"Is it weakness of intellect, birdie? I cried—Oh, Sarah, wasn't that delicious!" said Sam, as they walked through the corridor to the street.


"Ko-Ko had you in mind then." Sam turned around, and there sure enough was the disagreeable stranger again.

Free Synagogue Rabbinical Sunday School.

The Rabbinical Summer School under the auspices of the Free Synagogue began its sessions on Tuesday afternoon, July 6, at the Free Synagogue House, 36 West Sixty-eighth street, with an attendance of nearly thirty rabbis and undergraduates of the Rabbinical seminaries. Addresses of welcome were given by Charles B. Bloch, vice-president of the Synagogue, and Thurman Esp. chairman of the Jewish Law Committee and Dr. S. Goldstein, director of the Summer School.

The first series of lectures will be given by Professor M. L. Margolis of Dropsie College and later courses by Professor F. J. Poakes-Jackson of the Union Theological Seminary, Dr. Steinsaltz and Dr. Sidney E. Goldstein. Lectures are to run for four weeks from 2 to 4 in the afternoon, after which there will be field work, in which all the students will participate.

THE YESHIVA—THE JEWISH SANCTUARY

"Only Knowledge Will Save Judaism in America," Says Head of Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary.

The fact that the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, better known as the "Yeshiva," has purchased several buildings on East Broadway, New York, in order to enable the institution to enlarge its scope of work, gave the writer an opportunity to discuss the question of Jewish education in America and the work of the Yeshiva, which has its present home at 9-11 Montgomery street, New York. With Rabbi Dr. Bernard Revel, one of the greatest living rabbinic scholars, president of the faculty of the Yeshiva.

I found Dr. Revel in his study at the Yeshiva. Books everywhere, the walls lined with bookshelves from floor to ceiling. On the tables, books and even on the chairs.

The Yeshiva was a busy beehive. The pupils of the Yeshiva High School were preparing for their graduation exercises and the others were getting ready for their Hebrew and Talmudic examinations. The president of the Yeshiva found some time to grant me this interview.

"What is the purpose of Jewish education?" was my first question. Dr. Revel replied:

"I believe that as an orthodox man it is rather unnecessary for me to dwell upon the purpose of Jewish education. To the true Jew life means living in the spirit of the Torah and the glorious Jewish traditions. Every Jew in all ages, considered it his most sacred duty to train his children to know, love and live the life of the Torah and its precepts. If the Jewish nation is the teacher of the world, every Jewish father, from the days of Abraham was a teacher of his children by precept and example. The education of the Jewish child begins millenniums before he is born for the Jewish child is the heir to a glorious heritage from which humanity has drawn and will draw inspiration and guidance.

What is the most important problem of American Jewry?

The problem of Judaism in this country is education. Whilst we all hope and pray that soon, "Out of Zion will come forth the Torah," we must not deceive ourselves. Even during the days of the Second Temple the majority of the Jews lived in the Diaspora. We will draw our inspiration from Eretz Yisroel, but the spiritual relations between Eretz Yisroel and the Diaspora will be for a long while interdependent and inter-related and the stronger Judaism is in the Diaspora, the more glorious and fruitful will be the Jewish life in Eretz Yisroel.

Have all come to recognize that the school, where most of the Jewish children who receive any Jewish education whatsoever receive their Jewish education is a parody of Jewish

Jewry, bleeding to death, is gathering its last strength to establish schools where the Jewish child shall receive a thorough Jewish education.

In American Jewry, who has freedom, opportunity and the means to lag behind in this work?

If we are to retain our glorious inheritance and transmit it to our children, we must organize a complete and thorough system of education, beginning with the kindergarten and going right through

public and high schools and higher institutions of learning.

"What part is the Yeshiva to play in this gigantic work?"

The Yeshiva has always been the Jewish University. Ben Sirach centuries before the common era, speaks of the Yeshiva as the home of Jewish learning and "there have never ceased to exist Yeshivoth in Israel." The Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Yeshiva is modelled after the great Yeshivoth of all ages and is dedicated to the two cardinal principles, "Torah and the fear of Heaven." The Yeshiva aims to further the ideals of true Judaism, to awaken and quicken the dormant Jewish consciousness, to create the desire and demand for a more intensive, thorough Jewish education in all its phases to encourage and foster constructive Jewish scholarship, to help make true Judaism a living force in our daily life and thought, and to help supply the crying need of true, spiritual guides and teachers. The Yeshiva aims to foster through the learning of the Torah, which includes every manifestation and phase of the Jewish spirit of all ages, love for the Torah and loyalty to the Torah.

How about the Yeshiva elementary and high school?

Over 80 per cent. of the several hundred students of the Yeshiva are native born. It is self-evident that a thorough and intensive training in Jewish learning is impossible if it is begun after the adolescent age. The Yeshiva has, therefore, founded its own high school which is under the supervision of the University of the State of New York. The regular high school work and a thorough Jewish education are successfully combined. The regents examinations held by the State University prove that the Yeshiva High School is of very high scholastic standing. The Yeshiva is now adding to its high school department the first year college course, and it is hoped that every year an additional class will be added. By this system of high school preparation, combined with a thorough Jewish training, an ideal class of students is being developed, for the rabbinical department of the Yeshiva. The Yeshiva is situated in the very heart of the largest Jewish community known to history and will now have very commodious quarters.

There are in the Yeshiva students from every State and different parts of Canada. The Yeshiva sets itself the task to encourage and assist in the establishment of preparatory schools for the intensive study of the Torah, in all the large Jewish centers in the country, the promising graduates of which are to come to the Yeshiva.

The Yeshiva stands for a complete system of intensive Jewish education culminating in a central Yeshiva for Jewish higher learning and research, and the training of learned rabbis. To give the faculty and students of the Yeshiva opportunity to make public the results of their research work the Yeshiva is publishing a Hebrew bi-monthly, devoted to the Jewish lore and law by the name

Yagdil Torah." The Yeshiva is also building up a library. There are already in the Yeshiva library about 12,000 volumes.

The Yeshiva recognizes also the urgent need for Jewish teachers, who, by their convictions, knowledge, training and temperament will be able to instill into their students the knowledge of and love for true Judaism. The Yeshiva will, therefore, establish in its new quarters a normal school for the training of teachers.

How is the Yeshiva being supported? Many and complex have been the problems of the Yeshiva, particularly since it has no endowment fund and is entirely dependent for its support upon annual membership and contributions. There are three million Jews in this country, and I believe that the Yeshiva may count upon the moral and financial support of American Jewry when its work becomes more known.

I thanked Dr. Revel and I left his study, thinking of the great opportunities for American Jewry to become the bearer of the standard of Judaism.

NEWS FROM ENGLAND

(Exclusive Correspondence to the HEBREW STANDARD)

Jewish women's big War Memorial collection scheme. The Samuel appointment. General Deedes as his chief assistant. Proposed statue to the Right Hon. Edwin Montagu. Belgian refugees' thanks. Convention of women Zionists. Rabbi Mattuck on seventeenth century Jews and America.

London, June 10, 1920.

The Union of Jewish Women has undertaken to collect one million shillings (\$250,000) from Jewesses in the British Empire in support of the Jewish War Memorial. Mrs. Leopold de Rothschild heads the first list of donations.

In the House of Commons on June 7th a coalition member, Mr. Ormsby-Gore, asked the Prime Minister whether a civil administrator had been appointed to carry out the policy agreed upon at San Remo in regard to Palestine; when he would take over from the military authorities, and whether he would be directly responsible to a British Government department, and if so which, or whether he would be in any way dependent on the British High Commissioner in Egypt. In reply, Premier Lloyd George said: The Right Hon. Herbert Samuel has been appointed head of the administration. He will be directly responsible to the Government. An announcement as to the date when he will assume office will shortly be made.

According to the "Times" correspondent in Jerusalem, the press censorship is most severe there. For instance, he says, a telegram announcing officially the nomination of Herbert Samuel as High Commissioner in Palestine was not allowed to be published by the local newspapers by order of the Chief Administrator.

General Deedes, who is going out to Palestine as chief assistant to Herbert Samuel, has had wide experience in the East. Before the war he was in charge of the gendarmerie in Smyrna. He won the D. S. O. for his courage and enterprise in making his way into Smyrna alone in order to persuade the Turkish Governor to surrender the place to the Allies. He knows Turkish and the Turks very thoroughly. In the Palestine campaign General Deedes was director of intelligence. After the Armistice he was for some time British High Commissioner in Constantinople, and from there he went to Egypt, where he held a temporary position in the Ministry of the Interior. While in Egypt he had a great deal to do with the negotiations that took place between Lord Milner's Mission and the Egyptian leaders. General Deedes is one of the younger men in the war who won a high reputation, and there is reason for saying that his appointment to high administrative office in Palestine will be very acceptable to the Jewish community.

The movement for the erection in India of a statue of the Right Honorable Edwin Montagu, the Secretary of State of India, is taking shape, and Mr. Bomanji, the prime leader in the project, is now in Paris and is expected shortly in London. On his arrival here, I am told, he will place himself in communication with the authorities of the In-

dia Office in order that he may make known the wishes of those whom he represents.

The Chief Rabbi has received from "le Consistoire Israelite de Belgique" a letter, dated March 31st, and signed by Dr. Phillipson, the president, and J. Weil, the secretary, expressing on behalf of Belgian Jewry to the colleagues of Dr. Hertz in the Anglo-Jewish community their "deep gratitude for the care bestowed upon our co-religionists by various congregations, for the reception which they received, and for the unceasing care and attention shown to them." In consequence of the Chief Rabbi's illness, he was unable to acknowledge the letter until June 1st, when he sent a suitable reply.

Contemporaneously with the holding of the English Zionist conference, the Federation of Women Zionists held their second annual convention in London. Mrs. I. M. Sieff, the president, said that they were living in days of the greatest political achievements since the days of the dispersion. They had been given the charter of liberty and the days of the Geulah had begun. They were living too near the days of San Remo to understand its full significance. The question that now arose was whether the Jewish women were ready to shoulder the burdens that would be thrown on them, or whether they were capable of so doing. The historian of the future would want to know what part women had played in these great achievements, and she was afraid he would have little to narrate. But now they could start anew, the book was opened at a new page, and on that they must write their achievements of the future. The women Zionists had often been described as feminists—they were not—feminists thought men inferior. The women Zionists recognized that men were superior in some things and inferior in others. Mrs. Sieff hoped their work would help to raise the women from the inferior status that the Jewish religion gave them. She herself had not been allowed to make a speech in a synagogue. She concluded by stating that they hoped to found in Palestine, among other things, a women's agricultural college. She moved the following resolution:

That this conference immediately convene a Zionist Woman's International Conference at the forthcoming General Zionist Conference to discuss the advisability of creating a Woman's International Organization for special women's work in Palestine and the Diaspora.

Mrs. Harris, Mrs. Liebster and Mrs. Friedlander protested against the chairman's remark that the Jewish religion gave women an inferior status. The last named said it was because they regarded woman so highly that she was safeguarded from being mixed up in unpleasant communal politics.

Mrs. Paul Goodman gave a report on the work of the Cultural League. The war had cut them off from their headquarters in Berlin, but in 1915 they were able to send some \$400 to Palestine. But little else had been done. The importance of the work to be done could not be overestimated. It was a matter not

only of material but of moral importance to find occupation for the girls of Palestine. A scheme for the establishment of an agricultural school had been outlined by Mrs. Schochet, the former principal of the Farm School at Kinnereth. Domestic science must form an integral part of the curriculum of the schools. She appealed to all for whole-hearted assistance in this great work. The following resolution was proposed by Mrs. Goodman, seconded by Mrs. Marcouse, and carried: "That the central office of the Jewish Women's League for Cultrual Work in Palestine be moved to London, and that the council be authorized to make such arrangements as may be necessary to this end."

Mrs. Sieff said that it was their aim to be directly represented on the Greater Inner Actions Committee. Only in this way could the women Zionists make themselves felt politically. But to do so it would be necessary to become an international, independent body. Other resolutions proposed by provincial societies asked for conferences or council meetings to be held occasionally in the provinces. This was agreed to as far as council meetings were concerned.

The latest lecturer on the Jews of the seventeenth century has been Rabbi I. I. Mattuck. He dealt with the settlement of the Jews in America. He pointed out that the first Jewish community in America was established in Brazil and was first mentioned in 1584. The Jews of Brazil, however, maintained their Christian connection until the country was partly conquered by the Dutch in 1623, an event which they helped to bring about. Bahia, which contained the largest number of Jews, was in the region that now came under Dutch rule. With the advent of the Dutch the secret Jews emerged from their secrecy. In 1631, however, the Dutch conquered the city of Riufe, in Brazil, and the Jews of Bahia removed there. Another Jewish settlement was what is now Guiana, and was established at Cayenne under the patronage of Dvid Nassi, and was recruited from the colonists farther west and from immigrants from Holland. With the capture of Cayenne by the French in 1664, the Jews and Christians were expelled, some of the Jews returning to Surinam.

The colony had come under the rule of England in 1650, and the Jews had received from the English both religious freedom and political rights. These rights were somewhat less than the Dutch gave, by the elimination of the rights of communal authority to expel undesirable colonists and the regulation of debts. For these additions the Jews petitioned in 1669, two years after Surinam returned to the Dutch, and they were granted. Jews were, therefore, to be found in all the Dutch colonies and in the English colonies that were obtained by conquest either from the Dutch or the Spanish. In the settlements that were primarily English there were no Jews, for a variety of reasons. These settlements were established before the right of Jews to live in England was more or less recognized. The Jews of Holland would not be likely to go to an English colony even if permitted, on account of the difference in language.

Further, some of the English settlements, as, for example, the one in Massachusetts and that in Maryland, were of a distinctively religious character. In the British West Indies there were Jews from the very beginning. In Jamaica they were among the first settlers, for this island, though at first Spanish, was a friendly home for Jews. Many of the Jews who left Brazil in 1654 went to Curacao, where twelve Jewish families from Holland had settled in 1650. A tract of land along the coast at the rate of two leagues for every fifty families had been granted in this island to Joseph Nunz de Fonseca, alias David Nassi. But it would seem that this attempt at Jewish colonization was unsuccessful, since only twelve families came. This colony was also fed by the refugees from Brazil. From there, too, went the first Jewish settlers to that part of America which later became the United States.

The Victoria and Albert Museum at South Kensington, London, has received from Mrs. Leopold de Rothschild, a magnificent pair of silver gilt candlesticks for an altar, enriched with enamels and plaques of rock crystal—Italian work of the highest quality, dating from the sixteenth century. The gift is of peculiar importance inasmuch as the altar cross belonging to the candlesticks is already in the possession of the museum, having been acquired in 1861 at the time of the dispersal of the Solykoff collection. The candlesticks were shown by the late Leopold de Rothschild at the exhibition held at St. James Court in 1903, and there came under the observation of the museum. The discovery of an obscure pamphlet supplied evidence of their origin.

The series of lectures which are being delivered in London on the Jews of the seventeenth century was to have been varied last week by a reading from "The Dreamers of the Ghetto." Neither Israel Zangwill nor Maurice Moscovitch was able to fulfil promises in this connection, however, and so the Rev. S. Levy stepped into the breach with an address on Shabbetai Zevi, one of the three great Jewish personalities of the seventeenth century. The lecturer gave a short sketch of Shabbetai's life from his birth in Smyrna in 1626—the son of a man who attained wealth in his old age as the agent of an English company. Shabbetai, who was his third son, had the usual talmudical training and early showed a bent for mysticism

and self-mortification. He surrounded himself with a band of young students, to whom, in 1648, he announced himself as the Messiah. The age was one favorable for such happenings, for the year 1666 was regarded by Jew and Christian alike as the apocalyptic year, and so strong among Christians had become the belief of the Messianic era that Manasseh ben Israel had been able to use this belief as a plea for the readmission of the Jews to England.

The wanderings of Shabbetai Zevi to Constantinople and then to Salonika, where he publicly proclaimed himself and performed the mystic marriage of himself and the Torah, were briefly sketched by Mr. Levy. Shabbetai Zevi's expulsion by the indignant rabbis led to his renewed wanderings, and eventually he settled in Cairo, where he married a Polish maiden called Sarah, whose history was not a whit less romantic than his own. Orphaned in the Polish massacres of Chmielnicki, she had been brought up in a convent, from which she had escaped. Eccentric of disposition, irregular in her mode of life and of surpassing beauty, she brought a new element into Shabbetai's life and gained him many followers. Reference to Shabbetai is to be found in the English State papers, in which English agents in the East write to their principals about the rumors and tumults caused by the appearance of the pseudo Messiah.

His chief lieutenant, Nathan Levi, visited England and became acquainted with Henry Jesse, the great Puritan divine. In his diary, Samuel Pepys stated that wagers were being laid in the city of London that Shabbetai would be proclaimed King of the Jews within two years. On New Year, 1665, Shabbetai was publicly proclaimed the Messiah in the synagogue at Smyrna. The Turks suspected him of intriguing against them. In 1666 he was thrown into prison at Constantinople and then removed to Alydos. He was, however, treated with all respect, but another Messiah turning up in the shape of a Polish rabbi led to a quarrel between the two, upon which the latter denounced the former to the Sultan. Shabbetai was summoned to Adrianople, and under fear of death was apostasized to Islam. He ended his days in 1670 in obscurity and loneliness at Dulcigno, in Albania, whither he had eventually been banished.





ITEMS OF INTEREST IN THE JEWISH WORLD

Owing to advancing age Mr. Nathan Gross has resigned as a trustee of Temple B'nai Israel, of Evansville, Ind., an office which he has held for over 50 years.

Abraham Solomon Landman, of Cincinnati, this year's graduate of the Hebrew Union College, has accepted a position in the congregation B'rith Sholem, of Chicago, where he will be in charge of the prices are \$11.

John J. Cowden of Illinois has appointed Aaron J. Jones a member of the Chicago National Guard Commission. Mr. Jones is well known in theatrical circles and is a member of the firm of Jones, Linick & Schaefer.

Henry Morgenthau has resigned from membership in the Executive Committee of the Near East Relief on account of official duties. Judge Abram I. Elkus, former ambassador to Turkey, has been elected in his place.

The students of the University of Agram, Jugo-Slavia, have resolved to petition the government to introduce a percentage norm for Jewish students, and to expel all alien Jewish students from the educational institutions.

The new Ukrainian Cabinet includes Mr. Pinchus Krasny, who has been appointed Minister for Jewish Affairs. Mr. Krasny occupied a similar post in the Ukrainian Government which existed before General Denikin's entry into Kiev.

The recent contest for the lightweight championship of the world at Benton Harbor, Mich., was fought between two Jewish athletes, Benny Leonard and Charlie White, born, respectively, as Benjamin Leiner and Charles Anshowitz.

A summer school for social service workers has been opened at Boston under the auspices of the Boston Federation of Jewish Charities. Sixty-four students, representing many States, are in attendance.

On July 5 the cornerstone was laid for the new \$175,000 synagogue to be erected for Temple Emanu-El at Spokane, Wash. Dr. Stephen S. Wise of the Free Synagogue of New York was the chief speaker at the ceremony of the Union.

A permanent creche for motherless Jewish infants has been opened in Jerusalem in a building adjacent to the Hebrew Seminary. It is under the auspices of and maintained by the funds of the Palestine Orphan Committee. The home has been thoroughly fitted out on the most modern and hygienic lines, complete with a private laundry and beds for twenty inmates. Infants from the age of two weeks to two years will be admitted.

Hebrew has been added to the list of subjects of instruction in the London County Council evening schools. It is at present being taught at the Stepney Commercial Institute, and further classes will be given if a demand for such is shown.

Russian refugees at Varna have opened a violent campaign against the Jews. They are endeavoring to intimidate the Bulgarians that the Bolsheviks and the Jews are on the point of entering the country to destroy their churches and kill their children.

Congregation B'rith Kodesh, of Rochester, N. Y., in addition to a liberal increase in salary, presented its minister, Rabbi Horace J. Wolf, with \$3,100 in Liberty Bonds on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of the beginning of his service with the congregation.

Simon N. Stein, at Rochester, N. Y., presented the collection of original water color illustrations of Boutet de Monvel's "Joan of Arc" to the Memorial Art Gallery at that city. The collection was making the tour of the principal art centers of America and Mr. Stein purchased them for \$12,000.

On the occasion of a recent presentation of the Rumanian national flag to the Great Synagogue at Bucharest, the King, the Cabinet, the Church, and the army were officially represented. The Metropolitan delivered a speech in Hebrew, in which he advocated harmonious and brotherly relations with the Jews.

In Bulgaria all Jewish religious communities, B'nai B'rith lodges and Jewish banks have pledged themselves to give the Jewish National Fund annually a fixed sum from their budgets, or of their net profits. The communities pledge themselves to place 4 per cent. of their annual budgets at the disposal of the Jewish National Fund.

Under the will of Morris Light, of Syracuse, N. Y., the Western Jewish Orphans' Asylum of Rochester is given \$5,000 and other charitable bequests are: Jewish Home for the Aged, No. 712 1/2 Irving avenue, \$2,000; Syracuse Memorial Hospital, \$2,000; Temple Society of Concord, \$1,000; Onondaga Orphans' Home, \$500, and St. Joseph's Hospital, \$500.

The Polish Diet has passed a law which precludes Jewish schools being built at the expense of the State. This is a breach of the minority clauses in the Peace Treaty. The Minister for Education endeavored to justify the law by stating that it was only provisional. There is no doubt, however, that this explanation is only intended to soothe the Jewish population in foreign countries.

On the invitation of the University of Cambridge, Professor A. S. Yahuda of the University of Madrid, Spain, last month delivered two lectures, the first on the Moorish epoch of medieval Spain and the second on the scientific, literary and artistic achievements of the Jews in Spain. Both lectures were attended by large audiences, there being, among others, the most prominent professors of the Oriental and theological faculties present.

Rev. Joseph H. Stoltz has been elected rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregation at Fort Smith, Ark. Rabbi Stoltz, who is now a minister at Corsicana, Tex., is a native of Syracuse, N. Y., and a graduate of the State University of New York and the Chicago University, as well as of the Hebrew Union College.

The Adath Israel Synagogue, 1725 East Baltimore street, which several months ago amalgamated with the Congregation Emanuel, is interested in the erection of a large and attractive synagogue in the neighborhood of Patterson Park, to which a large number of Baltimore Jewish families have moved in recent years.

Following a brief illness, Samuel Silberman, a prominent Cleveland (O.) business man and a leader in Jewish philanthropic and religious activities, passed away June 21. The deceased was chairman of the Cleveland Jewish Center Committee on Finance and was active in the Jewish center movement since its inception.

An appeal has been made for funds for the London (England) General Hospital. An especial appeal has been directed to the Jewish public inasmuch as this hospital maintains four Jewish wards and a special Kosher kitchen. Last year 2,074 patients were admitted to the wards and over 59,000 Jewish patients were treated.

Initial steps have been taken by Temple Emanuel Congregation at Denver, Col., to build a new half million dollar temple. The congregation owned what was formerly the old Jewish cemetery, a tract of eight and one-third acres. The location is now one of the choicest in the city and the synagogue will be erected thereon.

The Jewish community of Manchester, Eng., has recently been appealed to to subscribe £40,000 to build, equip and endow a Fresh Air Home and School for delicate children at Delamere, Cheshire. Subscriptions of £20,000 have been received, but until the remaining half of the money is forthcoming the scheme cannot be completed.

The Grand Master of Masons for New York State has reappointed Rabbi Elias Margolis of Mt. Vernon as a Grand Chaplain. Other appointments are those of Philip S. Seligman of Brooklyn, Grand Sword Bearer; Edward J. Rosenthal of New York, Grand Steward, and Mortimer B. Bernstein and Abraham A. Wiener of New York, district deputies.

Jewish physicians of Baltimore have organized themselves into an Association for the Promotion of the Medical Department of the University of Jerusalem. A fund has been subscribed by the members for the purchase of medical books for the use of the Medical School of the Hebrew University.

The Polish Foreign Ministry has informed the Jewish deputies that it is doing all in its power to protect the Galician Jews in Hungary. The Polish representative in Budapest was also making arrangements for the return to Poland of a number of Polish-Jewish refugees now residing there.

With the purchase of the beautiful structure known as the Gesangverein building on the east side of East 55th street, just south of Scovill avenue, for the establishment of a large, perfectly appointed Hebrew Institute in Cleveland, O., the Margolles Memorial is at last a reality. The institute will be a memorial to the late Rabbi Samuel Margolles, who met a tragic death a few years ago.

Rabbi M. M. Erchler of Boston has accepted a call to the pulpit of the Congregation Beth El, Buffalo, N. Y., as successor to Rabbi Max Droh. For about ten years he was the spiritual director of the Congregation Ohabei Shalom, but resigned from the ministry about four years ago to engage in law practice after graduating from the Boston University Law School.

The recent offer of Nathan Straus to turn over to the city of New York the milk pasteurization laboratory maintained by him was accepted last week by the Board of Estimate. The offer was conditional on an appropriation sufficient to carry on and expand the work. A resolution thanking Mr. Straus for the work he has done for the children of New York and for his gift was passed.

The famous historian, Otto Von Gierke, who was one of the most important spiritual leaders of the Conservative party in Germany, has resigned from his position in the German National party (Conservative) because his daughter Anna, till now a member of the German Parliament, has not been placed again on the list of candidates, owing to her mother being of Jewish extraction.

From January 1, 1915, to January 1, 1920, the membership of the B'nai B'rith in the American districts increased from 27,599 to 40,931. From January 1 to April 1, 1920 there was an increase of 7,006 in the entire Order. In the five and a half years past the entire Order increased its membership from 40,083 to 62,377, an increase of 22,294. In the same period there were instituted 74 lodges in the United States, 3 in Canada, 3 in Germany, 2 in Austria and 1 in Rumania.

Representatives Samuel Betelheim, Max Dornier, Rev. Heimlich, and Mayer Preisz in cables received today exclaim that immediate appeals for help to the United States Government and other governments are in order to save the Jews from perfect extermination.

The Jews in Budapest, Misholtz, Sator-Alja-Ujhely and in other large cities are afraid of appearing in public streets after 7 p. m. and are experiencing daily struggles for their very lives. The active officers of the army are mostly instrumental in arranging these pogroms and massacres against the Jews. Men, women and children are subjected to the most bestial indignities and are clamoring for steamship tickets to sail to the United States.





Lack of Jewish Insane Asylums in New York.

(Copyright, 1920, by I. J. P. B.)
The position of the Jewish insane in the city of New York is a very tragic one. Until now the Jewish community of this city has not established special hospitals to care for the Jewish mentally deranged. Yet the need of such institutions is becoming more apparent every day. That the Jewish insane must be treated differently from the unfortunates of other nationalities is clear to anyone who has some knowledge of abnormal psychology.

First, there are among these unfortunates a great number of pious Jews who are not able to observe the religious ceremonies and customs according to their habit and conviction in a general hospital. Since the mentally deranged are usually even more moved by religious fervor and are more strenuous in their devotional exercises than normal people, this situation is a constant source of irritation. The eating of non-Kosher food, the lack of religious service and the like often so agitate these wretched souls as not only to negate the medical treatment given, but perhaps to accentuate and to develop their ailment.

Second, the presence of these sick in a foreign atmosphere, among people whom they do not understand and who do not understand them, also tends to affect their health negatively and to aggravate their nervous state of mind.

The third problem that is created by the Jewish insane is one for the specialists. It is clearly established that the Jews are subject to different aberrations from those of other nationalities. Thus, for example, there is a disproportionate number of cases of dementia praecox among the Jews. The Jewish insane type is different from those of other groups and, consequently, needs other treatment than the non-Jewish types. This is only possible, at any rate, in a special institution for the Jewish insane.

There is an unusually large number of Jewish mentally deranged in the city of New York. Only the Irish contribute a greater absolute number to the insane asylums. Rabbi Samuel Buchler, former Sing Sing chaplain, has gathered much interesting statistical data about the Jewish insane in New York. According to him, there are 800 Jewish insane in local institutions. The number of Irish insane is 1,344, although the Irish population in New York is much larger than the Jewish. In proportion to population, the Jews contribute more insane than any other element. It has been suggested that this situation is partly due to the fact that there are no Jewish hospitals for their care, and that the Jewish insane are not given the necessary and proper treatment.

Warsaw Jewish Community's Farewell to Mr. Leon Kamaiky.

Mr. Leon Kamaiky, one of the European Commissioners of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America, is now on his way back to the United States to present a preliminary report, together with recommendations, regarding the society's activities in Europe. On the day of his departure from Warsaw, the Jewish community gave Mr. Kamaiky an official farewell and presented him with many bouquets or flowers in appreciation of his work.

In connection with the work of the European Commission, Mr. Albert Rosenblatt, chairman of the Building Fund Committee, reports that contributions to the building fund up-to-date warrant proceeding with the necessary alterations on the Astor Library Building which the society has purchased. However, Mr. Rosenblatt states, that a great deal more money will be required before the society will be able to open the new home.



Kosher Hungarian cuisine; and meals prepared by and under the supervision of Mrs. Weiss, well known at Asbury Park and Lakewood, N. J. Music and Dancing.

The Trades Are Still on the Job!
All the summer lassitude is coming over the city, the trades committees of the Greater New York Fund for Jewish War Sufferers are still faithfully at work—to complete the quotas assigned to them, or to go above their quotas until the limit of their respective industries is reached. Additional subscriptions from trade chairmen continue to pour into campaign headquarters, adding thousands of dollars to the total.

Noteworthy among the industries continuing at work is the cotton goods trade, which set out to double its quota of \$150,000. On June 4 this committee announced a total of \$341,527, and, not content to rest on the laurels of this achievement, today announced \$365,367. This committee includes such able workers as Leon Lowenstein, Bernard Semel and Samuel C. Lampert.

The laundries industry—a small trade which had never before participated as an industrial unit in any relief campaign and had, a few weeks ago announced the attainment of its \$20,000 quota, today stated that it had succeeded in raising \$24,106. S. Liss is chairman of this committee. The committee for the dress trade, which, under the chairmanship of J. J. Goldman, is appealing to manufacturers and salesmen in this industry, announced that nearly \$6,500 had been added to the committee's total in the last week. Three trades which had not previously reported announced their total today. These include the Engineers committee, of which R. H. Shreve is chairman, which raised \$2,781, the forwarding and shipping committee, under the leadership of Max Ulin, which raised \$6,200, the paper and twine committee, of which I. Kuhe is chairman, which raised \$37,955. Among the others who announced large increases are the furniture and pianos committee, the lawyers committee, and the waists industry.

Ladies' Malbish Arumim Summer Home Opened.

The opening of the Children's Summer Home maintained by the Ladies' Malbish Arumim Society at Edgemere, L. I., was celebrated last Sunday afternoon. Several addresses were made and the school choir and orchestra gave selections.

The home is located at Beach Thirty-fourth street, right on the ocean front, and anemic children will be sent there for a two weeks' sojourn under the supervision of nurses, and competent teachers.

To Honor the Late Frances N. Cohen.

At a board meeting of the directors of the Young Women's Hebrew Association, held on Thursday, July 1, it was decided that the auditorium in the building be called the Frances N. Cohen Auditorium, and that a scholarship fund also be created to bear her name.

Of course, Jews as such have no interest in Freemasonry, and no Jewish grand lodge of Masons exists anywhere throughout the world. Jews are Masons just the same as men of other faiths are Masons. This is the truth and the whole truth of the matter, despite the vaporings of anti-Semites and others who know not whereof they glibly prate.

We observe that the Reader in Talmudic at the University of Cambridge has just published his first series of "Studies in Pharisaism and the Gospels." Mr. Israel Abrahams is devoting considerable attention to New Testament research, which, we dare say, he might profitably have utilized on work of more specific Jewish content. But, then, he is an abettor of Claude G. Montefiore in the legitimization of Rabbi Jesus.

Ignaz Goldziher, the eminent Hungarian *savant*, has reached the Biblical age. The entire Jewish world offers its cordial felicitations on this event to this loyal son of Israel, this famous authority on Mohammedanism, this transcendent expert on Arabic. Some of us may recall that the learned Hungarian professor passed some time in this country when the great St. Louis Exposition was open. We could wish that his visit were repeated.

So philo-Semitic a journal as the *Frankfurter Zeitung* believes that Germany has at the present time a Jewish problem of tremendous proportions. But this newspaper offers the bland advice that the problem will of itself disappear, that the relatively few conversions; the undoubted tendency of Jewish families to be the reverse of Rooseveltian in the number of their offspring, and the appalling amount of mixed marriages will rather soon cause the German Jew to vanish.

At this season of the year the annual cry of a dearth of rabbis is raised. True, our theological colleges have graduated some twenty-five new rabbis in Israel all told. True, there are a goodly number of rabbinical students. And yet, because some congregations cannot find the rabbi of their choice, the cry is raised that there are not enough rabbis to go around. If the congregations invariably knew what they wished to possess in their spiritual guides, and if the rabbis invariably seriously conceived their mission in the world and executed this in the same devout spirit, we should hear less concerning the dearth of rabbis and there would be fewer shifts among the rabbis themselves.

Recently there was formed at Philadelphia a Jewish academy of scholars, largely composed of members of the faculties of the Jewish Theological Seminary, the Dropsie College, and the Hebrew Union College, admission to which is predicted on original contributions to the knowledge of the science of Judaism. Beyond the fact of its organization little is known of this new institution. Last month, however, the first annual meeting of the Academy for the Knowledge of Judaism was held at Berlin; at which time the announcement was made that local branches thereof had already been established at Leipzig and Frankfurt, and that negotiations were pending for the creation of foreign off-shoots in Denmark, Holland and America. It is possible, therefore, that the movement here which culminated in the formation of the new academy of Philadelphia, is a direct result of these German Jewish efforts. The parent organization in Germany has set an ambitious program for its fulfillment, including, of course, the publication of a quarterly review, and it is altogether likely that ere long we shall have a world-union of Jewish learned societies capable of much effective work in behalf of the science of Judaism and so of Judaism itself.

JEWISH POLICY IN PALESTINE.

SIR HERBERT SAMUEL, British High Commissioner for the Holy Land, having arrived at the scene of his official activities, we avail ourselves of the opportunity thus presented to sketch succinctly the main outlines of what should be the Jewish policy in respect of Palestine. We are aided in this task by the statements of Sir Herbert himself, especially by the remarks which fell from him at a recent dinner tendered him by Zionists in London.

Jewish policy in Palestine must be grounded on three factors. First and foremost, that it is the land of our traditions. *Eretz Yisroel* is and should be more than a prayerful expression. It is a hope and an inspiration. Secondly, that history teaches us how and why Palestine may eventually become the Jewish land of the world. Thirdly, that Jews already in Palestine should be fosteringly joined by those of their race and faith in a position to take up residence there. Under this head, too, Jewish relations with the non-Jewish elements in Palestine, principally the Arabs and the Christians and Moslems abiding there, must be watched and nurtured. Bearing all the factors we have indicated in mind, we think Palestine may thus eventually become as Jewish as England is English. This, at all events, is the objective of the Jewish policy in Palestine.

Now, Jewish policy in Palestine demands that *Eretz Yisroel* be our homeland in a religious and traditional sense. Politically, it is one of the nations of the earth existing under British suzerainty, but not commanding the political allegiance of Jews living under other and alien flags. For example, American Jews owe no more obedience to Palestine under British control they do to the Dominion of Canada. But the centre of their religion is there; there, too, all their glorious cultural traditions are embodied. In short, the relation of Jews throughout the world to the new state of Palestine partakes much of that which subsists between good Roman Catholics and the Vatican. The tie which binds us is religious, traditional and cultural.

Such a Jewish policy in Palestine will work well for Jews and for Palestine.

We note the existence of a movement which has for its object to include modern Hebrew among the courses of instruction preparatory to the British Civil Service at the University of Cambridge, in England. The purpose thereof is quite apparent. Great Britain, having accepted the mandate over Palestine, must provide that land with administrators fully acquainted with the language of the people governed. Does this movement imply, however, that the mandate is to be exercised either through non-Jews sent out from England itself or only by means of Jews who have pursued the courses offered by a British university? In either instance, what work in the training of public officials is there left for the Hebrew University of Jerusalem to do?

A side-light on the terrible plight of the Jews in Hungary is thrown by the circumstance that Dr. Immanuel Low, the chief rabbi of Szegedin, has been for some time confined in prison. The outside world knows almost nothing concerning the details of his incarceration. Dr. Low, himself an eminent scholar and the son of Leopold Low, a famous name in Jewish learned circles, has a reputation for scholarship which ought to have raised him above such an indignity. Then, too, the rabbinical office he fills should have made his person proof against this humiliation. But, in the present *tohu va-bohu* which is Hungary, anything is possible, and the fact that a man of his standing should be the plaything of contending demagogues is some evidence of the condition of affairs which obtains in that country.

In common with the entire community we deeply deplore the tragic deaths of Prof. Israel Friedlaender and Rabbi Bernard Cantor. Both perished at the murderous hands of "red" bandits in far-away Ukraina. Professor Friedlaender was one of the greatest American Jewish scholars, a man of high attainments, young in years, and with what would have been a long career of honorable usefulness before him. Rabbi Cantor was a very young minister, who in his chosen field had won golden opinions from those with whom he came in contact. It is inexpressibly sad to think that these two men lost their lives far from home, under such appallingly tragic circumstances and while performing a high and sacred duty. They gave their lives for the sake of the fair name and fame of Jewry; they were, indeed, soldiers in the warfare for humanity; their memory will abide with us through numberless years.

In announcing its new departure of providing for two services, at 5:30 and 7:30 P. M. respectively on the eves of *Rosh Hashannah* and *Yom Kippur*, the Baltimore Hebrew Congregation declares: "It means a broadening of our service; it means an extension of our activities by a natural increase in revenue; it means new blood, new life, new enthusiasm." It, however, does not mean a return to the Judaism of our fathers, for this additional service is to provide the means of worship (hence the cry about revenue) for those who lacked this facility heretofore. While the plan seeks to perfect the idea of the free pew, so beloved by our Reform rabbis for over a decade now, and while, of course, a large number of Reform congregations are "playing this style of 'double header,'" we confess to not being so profoundly impressed with the salutary nature for Judaism of this scheme as is, for example, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

THE ABOLITION OF DISTANCES.

"Shall your brethren go to war, and shall ye sit here?" (Num. xxxii 6.)

GEOGRAPHY is the devil's invention. In a measure, it heads the list of that resourceful gentleman's varied contributions to the misery of the world. Indeed, Geography seems to be the devil's Bible, having all the appearance of sacredness attaching to other bibles of more authentic origin. No wonder, so many accept Geography as the last word of divinity, and not as the first word of devilry. And this mock-holiness of Geography, so patently displayed in militarists and jingo-patriots, does but add to the terrible mischief caused throughout human history by the fiendish invention of Geography.

'Tis but a poor joke, you say? To my mind the matter is too tragic to be treated as a joke. National selfishness, national greed, national aggressiveness; prejudice, hatred, oppression, tyranny, and a host of kindred evils: all these have fed and grown to monstrous proportions on the mental pabulum provided by Geography. Nations have deliberately drawn about them geographic lines for purposes of isolation not alone but even more often for purposes of active hostility; for the shirking of responsibility not alone, but also for the carrying out of malevolently conceived designs upon some hapless neighbor. Neighbor?—it is enough to draw an imaginary boundary line between nation and nation, and the neighbor becomes an enemy, and friend becomes foe. Much less substantial lines have been traced between the families of the earth than the line of the Jordan behind which the two tribes-and-a-half sought to withdraw in order—as it first appeared—to be rid of the dictates of brotherly love and national solidarity; yet it is these lines, imaginary and for the most part unwarranted, that have determined the character of history, that have been woven into snares to catch the weak in. Geography—how many sins have been committed in thy name!

Look at any map employed at schools for the edification of the young. What a curious patchwork of color it is! These patches of variegated color have turned all mankind into a crazy-quilt of inharmonious pattern. But can you find the replica of this insane chromatic gamut in nature? Has God laid out his world according to these artificial lines of division and demarcation? Can you find your School-map on the *real* globe which for aeons untold has been spinning through space in quest of the Divine Adventure? This green-haired earth of ours, our cradle, our mess and our grave, beautiful beyond words and holy by reason of God's life with which it is instinct: has it been intended as a place of cruelty and carnage for mutually destructive peoples, or as a peaceful abode for a free, happy and reverent human family? Verily, it would be a fine thing if we should burn all maps, with their multi-colored hatreds, in a huge pyre, and forbid the teaching of Geography at least for a generation. Thus, perhaps, the next generation might not fall heir to our century-old jealousies and suspicions, and the race would for the first time learn the meaning of Human Brotherhood!

Geography has created a scheme of living based upon deliberately fostered distances between the nations of the world. But the last goal of Civilization is the very opposite of this nefarious business: it is—the *Abolition of Distance*.

First, the Abolition of Distance in the physical sense. This has been very largely accomplished, and will yet be achieved to a still larger extent, by our truly marvelous mechanical devices for locomotion. The world is getting a smaller place to live in; miles and miles of territory are eaten up by our fast-travelling engines. These mechanical devices, however, are but tools—and in the higher sense: symbols—of a loftier purpose, namely, the bringing about of international comity through interchange of goods and ideas; through trade and truths. So that the abolition of physical distances must in the end lead, through sympathy and understanding, to the Abolition of Spiritual Distances. This is the last, the highest, aim of Civilization.

The abolition of spiritual distances means, it hardly needs saying, the last removal from human life of the inheritance of the jungle, of jungle-hatreds and jungle-enmities: the banishment of that evil tendency of man to regard every one an enemy who does not live in the same country, speak the same language, worship the same God, in the selfsame fashion.

Therefore, a corollary to the abolition of spiritual distances is the maintenance of spiritual differences. For how are we going to abolish spiritual distances and create true understanding and complete co-operation between the nations? By forcing all to speak one language, recognize one flag, and adopt one mode of salvation? By forcing all mankind, that is, into one tight mold? That were clearly oppression of the worst, the cruellest sort. How then? Obviously, by allowing each people, each race, each nation or nationality, to live, think, act in accordance with its inner spirit at its highest; maintaining and perfecting its individuality, while at the same time allowing equal freedom and equal latitude to all other nationalities and race-groups in order that they too may bring to the highest possible expression the hidden potentialities of the national soul. In a word, the Abolition of Spiritual Distances does not mean the elimination, but rather the active maintenance, of Spiritual Differences.

Yes, the active maintenance. For divisions and differences are wholesome and necessary. They make for individuality. Only, they must not make for separation. Moses knew this, when he allowed the Reubenites and Gadites their own territory, in accordance with their own needs, yet insisted on mutual helpfulness and co-operation. This, too, is Geography—but this is divine Geography. Some day—it seems yet far—the world will be arranged according to the rules of this divine Geography: when across the far-flung tracery of national lines there will play to and fro the sweet influence of love, sympathy and human fellowship.

A JEWISH MUSEUM IN JERUSALEM.

An Interview With Boris Schatz, Head of the Art School, Bezael, in Jerusalem—Professor Schatz, Who Proposes to Found a Jewish Museum in Jerusalem, Is Now in Vienna for This Purpose.

Like all the other institutions in Palestine, Bezael naturally suffered much because of the war. With the rejuvenation of Palestine, Bezael also began to live anew. The most noteworthy reform made was that the Bezael became once more what it was meant to be when it was founded—a school for the study of artistic work and not a shop given to the manufacture of articles to be sold at Palestine exhibits, as in the last years before the war. The well-known Talmudic maxim, "A teacher is not a warrior and a warrior is not a teacher," proved quite true in the case of the Bezael. An educational institution is not a good business house, and a business house hardly makes a desirable alma mater. Bezael, that tried to bring together both extremes, did not succeed in the venture and, therefore, has returned to its original purpose to serve as an educational institution, where young talented Jews will be given training in the artistic industries.

Now, the sale of the school's produce is undertaken by co-operatives of the various workshops. All the students of any given studio are members of the co-operative and so benefit from the sale of their handiwork. This social arrangement is in itself a stimulus to further activity, since each student knows that he is to benefit from his work, that he is working for himself and not for the shareholders, as in previous years.

There are eight workshops. Of these, one is working for an American magazine on a co-operative basis. Six more shops have also united on the same basis, under the supervision of the Bezael. Only one workshop has retained the old method. It is expected that this one, too, will soon follow the example of the others. The shares will soon be liquidated and all similar forms of philanthropy will soon disappear from Bezael.

The change in the conditions of the country, which will bring to it a great number of tourists, makes necessary the establishment of new departments to teach the manufacture of tourists' articles. Beyond question, the care and

provision of the visitors to the Holy Land will become the chief source of income of the Jerusalem population. It is now a respectable part of their earnings, which is becoming larger and larger from year to year. With the building up and the beautifying of the new Jerusalem, the number of tourists is bound to increase. The Bezael exhibits have already won the attention of all tourists without exception. In proportion to the growth of the tourist traffic and the increase of the Bezael exhibits will the Jewish population of the city increase, and Jerusalem will be ours.

But in order to win Jerusalem spiritually as well as materially, it is necessary to establish, besides the university, other cultural institutions. Among the first of these, should be a great Jewish museum where would be collected the best works of all the Jewish artists and of Jewish art. This museum must be put on the same high level as the finest European and American museums, so that it might attract lovers of art from various parts of the world and bring honor and respect to the whole Jewish people.

The Jewish museum will later be an independent institution, with its own board of curators and its own name. For the present it is the undertaking of the Bezael and bears the name "Art Museum of Bezael." Prof. Schatz is delighted with the start which he made in Vienna. He bought some pictures of the foremost Jewish artists and many other works of Jewish art, such as candleabra, sacred curtains, etc. Besides the purchased objects, he will also take back with him many valuable gifts which he received from Jewish art collectors. This has increased his hope that in all other Jewish centers and wherever Jews live the people will interest themselves in this noble cultural institution and will help to build and to develop it.

A start has already been made. Both in Paris and Berlin committees have been organized to collect art objects for the Jewish museum in Jerusalem. America also has made a start—a great and imposing one, as she usually does when called upon—for the museum. At the exhibition in Chicago of the works of Abel Pann, a teacher at the Bezael, a Maecenas by the name of Fetshheimer bought the whole cycle of 45 war pictures and presented them to the new museum. Such generosity has not been displayed by anyone in Europe. At the exhibition were many people who wanted to buy single pictures of the cycle for various American museums. Mr. Pann, however, undertook to sell the whole cycle, and only to the one who would donate it to the Jewish museum. He waited until the Maecenas came and enriched the Jewish museum with this splendid art collection.

Professor Schatz feels extremely happy to have been able to get works of the deceased great Jewish artists Gottlieb, Hirshenberg, Horwitz and Mossay. He hopes that in the next ten years he will succeed in acquiring at least one work of each of the best Jewish artists in the world, so that the new museum may really be the mirror of all the art creations of the Jewish people. The writer of the history of art will no longer have to travel to various parts of the world in order to study Jewish art. It will be sufficient for him to visit the Jewish museum in Jerusalem.

And Professor Schatz confided another happy bit of news to me: All the Jewish artists of Vienna have expressed the wish to come to Palestine to work there. Eretz Israel is to become not only the home of the Jewish people, but of Jew-

ish art as well. Every real Jewish artist will have to spend some time in Palestine to paint the beautiful landscapes of the country and depict the picturesque Jewish types and to enrich world culture with a genuine Jewish art.

Pressing interests of the Bezael compel Professor Schatz to return to Jerusalem at once. That, however, will not stop his activity in behalf of the Jewish museum. Its foundation has already been carefully laid. Its existence is a fact with which American and European Jewry must reckon. All the Jews of the world must strive to make the Jewish museum at Jerusalem one of the finest in civilization.

Samuel Promises a Fair and Impartial Administration in Palestine.

The administration in Palestine will be fair and impartial and of benefit to all the inhabitants, Sir Herbert L. Samuel announced when he arrived in

Jerusalem to take up his duties as Lord High Commissioner under the mandate granted to Great Britain.

Great, enthusiastic crowds lined the streets to greet Sir Herbert upon his arrival, according to a cable received by the Zionist Organization of America. The arrival of the British High Commissioner marks the end of the military administration which has governed Palestine since General Allenby wrested it from the Turks.

In a debate over the Palestinian mandate in the House of Commons, Lord Curzon, British Foreign Secretary, defending Zionism and the British policy declared that although the appointment of a Jew as High Commissioner to Palestine might be construed as unfair, the government and the Allies had found Sir Herbert Samuel to be both experienced and impartial and that within six months he would be the most popular man among the Arabs as well

as the Jews.

Irrigation, wiping out malaria in the Jordan Valley and surveying of the land must be the first restoration tasks, according to Lord Curzon, who emphasized that the country must be built up slowly.

Sadistic Murders by Hungarian Soldiers.

Budapest (By I. J. P. B.).—Many of the murders committed by Hungarian officers and soldiers are so revolting, so bestial, that they cannot be the acts of normal people, however enraged, but of psychopaths. It is more than probable that abnormalists are leading the blood-thirsty Hungarian mobs against the Jews and are merely exploiting a questionable patriotism for the purpose of satiating their own diseased appetites. The Hungarian Government is well pleased with these, its executioners, and calls them the "vanguard of civilization against Bolshevism."

How else can the following atrocities be interpreted? In Szegszard an old Jew of 65, named Deak, his son and his son-in-law were kidnapped by a Jankovich detachment of soldiers. Without any charges being made against them, and without a trial, all three were hanged. The daughter of the old man, with her two children at her side, was compelled to witness the execution of her father, brother and husband. Then the soldiers grabbed one of the children, a little boy, cut open his belly, stuffed it with salt, and left him to die "in peace."

Two hundred persons, among them many Jews, were murdered by officers in Kecskemet. Thirty-seven others were dragged from their prison cells into the forest of Orgavany and were tortured to death. Still others had rocks tied to their bodies and were forced to jump into the Theis River.

In Siosok, Captain Freisberger and his troops killed forty-two prisoners during a single night. Several corpses were cut to small pieces. Their flesh was then fried and other prisoners were compelled to eat it. Mrs. Klein, a Jewish woman, was taken prisoner by the Detachment Hejjas in Tiszasulyi. Her crime consisted of the fact that her daughter was the bride of one of the Red Army soldiers. She was given a hundred lashes and became insane as a result.

These are but a few items from one day's issue of the Hungarian press. The present Hungarian regime is doing nothing to stop these outrages and

Leon Komaiky Honored in Warsaw. Warsaw (By I. J. P. B.).—Before Leon Komaiky, the representative of the American Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society, left Warsaw he was given a royal sendoff by the Warsaw Jews. Many took him to the station, where he was presented with beautiful bouquets of flowers.

Rabbi Julius Newman, for many years rabbi of Moses Montefiore Congregation of Chicago, Ill., died at Los Angeles, Cal., last month, whither he had gone for his health. Rabbi Newman was 69 years of age, and had lived in Chicago for over 40 years.

Prof. Friedlander and Rabbi Cantor Slain by Red Bandits.

According to an Associated Press cable from Warsaw, and confirmed later by the Joint Distribution Committee, Prof. Israel Friedlander and Rabbi Bernard Cantor, both members of the unit of the Joint Distribution Committee which left here for Poland January 10, were slain by bandits on July 7, near Yarmolince, in the Ukraine, by three men wearing Bolshevik uniforms.

According to the story related by the chauffeur who was driving the car in which they were traveling, the armed bandits stopped the automobile and demanded money. The chauffeur, who spoke Russian, explained to the bandits that both the men he was driving, and who wore the khaki uniforms of the distribution committee, were Americans. The bandits persisted in their search, however, and while they were going over the car the chauffeur escaped. As he ran, he heard a shot, he said, and saw one of the Americans fall. Travelers who arrived at Lemberg later reported having seen the bodies of the two Americans and the ruins of the burned automobile.

Prof. Friedlander, who had been connected with the Jewish Theological Seminary for seventeen years, was Sabato Morais Professor of Biblical Literature and Exegesis. He was also a member of the faculty of the Teachers' Institute of the Jewish Theological Seminary, being instructor in history. Prof. Friedlander leaves a wife and six small children. Mrs. Friedlander was Miss Lillian Ruth Bentwich of London, Eng. There are three sons and three daughters.

Rev. Dr. Israel Friedlander was born in Russia forty-three years ago. He was educated in Berlin University, the Rabbiner Seminar and the University of Strassburg. He was admitted as privatdozent for Semitic languages in 1902. He came to the Jewish Theological Seminary of America in October, 1903.

The Rev. Dr. Bernard Cantor was formerly rabbi of the Flushing branch of the Free Synagogue. He was born in Buffalo, N. Y., twenty-nine years ago. He was educated in the Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, O.

Rabbi Cantor leaves a father and mother in Buffalo, N. Y. He also leaves a brother, Maurice Cantor, a lawyer of this city.

Out of 84 graduates of the Shreveport (La) High School, three receiving highest honors were Miss Bessie Kupperman, Miss Netta Velinsky and Master Paul D. Abramson, son of Dr. Louis D. Abramson, who is the president of the school board.

THE DIETARY LAWS.

Dear Children:
The world is divided into three classes in regard to the partaking of food: There are those who live that they may eat, their great aim in life is to fill their stomachs; these are the lowest class. A higher class are those who eat that they may live, but they are not particular as to the kind of food they partake of so long as in their estimation it will not injure their health. Both of these classes are concerned only with the effect the food will have on their body. They either do not know, or will not admit, that food has also a refining or degrading effect on the human soul. Israel, as the guardian of the Holy Torah which teaches us the laws of life, the life of the body and the life of the soul, has been chosen to represent the highest class of humanity, whose food the Almighty has ordained for them with the view of preserving the health of their body and the purity of their soul, and these laws we are taught in this section of the Torah. "And the Lord spoke unto Moses and to Aaron, saying unto them, Speak unto the children of Israel, saying, These are the beasts which ye may eat among all the beasts that are on the earth. Whatsoever divideth the hoof, and is cloven-footed, and cheweth the cud, among the beasts, that may ye eat." Rashi comments on the above as follows: "El Moscheh veel Aahorone." "Unto Moses and to Aaron." He spoke unto Moses only and told him to tell it also to Aaron. "Cimore aleiheur," "to say unto them." He told him also to say it to Elazar and Ithamar—or perhaps this means that he shall say it to Israel? Inasmuch as it is said, "Speak unto the children of Israel," the command to speak to Israel was given separately. Then how can we interpret the words "Cimore aleiheur?"—to the sons, to Elazar and to Ithamar. Speak unto the children of Israel ("Dabru"—"speak ye"). He made them all equal as the promulgators of this commandment, because they (Aaron and his sons) were all equal in their silent resignation and in accepting the decree of the Omnipotent with loving submission. "Zoth hachayah asher tochlu mikol habehema," "These are the beasts which ye may eat among all the beasts." The proper expression would have been "Zoth habehema," but the word "Chayah" was used significantly because it is derived from the word "chayim," which means "life." Because Israel cleaves to the Omnipresent, and are deserving of life, therefore, he separated them from that which is unclean and prescribed commandments for them, but to the nations, who worship idols, he has not forbidden anything. It may be compared to a doctor who visited two patients, seeing that for one of them there was no hope of recovery, he said to his family, "Give him whatever food he desires," but concerning the other whose recovery he foresaw he said to them, "Such food shall he eat, and such food shall he not eat." Said they to the doctor, "What is this, concerning this one you tell us he may eat whatever he desires, and concerning the other you say he shall not eat this or that?" Said the doctor to them: "To this one, who will live, I said, this shalt thou eat and this shalt thou not eat; but concerning the other, who will die, I said,

give him whatever he desires as he is not going to live. Thus the Holy One, blessed be He, permitted the idol-worshippers to eat abominations and creeping things, but to Israel who are destined to live he said: "Ye shall be holy unto me, for I am holy." "Ye shall not abominate yourselves" (literally, "make your souls abominable"). These may ye eat but these shall ye not eat. And ye shall not make yourselves unclean with them that ye should be defiled thereby. Why? Because they are destined to live! (Medrash of Rabbi Tauchuma). "Zoth hachayah." This is the beast, hence we learn that Moses took hold of each beast and showed it to Israel and said, "This may ye eat but this may ye not eat." "Eth zeh tochlu." This may ye eat, of all that are in the water; of each species that moves in the waters he also took hold and showed them. Likewise of the fowls, and these shall ye have in abomination among the fowls; likewise of the creeping things. And these shall be unclean to you among the creeping things, "babehema othah toeheil," among the beasts, that may ye eat, "babehema" seems superfluous, but it signifies in the beast, permitting the offspring that is found in its mother's entrails to be eaten. "Otha toeheil," that may ye eat, but not an unclean beast. Why this inference? Did not the Torah expressly forbid the eating of an unclean beast? However, this makes the transgressor guilty of violating a positive as well as a negative commandment. "And their carcasses shall ye not touch" lest we think this prohibition concerning the touching of the carcass of an unclean animal applies to Israel, we are taught (Leviticus 21), "Speak unto the priests and say unto them none of them shall defile himself on the dead among his people." The priests are warned, but not the Israelites. If, therefore, the touching of a dead human body was prohibited only to the priests, the defiling by the touch of the carcass of a beast, which is a minor degree of pollution, surely does not apply to the Israelites. Why, therefore, does it say here, "and their carcasses shall ye not touch." That means, "on a festival," when the Israelites must appear in the Holy Temple, they must keep themselves very clean, even from such a pollution. Whatever hath not fins and scales in the water shall be an abomination unto you, but if it has fins and scales in the water even if it lost them whilst taken out of the water, it is permitted, "lo yeachlu," they shall not be eaten. Ye shall not cause others to eat them. This makes the one who gives little children forbidden food as guilty as if he ate it himself.

Kosher Kitchen for Boy Scout Camp.
For the benefit of the Jewish boys, enrolled in the various Boy Scout troops a Kosher kitchen has been established at the Boy Scout camp at Tuxedo, N. Y. One of the students of the Jewish Theological Seminary is at the camp to supervise the Kashruth and to conduct religious services for the Jewish boys. These steps have been taken as a result of the efforts of the New York branch of the United Synagogue of America.

A B'nai Brith lodge was organized last month at Wynne, Ark. There are 34 charter members and the new lodge includes members from the nearby towns of Augusta, Earle, Parken and McCrory.

German Jews to Aid Lithuanian Talmudical Students.

Berlin (By I. J. P. B.)—A representative committee of all the Jews of Germany is now working for the relief of the Talmudical students in Lithuania and for the upkeep of the historic Talmudical colleges that have fostered the Jewish spirit throughout the diaspora. Some of the members of this committee are: Professor Banet, Berlin; the Rev. Dr. Karibach, Lubek; Rabbi Freiman, Posen; Dr. Hirsch, Halberstadt; Rabbi Rosenthal, Breslau; Mr. G. Marks, Konigsberg, and others.

Throughout the dismal period of the war, threatened by massacre and starvation, the students of the Yshivos of Lithuania persisted in their study of the Torah and of Jewish science. Neither hunger nor the most acute suffering could move them to desist from their studies and to seek an independent livelihood. At last an organized attempt is to be made to aid them in their struggle.

In Lithuania itself a committee has also been established, of which the Jewish Minister in the Lithuanian Government, Dr. Rachmilitz, is the treasurer, for the same purpose. This committee is now planning to found a normal school for Jewish teachers.

Lithuania has been the greatest center of Jewish learning since the days of Yavneh. Many of the great Jews of the world, writers, poets, scientists and diplomats, have studied at its Talmudical colleges. Even many of our radical Jews, who are now but little interested in either Jews or Judaism, bear memories of years spent in the Lithuanian Yshivos.

MUSIC AND DRAMA.

Bookworms who have read the biographies of some of the great masters in music and art, are surprised at the unsystematic manner in which these geniuses existed. Not so, with Mario Salvini, tenor and opera coach. On the contrary, his manner of living is so orderly that one might say he almost has the sound waves caught, classified and properly indexed. Be that as it may, Salvini tells the world and will demonstrate in this city in the approaching fall, that it is possible to put on grand opera with artist-virtuosi. He is the Oscar Hammerstein in this movement, in its origination and plan of fulfillment, and "little old New York" is due for one more big surprise.

Nothing seems to stop the crowds that gather nightly on the Green at Columbia University to listen to the Goldman Concert Band under the direction of Edwin Franko Goldman. Threatening weather and rain have not diminished the size of the audiences. In fact, on several occasions people sat in the rain under umbrellas. During one concert last week thirteen hundred people carried their own camp chairs through the gates. When one considers the vast crowds that assemble on the Green nightly, it is quite remarkable to note the discipline and quiet that prevail at these concerts. There is nothing to mar one's attention. No one is seated during the rendition of the music, and the entire atmosphere is ideal for open-air concerts.

Edwin Franko Goldman is extremely popular and his every appearance is greeted with enthusiasm. He understands his audiences and has the happy knack of making programs that appeal. Incidentally, he has complete charge of the entire undertaking, and the success of the enterprise is due in a large measure to his personal efforts.

Samuel S. Grossman, the former general manager of the Jewish Art Theatre, is now associated with the Wendell Phillips Dodge Production Company as its general representative. The first of Mr. Grossman's efforts as a Broadway manager will be the production of "Esther," a dramatic spectacle based on the Bible story. "Esther" will be the first great Jewish woman character to be dramatized on Broadway. It is written by the author of "The Wanderer," Maurice V. Samuels. A prominent Jewish actor is to play the title role of Esther in English.

Metropolitan League of Y. M. H. A.'s. A meeting of superintendents of the Metropolitan League was called for Monday morning, July 12, at the 92d street Y. M. H. A. by Mr. Henry J. Bernheim, president of the Metropolitan League.

Various suggestions were taken up for co-operation in the musical and dramatic fields during the summer. A full report was given on the summer work in the different buildings, especially of the Week-End Camp at Silver Beach. Mr. A. W. Rosenthal, director of the Week-End Camp, reported a highly successful opening of the season on July 4. An impromptu program, both athletic and amusement, was provided by members. Rabbi Lee J. Levinger, executive director of the 92d street Y. M. H. A. delivered the Independence Day address at the camp. Mr. Rosenthal announced that registrations are taken each week, with no prior reservations so that all Y. M. H. A. members will be able to attend the Week-End Camp at least once this season, if they desire.

At a meeting of the Association of Y. M. H. A. superintendents of the Metropolitan district, held directly afterward, Mr. J. N. Sokohl resigned the presidency of the organization as he is shortly to leave New York to act as executive director of the Philadelphia Y. M. H. A. Mr. Herman Bergoffen of the Williamsburg Y. M. H. A. was elected president instead; Rabbi Lee J. Levinger, of the 92d street Y. M. H. A., secretary. The superintendents, who are all active in various camps, have been invited to make a tour of inspection of the Palisade Interstate Park at Bear Mountain.

Marannos in Persia. Constantinople (By I. J. P. B.).—Persian Jewry is undergoing the fateful experiences of the Spanish Jews of the fifteenth century. Thousands of them have been forced to embrace Mohammedanism and practice their own religion secretly at their peril. Fortunately, a political motive for their discovery is lacking, and there is no inquisitorial secret service to hound them.

Recently the Jewish writer, Abraham Triver of Constantinople, met a community of these modern Marannos at Mished. He was traveling through the city and wanted to visit the Jewish settlement. In the streets he saw Jewish faces, but when he asked they replied, "No; there are no Jews in Mished." Mr. Triver was so certain of their identity that he concluded there was something wrong.

In a casual conversation with a few Persians he was informed that several years before the thousand Jews of Mished were compelled to turn Mohammedans. Later he did manage to win the confidence of a number of the secret Jews. They told him that they were most anxiously awaiting the time when they would be able to take the masks off their faces. That, they believed, would not be possible without external

aid and protection. Sabbaths and holidays they gather in a secret chamber for communal religious services. Great care is taken not to be detected, and a strict watch is put on guard to warn the worshippers in case of danger.

There are a number of other Jewish communities in Persia that are leading the same precarious, terrorized sort of existence. They appeal to their European co-religionists to come to their aid and to save them from savage intolerance.

Jews in Czechoslovakian Government.

Prague (By I. J. P. B.).—Although not a single Jew has been elected to the Czechoslovakian Parliament at the last election by the Jewish party, there are now several Jews occupying prominent governmental positions. Dr. Meissner and Dr. Winter, two Jewish Socialists, are members of the Czechoslovakian Cabinet. The leader of the German Democrats of this country is Dr. Kafka, a baptized Jew. His wife is also a bap-

tized Jewess and is descended from the family of Zachariah Frankel, the famous scholar and head of the Breslau Rabbinical Seminary. In the Senate there is one Jew, the noted jurist Professor Spiegel, elected by the German party of Prague.

The Rabbi Loew Trial in Hungary. Budapest (By I. J. P. B.).—The father of the apostate Simon Hallosi, who, it will be recalled, is responsible for the arrest of Rabbi Loew of Segadin, has publicly come out against his son. In an open letter to the press Mr. Hollander renounced his son and declared him to be a renegade and a scoundrel.


