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# NEWS FROM ENGLAND

Exclusive Correspondence to the HEBREW STANDARD

Things Are Quiet—Economics in Palestine—Mrs. H. O. Barnett on Zionism—A Marriage—Mr. Crosland's "Vain Old Hebrew Gentleman" Criticized.

London, Aug. 14, 1922.

Nothing of particular importance has passed during the last week in the Jewish world. This is probably explainable by the holiday and the opening of a new era in the Jewish national movement. We look forward with interest to Dr. Weizmann's explanation on the action of the Zionist Organization in regard to the Churchill statement to the conference which is to meet later in the month at Carlsbad. The Arabs do not appear to be particularly well satisfied, but now that the Mandate has passed and therefore the main motive for their agitation has been removed, it is expected that this opposition will gradually die down—in fact, probably the first steps have already been made in an advance by the Jews to the Arabs in a publicly made statement. This statement says that an appeal to the Arab nation in Palestine and the greater Orient has been published by the National Council of the Jews of Palestine, in which the cause of friendly feeling between Jew and Arab is pleaded. While protesting that the Jew comes to Palestine to live a calm and peaceful life in concert with all nationalities, the appeal shows no weakening in the faith in the National Home for the Jews. The conclusion of the appeal reads: "Why should there be strife between brothers? Rather let us share the common ambition to rebuild the wasted portions of our Holy Land for the welfare of ourselves and that of all mankind." During the first six months of the current year 4,399 Jews entered Palestine. This is not a great number when one remembers the ultimate purpose for which they are migrating, and the conditions, etc., they have to help in modifying. It is evidence, however, that the Zionist movement is still in existence.

Considerable new economic enterprise is springing up in the land of Israel. The first attempt, in modern times at any rate, to commence a salt industry is announced, a company, it appears, having been formed to work the marshy land near Athlit. If the venture succeeds one of the direct results will be the conversion of what are now malarial swamps into a healthy zone. Another company which has been incorporated is one with £100,000 capital under the name of the "Central Bank of Co-operative Institutions in Palestine, Ltd." Its purpose is the financing of co-operative credit unions and other co-operative undertakings.

Mrs. Henrietta O. Barnett, writing in the last issue of "The Nation and the Athenaeum" on the question of "Settlements" says: "When Jews invade a neighborhood the Gentiles leave it. The latter do not like the Jews 'en masse,' though individual Gentiles may appreciate individual Jews. This feeling, be it called foolish prejudice or wise instinct, explains the fact of ghettos in all towns where there are Jews, in the new world as well as in the old nations. To me this seems the strongest reason for Zionism. It is bad to be hated; it is worse to hate; but if the Jews would bravely leave the fleshpots of the various

Egypt in which they now live, assemble somewhere and make a nation, they would bear their own responsibilities and reap the rewards or punishments of their own virtues or shortcomings. Scattered, these great people often annoy and create discord—united, they might again have something really valuable to teach the Gentile world." The above is interesting, although not particularly pleasant, reading, while the suggestion that Jews should yield up their right to live where they do merely to congregate "somewhere" will, I should say, hardly be agreed with in the community.

In a London Registry office, the other day, Mr. Edmund X. Kapp, the caricaturist, was married to Miss Yvonne Helene Mayer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mayer of St. John's Wood. I am informed that the couple have wished to marry for some time past, but have been unable to obtain the lady's parents' consent, the parents going so far as to place a ban upon the marriage by communicating their attitude to the Registrar General. As parents commonly do in such circumstances, Mr. and Mrs. Mayer relented, intimating their change of opinion to the Registrar General, and so the young couple were married.

According to the "Observer," "The Vain Old Hebrew Gentleman," the latest of Mr. Crosland's books, does not appear to enjoy much favor. In fact, the "Observer" calls it a "Pogrom in Print." It goes on to say: "A vulgar style, a content of crude abuse and a partially saving undercurrent of humorous exasperation that begs the reader not to take the whole thing seriously, are the characteristics of Mr. Crosland's wholesale attack upon the Jews in 'The Vain Old Hebrew Gentleman.' We have those unfortunate protocols dished up with extracts and comment as well as details of some of the more revolting crimes in history that happened to have been committed by Jews. We have personal attacks on well known men of Hebrew blood, apparently irrespective of their characters. And at the end we have a disconcerting announcement by the author that he is in the later stages of a mortal illness—which makes criticism seem an indecency. The fact is on humane grounds deplorable, and on literary grounds the statement of it holds this much of relevancy: an illness may well cloud the judgment of an author and cause him to write what in corpore, sano his discretion would withhold."

## Reported Killed in France; Turns Up Alive

New York (Jewish Press Association).—Richard Goldberg, a Brooklyn ex-service man, who was reported by the War Department at Washington to have fallen in action, has turned up at home hale and hearty, much to the surprise of his parents and friends. Since his return from France he has lived at Boston, where he has married and established his home.

When the supposedly dead Richard Goldberg came unexpectedly to his parents' home they fainted, and it required medical attention to revive them.

## "THE LETTERS OF AKIBA TO RACHEL"

In these letters in which the main theme is love, Mr. Dembitz deals with an old subject in a new way. Akiba and Rachel as the main characters are well-chosen both were ardent and self-sacrificing lovers. Rachel gave up a life of ease and wealth and the love of her wealthy father, Kalba Sabua, for the love of the ignomant shepherd Akiba, in whom she saw the incarnation of a potentially perfect manhood. For twenty-four years she suffered poverty while her husband was transforming himself into the great teacher and leader that he eventually became. And Rabbi Akiba's entire life, until his very last breath, is one of love. As a shepherd he loved his sheep, and later his love was directed toward higher objects. His love for the Torah and his people, and his devotion to the Almighty prompted him to die as a martyr, with a smile on his face, happy that he can "love the Divine Being not only with all his heart and might, but with his soul as well."

If Rabbi Akiba did hate anything, it was wickedness, dissension, injustice and haughtiness. Yet, though he hated sin, he could love even the sinner, for, as he says, "everyone is created in the image of the Almighty" (Aboth 3:8), and "one of the greatest principles in the Torah is, 'and thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself'" (Yerushalmi Nedarim 9-4). Surely such a philanthropist—in the original sense of this term—would also be expected to be the perfect lover.

Our author in his "Letters of Akiba to Rachel," aims to show that even before the days of "complexes" and psycho-analysis, love "made the world go round," and, indeed, the ardent, devotional love of Rabbi Akiba and Rachel is admirably and artistically portrayed in Mr. Dembitz's book.

The author puts into Rabbi Akiba's letters his own views on love and marriage. He shows how true love between man and wife can become the counterpart, as it were, of the love of man for the Torah and for the Almighty Himself, and that marital love may beget a deeper and more lasting devotion to the spiritual values. He can justifiably put these thoughts into Rabbi Akiba's letters and make them appear to be Rabbi Akiba's thoughts in view of the dictum of Rabbi Akiba: "Where true love exists between man and wife there is also the divine presence; but where there is no true love between man and wife the divine fire consumes both" (Sotah 17a). For the Divinity is love; and to love is not only human but divine. But true love is not to be confused with lewdness, which, according to Rabbi Akiba, results from frivolousness and levity (Aboth 5:17).

It was Rabbi Akiba who said all the songs in the Bible are holy, but the "Song of Songs" is the holiest (Midrash Rabbah Shir Hashirim). He saw in this book the most sublime symbol of the mutual love of God and Israel, and while some of his contemporaries saw in it only a collection of beautiful lyrics and would regard it as secular, he stressed the spiritual significance of the book and emphasized its holiness. It is therefore fitting that Rabbi Akiba, the supposed author of these letters, should be characterized as idealizing what is too often debased and as connecting with the Divinity what is allied by many with Satan.

What a relief and spiritual exaltation it is to read these unhistorical letters, which are, however, so replete with historical material. How pure is the air we breathe on the heights to which our author ascends! The "letters" are love letters, but they are in a class by themselves, for in speaking of this book in connection with the usual "love literature," one must use the Hebrew expression, "lehavdil be'elef havdolohs."

The author, whom, by the way, the writer of this appreciation is privileged to have had as teacher and whose friendship he hopes to merit, marshals his rabbinic dicta and historical facts in an orderly and masterly fashion, and the sidelights that he throws on Jewish history in that eventful period, as well as his characterization of Rabbi Akiba's contemporaries and predecessors, are of great interest to students of Jewish history.

Mr. Dembitz's reinterpretations and revised translations are also noteworthy. For example, he points out that in Psalm 113 the expression "akereth habayith" does not mean, as it is usually translated, the "barren" woman of the house, but the root, the "ikkar," the important person of the house.

The word "echod" in the Shema he translates not by "one," the usual translation, but by "alone"—"Hear, O Israel, the Lord is our God, the Lord alone."

The mishnaic dictum (Aboth 4), "Who is mighty?—he that can repress his nature," receives the following interpretation: "That means, he who can repress his good impulses as well as his evil tendencies." There are numerous cases in these "letters" of interesting reinterpretations of familiar texts.

The author is a "ladies' man" in the sense that he regards seriously the woman as being "the better half," and he lays great stress on woman's rights in his dramatic chapter, "The Daughters of Zeloph'had," based upon the biblical account, which might be regarded as

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the biblical precedent for woman suffrage. He discusses this subject seriously and in earnest, and in these days when even the most sacred things are often made to appear ludicrous, and when for laughter and applause we make light of the most serious phases of life, it is refreshing to find earnest treatment of serious subjects.

The author, a native American (Louisville, Kentucky, being his birthplace), though thoroughly versed in the "higher" criticism of the Bible and well read in the original Babylonian epics in which the creation story is quite different from the biblical creation story, is also well grounded in Jewish lore, and with his love and ardor for the Torah, to which he adheres piously, he gives the lie to those who say that the Torah is only "on the other side of the sea." Devout Jew as he is, he says, "However great a man may be, he cannot be a law to himself or to others." The author is a firm believer in authority in Jewish life, and he devotes a chapter to discuss and argue for the authenticity of Scripture.

The imaginative powers of the author are so highly developed that one can read these letters of the life of eighteen centuries ago in the light of present-day thought and events, and, as with a telescope, those ancient days are brought nearer to us. Dim, vague characters are brought to life again, as it were.

In many ways is this book unique and interesting, and of the book and its author one might say, "May there be many more like them in Israel."

## Rabbi Jung Accepts Call to Jewish Center

The Jewish Center, No. 131 West Eighty-sixth street, has extended a call to Rabbi Dr. Leo Jung, now of Congregation Knesseth Israel, Cleveland, Ohio. Rabbi Jung has accepted and will begin his new duties commencing with the

Rosh Hahsanah holidays. Rabbi Jung succeeds Rev. Prof. Mordecai M. Kaplan, recently resigned.

Rabbi Jung is a son of the late Rabbi Meier Jung, head of the Federation of Synagogues in England until his tragic death last year. Rabbi Jung obtained his training in Hebraic and Judaic at the parochial school which his late father had founded, at the Yeshivoth of Galanta and Eperies, and at the Hildesheimer Rabbinical Seminary, from which he was graduated. He holds Semichah among others from Dr. David Hoffmann. He attended universities as follows: Vienna (classics and psychology); Berlin (comp. philology and philosophy); Giessen (history and pedagogy); London (Oriental languages); Cambridge (comparative folklore). He was appointed Cambridge researchman in comparative folklore in 1917, and his thesis for the research degree formed the first part of his book, "The Story of Fallen Angels in Jewish, Christian and Mohammedan Folklore." He received the degrees of B. A. Hon., London, 1919; M. R. A. S., 1919. This thesis for the Ph.D. degree of London University is the completed work on the above.

Rabbi Jung was director of the Sinai League of Great Britain, "an association for the promotion of Judaism among the Jewish youth in the most enjoyable and encouraging manner," and for four years editor of "The Sinaist," the organ of the orthodox Jewish youth of Great Britain. He was called to Cleveland, Ohio, early in 1920.

His main efforts will be directed towards preserving and promoting the knowledge and the practice of the Torah among the Jewish youth by leading them to its sources in literature and history. He stands for the uncompromising faithfulness, for the mission above all of the Jew for the Jew, for the reassertion in Jewish life of a virile, upright, efficient orthodoxy.



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ITEMS OF INTEREST IN THE JEWISH WORLD

Rabbi A. M. Baum, for the past year at Sag Harbor, L. I., has resigned his charge.

Chicago (Ill.) Jewish charities benefit to the amount of \$3,000 through the will of the late Hyman Wittenberg.

M. Jules Rene Brisac, prefect of the Department of the Marne, has been made a Commander of the Legion of Honor.

In the recent primaries at Mobile, Ala., Hyman Gabriel was elected a member of the School Board by a very large majority.

Jews of Beacon, N. Y., who have heretofore attended synagogue at Newburgh, are forming a congregation and will engage a rabbi.

Rev. Abraham Ruthberg has accepted a call to head the orthodox Jewish congregation at Auburn, N. Y., which opened a new synagogue on the 15th ult.

A new Jewish publication has just made its appearance in Paris. It is called "L'Illustration Juive" and is edited by MM. Jacques Calmy and O. Camby.

As a result of a recent visit from Rabbi Julius Leiber of Spokane, Wash., a society for the promotion of Judaism has been organized at Wenatchee, Wash.

Another Hebrew gymnasium was opened this year in the city of Wilkomir, Latvia. All the seven classes of the school are in full operation, with a satisfactory enrollment of students.

Former Alderman Louis Zeltner has been nominated by the Republicans to contest the Twelfth district Congressional seat. His opponents will be Meyer London, Socialist, and Samuel Dickstein, Democrat.

The supervisor of the village of Vladimir-Wolinsk in Poland has issued orders forbidding the placement of the Mogen-David on Jewish synagogues, for, in his opinion, the Mogen-David is a symbol of Bolshevism.

The conference of the organization of anti-Semitic students has met at Wurzburg, instead of Marburg, where it was not permitted to hold its meetings, on the ground that its deliberations were a danger to the republic.

The Jewish members of the Warsaw City Council have resigned in a body in consequence of the rejection of their motion that Jewish schools should be allowed to adopt Hebrew or Yiddish as their language of instruction.

Rabbi Borischansky of Homel, who has been on trial before the Revolutionary Tribunal for opposing the action of the Soviet authorities in closing down the Chedarim, has been sentenced to three years' imprisonment.

A drive is in progress to raise \$50,000 to provide a new home for the Hebrew Home for the Aged of Hudson county, New Jersey. The present home in Jersey City accommodates but twenty-one inmates and is greatly overcrowded.

A collection taken at the Adirondack Inn, Sacandaga Park, N. Y., last week, netted \$1,300. Half was allotted to the Jewish charities of Gloversville and the other half to the Dormitory Fund of the Hebrew Union College at Cincinnati, Ohio.

The representatives of the Joint Distribution Committee in Latvia are engaged in a bitter controversy with Jewish Kehillah leaders because of the latter's demand for a greater measure of control and supervision over the J. D. C. activities in Latvia.

Some time during September the head office of the Keren Kajemeth Leisreal will remove from The Hague to Palestine. All necessary preparations have been made in Jerusalem, so that the regular work of the office can recommence at the beginning of October.

Rabbi Abraham Chernavsky was tendered a farewell reception by the members of the Place Israel Congregation of Plainfield, N. J., last week, prior to his departure for New York city, where he is to assume charge of the Concourse Center of Israel, recently completed.

The Jewish community of Colchester, Conn., numbering but a few families, has just completed a community house, size 50 by 50. In the basement is a public bathhouse with two pools, Turkish baths and rest rooms. The upper story contains an assembly room and reading rooms.

The dedication of Temple Israel, Rockaway Beach, L. I., which was recently destroyed by fire and has been rebuilt, has been set for September 17. The new building, located on Eighty-fourth street, is a thoroughly modern building and will house over 800 worshippers.

Rev. Israel Brodie, whose appointment to succeed Rev. Dr. Joseph Abrahams as Minister of the Melbourne (Australia) Hebrew community was recently announced, has been given a year's leave of absence, during which time he will remain in England in order to complete his studies.

The elected members of the Legislative Assembly in Palestine will comprise eight Moslems, two Christians and two Jews. All former Ottoman subjects and those who by reason of their permanent residence in the country are qualified for Palestinian citizenship will be eligible to vote in the general elections.

Jewish manufacturers of Bialystok have organized a joint stock association named "Taasivah" to aid in the industrial revival of Palestine. A large transport of machinery to commence operations of a large spinning and weaving factory has already been dispatched to Palestine by this association.

Dr. M. Solovetchik, Minister of Jewish Affairs for Lithuania, has left his post for a three months' vacation, and the President of the Republic has appointed Dr. Julius Brutzkus in his place. Dr. Solovetchik is anxious to resign the position in order to devote himself more completely as a member of the World Zionist Executive.

The Sosnowitz Jews are living in constant dread of fresh pogroms. The local Polish newspapers are agitating openly for wholesale pogroms, and the local authorities have taken no steps to curb this propaganda. Dr. Perlman and S. Weiss, the representatives of the local Jews, have appealed to the Minister of the Interior for protection.

Max Coleman, one of the most active members of the Dublin (Ireland) Jewish Board of Guardians, is dead at an advanced age. He was for many years honorary treasurer of both the board and the Dublin Talmud Torah. He helped both these institutions materially during his lifetime and upon his death bequeathed a large sum to them.

Colonel Harris Weinstock of San Francisco is dead as the result of a fall from a horse. Colonel Weinstock was for many years a partner of the late David Lubin at Sacramento, where he amassed a fortune. He was especially interested in market conditions and was at one time State Market Director, contributing his entire salary to charitable institutions.

The Young Israel of Williamsburg has purchased the Hanover Club building, at Bedford avenue and Rodney street, for many years a prominent social center of the eastern district of Brooklyn. The club is to be disbanded. The club property, which is an attractive brick and stone building, fully equipped with modern furnishings and club accessories, will be taken over at a price of \$35,000, much below its current value.

Rev. David Levene, rabbi of the Constructive Synagogue of Brooklyn, has accepted a call from Temple Emanu-El of Yonkers, N. Y., succeeding Rabbi Jacob Tarshis, who goes to Columbus. Dr. Levene, who is a graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary and who has a Ph. D. degree from Columbia University, was at Spokane for thirteen years prior to his coming to Brooklyn.

"L'Italie," the organ of the Catholic aristocracy in Rome, recently published an article severely criticizing the action of the Pope in appointing his librarian to deal with the Palestine Mandate problem. The librarian is a converted Jew, Mr. Kovolnitsky, of Obnruisk (White Russia), and, in the opinion of "L'Italie," a converted Jew is not a fit person to be entrusted with such a task.

The Bavarian government has issued a decree condemning anti-Semitic propaganda. It is explained that the government is not condemning or approving of anti-Semitism as such, but that it takes its stand against any action which is liable to endanger public security. The police are, therefore, instructed to suppress any agitation which is likely to lead to murder or violence against the Jews.

Rabbi Judah L. Levin, the recognized head of the orthodox Jewish community of Detroit, Mich., has just rounded out twenty-five years of service in that city and was the recipient of many substantial tokens in celebration of the event. Rabbi Levin is a native of Wilna and the son of a rabbi. He was born in 1862 and came to America twenty-four years later, occupying positions in Rochester and New Haven before going to Detroit.

At Gnussen (Province of Posen) the Jews have received anonymous letters threatening them with death unless they leave the town. Many Jewish shops and houses have been marked with mysterious signs. The local Jewish community and the Jewish National Council at Warsaw have made representations to the cabinet. The Minister of the Interior promised to adopt precautionary measures to prevent any violence.

The Socialist faction of the Hungarian Parliament has put forth the demand limitations and discriminations against that there be an end to all restrictions, Jewish students in Hungarian universities. The Socialist leaders delivered vigorous addresses in support of their demand, asking for immediate action.

After a long illness, Mr. Meyer H. Silverman of Savannah, Ga., passed away on the 13th ult at the age of 91. Mr. Silverman, who was the father of Rev. Dr. Joseph Silverman of Temple Emanu-El of this city, was a Mason for sixty-eight years and an Odd Fellow for sixty-four years.

A conference of secretaries of the lodges of District Grand Lodge No. 3, I. O. B. B., was held at Atlantic City, N. J., last week and attended by over fifty delegates, representing lodges in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland. It was decided to make a campaign to aid the Jews in Europe.

J., and Rabbi Morris Silverman, Temple Israel of Washington Heights, New York, N. Y.

Boycott a Failure in Poland

Warsaw (Jewish Press Association).—Reports from the well known Zaczopano indicate the complete failure of the hotel "boycott" enforced against the Jews of Poland. The "Rozvoy," notorious anti-Semitic organization in Poland, had carried on a vigorous agitation for the exclusion of Jewish guests from all Christian inns and hotels, promising to all such patriotic Poles the full patronage of wealthy and noble Gentiles, which would more than compensate for the loss of Jewish attendance.

The result, however, was a crushing blow to all the roseate dreams and illusions which the misguided fanatics had nurtured and cherished. The number of Christian patrons was small and inconsequential, and the hotel-keepers who had adopted the reasoning of the "Rozvoy" were ruined financially and were compelled to sell their hotels to the very Jews whom they had labeled as "pariahs," excluding them from the privileges of their hotel and inn service.

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### The Wonders of Science!

The world today is undoubtedly in a parlous state. There was never a time since the day when Adam weakly yielded to the charms of his undraped soul-mate and ate of the fruit that brought forth curses in place of blessing, bitter drudgery and suffering in place of sweet knowledge of good and evil, when the human race was so sorely beset by so many sorts and varieties of perplexities, problems, baffling puzzles and intricate labyrinthine follies.

Religious preachers, politicians, statesmen, sociologists and labor leaders are all busy prescribing their various and variable specifics for the sick man, each one of them presumably contributing the best that is in him and offering his prescription after a due and careful weighing of the ingredients in the scale of logic and reason and testing its efficiency. There is confusion in the camp, the confusion of the multiplicity of the voices offering their advices, the rise and fall of disputacious argument, the whirl of syllogisms through the air, the crash of abstractions met in the rarefied atmosphere. Capital and labor, the white, black and yellow races, the conqueror and the conquered, the victor and the victim—all these are making a terrific din just now, creating a Tower of Babel confusion, making the welkin ring with the shouts of triumph and the groans of the maimed and the mutilated. There is no rest, no joy nor comfort any longer in life for you, even if you happen to be one of the wise patriots whose greatest efforts and exertions on behalf of the country consist of the cutting of the quarterly coupons of their steel or pork products stock.

Now, however, we shall not be troubled thus any longer, for according to the recent announcement of a certain professor of physics at Yale, the spirit of unrest is just a disease of the glands, and if a man complains of the so-called struggle for food, shelter and clothing, or if an oppressed nation complain against its harsh masters, what is more simple than the removal of the particular gland that is causing all the trouble? And there would be no need even of any machine guns, bombing planes or other cruel and ungentlemanly implements. The world "do move" indeed!

### "Winged Victory" vs. Club-Footed Defeat

The wide-soaring, outstretched pinions of the headless winged victory (and where, pray, will you find me physical victory that boasts a head designed by its Maker to hold brains within it?), celebrated since days immemorial as the

symbol of accomplishment that will take no heed of cost or forfeit, took under their feathery protection the other day the fleeing soul of an artist whose creations had been consistently rejected by his stupid fellow-men and whom these same stupid and selfish men insisted on harnessing up to the utilitarian cart of a clerk's desk.

The hoary Winged Victory, who, had she had a head, would no doubt use the same for a good deprecatory wag at the foolishness of the many victors and victories that she had been the witness of during the millenniums that elapsed since some Greek dreamer chiseled her out of some mountainside block and gave her form and expression and the embodiment of an idea, looked on unmoved from her eyeless sockets placed in an imaginary head and no doubt murmured: "This is one more of the victories of that stupid race of bunglers over the would-be seer of visions and dreamer of dreams. They have done this foolish thing so often in their brief and flustered life on this planet that I have ceased to bat even an ethereal eyelash on their stupidity!"

### "Oi, Wei Einstein!"

Plunged in reverie—at which time the most epoch-making of thoughts as well as the most insidious and bootless nonsense are hatched in the human brain—I sat in my easy chair, watching the ringlets of tobacco smoke as they ascended spirally and tortuously toward the ceiling, tracing and retracing their uncharted route to nowhere. Before me lay an open book which, however, I was not reading, while vagrant thoughts kept flitting to and fro, in and out of my brain, drifting in numberless as well as endless directions and coming and going with the rapidity of a lightning flash, leaving a trackless road behind them as does the ocean grayhound in its uncharted track upon the mighty rushing waters.

### Arabs Adopt Guerilla Tactics. Jewish Colonists Slain

Jerusalem (Jewish Press Association).—Arabs have adopted guerilla tactics in their warfare upon Jewish colonists, and a number of victims has been the toll.

In the colony of Yesod-Hamleh a marauding band of Arabs attracted the local Jewish Agranom, wounded him and took away his horse, killing, at the same time, Isaac Friedman, one of the colonists, who was standing nearby.

In Eimlah, a band of Arab Chauvinists murdered Albert Mizrachi, a Jewish post official, a native of Palestine, whose official position aroused the wrath of the Arab patriots. Before expiring, this victim identified his assailants who were apprehended and are charged with his murder.

### Brownsville's Largest Synagogue to Be Dedicated

Sunday, September 10, at 2 p. m., the formal opening of Brownsville's largest synagogue will take place. The building was erected at 139-145 Amboy street by the Congregation Chevra Torah Anshe Radishkowitz, of which Morris Goldman is president.

Max Abelman, executive director of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities, at the invitation of the Board of Directors, will speak on the advantages to be derived through the co-ordination of religion and charity.

### Beth Emeth Addition Nearing Completion

Work on the addition to Temple Beth Emeth, Church avenue and Marlborough road, is moving along speedily, that the building may be ready for use September 15. Rabbi Samuel J. Levinson, who recently returned from an extended trip through Europe, announces for the coming season a public forum, at which various topics of the day will be discussed by prominent and able speakers. Classes in history and civics will be introduced and an athletic club will be organized.

The first affair at the temple will be early in October, when "open house" will be held and the premises will be thrown open for inspection by the public. The celebration will be concluded with a luncheon and social for the members. Next week a drive will be started to get 300 new members.

Work on the building is practically completed and is confined now only to the interior decorating and to the moving in of furniture. The seating capacity of the temple was increased from 520 to 855. The entire building operation is said to have cost more than \$200,000.

### Incites to Boycott; Sentenced to Prison

Jerusalem (Jewish Press Association).—An Arab agitator in Haifa who preached the "boycott" as an economic weapon against the Jew found himself running afoul the law of the land, and he was sentenced to six months' imprisonment, besides being fined a substantial sum of money.

This ultra 100 per cent. Arab had sought to interfere with an Arab peasant who was selling some eggs to one of the Jewish city residents by reminding him that between the Arab and the Jew there could be no peace or economic intercourse. This intrusion was resented by both parties, who placed the Arab "patriot" under arrest and pressed charges against him.

## Orthodox Rabbis of America Indorse Hias' Work

The Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States has indorsed the work of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America (HIAS).

In an appeal signed by Rabbi B. L. Levinthal, the president, the union says that in view of the financial situation in which the great organization finds itself it is the solemn duty of the entire Jewry of America to come to its aid.

The appeal says that it would be a calamity if the European activities of HIAS should cease, and there is grave danger of that by reason of the lack of funds.

The rabbis in particular are called upon to support the request of HIAS that appeals be made in the synagogues on Kol Nidrei night.

OLD LANDMARKS

Dear Children:  
Moses continued to admonish Israel as follows: "Lo thasig gebul." "Thou shalt not remove the landmark of thy neighbor which they of old have set." Rashi says the words "Lo thasig" indicate "turning backward," for he turns the sign showing the boundary line of the ground, backward into the field of his neighbor, in order to enlarge his own field. But does it not already say, "Thou shalt not rob." Why then this command, "Thou shalt not remove, etc." To teach us that he who removes his neighbor's boundary line transgresses two commandments. Lest you think this also applies to a field outside of the Land of Israel, therefore, we are taught, "In thy inheritance which thou shalt inherit, etc." In the Land of Israel he transgresses these two prohibitions, but outside of "Eretz Israel" he transgresses only the commandment, "Thou shalt not rob."

"There shall not rise up one single witness against a man." This is the foundation of the principle that wherever "eid," "witness" is mentioned in the Torah it means two persons, unless it expressly mentions one. "For any iniquity or for any sin," to cause his neighbor to be punished corporally or financially, but he can rise against him to make him take an oath. As, for instance, one said to his neighbor, "Pay me back the money I lent you," and he replies, "I owe you nothing," and there is one witness that testifies that he does owe him, he is obliged to swear that he does not owe it. Upon the evidence of two witnesses (literally "by the mouth of two witnesses"), and not by their written testimony sent to the Beth Din (Jewish Tribunal) in a letter, nor should an interpreter be placed between the witnesses and the judges. If a witness of violence rise up against any man to testify against him "Soroh" for any wrong—testimony that does not exist in fact, "Soroh," "turned aside," where the witness was turned aside from his entire testimony, as for instance, when others say to them, "Were you not with us on that day in that place?" (Sifri). Then shall both the men stand. This refers to the witnesses, and hence we learn that women should not testify. We also learn that they should deliver their testimony standing.

Who have the controversy—this refers to the litigants—before the Lord. It should seem to them as if they are standing before the All-Present, as it is said, "In the midst of judges doth He judge" (Psalms 82). The judges who shall be in those days. Pephtah in his generation is as Samuel in his generation (Talmud, Rosh Hashannah). You must treat him with respect. And the judges shall inquire diligently, through those who prove them false; the latter should be subjected to a severe cross-examination. And behold if the witness be a false witness (although expressed in the singular, it means two witnesses). Then shall ye do unto him as he had purposed to do unto his brother, as he had purposed to do but not as he had done, hence they said, "If the accused was killed through the tes-

timony of the false witnesses before it was discovered that they testified falsely, the false witnesses are not killed because the fact that Providence did not intervene to prevent the execution proves that the accused deserved death for another reason (Sifse Chachomim)—unto his brother. This teaches us that if they testified falsely against the married daughter of a priest, that they should not be burned, but should die the death of the man who was guilty with her, which is by strangulation. Therefore it is said here, "As he had purposed to do unto his brother," but not unto his sister, but in any other kind of death the Torah has made man equal to woman, and those who testify falsely against a woman are killed as those who testify falsely against a man. For instance, if they testified that she killed some one, or profaned the Sabbath, they are killed by the death she would have suffered, as the Torah made no other exception in her case than in the fact where it is possible to fulfill the punishment against the false witnesses by the death of the man who was guilty with the woman. And these who remain shall hear and be afraid. Hence it is learned that it is requisite to proclaim these men are killed because they were found guilty by the Beth Din of having false witness. And thy eye shall have no pity, but life shall go for life, eye for eye—that means the payment of money, likewise tooth for tooth, etc. This also means that they should be made to pay money which their false testimony would have caused the accused to pay.

What's the Answer?

New York Jewry cries out for Rabbinical leaders. Ask any thoughtful New York Jew who takes the slightest interest in the affairs of the Jewish community and he bemoans the fact that New York lacks virile leadership in the pulpits. Occasionally they qualify it by saying that Rabbi Stephen Wise is most aggressive, but, then, they qualify that again by saying that he is "too radical"; that they have in mind a different type of aggressiveness. When we make these comments we are not in any way trying to depreciate the present rabbis in New York; they will measure up to the standard to be found in most communities; but inasmuch as New York is a Jewish world almost its own, that it contains more Jews than any other city in the world; that the Jews play such an important part in the affairs of the city, and, further, inasmuch as Jewish influence in New York is felt in the Jewish communities in other parts of the country, New York should have unquestionably the highest quality of Jewish leadership. For years Temple Emanu-El has played rabbinical politics and for some reason or other has never made that pulpit as influential as it should be. Ask any one regarding that situation and they will answer that there is too much wealth in Temple Emanu-El; some rabbis, we have been told, refused to go to Temple Emanu-El or were disinclined to consider an offer of that pulpit at different times because they felt that they would be smothered under the weight of money-influence. We know quite well that one rabbi, at least, refused to go because he felt that his pulpit utterances would be censored by the Board of Trustees. Others probably had other reasons. Temple Emanu-El, representing the power of New York Jewry, owes much to the country as well as to the city of New York. It has always seemed to us to be too well satisfied and too smug in its complacency. We say unreservedly that the greatest rabbis are by no means in New York, and that New York has rarely contributed a great rabbi to the nation. We have no desire to single out instances of this, but the fact remains and is apparent to any one in the country. Well, what is the answer? We think it a shameful condition, one calling for as severe condemnation as that of Mr. Toeb during the relief drive that New York Jews do not wake up and are satisfied to go sleepily along with only average leadership. Too great a responsibility rests upon that group, greater than upon any other Jewish group in the country, and you find what—a hopelessly divided leadership. There are able men in the New York Jewry, but the world's greatest should be there.—The Jewish Criterion.

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Jewish Actress Refuses to Sing Russian Songs, Expelled From Latvia

Kovno (Jewish Press Association).—Madam Potozky, a Jewish concert singer, has been expelled from Latvia, because she refused to sing Russian songs. This singer had applied for a special permit to enter the country and give concert with a Jewish program at Shovel City. Her request was granted, and the concert program was duly arranged. On the day of the concert, however, the city officials of Shovel demanded that the program be changed and that Russian numbers be sung instead of Jewish. This Madam Potozky refused to do, and for her impudence in not complying with the bureaucrat's demand, she was ordered to leave the land. The Jewish National Council has made representation to the Ministry of the Interior concerning this striking incident.

From its heights *The Jewish World* looks down on us and waxes merry over our recent "threnody of 100 per cent. Americanism," because, forsooth, we hazarded the suggestion that Jewish immigration to this country is not entirely based on considerations of materialism and creature well-being. As if we said anything revolutionary or disturbing! But, then, *The Jewish World* is so diligent in seeing the mote in the other fellow's eye!

The more light thrown on the workings of the existing 3 per cent. immigration law of the United States the better. The American people do not yet realize the mischief that resides in this bit of legislation, nor will they until, in the fulness of time, our industrial situation of the future compels an intensive study of the problems with which we shall be confronted. Only then it may be too late to repair the damage which will have been inflicted.

Emile Berliner has just come in for much praise by reason of his splendid inventive genius. He has also earned expressions of gratitude because he has been a generous and unflinching contributor to the Zionist cause. That he is practically an unbeliever in our holy religion has been glossed over, the perfervid Zionist regarding only Zionist orthodoxy, not Jewish orthodoxy. Aye, there's the rub. The sooner our Zionists cleave to Judaism as well as to Zionism the better for the latter.

Well, it had to come. "It" is the broadcasting of sermons by our Reform rabbis over the radio. We read that Rabbi Herbert C. Straus of Augusta, Ga., is completing arrangements whereby his preachments will have such dissemination. Of course, it is easy to understand why the Reform rabbis take up the broadcasting of their sermons by radio. Only by such a method will they obtain large congregations. And henceforth in Reform congregations a feature of the questionnaire applicable to candidates for vacant pulpits will be, Is the rabbi able to preach by radio? It is all very simple and all very up-to-date. Besides, the Reformers need not fear that the Orthodox will ever copy this practice.

The judge in Brooklyn—a non-Jew, by the way—who cited the authority of the Talmud in support of his decision that a rapacious creditor could not seize the wedding-ring from the finger of a poor debtor, who happened to be a woman, paid thereby a due tribute to the humanity of the Jewish jurisprudence. The world does not know, since it little reads the Book of books, to say nothing of the Talmud and the rabbinical literature, that ancient Israel in its system of justice aimed as near perfection as was humanly possible. And when we recall that the so-called jubilee legislation was properly carried out, the wisdom and humanity of the Jewish jurisconsults stand clearly revealed. We hope Judge MacMahon's example will be frequently emulated by jurists here and throughout the land. It ought to accomplish much for the betterment of man and the downfall of Socialistic tendencies among our people. The Socialists simply hark back to Biblical and Talmudical precedents for their doctrines, although few of them know this and fewer still admit it.

#### THE COMMISSION NUISANCE

ONE of the post-war developments in American Jewry is the growth of our philanthropic and international institutions, especially in the direction of enabling our community to perform its full duty by the war-stricken Jews of the Old World. As a feature of this development we observe that commissions are created to carry the message and the tangible succor provided of American Jewry to the communities overseas and to correlate the disparate forces of Jewry from all sections of the universe into a closely-knit unit.

Now Jewish commissions undoubtedly had their uses at first, but at the present time, when the number of these bodies threatens to become legion, it looks very much as if they have grown into a nuisance for American Jewry. We now have so many and such different kinds of commissions that we almost require the aid of a bureau to keep proper track of them, and that the army of those employed on these bodies bids fair to extend to very respectable proportions.

In fact, the commission nuisance for American Jewry is in a fair way to vie with the similar excrescence of Congressional activity, and with like results. Time was, nor are we sure that we may not still say time is, when a committee of Congress provided itself with a "junket" to foreign lands at the public expense, ostensibly, of course, in pursuance of a public duty.

We do not know that every member of all the different Jewish commissions "pays his own freight," but we do know that many, if not most, of them have their expenses defrayed out of communal or organization coffers. This item alone is sizable, but, aside from it, the existence of so many commissions, with all their members, paraphernalia, reports, objects accomplished or the reverse, amounts, indeed, to a veritable nuisance. It might also be noted that most of these commissions go abroad during the vacation period, and while some of the commissioners do actually visit Poland and the surrounding country, yet much time is spent in sightseeing and visiting the pleasure resorts of Europe.

We think it is time that the community order its own house in this matter. With so many commissions, with commissioners innumerable, the wonder will be that any Jews will be left in America who do not "feed at the communal crib."

Relief is needed for some if not all of the commissions with which our life as a community is now beset.

#### THE ZIONIST FOREGATHERING

THE Zionist *Jahreskonferenz*, just concluded at Karlsbad, accomplished two very useful objects. For one thing, it enabled those in control of the destinies of this great movement to take stock, as it were, of their progress during the preceding twelvemonth, important in this instance by reason of the strength, the influence and the ramifications of the cause. Thus the *Jahreskonferenz* registered its approval of the efforts now making to unite the two factions in this country, represented by those adhering to the *Keren Hayesod* program and the members of the Brandeis-Mack group.

From another point of view this *Jahreskonferenz* had valuable implications. Palestine can be rebuilt, Zionistically speaking, with the help of the Arab people, as contemplated by the recent additions to the Balfour Declaration promulgated by the British Government. This amendment the Zionist rank and file must accept equally with the Zionist leaders, and while the latter have already declared their adhesion to it, the rank and file could not have vocalized their sentiment over it without a *Jahreskonferenz* of this kind. This, then, is an important, if not the most important, factor behind the holding of the Karlsbad meeting.

Naturally it was exceedingly flattering to the Zionists of America to find that the principal speakers at Karlsbad paid so much attention to and expressed their due appreciation of the qualities of American leadership in the movement. We must not forget that the vast majority of the delegates at Karlsbad came from the continent of Europe and that only a scant few emanated from our own country. Therefore it comes as a welcome evidence of recognition that the American-Zionist work received the unqualified approval of the Karlsbad foregathering.

Such a meeting as that at Karlsbad spells for Zionist progress. Difficulties arose in its course, and there were differences of opinion between outstanding Zionist characters over matters of policy. But the conclusion registered the firm purpose of the leaders to continue to work as before and to carry on the cause entrusted to their care with an eye single to the one purpose—the welfare and the well-being of the entire Jewish people.

Speaking of the introduction of women into the Reform Jewish pulpit a Jewish journal, supposedly standing for Judaism pure and undefiled and hailing from overseas, decries the departure from the point of view of its novelty. It adds: "... in the modern Jewish pulpit—by no means confined to Reform—there is many an old woman." And among our brethren Jewish editors there is one that needs instruction in *derech eretz*.

Our recent remarks on the Jewish college fraternities, which *The Jewish Criterion* reprinted, served to make our contemporary disagree with us. The Pittsburgh journal believes that prejudice against the Jew at the colleges sprung out of the circumstance that the number of Jewish students increased by leaps and bounds. Yet just because the number of Jewish students increased by leaps and bounds the Jewish college fraternities arose. Therefore if the increase in the number of Jewish students is responsible for present academic anti-Semitism, the Jewish college fraternities gave this prejudice direction and force. So we cannot see that our original remarks were so far from the mark.

#### THE LEAKAGE

"Thy sons and daughters shall be given unto another people, and thine eyes shall look and fail with longing for them all the day long: and there shall be no might in thy hand." (Deut. xxviii, 32.)

OF all the withering curses contained in the Chapter, this, I think, is the darkest. It is blood-curdling. It is worse than the dread diseases, worse than the panicky fear of the driven pariahs of mankind, as depicted there: worse than the sickliest hallucination of a diseased mind given to gruesome visionings. Such minds are oft visited by ghosts and demons, haunted by nameless shapes, but their terror is nothing to the utter bewilderment suggested here of the helpless parent beholding the disloyalty of the child as it scornfully leaves the ancestral hearth, to join the ranks of the stranger and, horror of horrors, live an alien kind of life. And when such cases are multiplied until it becomes a national calamity, and a people find itself little by little bereft of its choicest, strongest, most promising human material—the blood, the brain, the brawn of its young—then there can be no more appalling disaster for any people. It is worse than war which decimates the population and ends in stupor; worse than a stream of emigration which usually sends forth the most dispensable elements; worse than epidemics—this steady slow and sure oozing away of the strength of a nation.

And this is what I call Leakage. . . .

Parents may lose their children by death, by any of the possible contingencies of the uncertain human existence; and then they have not themselves to blame. In the national life, the young may be carried away captive, or as hostages, or as colonizers, and in many such cases, particularly in ancient times, the sap of the youth goes to feed the strength of the captor-nation; but even so neither the individual parent, nor the nation as a whole, is to be held guilty. But this is not, I take it, the sense of the text. Whence do I derive the meaning I am about to attach to the text? Not from any direct evidence, only from instinct, from the whole *feel* of the words: and then also to some extent from my knowledge of Jewish History and the Jewish character. The meaning as I sense it is rather that the young would be leaving, oozing away from the ancestral home and the ancestral life, because that home and that life would be made so unattractive, so repulsive, by the parents themselves as to leave the generous-minded youth no other choice than to flee the stifling, suffocating atmosphere replete with dangers to their spiritual development. This, then, is the curse laid upon backsliding Israel, that their children, seeing the gross, ungodly life led by the parents, a life of greed, gluttony and superstition, a life bereft of human dignity because lacking in spiritual purpose and moral significance, would in steady slow streams trickle away, leak away, to fill the vessels of the stranger, to enrich his life: and the better the children, the subtler their spiritual capacity, the keener their hunger for God and Goodness, the more surely, though not without ache and inner struggle on their part, would they turn their back upon so meaningless and repellent a life as offered to them through the sheer accident of birth by their fathers and mothers—by their people.

And this is terrible. The living accusation in the child eye, the slowly but menacingly rising tide of resentment in the child heart, accusation and resentment depicting themselves in the countenance, the bearing, of our offspring, mingled with signs of agony and shame—if we only saw it all!—this is punishment worse than the rack, worse than life-long torment. When the sins of the fathers fall upon the children and these bear the fearful load, it is bad enough; in some cases mysterious heredity sees to it that they must bear it, most of it; but when the children, so far as possible, throw off the unbearable burden, and stand with glowing eye and defiant mien as incontrovertible evidences of the parents' guilt and reproach: that is an act of divine judgment; that is the most awful revenge of time!

That nation is the richest which has most to give to other nations, to the world at large. Let the young of a nation excel in intellect; in industry, in learning and the arts: let them be great thinkers, great inventors, musicians, painters or sculptors, whatever they produce goes to enrich not only the life of their own country but is gathered into the treasury of all mankind. But, in addition to the direct result of their work in which all share, the parent-nation receives the praise, the recognition of all peoples—to use the cruder term, the credit,—for having fathered such a genius, such a benefactor of the race. In such cases, the parent people cannot be the loser even if to some extent the prodigy boy or girl becomes as it were *denationalised*, for there naturally flows back from the gifted son or daughter a current of inspiration, of abundant life, that can never be taken away from it. Out of the body and soul of a people there flashes up the spark of genius: that brilliant spark will forever be more intimately part of the illumination of the nation's spirit than of the world's body and being, and it will ever feed the fires of the ancestral hearth more brightly, more hearteningly, than of mankind's life and aspiration. But when a nation loses its youth to other peoples through its own unworthiness, then the leakage is absolute, is irrevocable, for the spiritual achievements of that youth will never revert to the parent people in the form of worth-while recognition or of that back-flow of wondrous life which is the finest after-effect of the work of genius.

And is not this very Leakage, as here described, taking place in our Jewish life today? And for the reasons suggested? Are not the best leaving us? Jewish parents, think—think—think!



## PERSONALITIES

THE recent announcement in New York that the Republicans had picked Louis Zeltner as a candidate for Congress in the 12th district in the coming elections, recalls an interesting story and one which, aside from its bearing on the man, is remarkable as a piece of true fact rendered in decided fiction form. Louis Zeltner is a well-known New York personality and is particularly a familiar figure on the East Side,

gallows and beat for the time many an expert detective working on the case.

It happened some years ago that in the town of Dembrova there lived a young man named Sholem Schneer. Sholem was a vacillating youth without much backbone, and he fell in love with a buxom peasant girl. In this, it is true, he did not show any lack of backbone, but wherein he proved himself an arrant weakling

that the baptismal water could be shaken off him like the raindrops from a duck's back, and evolved a plan of decisive action. In the dead of night ten of the best and most muscular brothers surrounded the monastery where Sholem enjoyed his new fathers' hospitality, and when an opportunity came some of their number rushed the gates, seized the apostate in the confusion and made off with him.

In the privacy of another conference Sholem was made to see the error of his ways, and before he could recover his balance from the wonderful chain of adventure which had suddenly enmeshed his simple self he was bundled onto a train and shipped off to New York.

Now what had been a light comedy became a very realistic tragedy. Sholem's converters became the soul of vindictiveness. They gave to the incident a venom that was ready to go to any extreme to obtain revenge on the Jews who had stolen away Sholem and flaunted their might insultingly. A complaint was lodged with the police that Sholem was murdered by his people out of vengeance for his rejection of the Jewish faith, and demanded justice.

The police were not slow to seize on the opportunity. Presently proof became abundant that Sholem's kin had actually murdered the youth, and the Schneer family, as well as some of the men involved in his abduction, were arrested, charged with murder. A trial was speedily rushed through and conviction was obtained. Sentence to the gallows followed.

In the grim seriousness of the situation the Dembrova Jews made frantic attempts to get Sholem back. But no one knew where he was. He had been sunk in the great American metropolis and was totally ignorant of what was taking place at home. And in the absence of the one person who could save them all, appeals for reversal of the sentence or clemency were hopeless.

It was at this juncture that Louis Zeltner made his dramatic entrance. Sholem Schneer's picture had appeared in the newspapers. Sholem did not read newspapers, but Zeltner did and was a newspaper man besides. And still, again, he knew everyone and everything on the East Side. As soon as the picture appeared Zeltner decided to go in quest of Sholem. And from out of the maze of tenements and pushcarts he dragged out a bewildered boy who answered to the name of Sholem Schneer.

Having established the boy's identity beyond question Zeltner determined to bring Sholem personally to Dembrova and save the victims. He left his business and his family as best he could and, outfitting Sholem respectfully, journeyed with him to Europe at his own expense, never leaving him out of his sight for an hour.

Wherever the couple passed through Zeltner was greeted as a national hero by his fellow Jews, and all honor was accorded to him. The news of his life-saving mission traveled ahead of him, and his journey became akin to a parade.

He arrived at Dembrova in the fashion and in the manner so dear to old-school romancers. Scott's "Jeanie Deans," with her document of pardon, did not arrive at a more opportune moment than did Louis Zeltner with his living proof. Unwilling as they were to be cheated of their pleasure the police could do nothing but take official cognizance that Sholem was not six feet underground, and the men who already felt the straining of the gallows rope around their throats were released.

After this Sholem's peasant sweetheart and her kin could hardly have any more use for him, and he was sent out of the country again without difficulty, to lead a less eventful but more comfortable life in America.

Zeltner reaped the reward of his fine deed in added popularity, as is to be seen in his present nomination.

If elected this will not be Zeltner's first experience in political halls. In 1920-21 he served a term on the New York Board of Aldermen, being elected on a fusion ticket and roundly


beating his Socialist opponent, Joseph Held.

Another veteran of the Yiddish stage, Bernard Bernstein, died here on August 29 at the age of sixty-one. The old school of Yiddish theatricalism is passing out, both in person and in spirit, and it was fitting that the late Bernstein's colleagues should honor his memory with a unique funeral. A guard of honor conducted the body last Sunday from the rooms of the Actors' Club to Kessler's Second Avenue Theatre, where he had played so many of his well-known roles. Here Cantor Meisels chanted and the gifted orator Masliansky moved all with a wonderful forensic tribute. The body was then taken to the Warschauer Synagogue, in Rivington street, and to Mt. Zion Cemetery for interment.

Bernstein came to this country from Austria thirty-one years ago and was a popular figure on the stages of this country and England ever

**121,189 Persons Benefited by Federation's Free Dispensaries**

One hundred and twenty-one thousand, one hundred and eighty-nine persons were benefited in the past twelve months by dispensaries maintained at four hospitals supported by the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies. A total of 389,176 treatments were given during the year, making a daily average of 1,381 treatments. The hospitals included in this report are the Mt. Sinai, Fifth avenue and 100th street; Beth Israel, Monroe, Jefferson and Cherry streets; Lebanon, Westchester, Cauldwell and Trinity avenues, and the Hospital for Joint Diseases, 1913-1927 Madison avenue.

While small sums are charged for dispensary work, the federation explains, in all cases the work comes under the head of charity because the fees are so small—generally a quarter a visit—that the returns for the dispensary work do not begin to pay the maintenance cost of this branch of the federation's work.

These four hospitals together with the Jewish Maternity Hospital, 270-272 East Broadway, and the Montefiore Hospital for Chronic Diseases, Gun Hill road, had a daily average of patients during the year of 1,508. The total number of patients given beds in the hospitals was 23,346. Practically fifty per cent. of these patients were given free care, according to the federation statement. The expenses of these hospitals during the year amounted to more than three million dollars. Some of this cost, it was explained, was covered by private patients, but in the case of each hospital, the expenses for charity work are borne by the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies.

The Hospital for Joint Diseases is closed at the present time, although the dispensary is serving an average of 300 a day. A new building is being erected for this hospital. The new Beth Israel Hospital is also being rushed, and the year has seen important additions made to the Mt. Sinai Hospital.

In connection with each of the six large hospitals, there are ladies' auxiliaries and social service groups which devote their entire time to looking after the welfare of the families whose fathers or mothers are confined to any of these hospitals. Thousands were aided by the Social Service Units during the year.

**Memorial for the Late Benjamin Blumenthal**

Last Sunday the members of Temple Beth-El, at Belle Harbor, composed of residents of the Rockaways, held memorial services on the occasion of the death of Benjamin Blumenthal, who for fifty years was inspector of public schools of this city, for twenty-five years president of the Temple Rodeph Sholom and for forty-five years delegate-at-large and grand treasurer of the Independent Order Free Sons of Israel. The occasion was marked by the presentation on behalf of Mr. Blumenthal's family of a Sefer Torah.

Elias A. Cohen, president of the congregation, presided. Representatives of a number of religious and civic organizations were present, as were also the members of the family of the deceased, including his sons, Daniel W. Blumenthal, Simon B. Blumenthal, Charles S. Blumenthal and former Deputy Attorney General Maurice B. Blumenthal. Leopold Zimmerman, a brother-in-law of the deceased, made the presentation address. Mr. Zimmerman said:

"There has been assigned to me by the family of the late Benjamin Blumenthal the pleasant privilege of presenting to this congregation a Safah Torah.

"The gift is intended as a memorial to Benjamin Blumenthal and, coming from this source, serves not only as a sacred possession of the congregation, but also as an inspiration to its members. In the Torah we have the Jewish law, upon which rest the ethics and the precepts of morality that for centuries have guided and advanced the world's civilization. The Torah is the most valued possession of Israel, because it has been a beautifying influence in our lives and ever reminds us that as the chosen people we were commissioned by the Almighty to promulgate His law and by our devotion to the duties of citizenship and by our right living to set an example for all peoples to follow.

"Mr. Blumenthal was a fine example of the American Jew. Born and reared in this city, his father a rabbi, he so lived as to have left behind him a name that only the truly great can enjoy. His activities in fraternal and civic affairs, his service to the public school system of the city for almost half a century, in which he accomplished most valuable constructive work, are well known.

"During his entire life an active member of the Congregation Rodeph Sholom of this city, the oldest conservative Jewish congregation in the United States, and during his last twenty-five years its president, he became widely known throughout the country as one of the most lovable, useful and energetic figures in American Jewry.

"He loved this congregation, and often, when summering in this vicinity, attended its services. The members of the congregation loved and admired him and were inspired by his high conception of the sanctity of the law. It is most appropriate, therefore, that in tendering a modest gift to this congregation in memory of Mr. Blumenthal his family should have selected this beautiful transcript of the Mosaic law. We hope it will be accepted in the spirit in which it is tendered. We feel that it will serve to inspire in the members of this congregation and their posterity an ever-growing respect for Judaism and devotion to the tenets and traditions of our faith."

**Schiff's Nephew Confers on English Relief Campaign**

Otto M. Schiff, nephew of the late Jacob H. Schiff, has returned to England after spending some time in America conferring with the leaders of American Jewish relief work.

Mr. Schiff, one of the outstanding figures in English life, is the chairman of the Jewish Relief Appeal in that country. Associated with him as leaders in the campaign are such men as Claude Montefiore, Lionel Rothschild, and Lord Swaythling.

"We have no very large Jewish population in England—perhaps 260,000 all told," said Mr. Schiff before sailing, "but we will do everything in our power and raise every possible pound. We do not intend that the Jews of America, who have done so nobly by their stricken people, should outdo us in their generosity.

"We are much closer to the Jews of the Ukraine and Russia, geographically. The details of the terrible situation there come to us fresh, by word of mouth, and by living examples, in the way of refugees. I cannot conceive of any Jew turning an indifferent ear to the appeal for help.

"I am very glad to have the tremendous good fortune of Mr. Brown's advice and personal assistance. It is a remarkable thing he has been doing. To have given so much of his valuable time, his untiring effort, and money also, is an example which is to be greatly admired. We, in England, have watched his work with great interest, and it is very gratifying to us to have him with us, fresh from his investigations as a member of the American Commission."

**Danzig Citizenship Made Easier for Jews**

Danzig (Jewish Press Association).—The Danzig Senate has just adopted an amendment to the present naturalization laws, requiring but five years' residence in the Free City of Danzig to entitle one to the privileges of citizenship.

The existing naturalization laws required forty years' residence as a preliminary to citizenship. The Jews of the city protested to the League of Nations Council, and their protests were effective in securing a modification of the naturalization laws and requirements.

**Judges Endorse "Join" Week**

Leading members of the New York Judiciary have endorsed the Join Week campaign which the Friedlander Educational Conference will conduct throughout the greater city during the week of September 24 to urge all Jewish youth to enroll in a class, club or activity devoted to Jewish education in their neighborhood, hailing it as a great step forward toward deterring crime. In messages addressed to Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, honorary chairman of the campaign, the judges unanimously declared that practically every Jewish criminal brought before them was found upon investigation to be without any religious or Jewish education. Among the judges who have given their support to the movement are Harry E. Lewis, Louis D. Gibbs, Samuel D. Levy, Alexander H. Geismar and Leopold Prince.

In his statement Judge Lewis said: "After seven years' experience as County Judge and District Attorney, coming in contact with thousands of boys and girls who have violated our penal laws, and also by contact with Jewish institutions, I have come to the conclusion that the participation of the Jewish men in crimes is due principally to the lack of religious training."

Judge Gibbs said: "I have no hesitation in saying that such crime as exists among those of the Jewish faith could be cut down very materially, if not altogether eliminated, by religious education."

Judge Levy declared: "Where religion is seriously considered and where children are sent to religious schools and Sunday schools regularly and are made to understand and fully comprehend the seriousness of the Ten Commandments and what they really mean, in those families comparatively few children are brought before the Children's Courts for delinquency, and this holds good for all the faiths or creeds. In other words, if all the children of our land, whether Jewish, Catholic or Protestant, were sent to Sunday school and religious school and made to observe them, delinquency would be cut down 75 per cent."

Judge Geismar observed: "I have always been of the opinion that a proper religious education inculcated in the Sunday school and emphasized in the home is absolutely essential to the making of good character. By as much as there is defect of training in these respects, by so much may we expect our young Jewish people to show greater tendencies toward vice and crime. I do not believe that good morals or idealism are to be inhaled from the atmosphere. I believe that there should be a purposive, extensive and intensive system of education adopted so as to accomplish the desired result."

Judge Prince said: "Religion is a deterrent of crime, and if children received a proper religious foundation many a criminal tendency among Jewish young men would be lessened and perhaps avoided."

**Billion and a Half Polish Marks Loaned Out by J. D. C.**

Loans approximating a billion and a half marks have been made to individuals in Poland by the Joint Distribution Committee. By districts, the loans made and pending on July 31 were as follows: Warsaw, granted through 64 "Kasses" (loan societies), 273,000,000 marks; pending, 280,000,000.

Bialystok, granted through 16 "Kasses," 78,000,000 marks; pending, 80,000,000.

Wilna, granted through 47 "Kasses," 87,000,000 marks; pending, 140,000,000.

Galicja, granted through 21 "Kasses," 48,000,000 marks; pending, 120,000,000.

To Consumers' Co-operatives, 13,000,000 marks; pending, 25,000,000.

Agricultural loans through O. R. T., 40,000,000 marks; pending, 20,000,000.

For reconstruction purposes 220 loans, approximating 280,000,000.

On the same date \$15,000 had been spent for trade school equipment. These schools are to be maintained by the Jewish Colonization Association, according to an agreement with the Joint Distribution Committee.

Ten thousand dollars has been paid in Latvia for school and credit operations.

Fifty-seven thousand dollars has been appropriated for school purposes in Hungary, where a credit system is being organized.

Loans for housing purposes amounting to \$12,000 have been drawn by Lithuania.

**The World's Largest Thermometer**

No longer will promenaders along the Boardwalk at Atlantic City be obliged to guess at the temperature. Colgate & Co., who have the largest clock in the world atop their big buildings in Jersey City, have now placed the world's largest thermometer on an electric sign facing the Boardwalk just below Michigan Ave. It towers fifty feet in the air on a structural framework sixty feet high by thirty-three feet wide. The mercury bands are ten inches wide, while the numerals indicating the degree are eighteen inches.

Alongside the thermometer appears the legend, "You'll come to Colgate's by degrees." Even as the giant clock at Jersey City supplies time to the whole of New York harbor twenty-four hours a day, so will the thermometer at Michigan Avenue record and announce the temperature at all hours. The electric lighting on the board is so arranged that the mercury and numerals can be seen on the darkest night.

A system of small thermometers with electrical relays will operate the lights on the board to indicate the temperature automatically and accurately. Use Colgate's products for "Good Health."

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**"Only a Jew"**

The brutal attack on Maximilian Harden, the well known German publicist, seems to be yet another example of murder (or attempted murder) as a method of political propaganda, a subject which we commented upon in our last issue. Once again, too, the crime meets with the approval of certain sections of public opinion.

Deeds such as these are naturally abhorrent to the normal minded, but to the American or Britisher they are even more inexplicable when inspired by the bitter hatred of the Jewish race which appears to obsess many minds in this country.

In the United States or Great Britain the Jew has proved himself a worthy citizen, often even a great one; industrious, law abiding, frequently with an intellect above the average, he plays a welcome part in all political, social or commercial activities. But in Eastern and Central Europe, perhaps more especially in Germany, the Jew is regarded at the best with suspicion or dislike, and more often is subjected to persecution and ostracism.

What, then, has the Jewish race, as a whole, done to inspire such antipathy? Is it that as men of peace and industry they have succeeded where the advocates of force have failed lamentably? This, at any rate, would seem to be a partial explanation; for today Judaism is almost the dominating influence in German politics, while the saber rattlers must be content to hold envious council behind closed doors or in remote castles.

As mere onlookers, Americans and British are ready to respect the honest political opinions of all parties in Germany, but it is almost impossible to respect those who consider murder as a legitimate argument.—Munich (Bavaria) Weekly.



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

## "IN ALL MY EXPERIENCE I HAVE NEVER SEEN ANYTHING LIKE THIS!"

An Interview with Dr. Lee K. Frankel

By A. H. FROMENSON

When I finally got to Dr. Lee K. Frankel in his luxuriously appointed office in the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, I missed that poise, that remarkable self-control that is so characteristic of him. Getting to see him was no easy matter. He had just returned from Europe, whither he had gone as the head of the commission appointed by Mr. Louis Marshall, president of the American Jewish Relief Committee, to act as the "eyes" of the Jews of America and see how our people abroad are far-

ing. He had been away since June 29, and he was working at top speed to catch up with some of the most important matters that demanded his attention as vice-president of the Metropolitan. And though we had fixed a time that seemed convenient to him, there were so many officials of the company clamoring for "just one minute" that, unlike his usual method, he had to ask me to wait a little longer. But the knowledge that I was waiting to talk to him and what we were to talk about brought back to his mind, in vivid fashion, many of the things he had seen. And, as I found out very shortly, it was this that so depressed this man who during the course of the last quarter century has seen human misery in its many and most tragic forms—the sick, the maimed, the halt, the blind, the handicapped, the widowed, the orphaned.

I could not help expressing my surprise.

"Never, in all my experience, have I seen anything like this," he ejaculated. "I have never seen such misery, I have never seen such poverty, I have never seen such suffering."

### "The Bridge of Sighs"

"Let me give you one picture," he went on.

"At Rovno the Polish authorities have set up a detention pen into which are herded the thousands upon thousands of repatriates—those indescribable unfortunates who fled from war and pogrom and who are now making their way homeward after undergoing God only knows what misery, what tortures of hunger, cold and disease during the intervening years. A strong stockade has been erected so that none may escape before they have been inspected and passed. A bridge leads across the stockade to the feeding station, where these unfortunates get a hunk of black bread and something called 'soup'."

"An old man was being led across that bridge by a girl, apparently his daughter. Bent with age and shambling in gait, there was something about that unkempt, hoary head that conveyed the impression that once, in those happy days before 1914, that old man had been 'somebody'—a merchant, or a rabbi perhaps. Now he was going across that bridge for a hunk of black bread, for a bowl of 'something called soup', and all he wore to cover his nakedness was an overcoat. Nothing else, except some straw wrapped about his feet.

### Fourteen in One Room

"And here is another picture: I had gone to see how things were going with some of the orphans who are the wards of the Joint Distribution Committee, thanks to the splendid generosity of the Jews of this country.

"When we talk of caring for orphans in Europe, we don't mean by this that we are taking care of the particular child alone. It means, in a very large number of cases, that by the money we are giving for that orphan, we are making it possible not only for it, but for its widowed mother to live better than they could without our help.

"This was one of those cases. We found this orphan and her mother in fair comfort—that is, they lived decently in one room. But from the adjoining room came three other widows, who were not yet receiving support. Three families—fourteen persons in all—in one room. I hate to think of this picture—I hate to think of the sort of life they have to live—if you can call that living," Dr. Frankel ejaculated.

"And that brings me to what I consider the most important, the most pressing of all problems still confronting us in our efforts to aid our people in

Europe," went on this great social expert.

"It is the problem of the orphans. I don't know how many orphans there are in the Ukraine. We were under the impression that there were 300,000 there. But Morris Wolf and Dr. Milton Rosenau, who went there as members of the commission, estimate the number at 600,000.

### "But That Isn't All"

"But that isn't all of the Russian story," Dr. Frankel remarked. "You can get some slight idea of it when you recall that on August 1, 1,000,000 children and 800,000 adults were being fed in the kitchens operated jointly by the Joint Distribution Committee and the American Relief Administration. They would have died otherwise. Colonel Grove was not exaggerating when he said that if it were not for the funds supplied by the Jews of this country at least one-tenth and possibly more of all the Jews in the Ukraine would have perished. And there are about 3,000,000 Jews in that country.

"Conditions there are almost beyond human conception in their horror. Concentration camps filled with sick and dying refugees; children dying of typhus and dysentery in institutions; other children by the thousands wandering the streets and roads with none to care for them; whole communities decimated by disease, hunger and cold; men and women dying in the trains they hoped would carry them to some place where they could get some food. Oh! it is dreadful. And we, the Jews of America, ought to thank God that it is our blessed privilege to do what we are doing, and more, to relieve that terrible situation."

### A Word About the Commission

I have given so far some of the "high spots" of the story that Dr. Frankel has

brought back with him from Europe—a story that gains tremendously in its significance from the very fact that he tells it.

It was an extremely fortunate thing for all Jewry that it was possible for Louis Marshall and Felix M. Warburg to persuade Dr. Frankel to head this commission, which includes David A. Brown, the man who led the great relief campaign which went after \$14,000,000 and raised over \$17,000,000, and who is again giving himself freely and without reserve to the helping of his people; David M. Bressler, who led the New York relief campaign to success and who as manager of the Industrial Removal Office years ago gained expert knowledge of the Jewish immigrant and his problems; Dr. Milton Rosenau of Harvard, one of the greatest medical scientists in America; Morris Wolf, one of the leaders of Philadelphia's famous bar, who distinguished himself with a survey he made of European conditions for the Red Cross several years ago, and Samuel A. Goldsmith, secretary of the Bureau of Jewish Social Service, who since he left the university with high honors has been devoting himself to Jewish work. Mr.

Goldsmith is secretary of the commission.

The call for service came to Dr. Frankel at a particularly inopportune time. He had just returned to his responsible duties as vice-president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company after a year's leave of absence, which he had devoted to "humanizing" the Post Office Department, at the urgent request of Will Hays. As far back as anyone can remember—as far back as that time about twenty or more years ago when he had abandoned his chemical laboratory in Philadelphia to become the manager of New York's United Hebrew Charities, the dominant note of Dr. Frankel's life has been "service."

### One Could Write a Catalogue

One could write a reasonably long catalogue of the very many things he has done without ostentation, without thought of self—whether it be raising Jewish philanthropy from haphazard, degrading almsgiving to its present dignified plane or launching a scientific campaign against the spread of tuberculosis and organizing the National Health Association for that purpose; or

#### Book on Emigration Wins Praise of Prominent Jewish Writer

"What Every Emigrant Should Know" is a nicely printed Yiddish booklet, a translation from the English version, which was mentioned in this column a few weeks ago. The information given in the book is of the right sort, and the Council of Jewish Women deserves recognition for the good work it is doing for the wanderers with the instruction given in the book.

#### Baron de Hirsh Vienna Branch Moved to Warsaw

Warsaw (Jewish Press Association).—The Vienna branch of the Baron de Hirsh Bureau is now being transferred to Warsaw, the Polish government having given special permission to do so. The Vienna branch had been operating extensively in Galicia, supporting a number of Jewish schools, loan associations and other important Jewish institutions. Now that the political complexion of Europe has changed and Galicia is largely under Polish control, the operations of the bureau can better be handled from Warsaw than from Vienna. Hence the change.

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Jews at Harvard

Reactionaries and radicals are often equally sweeping. The radicals who have accused Harvard of reaction in the Jew problem are talking noise. It is the business of a university not only to distribute knowledge, but to maintain a culture. The Jews have an intensive culture of their own. The Jews will approve of a sieve that will add cultural tests to mere tests of industry, but they, like all liberals, see moral and intellectual death in discrimination by race. Moreover, as a matter of mere fact, is there any such emergency as President Lowell thinks?

The Grandgent Committee, now at work, can be trusted to face the question of cultural standards with advantage not only to the Christians but to the Jews as well; not only to Americans

of long residence here, but to newcomers, whether Poles, Russians, Italians, or French-Canadians. They will no doubt find some test that will protect university standards without singling out one race.

The Jews, on their side, should not be too sensitive. An example of Jewish broad-mindedness will be given next year when David Belasco, a Jew, produces "The Merchant of Venice," with another Jew, David Warfield, as Shylock. Jewish opposition to "The Merchant of Venice" has been a phase of that oversensitiveness to criticism nearly always shown by people put by circumstances on the defensive. The ideal attitude is to rejoice in the merits of one's people and to accept with serenity criticism and difference.—Norman Haggood in Hearst's International.

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A PILLAR OF JEWISH LITERATURE

(On the Death of David Frischman) By ELBERT AIDLINE-TROMMER

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"I swear I will compel you, by force if need be, to discard your obsolete ideas and old-fashioned mannerisms, and replace them by standards becoming real Europeans."

These proud words came from the pen of a young man, hardly twenty, whose pamphlet, "Tohu-Uvohu," directed against the old-time style of his contemporary Hebrew authors, created a great sensation in Jewish literary circles immediately after its publication. The author of the pamphlet was David Frischman, who already, at the age of thirteen, had contributed to the Hebrew weeklies "Haboiker Or" and "Ha-Schachar."

Frischman was born in a suburb of Lodz, Russian Poland, of a respectable, well-to-do family, and received, besides the traditional Jewish education, a thorough training in general subjects as well as in modern Hebrew literature. In 1890 he entered the University of Breslau, Germany, and five years later graduated from the faculty of history, philosophy and fine arts. Already at that time he was known as one of the foremost Jewish writers in Russia, if not in the world.

Frischman was the first to bring new currents into Hebrew literature, through the medium of his brilliant, sparkling style. And not only was he an innovator in his own writings, but he came out openly as a protagonist of a new style, a style unencumbered with the adornments and embellishments of the early "maskilim." Frischman was a lover of beauty in all its forms, and strove, with ultimate success, to introduce it into all the branches of Hebrew letters.

His was a hard but insistent struggle, but, being a man of brilliant wit and indomitable energy, he finally succeeded in making his victorious way through the maze of all that was archaic and old-fashioned in the Hebrew press and literature. In the first Hebrew daily newspaper, "Ha-Yom," to which he contributed, the young author published a number of splendid, breezy, yet profound "feuilletons" which are remarkable for their fineness of style and original, effervescent humor. Frischman introduced and perfected the Hebrew novelette. He was what may be termed "a gentle skeptic," and in his short stories, critical essays and other articles had always something new to say and said it in a new way.

He was very prolific, and wrote, outside of a great many publicistic articles, a number of short stories, all of them possessed of a soft, penetrating style with a light tint of dreamy romanticism. Among his Hebrew works, "Yiskor," "Sholshoh She-Ochlu," "Be-Shwel-Ha-Moshiach," "Moishe," "Aloto" and "Daniel Be-Gob Ha-Aroyot," are the best known. The last mentioned deals with the Kichinev pogrom and made an impression second only to that of Bilalik's "Maaseh Nemirov."

Frischman believed that a Hebrew author who knows Yiddish, too, has no moral right to write merely for the "aristocracy," well-versed in the tongue of the Prophets. He believed it his duty to write also for the masses who did not

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Bressler Returns From Investigation of European Jewish Conditions

David M. Bressler, who led the campaign in New York last winter which raised \$5,000,000 for the relief of Jewish war sufferers, returned from Europe on the "Berengaria" last Friday. Mr. Bressler went abroad on June 29 as one of the commissioners appointed by Louis Marshall, president of the American Jewish Relief Committee, to review

the relief work done by the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee during the past eight years and to recommend a program for speedily restoring the Jews of Europe to self-support.

Mr. Bressler, who was formerly manager of the Industrial Removal Office, which settled thousands of Jewish immigrants on a self-supporting basis throughout the United States away from New York, made a special study of the 400,000 war and pogrom refugees who have been wandering over the face of Europe since the outbreak of hostilities in 1914. He has visited Poland, Latvia, Lithuania, Austria, Bukovina, Roumania and Constantinople.

Mr. Bressler organized the first Jewish war relief campaign in 1915 and has been active also in the various Liberty Loan, Red Cross and United War Work campaigns in this city.

Arabs Store Munitions in Palestine

Jerusalem (Jewish Press Association).—The British Administration in Palestine has uncovered secret arsenals of munitions stored by Arab Nationalists of Sechem and Hebron, the greatest number and most ardent Arabs Schaw-unists are to be found in these cities. All of the firearms and munitions were confiscated and a thorough investigation is being made to determine the manner, methods and reasons for this secret importation of weapons of war.

Tobacco Experiment in Palestine a Success

Jerusalem (Jewish Press Association).—The experiments made by several Jewish colonists in planting tobacco in Palestine have been extremely successful. The soil, it seems, is especially suited for such crops, and the results have been very heartening. It is certain that tobacco will become an important export commodity in the economic life of Palestine.

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"I speak of this," Dr. Frankel explained, "because it so vividly reveals the really remarkable piece of work the Joint Distribution Committee is doing by the erection of bath houses for the communities. It is inconceivable, incredible, but it is nevertheless the fact that there is not even running water in 99 per cent. of all the homes in Poland. The bath houses built or repaired by the Joint Distribution Committee are being used not only by the Jews but by the Christians, by every element of the population. I am strongly in favor of the Joint Distribution Committee completing its program of erecting and repairing bath houses in Poland. Bath houses in at least 250 towns in Galicia are in need of repair. They must be repaired. Others must be built. Otherwise it will be impossible to check the spread of infectious disease.

"I am free to say that when the idea of this commission was broached by Mr. Billikopf at the 'Victory Conference' and prior to that, I was not very enthusiastic about it," said Dr. Frankel. "But now that I have been over, and have seen the problem at first hand, I realize that the sending of this commission is one of the biggest things that could have been done both for the Jews of Europe and for the Jews of America. The pity is that such a commission was not sent two and even three years ago. When you stop to consider how much time men devote to a close scrutiny of their local institutions, how they give up days and days to attend board and committee meetings in order that these institutions shall function efficiently, you can see how important it is that there shall be close contact between the Jews of this country and the problem across the ocean."

What the commission did, what they saw from day to day will be set forth in the report it plans to render in the near future. This report, Dr. Frankel told me, will be divided into two parts, one dealing with what still has to be done in order to restore European Jewry to a stage where at least it can work out its own salvation; the other, dealing with administrative detail, such as overhead, personnel and the like. I don't know how interesting the second part will be except for those who have been "on the job" since the beginning of the Joint Distribution Committee's work, but I am sure that the first part will be one of the greatest human documents ever prepared for Jewish purposes.

First, because of the men who have made the investigations and collected the data that will go into this report, and on which they will base their recommendations. And, secondly, the immense amount of territory covered by the commission. Upon its arrival in Vienna, where the main offices of the Joint Distribution Committee are located, the commission was split up into sections so as to cover more ground. Bressler, Wolf and Rosenau proceeded to Brest-Litovsk and Rovno and all the intervening territory. Dr. Frankel and Golsmith went to Wilna through Poland, Latvia and Lithuania. Then the commission reassembled in Warsaw to report their findings. Following this Dr. Rosenau went to Lithuania and Latvia, thence to Riga and into Russia, where they were joined by Brown. They are coming out of Russia, by way of Constantinople. Bressler and Golsmith left the Warsaw conference for Bukovina, thence to Kishineff to Jassy and Bucharest, and back to Vienna by way of Constantinople. Dr. Frankel went to Rovno, Dubno, Ratzivillow, Brody, Lemberg, Crakow and Budapest, where he was joined by Brown, and together they went back to Warsaw, taking in such points in Poland as had not already been covered. Brown left for Russia on August 26.

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**Central Committee Urges Sale of Stamps**

The Central Committee for the Relief of Jews Suffering Through the War, of 13 Astor place, New York city, is urging every congregation throughout the United States and Canada to order the 10-cent stamps issued by the said committee for the purpose of having them put on tickets to be sold in connection with the holy days.

Ten cents means nothing to those to whom these holy days mean everything and yet if most of the congregations, as it is hoped they will, order these stamps at once, a considerable sum can be raised and many lives will be saved.

Upward of a million children are being fed daily throughout Ukraine, White and other Russias, and they will have to be looked after for a least another year. Dr. Becilieri of Budapest, in one of his travels through Russian cities, describes that he witnessed a boy of ten frying a dog's skin, adding that the dog meat had been consumed by others.

Five pounds of black bread composed of mixed straw with doubtful flour costs 25,000 roubles; a pound of meat, 18,000 roubles; a pound of flour, 12,000 roubles; a pound of onions, 60,000 roubles; a measure of lamp oil, 18,000 roubles, and all we ask, for the time being, is the simple offering of 10 cents as an initiative of the holy day campaign, which is to be augmented by other suggestions to follow.

In Poland cultural aid is extended to 400 cities and 600 schools are being assisted monthly. In Lithuania, Latvia, Hungary, Czecho-Slovakia, Russo-Carpathia, Austria, Germany, Turkey, Palestine, Roumania, etc., were it not for the special grants made by the Central Relief Committee, most of the schools would have been compelled to shut their doors. Education is being provided very scantily in all of these countries, so far as Jewish children are concerned, and were it not for the Central Relief Committee, thousands of Jewish children would be totally deprived of general and religious educational advantages.
