

mate friends; I consider it something of an achievement to invest even trivial business relations with the human touch. "To you, dear friends, I extend personal greetings. Mine is the high privilege tonight of introducing our newly elected rabbi and teacher.

She has taken a very deep interest not alone in the poor and needy of her own faith, but as a true Jewess, in those of others as well.

"Dr. Coffee, the entire membership of Temple Sinai is with you and we all pledge you our utmost support. It goes without saying that the Board of Directors stands unanimously to assist you. I shall always aid you in every way that my health will allow.

"It now becomes my pleasant duty to hand over to you this beautiful edifice, without any encumbrance. The \$50,000 mortgage which rested on it for years, the good members, following the lead of an able committee, have paid off. God be with you as you enter upon the discharge of your spiritual duty in Oakland, your native city.

Lead us to remain steadfast to the glorious heritage of Israel. Teach us to remain good Jews so that we shall bless our beloved America through honorable living. Be our shepherd and guide. We are now your willing followers. We now call you to leadership. May the God of our fathers direct you that, fearlessly and unafraid, you may preach and teach Judaism to Jew and non-Jew in the great community of Oakland.

Convention of Young Judaea in the South

The president of National Young Judaea has just returned from a visit to the convention of Young Judaea in the South, at which sixty delegates were present at Chattanooga from the States of Tennessee, Alabama, Georgia and Florida. Very elaborate arrangements had been made in advance of the convention, and as a result substantial and constructive work was accomplished. Young Judaea in the South can be expected to carry out this year intensive educational work in the clubs and a general strengthening of the organization is looked for. New branches of the movement are to be organized throughout the Jewish centers in the South in close cooperation with the national headquarters.

The delegates assembled on Friday evening at the B'nai Zion Synagogue where they were addressed by the president of the national organization, Mr. Samuel J. Borowsky. On Saturday morning Mr. Borowsky spoke to the parents at the same synagogue in Yiddish.

The first business session of the convention was held Saturday evening when reports were given by the delegates from the various centers. It appeared from these reports that the strongest Young Judaea centers in the South are those of Chattanooga, Memphis, Birmingham and Montgomery. Young Judaea has been a vital force in Jewish life in the South, being the only agency of Jewish boys and girls, and the South looks with eagerness for its spread and development. The leadership of the movement in that section of the country is entirely in the hands of people who have developed and matured in Young Judaea ranks and who are an asset to Jewish life in this country as well as to Young Judaea. During the crisis in the Zionist movement the progress of Young Judaea in the South as well as Young Judaea everywhere has been rather slow. New spirit is now prevailing which gives every opportunity for growth and expansion.

The convention closed with manifestations of the utmost enthusiasm, and it can be safely said that Young Judaea in the South has started upon a new era of activity.

ZIONISTS GATHER IN WORLD CONGRESS

Preliminary Report of the Gatherings and the Opening Sessions

Carlsbad, Czecho-Slovakia (Jewish Press Association).—There is every indication that the twelfth Zionist Congress will be the most momentous in Zionism, not only because of the unusual conditions affecting Palestine, but no less so because of the decided differences existing between the various groups among the delegates with regard to policy and method. Preliminary meetings, which are being held here on a large scale, are chiefly devoted to criticism of all that has been done and left undone by the present administration since leadership was vested in it as a result of the declaration by Mr. Arthur J. Balfour. The American delegates, nearly all of whom have been here for some days, although said to be solid in their support of Dr. Weizmann and Ussishkin, are nevertheless taking part in conferences at which plans for various reforms are formulated.

More than 600 delegates are said to be here already, while many others are still expected. Poland will be in the lead with about 150 delegates, representing all parties. Germany will no doubt come second. While groups are forming themselves between delegates of various countries, the respective parties are seeking alliances in the hope of exerting a necessary influence on the course of the congress deliberations and decisions. The Ziorei Zion and the Hapoal Hazoir stand together, while the Mizrahi representatives are formulating their own campaign.

Dr. Max Nordau, the grand old man in the ranks of Zionism, will be conspicuous by his absence. While current report has it that he is staying away on account of ill-health, many maintain that his disapproval of the present administration is the chief cause of his absence. Much speculation is indulged in as to who may be chosen for chairman. Dr. Weizmann has appealed to Lord Rothschild to preside, but as yet no definite reply has been received from him. Dr. Schmarja Levin, whose name has been prominently mentioned, is strongly opposed by members of the Mizrahi. Professor Warburg, David Yellin and Dr. Chajes are some of the others who have been proposed, while many favor the great Hebrew poet Bialick. The Greater Actions Committee at its last session decided to recommend Mr. Nahum Sokoloff, but in view of his official position and the custom that those heading the organization should not preside, it is considered unlikely that the choice will be pressed. Dr. Motzkin, Louis Lipsky, Dr. Isaac Klumel, supplemented by one Mizrahi and one labor representative, will support the presiding officer as vice-chairmen.

Dr. Oscar Marmoreck, the Zionist French leader, and one of the strongest opponents of the present administration, following the example of Justice Louis D. Brandeis, former head of the Zionist Organization in America, has decided not to attend the congress due to open here tomorrow. It was understood that Marmoreck was definitely coming to the congress and his change of mind at the last moment is said to be due to the influence exerted by the former American Zionist leaders who are now outside of the organization. From authoritative sources we learn that it is the intention of Dr. Marmoreck to visit the United States at an early date and address all the large Jewish communities. At the same time it is his intention to issue a weekly publication in Paris in which the cause of Zionism from the points of view of the opposition will be advanced. In this connection he is looking to the former leaders of America for material support.

There are among the delegates present quite a number who fully sympathize with the views of Mr. Brandeis, but who feel that he erred in staying away from the congress.

A characteristic feature of the situation as it is resolving itself now is the fact that the present American leaders, chiefly Louis Lipsky and Abe Goldberg, who were able to wrest the control of American Zionism only through the aid

of Dr. Weizmann and Mr. Ussishkin, are now opposing the latter as a member of the next executive. On the other hand, the entire labor block of more than a hundred delegates, led by Katzeleson and Shprinzack, are solidly for Ussishkin. Those familiar with the situation in America charge that the leaders of the American delegation are again playing politics.

As private meetings progress and groupings continue it becomes clearer that the general Zionists are trying, with a good deal of success, to organize a center faction. One of the points over which much serious fighting is certain is the question of a Legion in Palestine. The great majority of Palestinians appear to favor it.

Very impressive was the opening session of the Twelfth Zionist Congress, which opened last Thursday morning and will continue for another week. The congress was officially greeted by Dr. Houliak in behalf of the Czecho-Slovakian Government, while Sir George Clark, English Ambassador to Czecho-Slovakia, spoke in behalf of the British Government and expressed his conviction that the Balfour declaration will surely be realized. Messages of greeting were also received from President Massaryk and Czecho-Slovakian Foreign Minister, Dr. Benesch.

Dr. Weizmann delivered his opening address in Hebrew and left a very deep impression. He spoke of the work already done, of the achievements in Palestine colonization which have now passed the experimental stage; referred to the great possibilities opening with the new land already purchased and more to be acquired; related how Ruttenberg's plans for irrigation and electrification of Palestine were nearing completion, and stated that the medical school of the Hebrew University would soon be an accomplished fact.

His references to the situation as it affected the Arabs were more in the nature of a challenge. Not the least of the rights guaranteed in the Balfour declaration would be surrendered, the Zionist leader declared. The Jews have no intention of doing the Arabs any injustice or robbing them of any of their rights, but if they persisted in their present attitude the Jews would be forced to take all measures for self-defense. However, he felt sure that the situation would settle and friendly and co-operative action for the good of the country would result.

Dr. Weizmann expressed the hope that American Jews are conscious of the hopes laid upon them by the rest of Jewry, they having been fortunate in escaping the ravages of war, and assured the congress that the administration recognized that there were more roads approaching to Palestine and they would not obstruct the passage of those who chose a road other than the one being followed by the administration.

Mr. Nathan Sokolow, who was chosen to preside over the congress, followed Dr. Weizmann. He too spoke in Hebrew, and was even more impressive than the head of the organization.

The Balfour Declaration on the part of England and the support given it at the San Remo conference by America, France and Italy have been the turning point in Jewish history, this Jewish statesman and scholar declared. But the immediate past, he pointed out, had been historic in other directions, and he turned to details of the martyrdom to which European Jewry had been subjected within the past seven years. Emphasizing the terrible catastrophe in Ukraine, Sokolow asked where were the European powers in all those years when Jews were being slaughtered by wholesale in Ukraine. Jews welcomed the appearance of the League of Nations with profound satisfaction and ardent hope, but where was this league, when Jews were being murdered in tens of thousands; who heard its warning voice against the massacre of the innocent and helpless? The only answer given to all appeals was the statement that, officially, nothing definite as to happenings in Ukraine could be established. Dr. Herzl, the speaker said, had warned a quarter of a century ago against the dangers which the lack of a national home carried with it, and for that he and his followers were branded pessimists.

Referring to the propaganda being

made against Zionism and the argument used that Palestine was sacred to all religious denominations, he said that none were more conscious than the Jews of the sacredness attached to the religious elements of humanity to Palestine, but that sacredness would be preserved and intensified. Jerusalem would not only be God's city, but would disseminate the principles of peace and brotherhood. All this, he said, had been conveyed to the venerable head of the Catholic Church, and he fully expressed his cordial agreement. Sokolow concluded by expressing his hope that the next congress would be held in Jerusalem.

H. N. Bialick, the national Hebrew poet, was the next speaker, and he appealed to Jews everywhere for a more profound application to the national problem, so that the Balfour Declaration may not remain "a mere scrap of paper."

After Sokolow had been elected president, he paid honor to the memory of the many heroes who had fallen in the midst of their duty to Jewry, and paid special tribute to Prof. Israel Friedlander and Dr. Bernard Cantor, the American relief workers that were murdered last year in Ukraine.

The second and third sessions were chiefly devoted to criticisms of the administration. Julius Simon, a resigned member of the executive, attacking Weizmann and Ussishkin, charged that they had deliberately gone to America to oust Brandeis from the organization, while as a matter of fact, he declared, Brandeis was the creator of American Zionism. He also defended the theory of Judge Mack that every Federation is entitled to take independent action.

Nehemiah DeLiema, another former member of the Executive, was even more scathing in his criticisms. Weizmann, Sokolow, Ussishkin and Jabotinsky all were severely scored for things done badly or not at all. What he asked was the meaning of the hundred and one interpretations being given the Balfour Declaration? were the pogroms in Jerusalem and Jaffa the result of the declaration? And the Palestine frontiers, he questioned further, were they the result of the efforts of diplomatic Mr. Sokolow? He, too, defended Mr. Brandeis.

These critics of the administration were answered by Rabbi Dr. Berlin, who himself found much fault with Dr. Weizmann's leadership, but could not praise sufficiently his good work in America, where a change was essential. Abe Goldberg also told the congress why the former American leaders had been ousted and outlined conditions in America. Finally, Chief Rabbi Dr. Chajes of Vienna related how he had found things in America in such shape that nothing but a sweeping change would have saved the situation.

The printed report of the executive contains interesting data on the manner in which Balfour Declaration came to be made, and shows that but for a message from President Wilson, which he sent personally, thanks to the influence of Justice Brandeis, the declaration might not have been made, for there were then many Cabinet members in the British Government who opposed it.

Official reports showed that there are now 765,900 Shekelpayers. The following vice-presidents were elected: Dr. Motzkin, Dr. Klumel, Louis Lipsky, Rabbi Meyer Berlin and H. Farnstein for the Mizrahi, Shprinzak for the "Achduth Avodoth," and S. Kaplansky for the Poalei-Zion.

In the course of many private meetings among the different groups and factions it was made clear that the labor elements stand together. Between them they formulated these demands:

- (1) Nationalization of all land purchased by Zionists.
- (2) Present co-operative should not be abandoned as suggested.
- (3) Single individual settling should also do so on national land (land subsequently reverting to the people).
- (4) Zionist organization should provide Jewish laborers with work through public works which should be carried out through the workers Kwutzos and not through any middlemen.
- (5) Part of the Keren Hayesod money should be devoted to the organization and education of the skilled laborers.
- (6) Free labor immigration into Palestine regulated with the co-operation of the Jewish labor unions.


An interesting demand was formulated by S. Kaplansky, of the Poalei-Zion. According to his plan each Jew should be enabled to have a voice in the rebuilding of Zion, hence he wants every Jew to be able to vote for delegates to all future Zionist Congresses irrespective of their affiliations with any Zionist or non-Zionist group.

A congress of Zionist women attended by 40 delegates from all parts of the world opened here last night. Among others present are Mrs. Peter J. Schweitzer of New York, and Mrs. Benjamin of Cleveland. Mrs. Dr. Bodenheimer of Berlin was elected president and the first session heard a report from Mrs. Dr. Chalm Weizmann on the results of the Jewellery Fund of the Keren Hayesod.

Sunday's sessions opened with further criticism of the administration. Jan Fisher of Antwerp demanded a change in policy which should be based on a properly secured national home in Palestine. There can be no question, the speaker emphasized, between an Arab majority and a Jewish minority, since the Jews the world over demanded Palestine as a national home.

Very impressive was Berl Batzenelson of Jerusalem, who spoke in the name of the Ziorei-Zion. He pictured the sad political situation of the Jews in Palestine and blamed Sir Herbert

Samuel for it, charging that the High Commissioner is flirting with the Arabs. Dr. Ebner, a member of the Roumanian delegation, after criticizing both Weizmann and Brandeis, appealed for peace.

The second session found Vladimir Jabotinsky, Dr. Motzkin and Dr. Shmarja Levin answering the various critics. Jabotinsky questioned how it was possible for Mr. Julius Simon and Nehemiah DeLiema to be dissatisfied with poor political results attained when Brandeis considered all necessity for political work over. He concluded by appealing for harmony and co-operation on the part of all concerned about the future of Zion, and proposed a greater executive which should include the best Zionist brains. Dr. Shmarja Levin in a brilliant speech told the delegates how the Brandeis group in America forced the conflict upon the European leaders.

The afternoon session was adjourned for some hours when the delegates witnessed a striking entertainment by four hundred Jewish gymnasts from Austria, Germany and Czech-Slovakia, who came to honor the congress. The athletes were directed by Abaramowitz of Constantinople.

The Austrian and American delegations have united under the leadership of Louis Lipsky and Dr. Robert Stricker. The combined delegations support the administration, but will insist on a number of reforms.

The Roumanian delegation made it known today that it would call for further information about the withdrawal of Justice Brandeis from the Zionist organization. The information so far supplied on this point, it was stated, was not considered satisfactory.

At the conferences of the Russian Zionists held here, the present leaders were freely criticized, Chief among those who flayed the heads of the administra-

tion were Dr. Tiemkin, Dr. Bruk and Dr. Wilensky. Weizmann, Ussishkin and Jabotinsky personally appeared before the Russians to answer the critics.

The delegation from Soviet Russia is expected here today and includes, among other noted leading Jews, Dr. Brutzkus and Zalmen Epstein.

About seventy Zionist students are holding a convention here. Engineer Baily from Holland is presiding.

The Polish delegation, forming the largest group which supports Dr. Weizmann, at its last meeting unanimously decided in favor of the formation of a Jewish legion. They will also demand that Vladimir Jabotinsky should be a member of the executive.

Dr. Boris Bogen to Remain in United States

Dr. Boris Bogen, the general director of the Joint Distribution Committee, having organized the liquidation of palliative relief and the initiation of functional activities abroad, has returned to the United States to offer to the committee the benefit of his experience and advice on this side of the water. After a brief visit to his family in Los Angeles he will return to New York to organize the administrative work here in harmony with the functional work abroad and to co-ordinate and direct the administrative work over here. Henceforth his headquarters will be in New York, but he anticipates that the development of the work will require him to make more or less frequent trips to the other side.

Dr. Bogen's return will thus not only afford to the committee the maximum of his service, but will also enable him to furnish advice in the solution of social problems on this side of the water to other institutions that have expressed a desire to consult him.

ITEMS OF INTEREST IN THE JEWISH WORLD

The municipal baths at Tel-Aviv were informally opened by the civil secretary on July 26.

Dining and sleeping car service has now been instituted on the Haifa-Jerusalem-Kantara lines.

Mr. Abraham Isaac, B.A., LL.B., has been appointed a subordinate judge in the Bombay Presidency.

The Austrian Minister of Agriculture has delivered a speech strongly condemnatory of anti-Semitism.

The French High Commissioner for Syria sent a donation of 3,000 francs to the Jewish poor at Enteb.

The French Academy has awarded the Aubril prize (500 francs) to the Jewish Trade School in Paris.

The Anglican Bishop has visited many Jewish schools at Jerusalem and expressed high approval of them.

Messrs. Druianoff, Ravnitzky, Faierstein and Rabinovitch-Lita, well known Hebrew writers, have landed at Jaffa.

Last week Rev. J. Rabinowitz celebrated his thirty-first anniversary as cantor of Temple Beth-El, San Francisco, Cal.

The Hirsch family of Halberstadt have given 200,000 marks towards the Agudath-Yisroel fund for the establishment of a colony in Palestine.

Gideon Lodge of Odd Fellows at Rochester, N. Y., is to equip a gymnasium for the orphans at the Jewish Children's Home in that city.

The Zion Congregation of Holyoke, Mass., has purchased the property on which its synagogue is now located. The ground was heretofore leased.

Plans for a nurses' building for the National Jewish Hospital at Denver, Col., are being completed, and ground will probably be broken this month.

A reform congregation has recently been instituted at Battle Creek, Mich., and an effort will soon be made to establish a similar congregation at Flint.

Mr. Hendle, director of the departmental and communal administration at the French Home-Office, has been appointed member of the Council of State.

Rev. Abraham Slutzky has been appointed rabbi by the Congregation B'nai Israel of North Adams, Mass., to succeed Rev. Michael Michelowsky, recently resigned.

The High Commissioner of Palestine has approved of the formation of a special force of gendarmes to consist of Jews, Moslems and Christians of good character.

At a meeting at Haifa the Arabs urged the government to retain the Turkish system of municipal elections, although it practically disfranchised merchants, engineers, doctors and other professionals.

The cornerstone for the new building of Temple Israel at Rockaway Beach, L. I., was laid last Sunday. The various honors were auctioned off and realized over \$2,000.

The City Council of Budapest has removed twenty-three Jewish head teachers from their positions and appointed them as ordinary teachers. One hundred and sixty-four Jewish lady teachers were dismissed a short while ago. The twenty-three former head teachers have held a meeting, at which it was decided to appeal to the Ministry of the Interior against the illegal action of the City Council.

A convention of Indiana State subordinate lodges of the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith will be held at Terre Haute on September 18. This will be the first time the Indiana lodges have ever met jointly.

More than 100 delegates of Jewish Zionist societies in Western Pennsylvania organized a Keren Hayesod Bureau of the Palestine Council in the Zionist Institute, Center avenue, Pittsburgh, Pa., on August 25.

A large number of Jewish refugees have collected outside the Rumanian frontier and are unable to get across. The frontier has lately been very strictly guarded, and the pickets shoot down any one who tries to steal into Rumania.

The Palestine administration is negotiating with the Colonial Office regarding the advisability of abolishing the Palestine censorship which was instituted during the recent riots in Jaffa.

Mr. Harry W. Davis of St. Paul, Minn., has been appointed acting superintendent of the Jewish Orphans' Home of Cleveland, O., to fill the vacancy caused by the recent resignation of L. Edward Lashman.

Exercises marking the laying of the cornerstone of the new Ohave Emunoh Synagogue at 7117 Cedar avenue, Cleveland, O., took place last month. The new synagogue has a seating capacity of one thousand.

A group of members of the Russian Far Eastern Constituent Assembly questioned the government concerning the pogrom agitation in the Far East. The Assembly unanimously condemned the pogrom agitation.

No foreign relief funds will participate in the Minneapolis (Minn.) Community Chest for 1922. Last year the American Jewish Relief Committee received a very substantial contribution from this source.

The University of Berlin has, for the first time, conferred the degree of Doctor of Law on a woman. The lady thus distinguished is a Jewess, Miss Hanna Katz, daughter of Judicial Privy Councillor Dr. Edwin Katz.

On September 20 there will be held dedication exercises, followed by a banquet, in honor of the opening of the Hebrew Teachers' College of Boston. Sessions will begin in October and will continue through June.

Anti-Semitic elements in Posen are doing their utmost to rid the province of all Jews. So serious are their anti-Jewish campaigns that numerous Jewish families are deserting their homes and emigrating to Germany.

Senator Lodge of Massachusetts has recommended to the administration the name of Mr. A. C. Ratschky of Boston as Minister to Turkey. Mr. Ratschky is a noted philanthropist and is president of the United States Trust Co.

The Court of Inquiry, which has been investigating the recent disturbances in Jaffa and elsewhere, completed the examination of the witnesses on July 27. The members of the court have gone to the Carmel, in order to compile their report.

The oldest Jewish resident of Cardiff, Wales, Mr. Solomon W. Joseph, died last month on the anniversary of his 81st birthday. Mr. Joseph had resided in Cardiff for the past 73 years, and was the founder and for many years president of the Windsor Place Congregation. He was also first president of the Hand-in-Hand Society, the first Jewish charitable organization formed in Cardiff.

At the eleventh annual convention of the Associated Young Men and Young Women's Hebrew Associations of New England, held at Hartford, Conn., this week, fifty constituent organizations, with an enrollment of over 20,000, were represented.

Mr. Mayer, professor at the Lycee Louis-le-Grand in Paris, and Captain Emile Gomez-Vaes, president of the Jewish Consistory of Bordeaux (who served brilliantly in the great war), have been appointed chevaliers of the Legion of Honor.

A number of public drinking fountains have recently been installed on the streets of St. Paul, Minn. It is largely due to the efforts of Mrs. P. N. Cardoza, prominent in the ranks of the Council of Jewish Women, that these fountains have been erected.

Under the auspices of Mr. Morris Clark, field agent of the Department of Synagogue and School Extension of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, religious schools have recently been opened in La Crosse and a number of other Wisconsin cities.

A conference of Jewish athletes and representatives of the sports organization "Hamachbi" is at present in progress in Riga. Jewish young men from Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia are participating in the meeting.

The Damascus correspondent of the "Haarez" writes that during the last few months many cases of conversion to Christianity has been traced in Damascus. All efforts on the part of the Chief Rabbi to prevent the activities of the missionaries have been fruitless.

At Grodno the anti-Semites accuse the Jews of having caused the big conflagration in the town. They state that the Jews kept munition stores and high explosives in the town. The Jewish community is suing the local newspaper, the Grodenskoye Echo, for publishing the libel.

The synagogue of the B'ne Jacob congregation, 711-713 Clinton street, Cincinnati, Ohio, which after eighteen years of service was closed some months ago by a split among the members, has been opened and was rededicated Sunday afternoon. Among those who spoke was Mayor Galvin.

The Austrian anti-Semitic newspaper Reichspost, referring to the census which is due to take place in Austria on November 30 next, insists that there shall be a column on the census form for "religion," as otherwise it will be impossible to establish the number of Jews in the country.

Mr. P. G. H. Samuel, son of Sir Herbert Samuel and secretary of the Cambridge branch of the Inter-University Jewish Federation of Great Britain and Ireland, who has arrived in Jerusalem, brought with him 500 books and 1,000 pamphlets as a presentation for the Hebrew University Library.

Acting on suggestion of the Department of Synagogue and School Extension Rabbi Herbert C. Strauss of Congregation Children of Israel, Augusta, Ga., made a trip recently to Waynesboro, Ga., where he organized a religious school. Arrangements were made to hold services at stated intervals.

Through the hospitality of the pastor of the West Jefferson Street Presbyterian Church the West Jefferson Talmud Torah of Los Angeles will hold services in the church edifice, because it has been unable to erect a building in time for the holidays. The "Free Synagogue" plan of seating will be carried out.

The thirst for knowledge on the part of Jewish students is illustrated in the Detroit (Mich.) summer high schools this year, where out of a total attendance of 5,850 there were 3,450 Jewish boys and girls, or 59 per cent. of the total attendance. The Jewish population of Detroit is less than 10 per cent.

M. Spector, a noted Jewish writer, has arrived in New York city. Spector was one of the earliest fiction and romance writers in Yiddish and still is one of the most popular. He has also edited a number of publications. More recently he lived in Odessa. He proposes to remain in this country for some time.

The Zionist Commission reports that all the Chalutzim in Palestine have found occupation; indeed, the supply of work exceeds the number of workers. Only a week ago some 150 workmen were being asked for in the capital itself. The Zionist Commission is setting up Labor Exchanges all over the country.

The will of Alfred Blumenthal of this city, who was killed, together with his wife, in a motor accident in Spain last June, just made public, leaves the greater portion of the estate to a number of charity institutions. The Federation of Jewish Philanthropies and a number of hospitals are the chief beneficiaries.

The Polish Government has officially announced that an inquiry will be made concerning the Jewish complaints of attacks on Jews in trains, and that all persons found guilty of having committed such excesses will be severely punished. In the meantime, nineteen Jews were injured in an attack on Jewish passengers in a train near Lukow.

According to a report of the American Astronomical Society read here last Monday before American and Canadian astronomers gathered at Middletown, Conn., in convention, astronomers are greatly concerned with the Einstein theory, and an effort will be made to test through observations of the next sun eclipses.

Rev. Harry Rickel, formerly with Congregation Beth Kol Yisroel of Cincinnati, Ohio, has accepted a call from Congregation B'nai Jeshurun of Cleveland, and will enter upon his new duties immediately. Cantor Rickel is a pupil of the famous Chazan Minkowsky of Odessa and came to America twelve years ago.

Announcement that Bernard M. Baruch of New York was the donor of the funds which made possible the holding of the Institute of Politics at Williams College has been made by President Harry A. Garfield of the college at Williamstown, Mass. Mr. Baruch's gift will also cover the expense of institute sessions in 1922 and 1923.

The Congregation of Agudas, Israel, one of the largest in the Ridgewood section, has engaged Rabbi Joseph Sarachek as its spiritual leader and he has assumed charge. Rabbi Sarachek is a graduate of Columbia University and the Jewish Theological Seminary, besides being author of a theological treatise on "Jewish Messianic Ideas."

Miss Ella Fleischman, daughter of Rabbi E. Fleischman of Omaha, Neb., has been appointed to the national directing board of the "A. W. O. L." the women's overseas organization which corresponds to the American Legion for the service men. Miss Fleischman, who is connected with the Omaha Bee, has been appointed director of all publicity in the country for the organization, which is nation-wide in its scope.

Gen. Ludendorff's chief of staff, Col. Bauer, has published a book in which he prints a letter of the former Crown Prince attacking the Jews. "Hatred against the Jews is not unwarranted," the Prince is quoted as having written. "A visit to Berlin trade centers shows many Jews fit for service at the front and few on the front. Popular hostility, therefore, is justified. This propaganda also checks Jewish influence and their control of German capital."

According to reports appearing in the Jewish press of Vilna, the government of that city has contributed three million marks for the maintenance of Jewish schools.


An American group of visitors has arrived at Jerusalem to study conditions of housebuilding in Palestine. The visitors were received by His Excellency Sir Herbert Samuel.

Henry A. Guettel, a leading spirit in the Kansas City (Mo.) Jewish community, died on August 18 while motoring through Vermont. Mr. Guettel, who was 54 years of age, headed the largest outfitting concern west of Chicago. He was a trustee of the Federated Jewish Charities and the Jewish Educational Alliance and a devoted patron of music, extending aid quietly to many struggling musicians. His will leaves \$10,000 to Jewish charities.

A number of Arabs from Hebron have petitioned the Director of the Education Department of the Zionist Commission to permit their children to attend the Hebrew School of Hebron. They express the wish that their children should know the three official languages and trust that one of the Jewish teachers of Hebron may be the instructor. They express their gratitude to the Zionist Commission in expectation of the granting of this request.

A delegation of the Agudas Israel, Warsaw, presided over by the Deputy, Rabbi Perlmutter, recently visited the Polish Minister for Home Affairs, Mr. Raczkiwicz, for the purpose of obtaining his intervention so that the renewed excesses against Jews in Poland may cease. As a result of this visit a conference between the Minister for Home Affairs and the Minister for War was held, and steps were taken to prevent further excesses.

Rabbi S. M. Neches has assumed charge of the pulpit of Beth Israel Congregation, Los Angeles, Cal. Rabbi Neches is a native of Palestine and came to America in 1911 and has been rabbi at Columbus most of the time he has been here. In 1918 he was appointed by the Governor of Ohio as a member of the Ohio State Board of Americanization and the same year was appointed by the Mayor of Columbus as a member of the City Beautifying Commission.



BROOKLYN NOTES.

Large Synagogue of Brooklyn Jewish Center to Be Completed for the Holidays

The continued progress made in erecting the Brooklyn Jewish Center Building on Eastern Parkway and Brooklyn avenue will make it possible to hold services in its main synagogue during the coming Jewish High Holidays, according to a statement issued at the office of that organization. The synagogue occupies a little over half of the entire second floor of the building, accommodating 1,750 people, thus making it one of the largest places of worship in the country. Heretofore services have been conducted in the place designated as the gymnasium, in this way giving the contractors an opportunity to continue work in the other parts of the building.

The pulpit will be occupied by the Rev. Dr. Israel Herbert Levinthal, rabbi of the center, who will speak at all the services. The Rev. Samuel Kantor, recently of Boston, Mass., will officiate as cantor and he will be assisted by a large choir under the leadership of Mr. E. Shnipelisky.

Bureau of Jewish Social Research Organizes Department of Information and Statistics

Beginning September 1 the Bureau of Jewish Social Research will have a Department of Information and Statistics under the active charge of Dr. Harry S. Linfield. This department is being organized with the generous co-operation of the American Jewish Committee.

The purposes of the department will be to maintain a highly specialized library upon Jewish matters; to keep in touch with current Jewish affairs through the medium of the Jewish and general press and through a development of a system of foreign correspondents; to make readily available to individuals and institutions interested any such information; to issue bulletins and current news digests whenever the department collects whatever is obviously original and serviceable information; to collect statistical and other informational material for the American Jewish Year Book, as well as to help the Bureau of Jewish Social Research generally in collecting material of a general Jewish sociological nature. Organizations and individuals interested are urged to use to the fullest extent the services of this department.

Dr. Harry S. Linfield is a fellow of Dropsie College, Philadelphia. He has been active in writing for the Jewish Publication Society and has the degree of Ph.D. from the University of Chicago.

NONE SO BLIND

Dear Children:

There is an old saying, "There are none so blind as those who will not see." It is very applicable to those who sympathized with Korach and his followers. Here they saw the hand of the Almighty in the terrible, supernatural punishment meted out to those who rebelled against Moses. And notwithstanding this appalling manifestation, they dared to murmur against Moses and Aaron, saying, "It is you who have caused the people of the Lord to die." And not content with grumbling alone, they actually assembled against Moses and against Aaron. This aroused the fury of the Lord to the point of wishing to destroy the entire congregation. And the Lord spoke unto Moses saying, "Remove yourselves from the midst of this congregation that I may consume them in a moment." And Moses said unto Aaron, "Take the censer and put therein fire from off the altar and put on incense and carry it quickly unto the congregation, and make an atonement for them, for the wrath is gone forth from the Lord; the plague hath begun." Rashi says, quoting the Talmud, treatise of Sabbath, "This secret the angel of death revealed to Moses when the latter went up to heaven. That the offering or incense prevents the continuance of a plague." And Aaron took as Moses had commanded. And he stood between the dead and the living. He seized the angel and forced him to halt. "Let me accomplish the mission upon which I was sent," the angel protested. "Moses commanded me to prevent you," said Aaron. "I am the messenger of the Omnipresent and you are the messenger of Moses," the angel retorted. "Moses says nothing which is not inspired by the Almighty," answered Aaron, "and if you do not believe me," he added, "there is the Holy One, blessed be He, and Moses at the door of the tabernacle of the congregation, come with me and inquire." That is meant when it is said, "And Aaron returned unto Moses" (Mechilta). There is also another reason for incense being used here to stop the plague because Israel condemned and decried the use of incense, saying, "There is deadly poison in it, through that Nodab and Abehu died, through that two hundred and fifty men were burned." Said the Holy One, blessed be He, "You will see that it prevents the plague, and that it is the sin that kills." And the Lord spoke unto Moses saying, "Speak unto the children of Israel and take from them one staff each for a family division. . . . And the name of Aaron shalt then write upon the staff of Levi, for there shall be one staff for the head of their family division. Although I have divided them into two families the priestly family by itself and the levitical family by itself, nevertheless they are of the one tribe." And Moses spoke unto the children of Israel and all their princes gave him each a staff, one for every prince, according to their family divisions, twelve staves, and the staff of Aaron was among their slaves. He placed it in the middle in order that they shall not say, "Because he placed it at the side of the Schechivah (Divine Presence), therefore, it budded. And it came to pass on the morrow, that as Moses went into the tabernacle of the testimony, behold the staff of Aaron for the house of Levi had budded; and it brought forth buds and produced blossoms, and yielded ripe almonds. Why almonds? Because this is the one fruit that buds quicker than all other fruit, likewise he who lays false claims to the priesthood, his punishment comes speedily, just as we find in the case of Uzzrahu, "the leprosy even broke out upon his forehead" (II Chronicles 27). And the Lord said unto Moses, "Carry back the staff of Aaron before the testimony, to be kept as a token. That will serve to remind them that I have chosen Aaron the priest, and they shall not murmur any more against the priesthood." And the children of Israel said unto Moses thus, "Behold, we perish, we are lost, we are all lost. Every one that cometh near at all unto the tabernacle of the Lord must die; shall we totally perish? We cannot exercise so much care; we are permitted to enter into the court of the tent of the congregation, and one who will approach closer than his companions and enter into the tent of the congregation will die, shall we totally perish. Perhaps we are abandoned to death!" And the Lord said unto Aaron, he said unto Moses that he shall say unto Aaron, to instruct him for the welfare of Israel,

that they shall not enter the sanctuary. Thou and thy sons and thy father's houses with thee (these are the sons of Kehath, the father of Amram) shall bear the iniquity of the sanctuary. Upon you I will let fall the punishment of the strangers who will sin in meddling with the holy things which are placed in your charge, viz., the tent, the ark, the table and the holy vessels. You shall sit and take care that no stranger enters, and thou and thy sons with thee shall bear the iniquity of your priesthood which is not given over to the Levites, and you shall warn the erring Levites that they shall not encroach upon your services. And, also, thy brethren, the sons of Gershon and Merari, bring them near with thee that they may be joined with thee, to warn, also, the strangers not to get near them. And they shall minister unto thee, in guarding the gates, and in appointing of their number as treasurers and superintendents. "And a stranger shall not come nigh unto you. You, I warn concerning this. That there be not any more wrath, as there was, as it is said for the wrath is gone forth" (Numbers 17). And I, behold, I have taken your brethren the Levites from the midst of the children of Israel unto you are they given, think you, for your individual and ordinary service. No! for it is said, "As a gift for the Lord, to serve as treasurer and superintendent, as a service of gift do I give you your priesthood, your service is my gift to you."

Differences Between Arabs and Jews Can Be Adjusted, Palestine High Commissioner Believes

London (Jewish Press Association).—In the course of a report submitted to the British Government by Sir Herbert Samuel, the Palestine High Commissioner expresses the belief that due consideration given to the claims of the Jews and the rights of the Arabs will make possible an adjustment between the two races. He accounts for the present restlessness of the Arabs by propaganda on the part of extremists and translations of Zionist addresses into Arabic.

The High Commissioner praises the work of the Jewish colonists and accounts for the suspension of immigration by the fact that during the past year a greater number of immigrants came in than the country could momentarily accommodate. Sir Herbert declares that, despite the differences between the American and European Zionists, much land has been purchased and much more would have been done for the development of the country if the Palestine mandate would have been officially confirmed. Of the 700,000 inhabitants in Palestine 76,000 are Jews.

New England Y. M. H. A. to Help Americanize Immigrant Jews

Hartford, Conn. (Jewish Press Association).—The convention of New England Y. M. H. A. and Y. W. H. A. being held in this city adopted a resolution binding it to help in the work of Americanizing immigrant Jews which will be carried on throughout the country under the auspices of the Jewish welfare work. The resolution was adopted after Mr. Harry L. Glucksman, executive head of the Y. W. H. A., had fully explained the work which the Welfare Board is planning.

Samuel's Report Commented On

London (Jewish Press Association).—The greater number of local daily publications today comment on the report of Sir Herbert Samuel, covering his first year as High Commissioner for Palestine. The "Daily News" and the "Morning Post" appear satisfied with his report, while other publications are critical and contend that the expense of maintaining Palestine is too great.

SOME INTERESTING LOCAL OBSERVATIONS

The Celebration of the "Zeit"; the Arbeiter-Ring and the Russian Relief; Cantors Again to the Fore

The New York "Zeit," the official daily of the Poalei-Zion party, celebrated this week the completion of its first year's existence. A good deal was said about this event in the columns of the "Zeit," but not in any other publication. Not a word about it appeared in any of the other New York Yiddish dailies.

And yet the event is not without much significance, and none are better aware of it than the contemporaries of the "Zeit." A year ago the greater number of those in the camps of the other publications made sport of the new venture. Others pitied those about to waste good effort and energy. All agreed in their prophecy that the new paper would not survive more than a few weeks, at most a couple of months, conditions making the existence of an additional Yiddish daily in this city utterly impossible.

Conditions, it is true, were anything but favorable. To issue a Jewish daily in New York involves an expenditure of tens of thousands of dollars weekly. Advertisements are not readily given to a new publication, particularly in a period when business depression makes it hard for the old publications to obtain any worthwhile advertising. A circulation is also not a matter of easy acquirement. The average reader, accustomed to his organ with its peculiarities, does not willingly change it for another. With mass immigration cut off, no new readers are available. Nor were the resources of those who undertook the issue of the new publication much of a factor. The Poalei-Zion is a small, poor party of laborites who struggled hard to maintain the appearance of a weekly publication. How could they be expected to continue issuing a daily under such adverse conditions?

And yet they succeeded; of course, not without a hard struggle. And having overcome the enormous difficulties of the first year, in the face of great burdens and undue expenditures, they are assured of existence. Those factors that helped to overcome the worst period are still with them.

Primarily the spirit of idealism with which the youth of the Poalei-Zion is imbued, made possible their success. These workers stopped at no personal sacrifice in order to help the management tide over the critical period. And further, the "Zeit" has really won a large following among the more intelligent Jewish classes.

The new publication really brought out it much that was new. It made no effort to flirt with the feminine sex, nor did it cheapen its columns with that sundry material which excites rather than enlightens or entertains. At the same time, its news and editorial policy was characterized by a firm tone and an unmistakable attitude of sincerity and honesty. Readers of the "Zeit" may frequently have disagreed with its opinions, but they respected these none the less.

The Arbeiter Ring (Workmen's Circle) had a conference over the question of Russian relief, and by a small majority decided that whatever funds this "order" will collect should be sent to the general Russian relief and not specifically for Jewish relief.

Three hundred and eighty-six delegates, representing only 177 branches, chiefly from and around New York, participated in the conference, and of those present only two-thirds voted, the majority being 153 against 119.

Why did the remainder refuse to vote? And why did not this "order," which proclaims its democracy so loudly, leave the whole question to a referendum?

Because this order with its 60,000 Jewish members has a great number of simple, good and devoted Jews, but its leaders are mainly old Socialist politicians, and they know all the tricks that are necessary to effect their decisions irrespective of the wishes of the majority.

Apparently, however, these politicians realized that their decision on this question of relief would create a storm among the large mass of the Arbeiter Ring members, and so they later announced that each branch can decide for itself how the money it will collect is to be disposed of.

With this step the leaders hope to pacify the great majority of their members, and it will be interesting to observe the further developments over this question in this great Jewish labor order.

The New Year holidays are approaching and there is considerable excitement in the cantor market. Those who have voices to sing, shout or lament are seeking and finding employment as the public readers of some Jewish congregation, where they will pray for a healthy and prosperous new year in behalf of Jewry at large.

The matter is not as simple as it sounds. Among the many "holiday cantors" there are some that are not only unfit to be public readers, but that we would much rather not lay claim to. Nor are those engaging them in behalf of congregations always the right men, with the result that scandals are brought to light which should never occur.

Nor is all well with the legitimate cantors, those regularly employed with synagogues. The relations between the cantor and his congregation and the cantor and the rabbi are often of an un-

certain nature, and occasionally of an unhappy one. The result is much confusion, quarreling, intrigues and scandals.

The condition making this possible should be put an end to. We have in this country an organization of cantors, the greatest Jewish cantors in the world are at present in America. It is essential and surely possible that this important branch of Jewish artistic and religious life should find its appropriate place in the community.

Jewish Chautauqua Society's Work in Summer Schools

The twelfth annual report of the work of the Jewish Chautauqua Society in the summer schools of the universities has been completed and the need and value of this very important activity is evidenced by the results of 1921. Fifty-four lectures were given in nineteen universities. The audiences at the lectures were most enthusiastic ones, composed solely of teachers and ministers.

Many hearing them would perhaps for the first time learn something of the real spirit of Judaism as well as gain exact information as to its tenets."

It is the purpose of the society further to extend this vital and much needed propaganda to present the truth about Judaism to thousands of teachers, who in turn impart it to hundreds of thousands of pupils. Such knowledge is an elemental factor in advocating a broader tolerance and fuller comprehension of facts about Jews and Judaism.


Jewish Refugees to Be Expelled from Galicia

Rev. Theodore Guinzburg, who has served the Central Synagogue faithfully and well as its cantor for almost forty-one years, has been made *chazan emeritus* at his full salary. May he spend the evening of his days in happy contentment.

The authorities of the New York Public Library have discovered that among their child readers those of Jewish affiliations are most omnivorous and ambitious. This fact, late in lodging in this particular quarry perhaps, was well known and appreciated by the community a long time.

When Chief Rabbi Hertz found it was impossible for him to remain in this city over the last Sunday of August the alumni association of the Jewish Theological Seminary postponed its annual meeting from that date to some time next winter. After all, the dull summer season is hardly a propitious time at which to stage the holding of an annual meeting of alumni of a Jewish theological seminary, even if it is dignified by the high-sounding name of rabbinical assembly. Of course, from the point of view of an opportunity to see and hear the chief rabbi, we regret the postponement.

Feisal has at last become the king, not of Palestine or of Arabia *Felix*, as he originally thought, but of Irak in Mesopotamia. And he reached his lofty eminence with the consent, even the expressed approval, of Great Britain. So that it is plain to see that King Feisal will not be a greater or more powerful potentate in his new dignity than he was when only the Emir Feisal. But he is satisfied with the result, and so must everyone else be. If King Feisal, now that he is king, will leave Palestine alone to work out its own destiny, and will call off his Arabs from their marauding expeditions, those deeply interested in the Holy Land will be happy that he is happy.

Anent the recent twenty-fifth anniversary celebration of his assuming control of the fortunes of *The New York Times* Adolph S. Ochs is made the motive of a song of praise by *The American Israelite*. His life is rationalized as fresh proof positive that America is still, in Emerson's immortal praise, but another name for opportunity. Our Cincinnati contemporary waxes joyous over Adolph S. Ochs, the Jew. We share this gratification. He has never been ashamed to stand up for his birthright, and has thereby increased the number of the friends—and the enemies—of his publication. In this respect, too, he represents a welcome departure from the course of other Jews at the head of great and influential journals in other lands; we know of not one of these at the moment save Rudolph Mosse, who did not seek baptism for the sake of himself or of his progeny.

Fresh evidence of the appalling conditions under which the Jews of Eastern Europe groan at the present time is not needed to assure American Jewry that the economic and political fate of our brethren-in-faith in that part of the world is wretched in the extreme. The economic side of their plight is what cries to heaven for amendment, for the political situation affecting them, unfair and merciless as it is, could be worked out eventually were their material condition improved. As Eastern European Jewry stands it is an empty shell, crushingly and blightingly visited by the instruments of human wrath. The cruel feature of this visitation is that the victims were innocent and unoffending. But the bestial in man, which war brings out, draws no distinction between the malefactor and the pure creature of circumstances. All this is written here by way of introducing into the hearts and consciences of our readers that feeling of responsiveness which may presently find adequate, and we hope more than substantial, expression when the Jewish war relief agencies approach them with their new appeal.

AMERICANISM WRIT LARGE

In *The Century Magazine* for this month Herbert Adams Gibbons, who has in the last few years dealt frequently with aspects of the Jewish question for our prominent monthly periodicals, deals with Zionism in its latest phases, especially as it reacts on the patriotic sentiments of the American Jew. It is thus apparent that the example supplied by Henry Morgenthau in his notorious *World's Work* paper has already borne evil fruit, and that the recent internecine strife within the ranks of American Zionists, instead of remaining what it was and is, an internal matter, has resulted in bringing to the fore once more the subject of Zionism itself and the good citizenship of the Jews in the United States.

This circumstance may be profoundly deplored, and what is even more deplorable is that the Union of American Hebrew Congregations is writ large, as it were, over every line of Mr. Gibbons' paper. This writer, then, draws a distinction between what he calls the three hundred thousand of "original" American Jews, whose spiritual life may be controlled by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, and the three million of their co-religionists who have migrated hither since the Russian persecutions of the early 'eighties. The latter, by Mr. Gibbons' testimony, are those to whom Zionism appeals, and in his view it appeals to them only because they are not real patriots in the American sense. They are only Jews!

Mr. Gibbons has forgotten, or does not know, the record of American Jews, largely of Russian birth or immediate extraction, during the Great War. We need, as a matter of course, not trouble to refute so ridiculous an "argument" as Mr. Gibbons advances: for the American Jew it is either the ghetto or the melting pot! Zionism, for which in this connection we hold no brief, represents neither the one extreme nor the other. Zionism is not a matter which relates to Jewish patriotism in this country.

Mr. Gibbons has supplied the material for his quiver at the arsenal of Henry Morgenthau and the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. Our remarks are not intended to dignify his diatribe, but only to point out how great a disservice some of our prominent "leaders" thus render their community. Incidentally, we are surprised to find *The Century* extending the hospitality of its pages to such balderdash as is contributed by Mr. Gibbons thereto.

In his final lecture before the institute of politics at Williams College, Signor Tommaso Tittoni, president of the Italian Senate, roundly deprecated the insertion of restrictive measures in the laws governing the migrations of peoples from one country to another. Specifically he expressed his disapproval on natural and economic grounds of the present one-sided inhibitions in the American statute concerning immigration against migrations from Italy to this country. The wandering of peoples is controlled by natural forces and economic laws, not by the fulminations of self-sufficient legislators at Washington. Perhaps the United States authorities will pay more than formal heed to the warning note voiced by Signor Tittoni, a statesman of worth and distinction, before it is too late. Only by a free and untrammelled movement of peoples may labor and production be maintained at their normal volume.

A. J. Stybl, of Warsaw, who employs his millions to extend Hebrew literature, is still a very young man. He is still much less than forty years of age. He was always interested in the development of Hebrew, which, as a native of Poland, he speaks fluently, but the Great War made it possible for him ardently to devote himself to his hobby. For, operating in leather, the outbreak of hostilities in 1914 enabled him to become in a comparatively brief time the acknowledged "leather king" of the former Russian Poland. And the millions which thus flowed into his coffers he has employed wisely and well. He has not only stimulated the writing of Hebrew, but has provided an appropriate outlet for writers in the sacred tongue to gain a public. It is pleasant to know that the Stybl publishing activities cover not only Poland and part of Soviet Russia, but our own country as well.

In a review of the extent of the influence on British life of Houston Stewart Chamberlain *The Jewish Guardian* remarks: "Germany was the real home of anti-Semitism; the most notorious advocates of Prussian militarism were among the bitterest assailants of the Jews." This expression of opinion is supported by the facts of the case. Chamberlain, an expatriated Englishman, had seized upon the literary fashion of Germany and appropriated them to his own use. He advocated militarism, fervently believed in the divine right of the Hohenzollerns and in the racial purity of the Teutons, and thus easily made anti-Semitism part of his *credo*. His distortions and perversions, bound up within the covers of portly German tomes and provided with much of the pseudo-scientific apparatus beloved of the Fatherland, were even translated into other languages and eventually reached England through these means. As we know full well, England has been disfigured by the possession of a British school of anti-Semitic writers these past fifteen years, the backwash of whose comings and goings has produced the abject creatures who execute Ford's anti-Semitic biddings. We have taken the pains to set forth here the particulars of this relation, in order to show whence the modern anti-Semite in England and America derives. His "god" is Houston Stewart Chamberlain, who was "made in Germany."

TREES NEAR THE ALTAR

"Thou shalt not plant thee a grove of any trees near unto the altar of the Lord thy God, which thou shalt make thee." (Deut. xvi, 21.) "When thou shalt besiege a city . . . thou shalt not destroy the trees thereof by forcing an axe against them." (Ibid., xx, 19.)

THE temptation is obvious to compare these two texts with one another—the one taken from the beginning the other from the end of this week's scriptural lesson. In the latter the spirit of Judaism, prompted by its pacific temper, evidences its tender regard for natural objects. The terrible waste of war should be confined to the unavoidable and inevitable. But trees are too sacred, too beautiful, instinct with too much of the vast life of God in the universe, to become victims of the ruthless battleaxe. Their solemnly waving foliage, their bountifully tendered gifts of ripe fruit, the delight they offer to the weary passer-by, are far too precious to be ill-used by the wanton hand of the vandals of war. This is one side of the picture. The other side is presented by the first text, which contains the severe condemnation of planting trees near the altar of God. These objects of beauty and use, of delight and inspiration, were taboo in God's sanctuary. Bald and bare of all natural ornament was the altar of the true God to stand, an upheaved mass of rude clay or unhewn stone, as a thing forsaken, unconsidered, unloved.

One might assume that there can be no finer embellishment for the divine altar than a tree, or a cluster of trees, a grove of cool shades and swaying boughs, where sunbeams are in constant play with dancing shadows, dappling the ground and adding a touch of mystery to the scene. Of all natural objects trees seem to be most alive, with an individuality all their own. They seem to carry with them a suggestion of old, of ancientness, as if they had been present at the very beginning of the creation, and knew all its secrets, and were telling each other all they had heard and seen when creation's first dream was woven into richly-colored reality. Think of the inspiration a worshipper at the altar might have derived from the living spirit whispering in these trees, speaking of the great Dreamer of the Universe, whose fancies and visions and deathless thoughts clothed themselves in the visible garb of the world's surpassing fairness, whose writing was traceable in the veinlets of every leaf and in the annual rings behind the age-scarred barks, and whose very yearning and unexpressed desire lay like a tender morning-mist over all growing things that cover the brown earth as with a bridal garment! Coming as he does, with heart touched into love, with soul open to receive the messages and oracles of the Infinite, waiting to hear and see and know something of the secrets of His Father in Heaven, what vast suggestions of Eternity might such a worshipper have received from the voices that sighed and sighed between the gently undulating branches of the trees planted near the altar of God!

And this evident aid of inspiration and aspiration, this undoubted source of revelation, these trees that published the joy and the beauty and the power and the hope of God's world, the spirit of Judaism that took such tender care of them, that spoke of them elsewhere with such love and admiration, severely banished from the sanctuary, where men brought their helpless gifts to the merciful Father! To think that this same Jewish Genius placed the beginnings of the human story in a garden, an Eden planted by God Himself, beneath whose waving tops man and woman were to live an ideally happy life! Is it because Adam and Eve sinned through trees that God could not bear their sight near His consecrated altar where His presence dwelt?

It will not do to say that the Jewish Genius does not appreciate beauty, particularly with respect to natural objects. There is hardly a literature in the world so filled with lyric outpourings on the subject of the grandeur and matchless perfection of the created world as the Hebrew Scriptures. It will not do, either, to set up an artificial opposition between Beauty and Holiness. It is an exaggeration to say that the Greek spirit expressed itself through a worship of beauty and the Jewish spirit through a worship of goodness. There is Holiness in the Greek writings too, and the Jewish writings are not without rhapsodies on the beautiful. Apart from this historic consideration, let us not forget that both beauty and goodness went forth from the same creative will and vision: they must be one, if God is One. Beauty is so surpassingly beautiful that it must be holy; and holiness is so exceedingly good that it must be handsome with the handsomeness of angels. And yet, beauty was severely banished from the place of holiness; beauty in its most appealing form: the green beauty that sprouts from the brown earth, when the creative forces hidden in the deep places of the world gather to realise their own dream of springtime hope and summer fulfilment!

And the reason was this: The essential difference between Beauty and Holiness is that Holiness can never lead away from itself, while Beauty may lead away from itself; and when Beauty becomes unbeautiful it ceases to be holy too. The groves of the pagan worshippers amply proved this. But the Jewish spirit recognises Beauty. It knows that Beauty is the Eternal Soul of the World making for Delight and also for Righteousness. Only it fears lest by men Delight may be cut off from Righteousness. It loves and always loved Beauty so much that it must have been a severe self-imposed limitation, this banishing of natural beauty from the sanctuary; but it chose this course because of the frailty of men. Some day men will be so purified of the passions and lusts of their grosser nature that there will loom up no danger of separation between Beauty and Holiness. On that day, the best there was in the visions of Hellas and the dreams of Judea will combine to make this world a better place. On that day the trees will be replanted near the altar of the God of Israel. JOEL BLAU.

PERSONALITIES

DOWN Twenty-third street, amid the whirl and swirl of the five-o'clock exodus from the factories and offices, we recently felt a tug at our elbow.

"Busy?" a gentle voice spoke.

It was Louis Keila. One other of the many, so many, young people who batter years of their life against the granite walls of the world's metropolis in an effort to win for themselves the laurels that they feel belong to them.

"Do you know," the gentle voice continued some blocks farther up, "I have had so many interesting experiences in my life that I think I would be able to write quite good stories about them. Do you think I could find a market for them?"

What can one say when one is confronted by a sculptor whom one knows is as near a genius as an everyday critical faculty can judge, who attempts to resort to a writing as means of making both ends meet? Next to presenting him with an elaborate commission we thought the best thing would be to give him our notice in these columns. Who knows but that some of you wealthy readers may desire a beautiful piece of statuary or a portrait to grace your libraries and living-rooms?

Louis Keila was born in Cherkass, Ukraina, about thirty-five years ago. He came to this country at the age of seven and passed through the usual uneventful youth of an East Side boy. At twelve he left public school and started to earn his own living. A preoccupation and thoughts on things artistic prevented him from mastering a commercial occupation. So he sold newspapers and ran errands.

When the artistic thoughts grew more pronounced he began to attend the art classes at the Cooper Union Institute in the evenings. After this preliminary study he joined the National Academy, where he won a medal and other honors.

Graduating from the academy he set to work in a studio on the East Side. There seems to be in this country a peculiar prejudice against Jewish artists, and this prejudice has been perhaps more keenly felt by Keila because of his un-Jewish appearance. People take it for granted that he is a Gentile and associate with him as one. When it is discovered that he is a Jew the knowledge comes in the nature of a shock.

Keila relates that he was commissioned at one time to make a portrait of a member of a rich family in New York. In response to polite questioning the sculptor said, truthfully enough, that he was an Ukrainian. When the portrait was finished it pleased the family so well that a dinner was arranged for the especial purpose of having Keila meet some influential people.

At this gathering a discussion arose regarding Jewish artists, and when the remarks assumed a bitter tone Keila went to the defense of the maligned artists. This occasioned the point-blank query of whether Keila was a Jew. When he answered in the affirmative the cordiality of the guests went down to zero and the influential guests remained unimportant as far as the artist was concerned.

Keila's reminiscences included a few such episodes, but he went on steadily with his work and acquired a marvellous faculty for portraiture.

There is the portraiture that models faithfully the likeness of a subject and there is the portraiture that mod-

els the character of the sitter. Keila's art is of the latter class. To that he has felt that portraiture alone is not the truest of arts, and he began to interpret his subjects atmospherically. To the preciseness of features he instills into the clay or stone the man's character, habits, thoughts, as a background. As one could perhaps humorously observe, into the sculpture of a Yiddish writer Keila would weave in the background of coffee and cake.

Of the notables that Keila has portrayed President Harding, Arthur Brisbane, the famous editor of the Hearst newspapers, and Caruso stand out predominantly. We have not seen these sculptures, but we have seen the bust of Frueh, the cartoonist of the *World*, and we have seen sculptures of a dock laborer and of the sculptor's grandmother. These three pieces alone are enough to establish the reputation of an artist.

Frueh has an unusual strain of humor. If you have ever looked at his cartoons with more than passing attention you will notice the theme of grotesque satire that runs through all his work. It is a keen, thin, cunning sort of grotesqueness, and these qualities are sharply stamped on Keila's portrait. The eyelids are narrowed to small slits through which eyes twinkle slyly, almost leeringly; the lips curled up in a sardonic grin, the broad nose can be almost seen quivering at the nostrils with half-suppressed laughter. Here is a portrait that one can always look upon without wearying, for always there sparkles from it the living personality of the subject.

Equal to the Frueh work is the portrait of a stevedore. Keila went down to the docks and picked out an individual with unshaven face, towseled hair, a rough corduroy suit covering a hulky but wiry body, and large feet encased in muddy army boots. Keila did not bother with anything but the face. But looking at this modeled head one can readily see the body. It is a face that expresses intelligence long since blunted and hardened; it is a face of the primitive basis of the workman—a man who does not give a brass button for anything about him except that which concerns his own personal needs. A coarse face, yet a face to which all the humane sympathy of the beholder goes out.

Working in a neighborhood where much is sham and hollow, Keila fashioned his images in a sincere loyalty to ideals. This man with a peculiar reserve and disinclination for world-chatter and temperamental froth bore just one thought in mind—how to be the most honest to art as he saw it.

Keila has had his successes, but his unassuming character has not played his opportunities to the best advantage. And so now the sculptor is thinking of an auxiliary profession. But luckily—only thinking.

About two years ago there came to New York a group of musicians calling themselves the Zimro Ensemble, whose purpose was to introduce to Americans—Jews and non-Jews—Jewish music. The proceeds of their tour, which began in Russia, was to go towards the establishment of a conservatory in Palestine.

We remember their initial bow to New Yorkers. It was made at the Waldorf Hotel, where, through the kindness of Mrs. Peter J. Schweitzer, the Myrtle room was placed at their disposal, as well as Mrs. Schweitzer's mailing list. A select audience greet-

ed them, and prospects looked bright, for they revealed themselves to be really accomplished and sincere artists.

Today the moving spirit of the little organization, Cherniavsky, the cellist, is leading a quartet in incidental music at the Yiddish Art Theatre.

There is nothing unethical, musically speaking, in Mr. Cherniavsky playing at this Yiddish playhouse. On the contrary, good Jewish music in a Jewish theatre is most commendable. But the rather sorrowful fact is that the Zimro Ensemble should have been forced to wander from its path.

And yet there was really no other result possible for their enterprise. The Zimro, fine players as they are and attractive as the music they play is, could not hope that programs made up exclusively of Jewish music could sustain the interest of American music lovers. Jewish music as one group in an evening's program is very fine and interesting to most non-Jews. But only Jewish music cannot hope to attract non-Jewish shekels. And, alas! there were not enough of the Jewish shekels to go around.

There is one man in New York to our knowledge to whom the ultimate aim of the Zimro is dear. That is Mr. S. A. Glushanok of the North American Bank, who came to New York just before the outbreak of the Russian revolution.

The idea of a Jewish conservatory is so near to his heart that he is almost persuaded to establish one right here in New York. He longs for a centre where Jewish talent can develop along Jewish feeling and temperament.

If Mr. Glushanok could only exchange places with Otto H. Kahn, what a patron Jewish artists would have!

Readers who are acquainted with Yiddish letters will surely be glad to know that "Moishe Nadir," the Yiddish writer, is doing well on a farm. There is no sarcasm intended in this remark, appropriate as that may seem to be. "Moishe Nadir" was a sick man when he left town a couple of years ago and his well-being is due to the bracing country air. And possibly, too, to his absence from the Yiddish theatre.

There is one critic to whom "Moishe Nadir" can be compared: George Jean Nathan, co-editor of the *Smart Set* and one of the most cordially disliked writers on the theatre that ever entered a playhouse on a pass. On second thoughts this perhaps is a wrong statement. Mr. Nathan, we believe, no longer requests press tickets, bearing in mind his various relations with theatre managers.

"Moishe Nadir," when he was on the staff of the Yiddish humorous weekly, *Der Kundes*, was generally refused admission to the Jewish theatres, an action on the managers' part which caused bitter controversies in the Yiddish press. The cause for this writer's unpopularity, as in the case of Mr. Nathan, was his uncompromising attitude toward the current productions of the Yiddish stage and his biting sarcasm. Wit sparkled in his lines with great brilliancy, but it was a wit that mostly played havoc with some one.

Later "Moishe Nadir," whose real name is Isaac Rice, became a playwright and once more showed that the professor cannot be a performer. His plays were clever and witty, but the people still bought their bulk of tickets for the type of plays which he "roasted."

While on the subject of theatre critics it may be of interest to our readers to know that the real name of Alan Dale, the very noted critic of the *New York American*, is Alfred Cohen, and that he is now reaching the state of "Dean of American Stage Criticism."

Incidentally it may be remarked that Alan Dale can join the fraternity of George Jean Nathan and Moishe Nadir in more senses than one.

He also carries the distinction of theatrical ejection through a caustic pen. Or is it typewriter?

Edwin Franko Goldman, conductor of the New York Military Band, has just finished his fourth season of concerts on the Green, Columbia University.

Thousands of citizens attend these free concerts at every performance and their popularity is really tremendous, showing what a great need free open-air concerts of a high standard are in a large city.

The man responsible for these concerts is, of course, Mr. Goldman. Few people know the energy, diplomacy, worry and hard labor which Mr. Goldman went through before he gave his first concert at Columbia. But Mr. Goldman would hardly have been as successful as he was had it not been for a few princely music lovers who stood behind Mr. Goldman with check books. One of these is Mr. Philip Berolzheimer, the City Chamberlain, and in private life one

of the owners of the Eagle Pencil Company.

Mr. Berolzheimer has spent a well-sized fortune on free music in New York. Not only has he helped to finance Mr. Goldman's concerts. As chairman of the Park Department he has jurisdiction over the park band concerts and the appropriations made for music by the city fathers do not at all satisfy Mr. Berolzheimer. He knows the uselessness of attempting to convert our Aldermen to the necessity of spending more money on the arts for the benefit of New York citizenry. So he digs into his own pockets each year and provides probably half as many concerts as those paid for by the city. Yet no one who is not intimate with the details of New York park music knows about Mr. Berolzheimer's generosity. The city does not feel so proud of the fact that a private citizen should pay for a large proportion of its public concerts as to announce it openly and Mr. Berolzheimer is fully content just to know that more concerts are enjoyed by the people.

Mr. Berolzheimer is also a performer on the organ and has a magnificent instrument installed in his home, and his fondness for this instrument has led him to establish free scholarships for talented students.

In every way Mr. Berolzheimer is a twentieth century version of those distinguished art patrons who in generations back made possible the creation of so many of the world's artistic masterpieces.



Nineteen Jewish Pogrom Orphans Received at Hias Home

Upon the SS. Lithuania, which arrived in New York on Thursday, September 1, there came nineteen Jewish orphan children saved from the pogrom ridden districts in Eastern Europe and who were brought to America through the instrumentality of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America (HIAS) and the Joint Distribution Committee. On Friday the children were discharged to Hias and brought to Hias Home at 425-437 Lafayette street, New York.

The children range in age from six to sixteen. Many of them are full orphans, coming to near relatives; others have fathers here. The children, boys and girls, waving American flags, were delighted to set foot on American soil, knowing that at last they had no longer to fear pogroms and feeling that at last they were secure. Some of them are destined to Philadelphia, Pa.; Lynn, Mass.; Chicago, Ill., and Sioux City, Ia. Among the little ones is a little Jewish girl, six years old, who, too, was rescued by the Jewish agencies. They were accompanied on the journey by Miss Rebecca Sulzer.

The arrangements for the reception of the children were under the personal direction of Mr. Jacob R. Fain, general manager of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America and a group of the society's workers headed by Mrs. Estelle Franklin of the Social Service Department, met them at the pier.

Saturday morning a special service was held in the synagogue at the Hias Home, where the children recited the "Gomel" prayer and the Kaddish. They will remain in Hias Home until they are reunited with their relatives.

Yom Kippur Appeal for Jewish Relief

The American Jewish Relief Committee has sent to the congregations of the United States a request that the rabbis devote their sermons on Yom Kippur to the problems of the Jews in Europe, and that funds be contributed on that day to help carry on the important work of putting our unfortunate coreligionists upon their feet. The letter, signed by Felix M. Warburg, says, in part:

"They still need our help. They want to earn their daily bread, become again the self-supporting and self-respecting men and women they once were. They have no tools, materials, workshops; they must have medical aid against epidemics, the war orphans must be cared for, the thousands of wandering refugees must be brought back to their dear ones. Without our help they cannot do this."

The American Jewish Relief Committee has prepared special literature for Yom Kippur and will gladly supply every congregation. Requests for literature, pledge cards, etc., should be sent at once to the American Jewish Relief Committee, 103 Park Avenue, New York City.

Soviet Representative Protests Against Latvian Barring of Jews

London (Jewish Press Association).—The Soviet representative in Latvia registered an official protest with the Latvian Government against its refusal to admit Jewish refugees from Russia, according to information received here from Riga.

The Teachers' Institute, which was formerly conducted under the supervision of the Mizrahi Organization and the Yeshiva (the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary), is now being reorganized as a separate institution, independent of these two, and will be supervised by a Board of Directors of prominent rabbis and laymen.

The Teachers' Institute, which is located at 138 Second street, was organized in 1916 by the Mizrahi Organization, and since 1920 it has been conducted jointly by the Mizrahi and the Yeshiva. The instruction in the institute is given only in Hebrew. The program covers a period of five years, during which the students are given proper instruction in Talmud, Bible, Hebrew, Aramaic, Jewish History, Hebrew Literature and pedagogics. During this period the students go through high school and begin their college education. The fifth year is devoted mainly to supervised teaching in New York Talmud Torahs and Hebrew schools.

The announcement that the Teachers' Institute will become an independent institution has created a good impression in local Jewish scholarly circles, as the institution is expected now to be able to widen its activities and sphere of influence. Among the first to answer the call for the formation of a Board of Directors were Rabbi B. L. Levinthal of Philadelphia, president of the Agudath Hrabonim; Rabbi Jacob Levensohn of Brooklyn; Rabbi Meyer Berlin, Isaac Allen, Nathan Lampart and Samuel Wilner, all of New York.

On account of ill health, Mr. Isaac Swett has resigned as executive secretary of the Federated Jewish Charities of Portland, Ore., and Mrs. Swett has been elected to succeed him.

Appeal for the Blind Institute in Jerusalem

Editor Hebrew Standard:

It is needless to describe the present crisis in Palestine. Owing to political conditions the country suffers from the general uncertainty attending any era of transition. The large Jewish populations of Eastern Europe which were the most generous supporters of Palestine are now in a state of helplessness. The cost of living has risen and the revenue outside of America's generous help has decreased.

Among the most deserving institutions hit by the present crisis is the Institute for the Education of the Jewish Blind. Founded years ago by the celebrated archaeologist, A. M. Lunz, himself for many years blind, it has always led a precarious existence. Owing to the withdrawal of the subsidy granted by the Zionist Organization this institute is placed before the necessity of closing its doors if aid does not come soon.

Do you realize what it means that young boys and girls who are being trained for gaining an honest livelihood will be turned out on the street and increase the already numerous beggars of the older generation sitting at street corners holding out their hands for the pittance received from tourists or the few inhabitants able to give?

Here is a case for constructive charity. For several years, at the request of the institution, I have acted as its treasurer for the funds collected in America. The receipts of last year, coming chiefly from Indianapolis, Dayton, O., and Kansas City, were \$500. The employment of a collector is an expensive proposition, no matter how economically arranged. Individual donors who wish that every dollar collected shall reach its destination and charitable organizations which know what such a waste through personal solicitations means are requested to send me their gifts. To those not acquainted with the work I wish to add that the High Commissioner, Sir Herbert Samuel, recently visited an exhibition of this institution and expressed himself in terms of highest praise on the work done by it. Impressive Sabbath Services on a Cunarder

Editor Hebrew Standard:

The Jewish cabin passengers of the "Empress of India," that reached New York on Sunday, September 4, 1921, held very impressive Sabbath services on board the steamer. There was a group of about 100 men and women assembled on the top deck, who, under the leadership of the famous Cantor Sirota, worshipped their Maker.

The services began on Friday evening at 6 o'clock, when the Cantor Sirota delightfully inspired the assembled congregation with "Lachu Dodu." On Saturday, September 3, at 10 a. m., before Musaph, Rabbi Wolf of Rochester, who was returning from Poland, described the pitiful conditions among the Jews in Europe.

Before going into details Dr. Wolf paid a warm tribute to all the noble workers of the Joint Distribution Committee who are in Poland doing splendid work for the welfare of their stricken brethren, workers some of whom have given up at home princely incomes for

the mere subsistence allotted to them by the committee.

Dr. Wolf dwelt mainly upon the alarming state of physical degeneration among the Jewish children. The effects of malnutrition are painfully visible everywhere; effects that show themselves in physically undermined and in a good many instances permanently crippled young children.

Then the insane asylums, filled with the flower of Jewish womanhood that fell victims to the lust of the Russian army—young women who under the strain of disgrace broke down mentally. The picture of an insane asylum housing men and women in the prime of life but whose minds proved too weak to withstand the constant horrors of pogroms and the terrific uncertainty of the day—that pathetic picture made a lasting impression upon the visitor.

Rabbi Wolf stated his belief that during the coming year the Joint Distribution Committee will have to extend its activities into Russia, where it will undoubtedly find conditions beyond our power of imagination.

The message was closed with an earnest appeal to every Jew present to carry home to his local community the cry for help that with the settling of the war became more visibly imperative, and also with the reminder, that as Joseph was sent by God into Egypt to provide for his brethren help during the historic famine, so it was undoubtedly the will of Providence that placed us more fortunate Jews in a land of plenty to bring comfort to our present day poverty-stricken brethren. Let every Jew be awake to the fact that he will be called upon for more help now than ever before.

The sadness of the impression conveyed by the spiritual leader of the Rochester Synagogue was counterbalanced by the message of joy and hope that another passenger, Mr. Lewis Goldberg, assistant Attorney General for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, brought from his trip to Palestine.

The services were closed with "Eri Keloenu" and finally with the American National Hymn. There was a collection made by Mr. Good for the Seaman's Fund, which was turned over to the pursuer of the "Empress."

Credit for the arrangements of the services is due to Mrs. Stavisky of New York and Mr. E. E. Guinsburg of Boston. Mass.

The Agudath Israel: Our Only Salvation

Editor Hebrew Standard:

My attention has been called to a vaporing by a young, fearfully immature whipper-snapper calling himself Max Sparber, wherein he voices a hectic protest to a letter of mine dealing with the Agudath Israel which appeared not long ago in the columns of the Hebrew Standard. In the words of Emerson, Why so hot, little man? You have my sympathy. But if you don't like any statement of mine, I suppose you'll have to "lump it," poor chap. Mayhap you are courting publicity. But that would be stupid, Max.

I stand squarely back of every statement I made in my letter. It matters not if contemptibly employed; the truth and soundness of my observations, which were the result of much study and thought, shine forth triumphantly. I am content to leave it at that. Those who have mental grip will understand and appreciate the force of my remarks. I reiterate that "most of the enemies of the Aguda are either ignorant or vicious minded," that is, they are either fools or knaves. I make this as a calm statement of fact, rather than as an expression of opprobrium. It is to me so obvious a fact that I am honestly astonished to find an observant Jew who cavils at my statement of it.

If my stern, relentless, choleric accuser desires to revere the memory of Schechter, that is his affair. But why rhapsodize in that careless, unintelligible way? I certainly hold far different views on Schechter and his work; it happens that I did not discuss Schechter in my last letter, but I shall, I shall. As to "Catholic Israel," if Mr. Sparber knew what the term signified, what evil lies in it, what heresy lurks in it, he would blush to use it. A tyro ought to be cautious.

I am familiar with Prof. Pick's pronunciamento. If it were true, as Rick asserts, that "the Aguda is sometimes confused in the public mind with the Mizrachi," surely the Mizrachi ought to

be the last to complain; the association, even though it be by error, is highly flattering and complimentary to the Mizrachi. He says further, "The Aguda claims to speak in the name of Orthodox Judaism, but it represents only a small minority, and its main principle is opposition to Zionism." He is here guilty, I am constrained to say it, of terminological inexactitudes, or in plain English—lies. It only goes to show what service under Mizrachi does to one who was once upon a time a decent fellow. Alas, alas. "We are convinced that it has no future." How amusing! This conviction convicts him. It's a dead "give-away." "Anti-national" the Aguda is not. It is opposed to Zionism because of its purely secular basis. No true Jew, in my opinion, thinks differently. Zionism's hateful premises and tendencies, its awful menace, must be steadily opposed.

Pick, in a letter from Jerusalem dated June 10, makes a partial and ungraceful retraction of the interview which Mr. Sparber lugged out. After claiming that he "was not well understood," Pick continues: "According to my view, the whole Aguda cannot be considered as anti-national, but there is no doubt that a great part of the German branch of the Aguda is anti-national. The Eastern members of the Aguda, however, are certainly national minded, although they harbor some doubts as to the practical carrying out of their ideas. In spite of all difficulties, I believe that Mizrachi will sooner or later be able to work together with a part of the Aguda." (Jewish Chronicle, July 8.) Interesting, isn't it?

If Mr. Sparber has a weakness for the London Jewish Chronicle, will he not allow me to bring forward one or two quotations from that journal? Does he know that several serious attempts have been made by the Aguda to come together with the Mizrachi, attempts rendered futile by the latter's contumacy? Does he know that since 1919 the Aguda has made repeated offers to the Zionist Organization, looking to co-operation, only to be turned down contemptuously? Herr Sokolow could speak with authority on this matter. A Mizrachi has written: "It is regrettable to state, but it is a fact, that the very same leaders who brought us the great external political successes have achieved but very little as regards internal Jewish policy. It ought to be the greatest task of Zionist policy to work shoulder to shoulder with all active parties, also with those who keep aloof from the organization." (Leo Vos in Jewish Chronicle, June 10.) Further, it might profit Mr. Sparber to glance at the following two excerpts. The first is by a Zionist who is opposed to the Aguda. He says, "Let not Zionist leaders be blind to the facts. No amount of oratory, eloquence and appeals for unity will influence the Orthodox masses to give their support to an irreligious movement, though national; and no amount of taunts, abuses or sneers will make them swerve from their loyalty to their uncompromising principles." (Jew-

ish Chronicle, June 3.) In the same issue appears a letter from E. Goodman wherein he states very truly that "nationalism without tradition will create a Yishub of Amhaaratzim, and Zionist Chinuch a generation of Epikorsim. . . . Orthodox Jewry, independently organized and united, can again create in Palestine a center of Jewish thought, a land where Torah and Abodah shall give an example to humanity. By splitting our energies we play into the hands of those who have erected unto themselves a golden calf of a people cut off from Jewish tradition and Jewish thought." Read that again, bub, yes, the Jewish Chronicle, when used with discretion, can be relied on to give us good, sensible stuff. But always, M. S., use it justly; otherwise you may suffer horrible embarrassment, don't you know.

As Mizrachists, in the nature of things you must hold a brief for the Zionists, willy-nilly, or be read out of the movement. Why blink at plain facts? Such is my shameless and abandoned callousness that I prefer to be classed as a traitor to the Zionist Organization (sacred thing!) rather than a traitor to the Torah and the Jewish people. There is no accounting for tastes; strange how they will differ. What right has Mr. Sparber to say to the Agudists that "a Zionless Judaism is like a soul without a body"? What hosh! What drivell! Pure buncombe! New standards are set up over night by self-constituted censors. The brazen audacity of it! It is a sure sign of the chaos that reigns in Judaism that so many of these damnable, execrable "isms" have been foisted on us in late years—and we seem powerless to stay them. Who ever heard of such plaguey things as Schechterianism, Zionism, Mizrachi, etc., etc., several decades back? These new conceptions are foreign to the Jewish spirit. On the other hand, how gloriously satisfying and reassuring it is to realize that the Agudath Israel is not new or foreign or forced—it is merely the expression in organized form of that which faithful, standard-setting Jewry has ever thought and dreamed and cherished. The Aguda is founded in Sinai; these "isms" are founded in heaven knows what. And, as I have stated in my previous letter, one conclusion is indubitable: if we prefer to seek in other quarters (for example, in Zionism or Schechterianism) a definition of what is expected from us, we are tacitly denying that Judaism is final. Above all, these "isms" are mere movements; the Aguda is not a mere movement—it is far more than that. It is an insult to our holy Torah, it is sheer blasphemy, to group it promiscuously with these undesirable, pestilential "isms."

Let us not be confused. It is not a matter of my opinion, but it is a matter of the opinion of the greatest living rabbis, plus the living Jewish people, reinforced by Jewish history. And nothing can stop the progress of the Agudath Israel. It must succeed, because only in this way can come the full protection of Judaism; the future of Judaism is in-

dissolubly bound up with that of the Agudath Israel. I am sorry if the Brooklyn stripling be distressed by these words.

By the bye, I am not "the Aguda spokesman," at least not in an official sense. I hope that this is clear. You can keep your Weizmann, Sokolow, Ussischkin, Mossinson, Levin, Brandeis, Mack, Wise, etc., etc. The Jewish people will never follow these figures, for it knows that the leaders of the Jews today, as always, must be the authoritative rabbis, the great lights of Israel. We are, you see, that sort of people.

Among the founders of the Aguda were the late gaonim of Brisk and Lubawitz. Its present leaders include Rabbi Chaim Ozer Grodzinsky of Vilna, the Chofetz Chaim, the Gerer, Tshortkower, Ostrower, Rodziener, Pressburger and Sokolwer rabbis, Rabbis Diskin and Sonnenfeld of Eretz Yisroel, Rabbis Job Joshua of Kintzky, Meyer Dan, Plotzki of Ostrowo, Epstein of Slobotka and Kahneman of Poniewish, Drs. The Despairing Rabbi

A rabbi of Paterson, N. J., has resigned his pulpit in despair.

The people are so worldly, selfish and unspiritual that the hopelessness of his office has prompted him to a surrender of his calling.

In the business world, in politics, official or domestic life conditions are discouraging enough to justify despair. Frequently in business, politics and the home people grow despondent when work and an optimistic spirit would be the salvation and redemption of the situation.

Admitting that it may be possible for the limit of hope to be past, that attitude does not apply, or should not, to a minister.

The very cause of his existence is to battle with despair, his own as well as that of others.

He is supposed to battle, unconquerably, indomitably, a perpetual antagonist of just the very things that hamper spiritual progress.

The minister is presumed to have the required understanding and the necessary moral strength that he will NOT surrender, though the conditions DO seem utterly hopeless and dark.

A rabbi who yields in the face of non-success is a coward, a weakling, and his loss is no loss to the flock he could not guide.

A new shepherd will lead them better. If not, he, too, must go.

A minister assumes a task that cannot know the meaning of the word "despair."

A "despairing" rabbi is a contradiction on terms. One who despairs is no rabbi and a rabbi never despairs.

There is only one thing worse than a "despairing rabbi." That is a rabbi or minister who humors and compromises the transgressions and follies of his flock, and who, to hold his "job," caters to their lower standards of existence.

In such a rabbi is a real cause of despair. He not only does not lead his congregation to better things, but fixes permanently its degeneration.—The Modern View.

What Difference Does It Make?

We find a young writer discussing whether New York rules the Jewry of the rest of the country or whether the Jewry of the provinces has a mind of its own. What difference does it make? Cincinnati seems to have an idea that it does some ruling on its own account, and we think so, too. Certainly Cincinnati has done much for the religious advancement of the Jews of this country. In a way considerably more than New York, though we do not overlook the value of the Theological Seminary. But, then, why shouldn't New York be a great factor in influencing the Jewry of the country? Think of it! There are almost two millions of Jews there. And every kind of Jew that the world produces is found there. Think of the synagogues, the temples, the Yiddish press and theatre; the Jewish activities of every conceivable kind; the Jewish authors and playwrights. Every phase of Jewish life is in evidence. Then, too, the enormous wealth of New York Jewry, and the power it has in the affairs of the nation. No great national movement can possibly succeed without the assistance of New York Jews. Take any movement you please and you will realize quickly how much it needs New York support. So why argue about it; and why write articles about it; for, after all, what difference does it make?—Jewish Criterion.

At Witebsk the authorities closed six synagogues and threw the Scrolls of the Law into the mud. In the synagogue building the Bolsheviks organized their clubs. The Jews appealed to the government at Moscow, and the latter ordered the commissary to reopen the synagogues. The commissary, however, refused to do so, and 10,000 Jews marched to the residence to protest against his action. The crowd was, however, dispersed by means of an armored car.

Excavations at Tiberias
 Particulars of the results of the excavations at Tiberias, which are being conducted by the Hebrew Archaeological Society, are given by the "Palestine Weekly."

The tentative excavations last winter served to uncover a portion of an ancient synagogue, to fix the position of the Herodian citadel, and to locate the third century necropolis. The excavation was resumed in the spring, when the whole of the synagogue was laid bare. The building was shown to have had a life of about 1,000 years from its origin in the first or second century to the middle of the thirteenth century, when Tiberias was destroyed by the Mongols. It appears that about the ninth century the synagogue was partially destroyed, and later rebuilt in amateur fashion, columns being replaced upside down and the marble pavement completed with odds and ends of marble picked up anywhere in the neighborhood. The building was probably used by Moslems as a mosque.

Among the many articles found were a large stone throne and a long inscription on a slab of blue marble, which apparently came from a neighboring Christian cemetery and was made use of by later occupants of the building as part of the flooring. It is carefully dated in the period shortly after the rise of Islam.

British Aviator Describes Plight of Jewish Refugees

London (Jewish Press Association).—The "Daily Mail" today publishes a special dispatch from its foreign correspondent, Major Blake, in which he describes the terrible plight of the famine-stricken Russians and the condition of Jewish refugees in the border provinces. Major Blake also relates that he visited Pinsk where he found indescribable conditions, chiefly as a result of the recent fire there which left thousands homeless. Major Blake makes his trips through the air.

Jewish Harmony
 One of the pet ideas that the Jew-baiter is always eager to spread is that the Jews of the whole world always act as a unit. There is perfect accord among them on all things. What they seek they work as a body to obtain. What they oppose they move as a body to attack. The Jews of the world are one well disciplined and drilled army led by their generals, the Elders of Zion. The capitalist Jew, the Bolshevik Jew, the Nationalist Jew, the assimilationist Jew, the orthodox Jew; the freethinking Jew, the Russian Jew and the Moroccan Jew—all have one aim, one object, one system, one method and one plan.

The truth of the matter is—and any intelligent person who knows how human groups are constituted would infer it a priori—that Jews are divided on all matters and questions just like other human groups. No two Jews think exactly alike on all things, any more than two Irishmen. No two Jews think exactly alike any more than they look exactly alike. This we have frequently pointed out, and frequently furnished examples of.

There are times and occurrences when we are tempted to believe that there is less harmony and unity among Jews than among others. This Jewish humorists have frequently made the subject of their satire. When one Jew says, yes, the other Jew is sure to say, no, and vice versa. And they will sometimes oppose

each other with a bitterness and animosity that can hardly be equaled among any other human group.

We have a most striking illustration of it in some recent occurrences in English Jewry. As is well known, during the war English Zionists, with Dr. Weizmann at their head, were largely instrumental in pressing the Zionist claim on the British Government. It resulted in the Balfour Declaration. No sooner was that accomplished than a so-called League of British Jews formed itself, with Mr. Claude G. Montefiore as its pilot, whose sole aim it has been to oppose all Zionist efforts and to frustrate all Zionist plans. Numerically, it has been a very insignificant body, but it has had a sprinkling of men prominent, influential and determined enough to make trouble. It has not scrupled even to burrow underground in order to undermine the Zionist position and to rob the Zionists of their gains. Secretly they have been making representations to the British Government protesting against the Jewish Homeland idea. And it seems as if they have succeeded, in a measure. For the interpretation now put by some English statesmen on the Balfour Declaration is certainly not the one that Zionists have all along been led to give it.

All this has recently been made known to the world when at the annual meeting of the League of British Jews Mr. Montefiore boastfully reported its activ-

Great French Political Economist Dead
 One of the most noted political economists in France has passed away in the person of Mr. Alfred Neymarck of Paris, who died last week at the age of seventy-three.

Mr. Neymarck was born at Chalons-sur-Marne in 1848. While still young he founded a financial paper, "Le Rentier," which is now in the fiftieth year of its existence, and which he edited throughout that period. Besides being a financial publicist, he was a distinguished political economist. He was vice-president of the Society of Political Economy (Paris) and had also presided over the Statistical Society. He published numerous historical and statistical works which were highly appreciated by specialists. Mr. Neymarck collaborated on many commissions appointed by the Ministry of Finance, and for the eminent services which he rendered to that department he was created Commander of the Legion of Honor. A thorough Jew and deeply attached to the traditions of his faith (he regularly attended the Sabbath services), Mr. Neymarck devoted himself heart and soul to the interests of the Paris community. He was the oldest member of the Consistory of Paris, of which he was for many years the treasurer. He also served for some time on the Administrative Committee of the Rabbinical School, the finances of which he reorganized, and was honorable vice-president of the Committee of the Jewish Schools.

Lord Northcliffe a Jew?
 Lord Northcliffe is so interesting a personality from so many points of view that the question of his origin must be interesting, too. The anti-Semites persist in saying that he is of Jewish extraction and that he is derived from the family of Stern, who hailed from Frankfurt-on-Main. An ancestor of Lord Northcliffe's is said to have migrated to Dublin and there married into an Irish family. What truth there is in this story we are unable to say; and for our part at its face value we would not be inclined to give much for it. But it is so persistently clung to by the gentry who circulate it in their unclean organs that we suppose some people believe there is something in the legend. We, however, would note that the anti-Semites are not very complimentary to Lord Northcliffe and his family (from the point of view of the anti-Semites) in thus claiming them to be of our people.—London Jewish World.



Hebrew in American Universities A long time ago, so long ago that the name of the responsible person has been forgotten, some one criticized the modern universities for not giving more attention to Hebrew and Jewish studies. More than a few have echoed the hoary complaint in some connection or other. In the European universities, Hebrew has had a place in the curriculum ever since the middle ages, both in the theological and philosophical faculties. The Talmud, the Mishnah, the Midrash and other later Hebrew literature have received scant notice, but they have by no means been ignored. The professors of European centers of learning are specialists and it would be demanding impossibilities to insist that they should have a specialist's knowledge of later Hebrew literature in addition to their other scientific equipment.

A chair for the Talmud and later Hebrew literature has been established at the University of Madrid. We have not heard that there is any great scramble among the students of Spain, or from other countries to be enrolled in the classes on this subject. That is the trouble. European universities would undoubtedly have established lectureships on Talmudic subjects if they had been wanted to any great extent.

The same thing holds good with regard to American universities. There is no prejudice against the introduction of Hebrew and Jewish lectureships, the whole trouble being today that there is no considerable clientele who would avail themselves of the privileges of such classes.

It is a pity that the importance and the charm of Hebrew literature are not better known. Be that as it may, we shall not have chairs in our universities devoted not only to Biblical Hebrew, but to the whole body of Hebrew literature, until the student body indicate a desire on their part that such chairs should be established. Meanwhile let us not criticize the universities for something for which they are not to blame.—Rabbi H. H. Mayer in Kansas City Jewish Chronicle.

We Thought Differently We thought when Stephen Lausanne was in the United States during the war trying to get our support and sympathy that he was rather a likeable man and inclined to be just. But then was then, and now is now. And while France and Frenchmen are as polite as ever—yet it is accentuated surface-politeness. There is an irritable rash; that somehow or other makes us shrug our shoulders impatiently when the rash irritates us. So we find Stephen Lausanne, editor of the Paris "Matin," making a vile attack on former President Wilson and incidentally taking a side-swipe at Bernard Baruch. He characterized him as a "lightweight braggart," whatever that means in French. It shows rather a hasty side of Lausanne that we never suspected. It seems incredible that he could bite the hand that befriended him. For after all Mr. Wilson did come to the aid of France. And we have the statement of Grosvenor B. Clarkson, Director of the National Council of Defense during the war, that "he has discovered many things Baruch did for France, and then recites numerous instances in which France was helped out of serious difficulties during the trying period of the war by Baruch. This should make Lausanne rather ashamed of himself, but we think this quite impossible judging by the antics he is performing in the arena of his journal. While America has cruelly maligned Woodrow Wilson and probably encouraged other countries to do the same, yet we think that France above all nations should refrain from joining with the remainder of the pack in snarling and biting at the heels of one of the greatest minds that has occupied the Presidential chair of this nation in many decades and one that from first to last was possessed of an idealism that reflected a man worthy of the highest traditions of Americanism.—Jewish Times.

Price of New Translation of the Bible Reduced

The Jewish Publication Society of America begs to announce that beginning with September 1, 1921, the price of the New Translation of the Bible has been reduced from \$2 to \$1.25 a copy.

Schools and synagogues purchasing quantities of 25 or over may have them for \$1.10 a copy.

With the reduction of the price of the Bible the society hopes that congregations and individuals will supply themselves with copies, and that an effort generally will be made by all rabbis, religious teachers and others to spread this Jewish version of the Bible in every Jewish home.

Morris Lyon, a pioneer of Kansas City, Mo., is dead in his 76th year. Mr. Lyon some years ago was a trustee of Congregation B'nai Jehuda and served on the boards of several other organizations.
