangely exhibits the pessimism of a needlessly deferred optimism that has nothing good to say of this madly-urgent, madly-beautiful life here and now. All this morbidity is due to the insensate and hopeless desire of finding a meaning for life, not in life itself, but outside of life. If an escape from life is needed, it can only be had in life itself, in ever more living, in a veritable intoxication with life; but such abundant, overbrimming life is only possible in and through the spirit of God.

This morbidity of a futile external quest of meaning is not a necessary human trait. There is a wholesome desire of understanding life, of sending the feelers of our soul to its remotest nooks, of penetrating into the deep recesses of its mystery. Not to ask the age-long questions about the riddle of the universe means living on the animal plane, "by bread alone," means glutting the body while starving the spirit. Man's real life begins with these questions, with the characteristically human hunger for that which "proceedeth out of the mouth of the Lord." And this hunger leads to an ultimate satisfaction not to be secured in any other form of life than in the life spiritual.

The animal-man takes his being for granted unquestioningly, indifferently. The spiritual man takes nothing for granted, is ready to wrestle for every boon life holds. There is, indeed, a healthy animal-spirit in man which superabounds in energy, in an effervescent sort of gaiety, care and fancy-free, that is very attractive and bracing in its effect. Into such mood of bubbling merriment no brooding sense of life's riddlesome essence ever enters. Still, this mere effervescence of living cannot be taken for the *keen vitality* of the spiritual life: the former is too momentary to furnish a lasting basis for human existence, and too much on the surface to plumb the depths, while the latter is both profound and abiding. Life is large enough to include passing moods, but it is too rich to be centered in them alone.

And then there is a certain naive unconscious form of living, beautiful, serene and happy, removed from all gnawing doubts and tantalising questionings: living as if for its own sake, spinning on unknowingly the fairy-web of hours and days, as though wrapt in a dream of laughing gossamer—very enchanting this is, and touching to behold. One would wish to live in this way till the end: but it is impossible. For such is the life of little children, in whose games we see a God dancing to the tune of Infinite Love. It is a life that partakes of the charm of flowers that blow under the radiant sun, that is as ultimate as the swaying branches conjured by the invisible fingers of the summer-breeze into a green harp. We ask nothing from these lives, except that they live: for we see in them the heave and breath of infinitude itself. Yet, unlike the lives of the animal-man, these unquestioning lives have a great deal in common with the keenly vitalized being of the spiritual man. Serenity, in the first place—only the latter's is an *achieved* serenity, a serenity into whose depth the soul has foundered through fathoms of darkness. And in the second place this too—that, like the child that lives for living's sake, though unconsciously, the spiritual man seeks consciously to find all of life's poignant pleasure, not in any external purpose, but in life itself: not anywhere else, but here and now on this earth riotous with beauty, teeming with manifold being, nurturing in its perishing womb the germ of eternity!

And he finds this overflowing joy of life here, because he knows that life is divine—the yearning of a God, the dream of the Uncreated Silence. And he finds it, not in detachment and separation, but in a complete merging with the life of the All, until he feels the delight of the very God running through his veins and singing out of his heart. It is then alone that the spiritual man knows himself to be alive—keenly, gloriously, triumphantly alive—when his own breath has become as the soft beat of the wave against the beach, behind which is the urgency of Eternal Desire sending its floating messengers toward the finite shore. . . .

**Dr. Alcalay Bids America Adieu.**  
Editor HEBREW STANDARD:  
Prior to my departure from America, I feel it my duty publicly to acknowledge my grateful appreciation for the many courtesies extended to me by various organizations, among which was the Central Conference of American Rabbis, congregations and leaders in Jewry. During my four months stay in the United States, I have had the opportunity of meeting a large number of the representative Jewish men and women. I shall carry back with me, an inspiration that will serve me in good stead, in my work in behalf of Serbian Jewry. America stands primarily for efficiency and the Jews in America have brought that lesson to bear in all of the work that is being done by them in Jewish matters.

The cordiality with which I was received and the opportunity extended to me to interpret both the purpose of my special mission in behalf of my government and also to define the status of the Jew in Serbia, has not, I am sure been in vain. Upon my return, I shall be filled with the zeal and enthusiasm, which my co-religionists in my native home, as well as in other parts of Europe are so badly in need of at this present hour. I feel that it is proper to acknowledge the many courtesies extended to me and to emphasize that I shall ever value the many friendships that I have formed during my short sojourn in this country.

There is neither room nor time to mention all of the people to whom I feel duty bound to name: Rev. Dr. and Mrs. H. Pereira Mendes, whose home has made it less difficult for me to forget my severance from my family and who have in many ways, received me as though I had the honor to be of their kin. In the same way, I have been placed under deep obligation to Mr. and Mrs. J. de A. Benayunes; Mr. and Mrs. Mayer Swab, also Mr. and Mrs. Munchin, of New York; Mr. and Mrs. Englehardt of Chicago; Rabbi and Mrs. Harry Levy and Rev. Dr. Israeli and Mr. Nathan Pinansky of Boston; Dr. Solis Cohen and Judge Mayer Sulzberger of Philadelphia; Mr. and Mrs. Shapiro and Dr. Rosen of Bridgeport, Conn.; Mr. and Mrs. Lasker of Springfield, Mass.; Mr.

Leo Lehman of Pittsburgh; Julius Levy of Baltimore and many others in all of these cities.

I particularly wish to emphasize the names of a few gentlemen who have not alone shown me civility, but who have considerably aided me in the work that has brought me to America. Among them are Jacob H. Schiff, who has proven in every act and thought, the sterling qualities that have made him the foremost among the acknowledged leaders in Israel; Nathan Straus, Julius Rosenwald, Felix M. Warburg, Oscar S. Straus, Henry Morgenthau, Abraham I. Elkus, Louis Marshall, Cyrus Adler, Harry Fischel, Morris Engleman and Gabriel Davidson have been more than kind. Rabbi M. S. Margolies, Rev. Dr. Bernard Drachman, Rev. Moses Hyamson, Rev. Dr. Philip Klein have received me with all the helpfulness and cordiality and spirit that could possibly be extended to a colleague.

No one has been more helpful than Mr. Albert Lucas, secretary of the Joint Distribution Committee of American Jewish Relief Funds. He has facilitated the obtaining of permission to forward money for the relief of Jews in Serbia and arranged for my reception at the Department of State, so that my petition was granted. The Joint Distribution Committee, headed by Mr. Felix M. Warburg, who has impressed me by his modesty and genuine Jewish interest has also granted aid to my brethren, who are refugees in Switzerland for which I am truly grateful.

Last but not least I am especially grateful to Mr. Stanley Bero, manager of the Central Relief Committee, who has made it easy for me to get a true impression of the many problems that concern American Jewry, and has been, I may be permitted to say, even as my right hand, ever since the first day of my arrival in this country.

I beg the Jewish press of America to extend their courtesy to me to permit me to take this means of conveying to the Jews of America, my heart-felt wishes for their progress and may the blessing of the Almighty lighten their unselfish labors for the perpetuation of our religion and the glory and honor of Israel.

**Governor Harding's Error.**

Editor HEBREW STANDARD:  
I read in the July 19th issue of the HEBREW STANDARD the arguments set forth by the Governor of Iowa and Mr. Louis Marshall of New York, in reference to a certain proclamation issued some time ago by the Governor.

Assuming that citizens of one State or our Union have a right to criticize official proclamations of the executives of other States, I beg to register a strong protest against the above-mentioned proclamation of the Governor, on the ground that the proclamation in question contains much too much patriotism, and is, therefore, against the interests of the United States.

Fritz, the storekeeper, was born in Prussia, but is a citizen of the United States. Fritz does not receive a single dollar—he says to himself—of the Kaiser's \$100,000,000 fund alleged to have been created in this country for the purpose of paying the expenses of the pro-German activities here. Fritz, however, loves the Kaiser, and is making considerable propaganda among his neighbors, tending to bring home to the latter exaggerated ideas about the strength behind the Kaiser, about the enormously great difficulties the United States may find in fighting Germany, about the great sufferings and sacrifices the people of this country may have to make in treasure and blood in case the war should continue much longer, about the possibility of England concluding a separate peace with the Kaiser, and exposing by this the United States to the—according to Fritz—great danger of facing the Kaiser's forces single-handed, etc.

The main object of Fritz's propaganda is evidently to make the masses of the people of the United States dissatisfied with our Federal administration in the matter of our being in the war and to lay by this a foundation for disturbances similar to those the German agency of Lenine-Trotsky & Co succeeded in breaking free Russia with.

Fritz seems, also, to have the benefit of legal advice, for he always understands how to cover his poisonous propaganda with a cloth of patriotism so that the laws of the United States cannot be easily used against him.

I certainly do not mean by the above

to throw even a shadow of a doubt on the patriotism and good intentions of Governor Harding. And I do not blame the Governor for requesting the owners of German papers of Iowa to issue the said papers in English during the war, in order to facilitate the task of the Federal censors. It seems to me, however, that the Governor was ill-advised when he included in his order or request the owners or editors of papers of all foreign languages, and especially when he included in the proclamation in question even public worship!

In its present form I must say Governor Harding's proclamation is just as much adapted to serve the interest of the Kaiser as the above described propaganda of a Prussian Fritz.

**Jewish Volunteers Address General Allenby.**

Among the deputations that participated in the recent presentation to General Allenby of a Sepher Torah was one representing the Jewish Volunteers, an organization of Palestine Jews who have offered themselves for enlistment in the British army, and also of the women who desire to become members of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (Waacs). The deputation included Messrs. Warshawsky, Guttman, O'ehan ky and Spiegelman and Mrs. R. Jan'ot. The deputation made the following address to General Allenby:

"Your Excellency: In the name of the Jewish Volunteers we beg to offer you our hearty thanks for your assistance and precious help in the realization of a Jewish regiment for the sons of the land of Israel. We, the sons of the oldest of nations, offer our being to you, conqueror of Jerusalem, representative of Britannia, the invincible Britannia, leader of nations by justice and honor, demonstrates now to us, also, her desire for justice by promising us a Jewish home in the Jewish land, and thereby opening for the Jewish nation, as well as for the Jewish land, the tower of hope, the tower of life, the tower of a future re-creation, a future that our past prophesied of its greatness. From you, honorable Sir, had we the honor to hear of the good tidings—tidings from Britannia that our regiment will become a reality, tidings which have brought us to our highest for me and desire offering us an opportunity to fight for our land and nation.

"Now we are ready for your orders. We hope that we shall know how to do our duty, the duty of the Jewish army to fight under the flag of Great Britain. And you, conqueror and deliverer, your name shall remain an honor and a blessing to the Jewish nation, which at this hour hopes to get its freedom. Forever will thy name be engraved on the heart and soul of that everlasting nation.

General Allenby, in replying, said that he was proud and happy to hear of the Volunteers' movement. They would all fight side by side in the trenches against their common foe, and he hoped that they will obtain the victory.

**Major Karpas Dead.**

The United States Army casualty lists of the 22d inst. announce the death of Major John Jacob Karpas, United States Medical Corps, as having died of disease. Major Karpas, who was 38 years old, had an office at 24 East Forty-eighth street, and lived at 307 West Forty-eighth street previous to his enlistment.

The last letter received from Major Karpas by his family said he was engaged in the organization of one of the largest base hospitals of the American expeditionary force at Favy, France. He left this country May 19 in splendid health, according to his brother, Irving Karpas, 152 West 118th street, who is engaged in the cloak and suit business. Dr. Karpas was born in Russia. He graduated from Long Island College in 1903, and later became one of the leading physicians of the Neurological Institute at Sixty-seventh street and Lexington avenue. He is survived by two brothers and one sister. His younger brother is now attached to an army medical unit at a base hospital in the South.

He was also an alienist at Bellevue Hospital for a time, and had been on the staff of the Manhattan State Hospital on Ward's Island. He was called in by the prosecution at the Waite murder case.

The summer concerts given by Edwin Frank O. Goldman and his New York Military Band at Columbia College are meeting with extraordinary success and the audiences at each concert have so far averaged between seven and eight thousand people. This evening there will be a special grand opera program, including numbers from "The Prophet," "Mignon," "Pagliacci," "Boheme," "Le Cid," "Faust" and "Giaconda." Monday, July 29, there will be a special request program, when the band will play excerpts from "Carmen" and the "Mikado." Miss Isabella Irving will give three songs. A grand patriotic festival, including community singing, has been arranged for July 31.

**First Zionist Organization in Chile.**

The first Zionist organization in the history of Chile was organized here recently, with the aid of the richest, most intelligent and most influential members of the local Jewish colony.

Until this Zionist organization came into existence there was not a single Zionist association in the entire republic. The organizer of the first and only Zionist organization in Chile is the well known Zionist agitator, Dr. Epstein, who has been in Argentina over a year, and who also made a trip to Chile from there.

Dr. Epstein's visit caused quite a sensation here. All the large newspapers wrote special articles about him and published interviews with him concerning Jewish and Zionist questions. The action of the British Ambassador in inviting Dr. Epstein to make him an official visit made a particularly strong impression in influential circles throughout the republic. The invitation from the British Ambassador was wholly unexpected, even by Dr. Epstein, and the British Embassy gave out the news to the press. This has a great effect on the rich Jews, who were until then almost entirely assimilated.

**Rabbis' Sons in Show Business Form Benevolent Association.**

A unique organization was formed in New York last Sunday, called the Rabbis' Sons Benevolent Association. The members are connected with the theatrical business in some capacity, and are sons of either rabbis or cantors. The officers elected are as follows: Harry Houdini (Weiss), president; Al Jolson (Yelson), vice-president; Irving Berlin (Berlin), secretary; Bert Cooper (Kupfer), financial secretary; Walter East, traveling representative, and Howard Brothers (Lefkowitz), sergeants-at-arms.

The organization was formed to supply financial aid to the Red Cross, the Young Men's Hebrew Association and other war organizations. A number of sons of rabbis were present and each contributed one week's salary, making a total of \$8,000.

"Our purpose is to get all the sons of rabbis who are in the show business in this organization," said President Houdini. "It is surprising how many sons of Jewish clergymen there are on the stage."

**Anti-Semitism in Vienna.**

The anti-Semitic disposition of the German Christian Socialist party in Austria, already sufficiently well known through the rabid attacks of its organ, the *Reichspost*, found striking illustration in the proceedings of the "Deutscher Volkstag," or German National Congress, held at Vienna, at which, according to a report in the *Vienna Morgenzeitung*, of June 18, the Burgomaster, Herr Weisskirchner, who presided, and the deputies, Herren Wolff and Kunschak, made provocative speeches in which they blamed the Jews for the distress which the war had occasioned, including the shortage of food and housing accommodation. The Congress greeted each expression of anti-Semitism with applause, and shouted, "Pogrom! Pogrom!" The speech of Herr Kunschak in particular had as its aim the starting of pogroms. The Jewish population in Vienna, which numbers more than two hundred thousand, is growing very uneasy.



### Germany and the Jews of Lithuania.

The *Judische Presse* of June 7 warns the German Government that by refusing the national claims of the Jews of Lithuania it is placing the settlement of that country on a radically wrong basis and withholding from the Jews their just rights. "It is well known," says the article, "that Germany's handling of the Jewish question in Poland has not satisfied the most important demands of the Polish Jews; and the unfavorable effect which this has had upon the situation of Poland itself and upon the attitude of international Jewry toward Germany is to-day clear to everybody. It is to be hoped that the same mistakes will not be made in the handling and settlement of the Jewish question in Lithuania; and that the directors of German policy will recognize that a frank acknowledgment of the legitimate claims of Lithuanian Jewry is dictated no less by political prudence than by common justice."

### The Germans in the Ukraine.

A representative of the Russian Union of Towns named Silbermann, who recently arrived from the Ukraine in Moscow, in a statement to the *Vlast Norado*, the organ of the Right Revolutionary Socialists, said that when the Ukrainian troops first returned to Kiev there had been numerous cases of workers, soldiers, and especially Jews, being shot and massacred. For some time the Germans had done nothing to prevent the outrages, but after a few German soldiers had been killed by the Ukrainian discharged soldiers they had brought strong pressure to bear on the authorities and the outrages had ceased. The *Nash Yek* published a statement that there was a pogrom of the Jews in Kiev at the time when the Germans arrived, and they made no attempt to put an end to it. The same indifference to Jewish interests is shown by the fact that the new pro-German Government has annulled the decision of the Rada to establish a Jewish teachers' seminary in the Ukraine.

### Argentine Zionists Thank Italy.

The declaration of the Italian Government supporting England's declaration that it looks with favor upon the establishing of a Jewish national home in Palestine made a particularly strong impression on the Argentine Zionists. The fact that there is a very strong Italian element probably accounts for the strong impression.

The Argentine Federation of Zionists sent a special message of thanks to the Italian Government for its declaration favoring a Jewish home in Palestine.

Strong efforts are being made to organize the Jewish communities in Batavia and Java, Dutch East Indies. The Jewish population of the two cities named has grown to such an extent that the need for community life is being felt very keenly. The task of the organization has been undertaken by Mr. J. Hen, a Zionist from Holland.

The Jewish Battalion in Cairo.

The Salonica paper *Pro-Israel* gives some interesting details regarding the English battalion during its stay in Cairo. About 50 per cent. of the members of the battalion, it says, are English-born or naturalized, while the rest include the former members of the Zion Mule Corps, a large number of Russian Jews and a curious mixture of allied and neutral nationalities. They are nearly all teetotalers, and the canteens which were opened for the sale of alcoholic drinks had to close down within a fortnight for lack of business. There is so little crime, according to the statement of Colonel Patterson, the commander, that the police station is empty, and the detention cells have been turned into guards' bedrooms. There are a large number of tailors in the battalion, which accounts for the smart cut of the uniforms. Over twenty languages are represented in the ranks, and orders are given both in English and Yiddish. Only kosher food is supplied to the troops; Saturday is the day of rest instead of Sunday; and fast days are observed as part of the military regulations.

Twenty-First Annual Convention of Zionists in Switzerland.

Basle.—The twenty-first general conference of delegates of Zionist societies in Switzerland took place here recently. Fifty-five delegates from various organizations, and hundreds of visitors, among them the chief rabbi and the president of the community of Basle, attended the various sessions.

Dr. Camille Levy, the president of the Swiss Zionist Federation, delivered the opening address, in the course of which he read a letter of hearty congratulation from the municipality of Basle.

The report of the Executive Committee dwelt on the significance of the declaration of the British Government. During the discussions which followed Dr. Pincus, of Zurich, expressed his opinion that the chief work to be immediately undertaken by the Swiss Federation was to support in every possible manner the English commission, which is already doing preparatory work in Palestine. The conference adopted an emphatic resolution protesting against cruelties on Rumanian and Bessarabian Jews.

A resolution calling upon the allies and the neutral countries to help create a Jewish autonomous home in Palestine after the war, was also adopted. Copies of the resolution were sent to the various countries involved.

Dr. S. Broinshweig, of Basle, was elected president of the Swiss Federation of Zionists.

Anti-Semitic Nations Now in Definite Group.

With Russia, Rumania, Finland and the Ukraine, practically, if not nominally allied with Germany, Austria and Turkey, it ranges the democratic nations and the anti-Semitic peoples in two distinct opposing groups. Any Jew who is in doubt as to where his sympathies lie should be sent to an asylum for the insane; or, if he is a pro-German, he should be shot, hanged or electrocuted, or whatever may be the style of doing away with dangerous criminals in the particular country that has the misfortune of having him as an inhabitant.—American Israelite.

MOSES AND AARON, Dear Children:

When the Holy One, blessed be he, spoke unto Moses and unto Aaron, and gave them a charge unto the children of Israel, and unto Pharaoh, the king of Egypt, Rashi tells us, he charged them to be gentle towards the Israelites and patiently bear the burden of their complaints and to treat Pharaoh with the respect due to royalty, this Rashi quotes from the Medrash, but the simple meaning of that paragraph, he tells us, is, he charged them with the mission to Pharaoh concerning Israel—and what that mission is, we are told in the succeeding paragraphs, after he describes their lineage. Having mentioned their names, the Torah proceeds to relate from whom they were descended, as follows: "These are the heads of their family divisions, etc." Inasmuch as it is necessary to give the lineage of the tribe to Levi until Moses and Aaron for their sake the Torah begins to relate the order of their birth from Reuben. "In the Pesikta Gedolah," says Rashi, "I have seen it stated that, because our father Jacob rebuked these three tribes before he died, therefore the Torah gives them special distinction here by mentioning them exclusively. And the years of the life of Levi, etc." Why is the number of years of Levi's life given here? In order to make known to us the duration of Israel's bondage, because as long as any of the tribes lived there was no bondage, as it is said, "And Joseph died with all his brothers," and then it says, "Now there rose up a new king over Egypt," and Levi outlived all his brothers. The Torah also tells us the years of the life of Keboth and the years of the life of Amram, and from this we learn that the four hundred years that Israel had ended in Egypt were not all spent in Egypt, but it was reckoned from the day that Isaac was born, for Keboth was of those who descended into Egypt; now if you will reckon all his years and the years of Amram and the eighty years of Moses, you will find that they do not amount to four hundred years, and many years of the sons are included in those of their fathers. And Amram took himself Jochebed, his aunt for wife. She was his father's sister, a daughter of Levi, and a sister of Keboth, and they were the parents of Moses and Aaron. And Aaron took himself, Elisheba, daughter of Kiminadab, sister of Nachshon, for wife. From this we learn that one who takes a wife should look after her brothers (because most of her children will resemble her brothers in character). And Elazar, the son of Aaron, took himself one of the daughters of "Putiel" for wife, from the children of Jethra who "Putam" fattened calves to sacrifice to idols and from the children of Joseph who "pitpet" rebelled against his evil imagination and would not let Potiphar's wife seduce him to sin. "These are Aaron and Moses," these who were mentioned before that Jochebed bore to Amram, these are Aaron and Moses to whom the Lord said, "Bring forth the children of Israel out of the land of Egypt. In some parts of the Torah, Aaron is mentioned before Moses, and in other parts Moses before Aaron to teach us that each was as important as the other. "These are they that spoke to Pharaoh," they who were commanded, they who performed the commandment. "These are Moses and Aaron," they in their per-

fection and righteousness from beginning to end. "And it came to pass in the day when the Lord spoke unto Moses," is a paragraph that is connected with the one following it, thus, "Then spoke the Lord unto Moses saying, 'This is the very same thing that the Lord already spoke to Moses when he told him to go and speak unto Pharaoh, the king of Egypt,'" but inasmuch as the Torah made a digression in order to give their lineage, it now resumes the original discourse. "I am the Lord, well able to send thee on this mission and to make that mission successful." And Moses said before the Lord, "These are also the very words that Moses said before." "Behold the children of Israel will not hearken unto me," but the Torah repeats it here, because the subject was interrupted, it is as though one would say, "Let us return to our original topic." And the Lord said unto Moses, "See, I have made thee a god to Pharaoh,"—a judge and executioner, to bring him to submission through plagues and tortures, and Aaron, thy brother, shall be thy prophet. As Onkelos translates it, "Shall be thy interpreter." "Thou shalt speak all that I shall command thee, each mission with which I shall charge thee, and thy brother Aaron shall give it expression and elaborate upon it to make Pharaoh understand. And I will harden the heart of Pharaoh inasmuch as he so wickedly rebelled against me, and as it is revealed to me that there is no satisfaction to be derived from the idol worshippers, by giving them a perfect heart to repent, it will best serve my purpose that his heart be hardened in order that I display my signs through him and ye will recognize my power, and thus does the Holy One, blessed be He, do—he brings punishment upon the wicked idol worshippers in order that Israel shall hear it and fear him."

Recruit Shows Uncanny Powers of Memory.

Among the men who have come to Camp Upton, Yaphank, L. I., writes a correspondent, in the many draft increments have been scores of college men, many holders of masters' degrees and one who has four imposing academic titles. The most recent phenomenon holds no degrees, but he possesses abilities of a remarkable order. He is Jacob Shapiro, a private of Russian-Jewish extraction, who is 23 years old. When drafted he was living at 1270 Amsterdam avenue, New York, and was an efficiency engineer. His work has been in Chicago, New York and other cities, reclaiming broken down business establishments. It has been his job to tell why they are broken down and determine what vital leakages there were. When Shapiro came to Camp Upton he was assigned to the Depot Brigade. By chance he was transferred to the headquarters detachment of the cantonment and was placed in the statistical department. Before long he began to astonish his co-workers by prodigious feats of mental arithmetic and alarm them by his uncanny powers of memory and quick observation. His fame quickly spread over to Headquarters Hill and resulted in his being called into the presence of a roomful of officers to show what he could do. Never before had Private Shapiro publicly demonstrated his powers, and with Lieutenant Colonel T. J. Powers, Chief of Staff, and other high officers in the company, he felt a bit embarrassed. But that didn't hinder the workings of his steel-trap. He was shown a column of figures, 15 or so, three digits abreast. In four seconds he gave their correct total. A box of matches was emptied on a table. Shapiro glanced at them and told how many there were. He flashed a look at a bookcase and told the number of volumes there. He was then introduced to the officers and taken immediately from the room. While he was outside they shifted their positions completely. He was brought back and named them, one by one, with correct initials and ranks. These things are as easy as two and two for Private Shapiro. And they have been natural to him for years. He has never studied rapid calculating or the science of lightning observation. His mind has always taken the flash photographs with perfect accuracy. Never has he given a public exhibition before or considered his feats more than normal, but the prediction is made here that should he ever become an airplane observer and be taken on a short trip over the German lines the Fritzies will wonder who the deserter was who betrayed all the information.

The Jewish National Council in Russia. Stockholm (By J. L. C.)—Only lately details have reached us concerning the Jewish National Council in Russia. Owing to the last German offensive directed against Petrograd, the convocation of the Jewish Congress became impossible, though the elections to the Congress have almost been completed. This council will represent the Russian Jewry till the moment when it will become possible to gather the Congress. All parties, including the Socialist, with the exception of the Bund, are represented on this council. The Bund refused to send its representatives on the ground of principle disagreements. The Social-Democratic Labor party, Poale-Zion, the United Jewish Socialists have seen no difficulties for participating in the council, and found that they had no reasons for leaving the Jewish people in Russia in its present critical position. Without any representation, or what would be still worse, to allow the bourgeois parties and groups to represent the Jewish people without being controlled by the proletariat. The organization of the representative body was decided upon at a conference of Congress members who succeeded in coming to Petrograd. The Poale-Zion demanded that a conference be convoked of all members of Central Russia which they considered to be possible. The majority, however, declined this proposal of the Poale-Zion. The seats are distributed between the parties in the following way: The Zionists, 28; the orthodox group, 12; the Poale-Zion and the Volksparty, 8 each; the United Jewish Socialists, 7.
